COOLIDGE PLAN CONTINUES GET COLD RECEPTION

Democrats and Insurgents Are Determined to Stop Coolidge - Mellon Tax Rebate Plan

Washington, Nov. 10.—(INS)—President Coolidge's plea for non-partisan consideration of the Coolidge-Mellon plan to rebate some \$250,000,000 back to income taxpayers this year was received with distinct coldness today at the Capitol Hill.

The Democrats, aided and encouraged by a majority of the Republican irregulars, are going ahead with their plans for producing in the dying session of the Sixty-Ninth Congress, which meets in three weeks, a general tax reduction bill. Their contention is that the condition of the Treasury warrants such a bill.

There is a general splitting of party lines on the whole question, a majority of the regular Republicans will, of course, follow Mr. Coolidge's outlined course of procedure; a majority of the Democrats will support their party attitude in favor of a general reduction bill; most of the Insurgents incline to the Democratic viewpoint but there are stragglers and dissenters in all three factions who believe that the healthy treasury surplus should be devoted to retirement of the public debt. This latter group includes such Insurgents as Senator Norris, of Nebraska; such administration regulars as Senator McNary, of Oregon, and some of the more conservative Democrats.

A veritable filibuster fight is in prospect as a result, and unless some sort of compromise is worked out within the next eight weeks it is entirely possible that the session will be allowed to die its constitutional death on March 4, next without having accomplished the enactment of any definite tax legislation.

The Democrats and the Insurgents are determined to stop the Coolidge - Mellon rebate plan. Their attack is based upon the broad general principle that its chief benefit will be to the wealthy classes of the country and the big corporations, who have already passed off their 1925 and 1926 taxes to the ultimate consumer in the form of increased prices.

They contend that of the approximately 4,500,000 income taxpayers shown in last treasury returns, some 3,800,000 of them paid taxes on incomes of less than \$5,000—making their rebate under the proposed plan amount to a little less than a dollar each.

On the other hand, it is the President's contention that there are 20,000,000 Americans who hold stock in various business enterprises who would be benefited directly and indirectly by his plan. It is on this line that the battle will be fought.

