MEDICAL SCIENCE UNCONVINCED AS TO CANCER CURE

Many Express Doubt As to Theory That Germ Has Been Isolated and Disease Cured by Serum

New York, Nov. 16.—(INS)—"From what I have seen, the Glover antitoxin will do more for cancer than any other treatment that is known to me and, when used in conjunction with surgery, a large percentage of good results can be obtained, even in what appears to be hopeless cases."

In these words, Dr. J. Willis Amy, one of this city's most eminent surgeons, today expressed himself in an interview with the International News Service on the efficacy and value of the recently discovered Glover antitoxin for the treatment of cancer.

Dr. Amy declared that he had no doubt as to the microbic origin of the disease. "From three years observation with patients and from the observations of other physicians," said the surgeon, "I am now thoroughly convinced that cancer is due to microorganisms."

"From your own study of the antitoxin and its results, would you consider that there is a possibility of permanently curing cancer with the Glover treatment?" Dr. Amy was asked.

"In the first place," he replied, "the word 'cure' should never be used in connection with medicine. We know of no medical treatment that will cure every case in every stage of a disease."

"Naturally we know that these statements will be received by many with skepticism, as in the experiences of Lister, Pasteur, Oliver Wendell Holmes, Semmelweis, Loeffler with his diptheria organism and Harvey, when he first demonstrated that it was blood and not air that circulated in the arteries and veins."

Chicago, Nov. 16.—(INS)—Officials of the American Medical Association were skeptical today of reports that the germ of cancer had been isolated and that a curing serum was available.

Dr. Morris Fishbein, head of the association's public-relations bureau, declared: "We have been given no proof of the isolation of a cancer germ. In the opinion of the association, cancer is still a medical mystery."

Boston, Nov. 16.—(INS)—Medical science today trained its gaze on latest cancer treatment theory advanced by Dr. T. J. Glover, of New York and Toronto.

The anticipated Glover theory, defined as "Glover's Microorganism," had been awaited with interest and was received with a barrage of questions reverberant with skepticism.

Dr. Robert Greenough, one of the foremost cancer experts in the world, talking to International News Service today, met the theory advanced by Dr. Glover with several interrogatory remarks.

"Is there such an element as a 'cancer germ'?" he asked and added: "Regardless of the Glover theory, no case of cancer has ever been recorded that can be attributed to contact from an individual so stricken."

CUBA BREAKS WITH URUGUAY

Cuban Minister Ordered Home and Legation at Montevideo Closed

Havana, Cuba, Nov. 16.—(INS)—Diplomatic relations between Cuba and Uruguay have been broken at the command of President Machado of Cuba, who has ordered the Cuban Minister to Uruguay to return to Havana and the legation at Montevideo closed.

The break was said to have been caused by the refusal of Uruguay to explain the remarks made by its delegate to the League of Nations in objecting to Cuba becoming a member.

The delegate declared before the League that Cuba was a dependency of the United States under the existing Platt Amendment. President Machado issued an ultimatum to Uruguay and when there was no reply forthcoming, he recalled Cuba's Minister to that country and closed the legation.

Trappers' War Breaks Out Anew In Louisiana

New Orleans, Nov. 16.—(INS)—The St. Bernard trappers' war, which has been going on for three years broke out afresh today with bloody results in Gentilly Bayou at De La Croix Island, where following a battle with machine guns, shot guns, and pistols one man was killed and seven or eight others wounded, two of them probably fatally.

Sam Cowland, 30, a deputy sheriff of St. Bernard Parish, is the dead man.

The wounded men were rushed to a local hospital in automobiles, but it was not known whether they were trappers or deputy sheriffs.

According to reports a posse had been ordered to St. Bernard by District Attorney L. H. Perez with machine guns to protect property there from poaching trappers.

The battle occurred early this morning while deputy sheriffs hiding in ambush, spotted a boat load of trappers. Which side fired first was not learned.

KINSTON FIREMEN SUFFER INJURIES

Kinston, Nov. 16.—(INS)—Fire in a business district structure here yesterday caused damage of approximately \$15,000, it was estimated today. Assistant Chief William Hoover, and fireman Jesse Conway, sustained serious injuries in fighting the blaze. Reports from the hospital to which they were taken, said today that the two men probably would recover.

COOLIDGE SAYS ADMINISTRATION FOR TAXPAYERS

Says All Branches Working for Common Cause in Matter of Taxation

Washington, Nov. 16.—(INS)—All branches of the administration are working for one common cause in the matter of taxation and that is a reduction whereby the taxpayers may benefit from the surplus which is accruing in the Treasury.

