LAWYERS DISCUSS TWO FALSEHOODS TOLD BY CARROLL

Were They Intended to Protect His Guests Or His Bootleggers Argued Before Jury

New York, May 27.—(AP)—Whether Earl Carroll lied to protect his guests or his bootlegger was the matter of argument today for consideration before the jury trying him on a charge of perjury. The theatrical producer told the grand jury that the bath tub at his party of February 22, did not contain either an intoxicating liquor or an undraped woman. Joyce Hawley, former underwear model, now on the stage, said drinks from the tub intoxicated her and she got into it without her underwear. If Carroll lied, Herbert C. Smyth, his attorney, argued yesterday, "he lied like a gentleman to protect his guests."

Swedish Woman Lifted to Fame By Saga Tales

Stockholm, May 27.—(AP)—Selma Lagerlof came out of the dark silent forests of the North as a little girl who loved to tell stories and she grew up to be one of Sweden's greatest woman writers, a weaver of sagas like the old Norse bards of a thousand years ago. Her books, fired with wild and moving scenes from Swedish life started a new school of writing and have brought her to the forefront of Swedish femininity. Honors and marks of esteem have come to her during thirty-five years of study and work, among them being the Nobel prize for literature, membership in Swedish Academy and honorary degrees from several universities.

ALVIN MANSEL TO PAY PENALTY IN ELECTRIC CHAIR

Haleigh, May 27.—(AP)—Alvin Mansel, Buncombe County negro, convicted of attacking a white woman, must die in the electric chair at state prison, the State Supreme Court decided today. No error sufficient to order a new trial was found by the court. June 11, the third Friday after his certificate of the opinion is automatically set for the day of the execution. Another opinion handed down by the Supreme Court had to do with the attack on the jail where Mansel was confined by a mob. The court ruled that Herman Banks, convicted of being a member of the mob, must serve a sentence in state prison which was imposed upon him.

Turner Leaves Candler Field For New York

Atlanta, May 27.—(AP)—Captain Roscoe Turner took off from Candler Field here today for New York piloting what was said to be the first passenger carrying plane from the south to the metropolis. His first stop will be Fayetteville, N. C., and another stop will be Washington, D. C.

After the British strike the usual happens, labor leaders fight among themselves; politicians fight each other, but not the men within their own camp. They attack the other party. Labor fights labor, and makes it easy for statesmanship and capital, Stamese twins, to run the government. Cook, leader of the miners, accuses J. H. Thomas, head of the railway unions, and Macdonald, formerly labor prime minister, of deserting the mine workers. This suits British capital and statesmanship, and will postpone the organizing of another general strike.

The Northern-Baptist Convention meeting in Washington today is threatened with a bitter church fight over "modernism. Standard Oil, the Rockefeller millions and the Rev. Dr. Fosdick," who is too modern to suit other clergymen. Mr. Rockefeller is the richest and a most philanthropic Baptist. The Rev. Mr. Fosdick is a reasonable, learned, convincing man. The church is injured by strife. See the first three verses, fourth chapter of Paul's Epistle to the Ephesians, especially this verse. "Endeavoring to keep the unity of the spirit in the bond of peace." When the good quarrel the heathens—to say nothing of the evolutionists—rejoice.

Evolutionists, and all that believe in the monkey descent, should tremble. The "Suprem Kingd" organized by Mr. Clark, one's acting Imperial Wizard of the Ku Klux Klan, will wipe out evolution, raising a fund of five million dollars and playing a very important part of the plan, although why monkey ancestors should be important in that election is not easily understood.

SINGLES OUT STATE AS TYPICAL FOR CONDITIONS OF CHILD LABOR

Atlantic City, May 27.—(AP)—William Greene, president of the American Federation of Labor, in a plea to the 18th biennial convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, today for increased activities for the adoption of the Federal Child Labor amendment singled out North Carolina as typical for objection conditions of child labor. "North Carolina," he said, "permits an eleven hour day and 60 hour week. Several other large states permit children under sixteen years of age to work 54 hours a week and in many of these states provision is made for longer hours of toil in case the repair of broken machinery interferes with the normal cause of employment." Mr. Green said that many states which voted for prohibition the federal income tax and women suffrage, voted against federal legislation to protect the lives of the children of the nation.

CARROLL FOUND GUILTY TODAY ON TWO COUNTS

Held Under \$5,000 Bail and Sentence is Deferred for One Week

New York, May 27.—(AP)—Earl Carroll was found guilty today of perjury in connection with the grand jury investigation of the bath tub party in his theatre at which Joyce Hawley, a nude show girl, served drinks from a bath tub. Carroll was on trial on four counts, two referring to a bath tub incident and two to his testimony that no liquor was served at the party. The jury found him guilty of the second two. Judge Goddard held Carroll in \$5,000 bail, twice the amount he had been requested to furnish before and deferred sentence for one week.