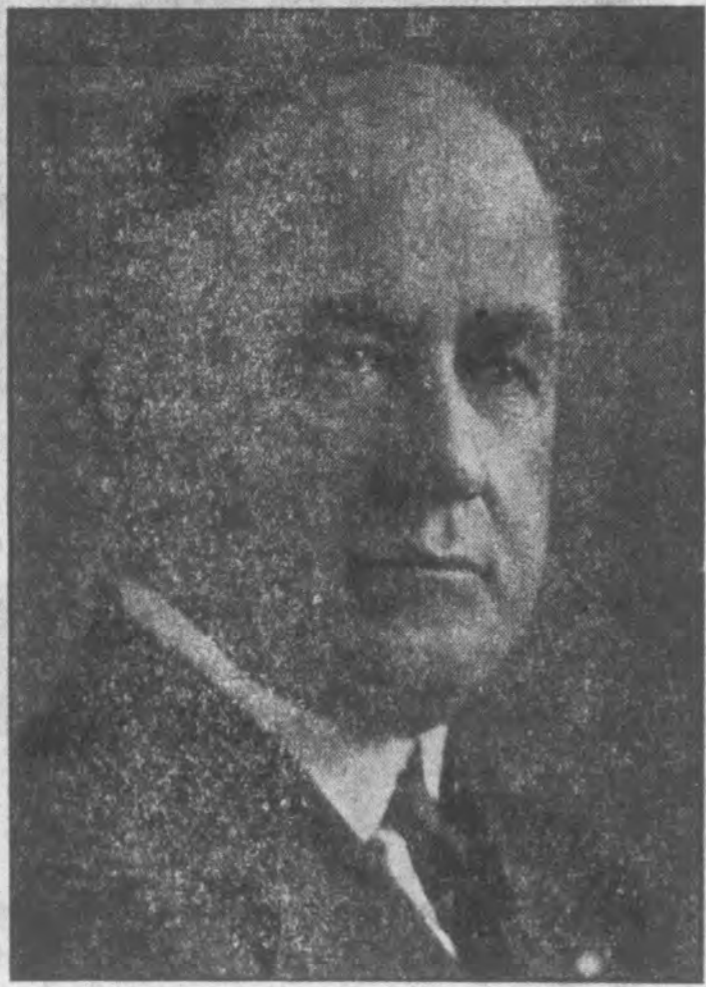
Tornado Leaves Boy in Tree Top

PAINFULLY HURT WHEN STRUCK BY AUTO YESTERDAY

Miss Mittie Beaman Suffers Broken Collar Bone; Negro Driver Placed in Jail

Miss Mittie Beaman, of the East Carolina Teacher College is in Pitt Community Hospital, suffering painful injuries received shortly before four o'clock yesterday afternoon when she was run down by an automobile at Five Points. Adam Langley, negro driver of the car, is being held in the city jail with his pending developments in Miss Beaman's condition.

Police officers who investigated the accident found Langley to be under the influence of whiskey and he was immediately taken in to custody.

According to reports of the accident, Miss Beaman was attempting to cross the street when she was struck by the automobile and dragged several feet on the pavement. She was immediately taken to the hospital for medical attention. A report from the hospital last night stated that she suffered a fractured collar bone and painful bruises. The patient was resting well at that time, the report said.

SENATE ABANDONS IMPEACHMENT OF JUDGE G. W. ENGLISH

Absence of Prisoner at the Bar Brings Impeachment Session to End Five Minutes After Start

Washington, Nov. 10.—(INS)—The Senate today abandoned impeachment proceedings against George W. English, Federal Judge for the Eastern District of Illinois, who resigned a week ago.

Meeting as a court of impeachment, but with no prisoner at its bar, the Senate ordered canceled subpoenas for all witnesses.

This stopped the trial, for which the Senate had come back to Washington ahead of the regular opening of Congress in December.

The Senate then adjourned as a court of impeachment until December 13 in order to give the House opportunity to recommend formal dismissal of the charges. The Senate will agree with the House and that formally will close the English case.

The galleries were only half filled. The session lasted but five minutes.

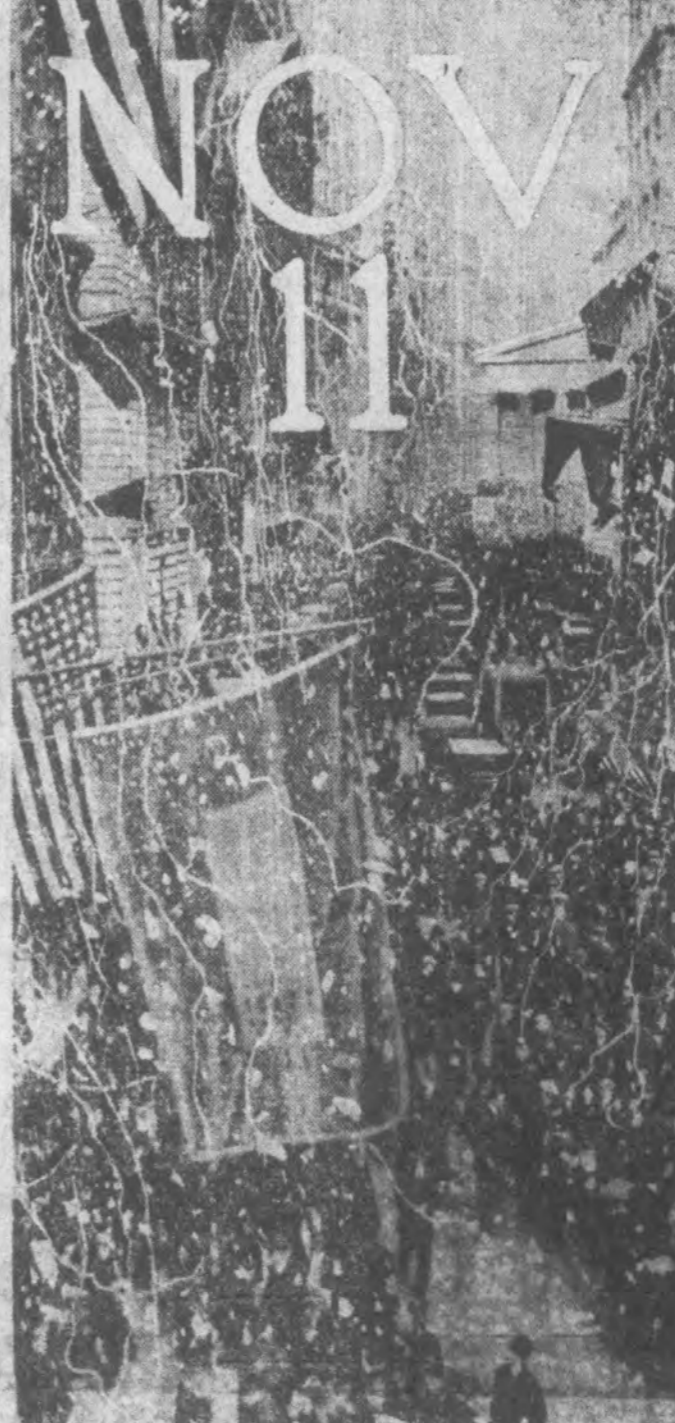
The court was called to order at 12:30 by Vice-President Dawe, and all the rituals were employed that were used in all the preceding impeachment trials. The House managers were led by Representative Earl C. Michener, of Michigan, while Edward C. Kramer, of East St. Louis, represented Judge English. Michener immediately arose and asked that the trial be postponed indefinitely to permit the House to recommend dismissal of the charges against the Illinois Judge.