This statement was made at the White House today in behalf of President Coolidge to offset what was termed confusion over the various terms, such as rebate, refund, and credit, being used in discussing the probable action of Congress at the coming session.

Mr. Coolidge and Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, are in harmony on the general proposition that the taxpayers should benefit from the surplus no the first two payments in 1927 of this year's income.

It was reiterated that the President has not undertaken to offer any definite plan, feeling this is a matter peculiarly up to the House where all financial legislation originates. He assumed that when the Ways and Means Committee ascertains definitely the probable amount of the surplus which will be on hand at the end of the fiscal year, that the committee will then be the best judge as to the form the reduction shall take and the manner in which it shall be put into operation.

Vanderbilt Annullment. Miss Dorrance at Work. Why Five Lingers? The 20 Feet Years.

Bishop Manning of New York's protest against the Roman Catholic Church has admitted the marriage of the Duke of Marlborough to Consuelo Vanderbilt.

Thirty-one years ago they were married in St. Thomas' Episcopal Church in New York. Both had been baptized in the Episcopal faith in infancy. The American Duchess divorced her British duke six years ago, both have married again. Before that they had two children, one of whom will be the next Duke of Marlborough.

Monsignor Lavelle, speaking for Catholics, says the Catholic Church does not annul a marriage without good reason for a duke any more than it would for a tramp.

There might have been a stul agreement between them before the marriage, that would nullify the marriage, such as agreeing not to have more than one or more children or to divorce and remarry if they grew tired of each other, he said.

ITALY REPORTED TO BE IN GRIP OF REIGN OF TERROR

Reports to Effect That Mussolini Has Ordered Deputies Excluded From Chamber Arrested

London, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Special report, that Premier Mussolini has ordered all opposition deputies expelled from the Italian Chamber of Deputies, arrested and punished here in Italy.

Italy is in a grip of terror. Remembrance of Cavour, the great statesman, has been driven from homes and midnight and fogged outside. Fascist head-quarters, Ser Cavazzoni, former cabinet officer was taken from his home at Gorzano and beaten and then a posse placed around his neck and driven to the gaols in the town square. He was not hurt, but died later from the effects of the beating.

At Cabo, wealthy Republicans were made to parade the streets with faces painted in red, white and green. Count Sforza, former Foreign Minister, has had his home in Rome destroyed and Signor Schiavelli, an editor in Rome, is reported dying.

South Carolina Negro Placed in Pen for Safe Keeping

Columbia, S. C., Nov. 15.—(INS)—Fears of mob violence resulting from the probable fatal injury of a Negro detective E. W. Johnson of Florence were believed quieted here today.

Robert Lawrence, Florence negro, was brought to the state penitentiary here for safe keeping, after a reported disturbance in Florence last night following a shooting. The negro was brought here by Sheriff R. A. Barnes of Florence.

Johnson is in a Forence hospital, not expected to live. The detective was shot when he attempted to arrest the negro, it was said.

Charlotte Man Killed in Florida

West Palm Beach, Fla., Nov. 16.—(INS)—While going through the new Cameau building on Central Avenue here this morning, Bernard Nels, realty broker, of Charlotte, N. C., fell from the ninth floor, dying almost instantly.

The body will be sent to his home in Charlotte after the inquest. The fall was believed accidental as no motive was known for suicide.

Illinois Wets Win Control of House

Springfield, Ill., Nov. 16.—(INS)—Wets have captured the Illinois House of Representatives and are fighting drys to a standstill for control of the senate, anti-Volssteadians declare following the battle of ballots of November 2. The house has a safe margin of moist legislators a count of noses will show, they assert.

Of the total of 153 house members, 83 are wet, 67 are dry and 3 are uncertain, the wets assert. The senate has 21 avowed votes and enough, anti-drys say, in doubt to swing 26 votes, the number necessary for control.

Gains throughout the state are claimed by the wets. The wets see the end of Anti-Saloon league rule. This change from the dominion of the Illinois legislature by the Anti-Saloon league to a state of liberal attitude toward the will of the people has been just as important to Illinois as the election of a United States Senator, Emil Thiele, director of the National Association Opposed to Prohibition and a former state senator declared. The voters of Illinois have put an end to the wet majority to the lower house and probably to the Senate, he said.