Kansas Has Plan To Build Lakes to Save Fish Supply

Topeka, Kan., May 27.—(INS)—"The lake system is the salvation of the Kansas sportsman, as it also is of Oklahoma, Texas and other sections where the running stream has been polluted from oil fields, killing the fish in these waters." That is the belief of J. B. Doze State Games and Fish warden, for Kansas. He estimates that one-half of the running streams of Kansas and Oklahoma, especially in the oil belt, have become so polluted that millions of fish have died, and that the only way to overcome this loss and to maintain this fine sport, is for the state, the communities and individual land owners to build artificial lakes and stock them with fish from the big state hatchery at Pratt.

Kansas will this year begin the building of two lakes to be paid for with hunting and fishing licenses, and without the cost of a dollar in taxes. There is \$40,000 in this fund now, and next year there will be \$125,000 more. Nearly 200 sites have been offered to the state under consideration by the State Games and Fish Commission. In dozens of communities, he says, farmers are advocating the building of "community lakes" and the planting about them of trees and shrubbery for their own pleasure grounds and for the accommodation of tourists.

Mrs. Everett was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Noah Moore, of Chiles, and was beloved by a host of friends. She was popular with people throughout her community. The deceased is survived by her husband and two children.

Former President to Die for Murder of 26 People

Baku, Russia, May 27.—(INS)—Funtikow, a former president of the Caucasian Republic, has been sentenced to death here for the murder of twenty-six persons, on evidence supplied by his seventeen year old daughter. The political differences of the father, who is a counter revolutionist, led to a series of family quarrels which eventually prompted the girl to tell the police of the crimes committed by her parent. Investigation proved that Funtikow systematically lured commissars entrusted with state funds into his house and there murdered them, stealing whatever money he could get. In each case the body was found in a wood of river and with a bullet hole in the skull, which the authorities usually took to indicate suicide. Funtikow had considerable political influence in his district and a good reputation, which would likely have kept him out of jail. The daughter's story at first was not believed but it was found that the former president had put the money stolen from his victims in a trunk without the formality of destroying the pocket-books or bags in which it was contained.

Riffian Chief Has Arrived Inside French Lines

Paris, May 27.—(AP)—Abd-el-Krim, the Riffian chief, who announced his surrender yesterday, has arrived inside the French lines and will be escorted immediately to Taza. Announcement to this effect was made by Premier Briand after a cabinet meeting today.

ANDREWS URGES TIGHTENING OF VOLSTEAD ACT

Declare Sale of Beer Should Be Stopped and People Taught What National Prohibition Is

Washington, May 27.—(AP)—Material tightening of the Volstead Act so that the country "may know what national prohibition means" was urged today by Assistant Secretary Andrews of the Treasury, the national dry chief before the House Judiciary Committee. He spoke in favor of a bill drafted by the treasury to give the prohibition unit power to inspect at any time a factory manufacturing cereal beverages. "It is common knowledge," he said, "that in wet areas beer is being sold. It can be stopped, and should be stopped if for no other reason than that the people throughout the country may know what the national prohibition law means."

Mr. Andrews testified after Mrs. Mable W. Willebrandt, Assistant Attorney General, had endorsed the Stalker Bill to make prison sentence mandatory for first convictions for sale, manufacture and transportation of intoxicating beverages. This bill precipitated some sharp discussions and after leaving the witness stand, Mrs. Willebrandt said the measure would not make sentence mandatory for first convictions for possessing in toxicants except when possessed for sale. Some committee members contended it would make a jail term necessary for the carrier of a hip pocket flask.

Little Girl Killed In Auto Accident

Fayetteville, N. C., May 27.—(AP)—Rita, four-year-old daughter and only child of Sergeant Michael Reardon, quartermaster at Fort Bragg, was killed last night in an automobile accident near here when the car, driven by her father, struck a sand bed, careened and threw the child into the windshield. Her neck was broken. The father and mother were returning with the little girl from a furlough which they spent in Philadelphia. Mrs. Reardon suffered a broken collar bone and internal injuries. Sergeant Reardon received many minor cuts.

HEAT THE SCAPEGOAT
 When it is hot everything is blamed on the heat. "Crazy with the heat" is an old slang phrase which has no more pat application than that by which it is attached to those who make excessive heat responsible for everything from the loss of ball games to the birth of triplets. One cannot doubt that there are numerous cases of heat prostration and that some of them result fatally, but in many of the deaths credited to heat the excess of temperature is responsible only in an indirect way. Bather seeks the cooling river and in drowned—heat. Someone goes to sleep in a hammock which breaks and the sleeper is perhaps fatally injured—heat. Another suffers an attack of acute indigestion possibly due to eating food that should not be eaten in hot weather—heat again. Heat brings an abundance of discomfort and it is wise to take precautions to prevent serious results following in its trail, but there

is no use becoming alarmed because the temperature hovers around 90 for a week or so. It exceeds that for long periods in the tropics and yet people continue to exist there.

Observe customs of living that all know are suited to hot weather. Somebody said that heat is a state of mind and it is likely that much of the discomfort is more imaginary than real.