Senator Curtis, of Kansas, Republican leader, immediately presented an order which the Senate adopted at once directing the Sergeant of Arms "to notify all witnesses, who were subpoenaed here, that they will not be required to appear at the trial of the Senate.

On Curtis' motion, the court was then adjourned to meet again on December 13, and the first impeachment trial since 1913 was brought to an abrupt halt.

Attempt Prove Atlanta Banker Was Insane

Atlanta, Nov. 10.—(INS)—Testimony to show that W. D. Manley is mentally incompetent, was introduced by the defense today in the banker's trial, growing out of the failure of the Bankers Trust Company and scores of smaller banks in Florida and Georgia.

Dr. Howard Buckreef and Dr. James Paulin testified in support of the defense's insanity plea, that Manley had been abnormal since 1924.

In his opening address to the jury, solicitor John Boykin declared that the banker is feigning insanity as a means of escape from punishment on the indictments returned against him.

ROYAL WEDDING CELEBRATED IN BELGIAN CAPITAL

Religious Rites Unit Religious Princess Astrid and Crown Prince Leopold Performed Yesterday

Brussels, Nov. 10.—A, the bells of the Cathedral of St. Gudule rang out and guns boomed, the Crown Prince Leopold of Belgium was today married to Princess Astrid of Sweden, in a solemn ceremony in the Cathedral, the religious confirmation of the civil ceremony held last week in Stockholm.

Belgium was gay in its rejoicing over its new princess, and no such demonstrations have been seen since that November day eight years ago, almost to the day, when the World War came to an end.

King Albert, tall and erect in uniform of the Belgian Army, escorted Princess Ingeborg, mother of Princess Astrid, on his arm down the long marble steps of the palace to the carriage for the triumphant procession to the Cathedral.

Two squadrons of guards with color, flying acted as an escort for the wedding party.

The wedding party after its ride through throngs of demonstrative admirers, drew up before the Cathedral of Saint, Gudule, and on every one of the thirty-one stone steps leading to the Cathedral, two lieutenants from the 28th Regiment, to which the young Prince belongs, with swords drawn, forming an arch of glittering steel beneath which the wedding party ascended to the Cathedral to receive the religious benediction.

Queen Elizabeth and Prince Leopold first entered the arch of swords, followed by Prince Charles with Princess Astrid on his arm.

Monsieur Van Rove, successor to Cardinal Mercier as Primate of Belgium, greeted the party as the Cathedral door, even though the had originally declined to participate in the ceremony, opposing the union because of the differences in religions. It is stated that on the advice of the Pope that he decided to officiate.

The wedding party proceeded up to the Cathedral aisle and took their places before Monsignor Van Rove, near the lectern, outside of the altar because the bride is not a Catholic. The royal parents sat upon a throne in the choir.

Eighteen Princess and Princesses fifteen of whom were Scandinavians and diplomatic and official guests, were seated in the nave. The general public was admitted to the lateral naves.