Heavy Sales On Tobacco Market Here Yesterday

The local tobacco market yesterday sold 968,524 pounds of tobacco at an average price of \$29.82 per hundred pounds. Yesterday's sales bring the season's sales to over thirty six million pounds, while the season's average price is close to 29 cents. Close to eleven million dollars have been paid to the growers for their offerings on the local market for the season to date.

Sales today are much lighter than on yesterday and indications at noon were that all sales would be completed by three o'clock this afternoon.

Right of Klan to Operate Anywhere Sought in Court

Washington, Nov. 15.—(INS)—The right of the Ku Klux Klan of Georgia to operate in all states of the union, regardless of state laws, was claimed before the Supreme Court today by attorneys for the secret order.

Appealing from an ouster order of the Kansas Supreme court the Klan counsel invoked the Constitutional privilege of free speech and free press to sustain the claim. The Kansas court held that the Klan had not complied with the state charter act for foreign corporations.

Hardships of Miners In Great Coal Strike Now Felt Keenly

Cardiff, Nov. 16.—(INS)—The terrible hardships endured by miners' families in the long-drawn out coal strike are now coming to light.

In the little, stilted, blackened towns of South Wales, straggling on mountain sides and sunk in gloomy valleys with tortuous streets and unbelievable houses the suffering of men, women and children are now plainly to be seen.

It needs a race touched with fanaticism to undergo the privations that these Welsh miners and their families have endured. This has not been a case of a few individuals being struck with poverty. It is that of whole districts who have lost absolutely everything that belonged to them. The strike has left everyone penniless—lawyers, doctors, mine operators down to the humblest mine worker.

There are tradesmen who, six months ago, were comparatively prosperous, having a turnover of \$300 per week. Many of these are now dependent on parish relief. Nobody has any money wherewith to buy. The big suppliers have cut out of the usual quota of goods.

MEXICO WOULD MEET AMERICA IN HAGUE COURT

In Reply Washington Note Mexico Invites Government Take Its Complaints to International Court

Mexico City, Nov. 16.—(INS)—The reply of the Mexican government to the latest note from Washington regarding Mexico's petroleum and land laws will invite the United States to take its complaints, if any, regarding the Mexican legislation, to the Hague Permanent Court of International Justice, it was learned today by International News Service.

The decision to invite the United States to go before the Hague tribunal was reached at a cabinet conference at Chapultepec Castle on Sunday.

At this conference, President Calles, former President Obregon, Foreign Minister Aaron Saenz and Gonzales Rios, who represented Mexico on the mixed claims commission, all agreed that while it would be impossible to sponsor legislation at the behest of the American State Department, Mexico, secure in the righteousness of her position, would offer to meet the United States before the Hague court should the State Department decide that American rights were insufficiently protected by Mexico's laws.

Mexico would pledge herself to regard a decision by the Hague court as final, it was said.

The Mexican reply, which vouched in the same courteous terms as those employed by the State Department's communications, will declare that Mexico insist upon her right to legislate on all internal matters in accordance with her Constitution. In this matter she finds herself unable to waive that right in deference to any foreign power.

The Mexican government will express cordial agreement with the State Department's proposal for the publication of all diplomatic correspondence exchanged in reference to petroleum and land matters since last spring when such previous correspondence was published. But Mexico City will stipulate that the forthcoming Mexican note be included in this proposal.

Annual Meeting State Baptists Opens Wilmington

Wilmington, Nov. 16.—(INS)—The 96th annual state Baptist convention was opened here this afternoon. Delegate from all parts of the state were here in attendance.

The pastors' conference will be concluded during the day. It was believed that the proposed memorial of the Women's Missionary Union, for which a \$1,000,000 campaign is to be launched, will be one of the chief topics of discussion that will come before the convention.

The manner of electing trustees of the various institutions under the control of the convention, is another important question which is expected to be settled at this year's convention.

Among the persons who will speak before the convention are: Dr. A. J. Barton, Nashville, Tenn., general director of the Co-operative Program; Dr. J. T. Henderson, Knoxville, Tenn., secretary of the Baptist Brotherhood of the Southern Convention; Dr. H. C. Moore, Nashville, Baptist Sunday School Board; Dr. L. B. Campbell, Baptist Bible Institute, New Orleans; Dr. W. W. Barnes, Southwestern Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas.

The convention will come to a close on November 18.

END OF BRITISH COAL STRIKE IN SIGHT

London, Nov. 16.—(INS)—Acceptance by the miners of the government's peace proposals is believed to be virtually assured today. The miners of Scotland, Northumberland, Yorkshire, Lancashire and South Wales voted for an acceptance of a count of ballots showed today.