Paris, May 27.—(INS)—Bonapartism is dead in France, buried with the body of Prince Victor-Napoleon, pretender to the sceptre of Napoleon the First, who died recently in Brussels after almost forty years of exile from his native soil.

Prince Victor was never a very ardent pretender and his last illness and death created only a slight flurry of Empirical patriotism in France. His pretension was supported by no organized party. He was content to live his life of ease in the Belgian capital having married into the Belgian Royal family.

Prince Victor's heir, the 12-year-old Prince Napoleon, has even slighter chance of ever being recognized as a serious pretender. The Bonapartists do not believe in Divine Right, therefore the young Prince could never rule France conscientiously without the consent of the people—consent which will never be

given.

"Papa" Lenglen, father of the incomparable Suzanne of tennis fame, has written a book which will soon be on the news stands, and undoubtedly translated immediately into English.

"Why and How I Trained Suzanne," is the title of the book, which relates Suzanne's first efforts at knocking a tennis ball against a brick wall to her memorable match with Helen Wills at Cannes last February.

"Papa" Lenglen relates how Suzanne when a tiny girl was frail and delicate. He decided to aid her physical development. He first thought of swimming, but, having been a tennis player of some ability himself, he decided upon tennis. For years Suzanne put in fifteen minutes of practice daily, in addition accuracy and speed, according to M. Lenglen, "the basis of her superiority."

Fifteen years ago, Suzanne then being 13, the Bordighera Tennis Club having arranged a tournament, invited the best Nice players to participate. Suzanne went, accompanied by her ever-present mother. After receiving them, the secretary of the club invited Madame Lenglen to prepare for the play.

"But I don't play," protested Madame Lenglen, "it is my daughter."

The secretary is reported to have said later: "Ja Nice so hard

up for tennis players that they have to send us children?"

Suzanne won the ladies' singles of the tournament, sweeping the boards clean as she has done in many a more important tournament since.

Paris apartment house proprietors, as greedy as any in the world, have tried many ruses to raise the rents of their tenants, but the proprietor of an apartment occupied by a Parisian actor, Pierre Daltour, went a bit far. According to reports, the proprietor had Daltour arrested and preferred a complaint of insanity against him.

The ruse failed to work. Daltour was confined for a week but finally released after experts declared he was perfectly sane. Daltour is still occupying his apartment and it is said he will prefer charges against his proprietor.

Mack Prescott, one of the oldest of the Alumnae present, spoke for about two minutes, and reviewed the history of the college from its infancy to the present time. Hon. R. W. Smith, who represented Pitt County in the Legislature four years ago, was next called upon and gave a good account of himself, as he always does. Mr. Smith said he rejoiced to see the splendid work which has been done by the Free Will Baptist denomination and that the new college buildings stood as a monument to the perseverance of the leaders of the denomination here in Ayden, and elsewhere throughout the state.

Mr. Larry W. Smith, assistant cashier of the First National Bank of Kingston, was the next to respond, and like his father, Hon. R. W. Smith, gave a good account of himself. Young Mr. Smith was a former student of the college, and spoke of the time when he was a student. Rev. W. B. Everett, financial agent of the college, was next on the program, and in his own inimitable way, enlivened the occasion by telling a good joke on himself and a friend, whom he would not call by name. No one is more at home telling jokes than Rev. Mr. Everett. Mr. J. R. Turnage, President of the First National Bank, also president of Turnage Bros. Department Store, was the next speaker, and made one of his best talks. Mr. Turnage is never happier than when talking education or good roads. He emphasized the great growth of Eureka College, and told the Alumnae that the town of Ayden was behind the college, and would do all that could be done for its advancement. Mr. Turnage also called attention to the interest which the Rotary Club felt in the college.

Prof. L. R. Ennis of the college faculty, was the last speaker on the program, and made a few timely remarks on the growth and future of Eureka College. He predicted a steady growth for the college and spoke on the loyalty and devotion of the Alumnae of the school. He stressed the importance of finishing the auditorium in the near future.

After the speeches had been completed, the organization of an Alumnae Association for the coming year was proposed. For president, the name of Larry W. Smith, of Kingston, was placed in nomination. Upon motion Mr. Smith was elected by a rising vote. Then followed the election of Hon. M. Butler Prescott as vice-president and George W. Prescott as secretary and treasurer.

The Eureka College Quartette, composed of Rev. R. F. Pittman, J. F. Casey, L. R. Ennis and Colie Prescott, were on hand and sang several selections, all of which were thoroughly enjoyed by the

large crowd present. It might be well to state here, that this quartette will sing for the Radio in Richmond on next Monday, May 31, for the benefit of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of means, the least on the program Commerce.

The last, but by no means, the least on the program, was the recitation given by Miss Alice Williams, head of the commercial department of the college. This recitation was exceedingly well rendered, and was enjoyed immensely. Home, Sweet Home, was then sung, and after bidding each other "good-night," the guests departed for their various homes.