As the Monsignor blessed the rings the bells of Sainte Gudule rang out and a choir of 100 men and 60 children burst into the Belgian national anthem, followed by the Swedish anthem.

Monsignor Rove addressed a short sermon to the Crown Prince and his bride, who was beautiful in a silver lace court robe over a silver brocade gown cut rather low, but with long sleeves and a long train. The bride's veil was of Brussels lace, more than 150 years old, and she wore silver slippers. About her throat was clasped a diamond and pearl necklace. Her bouquet was of lilies and orchids.

Queen Elizabeth and Princess Ingeborg, mother of the bride, both wore gold lace and ermine trimmed coats.

Crown Prince Leopold was in the full uniform of a Lieutenant of the Grenadiers, wearing all of his medals.

The bridal pair tonight will be guests at a chateau in the Belgian Ardennes, where they first became acquainted. The remainder of their honeymoon will be spent in a chateau in the South of France, loaned to them by a prominent French family.

Upon their return they will live in Bellevue Palace, which comprises the left wing of the royal palace.

From these all the "highfalutin" sauces are made. I'm thinking of the ones some of us get tongue-tied trying to pronounce: for example, Roulette, A l'enande, Espagnole, Finiste, Feugoux, Bigarade, Veiloute, Hollandaise, Moussolaine, and so on through the list. I'm sure every woman was inspired to go home, get her cook apron and prepare some of the artistic dishes with her own hand.

No woman attending classes need ever puzzle again over carrying out any color scheme she desires. Mrs. Grimes has discussed and made practically every color combination one can imagine. Pink soup is easily made. A salad tinted a delicate green is quite refreshing for hot weather. She emphasizes the fact that cookery is an art, one of the best of civilization.

Mrs. Grimes gave a very interesting and helpful talk on child psychology. She discussed the proper food for building healthy children and how to get them to eat it. The method given was that used at Vassar this summer which is advocated by the leading scientists of the country.

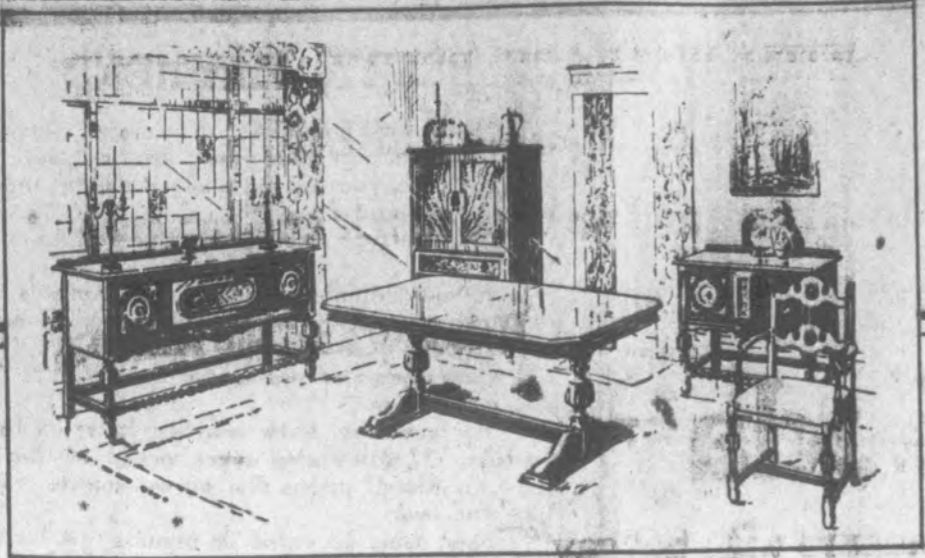

Herbie's oak, said to have been six hundred years old, was blown down August 31, 1863, and a young oak was planted on the spot by Queen Victoria on September 12, 1863.

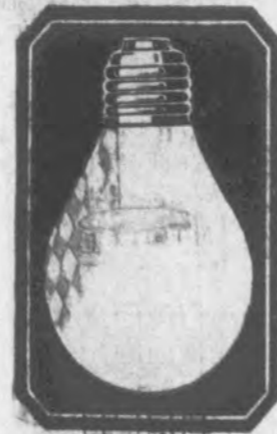
The Prince of Wales has lost some of his fondness for horseback riding, and of late has fallen under the subtle fascination of golf.