WITNESS DECLARES OFFERED BRIBE TO KEEP MOUTH SHUT

Says Detective Offered Her \$2,500 to Say She Did Not See Henry Stevens in New Brunswick

Somerville, N. J., Nov. 16.—(INS)—The Hall-Mills murder trial was adjourned late today until Thursday morning in order to give Mrs. Jane Gibson, the State's star witness, an opportunity to take the witness stand.

Somerville, Nov. 16.—(INS)—Mrs. Marie Demarest testified on the witness stand this afternoon in the Hall-Mills murder case that shortly after the murder of Rev. Dr. Hall and Mrs. Eleanor Mills, detective Felix De Martini, came to her home and offered \$2,500 if she would "keep her mouth shut."

DeMartini is the private detective who was employed by Mrs. Frances Stevens Hall, one of the defendants shortly after the murder.

For a period in the fall of 1922 he lived at Mrs. Hall's home. Asked to explain the \$2,500 offer, she said De Martini offered to clear a mortgage of \$2,500 which she had on her home at the time.

The statement of Mrs. Demarest created a sensation. The offer was made to Mrs. Demarest, she said, if she would forget about having seen Henry Stevens and Ralph Gorsline and Minna Clark.

Mrs. Demarest testified several days ago that she saw Henry Stevens in an automobile in New Brunswick a day after the murder. Henry Stevens, claimed that at that time he was in Lavallette, N. J.

She testified several days ago that she had seen Ralph Gorsline and Minna Clark spying on Rev. Hall and Mrs. Mills in Buceleigh Park prior to the murder.

Mrs. Demarest spoke of being offered \$2,500 by Felix De Martini to "keep her mouth shut." Mrs. Hall's right had clenched and unclenched nervously. Her face, however, remained expressionless. Henry Stevens squirmed in his seat. Willie twiddled his mustache nervously.

SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH REVEALS CAUSE OF CANCER AND ANTITOXIN THAT WILL CURE SAME

New York, Nov. 15.—Definite classification of cancer as a specific infectious disease due to a germ which has been successfully isolated and the production of a combatting antitoxin which is reported to be giving direct results in clinical use in the United States and Canada became known today through the Canada Lancet, the announcement being made by Dr. T. J. Glover, of New York and Toronto, Canada, and his associates.

The announcement follows more than ten years intensive research into the etiology of cancer and experiments involving the use of human beings and animals. This cancer germ is defined as "Glover's Microorganism" and the antitoxin is "Glover's Antitoxin" by eminent medical men who have been associated with the young Canadian scientist in his particular field.

The antitoxin is made from the blood of horses and is administered to cancer patients by injection.

Official reports from cancer clinics which have been established in many places in the United States and Canada to test fairly the efficacy of the treatment indicate that the antitoxin has therapeutic value and that in many cases of cancer previously considered hopeless by physicians, all apparent symptoms of the disease have disappeared under the new treatment.

Hope for complete immunization of humanity from the disease is seen in Dr. Glover's treatment that "the future treatment may consist of prophylactic injections of a standardized toxin for all those who show cancer susceptibility."

Dr. Glover, formerly serologist and clinical pathologist at St. Michael's hospital, Toronto, began his experiment in Canada and came to this city about five years ago. He received financial support largely contributed by John J. Murdock, Larchmont, N. Y. It is stated that vast amount of money has been expended in New York by Dr. Glover for his work.

The Canada Lancet and Practitioner, recognized by the medical profession as one of the most conservative and reputable scientific journals, devotes its entire November issue to the Glover cancer doctrine and treatment. This journal says editorially, in part:

"Glover's description of the cancer organism is extremely interesting, as is also the correlation he seems to have established between this organism and the organism of other research workers such as Young, Nuzum, Rath, Gye and Barnard. The test of time with confirmation of the laboratory work by London, McCormack, Howard, Andscott, and the clinical work by such men as Donnelly, Warnuth, Kurtz, Amey, Gancy, Kerr and White has, apparently established the work of Glover on a sound basis so that he may now look forward hope-

fully to the day of deliverance from one of the greatest scourges in the history of humanity."

Dr. Glover's conclusion in regard to treatment, which are supported in writing by clinicians, are that early cases, when the disease is local, will yield to the antitoxin in a large percentage of cases; in the more advanced cases, when the main growth is surgically removed, the metastases or spreading effects of the disease will usually disappear with the antitoxin treatment; in cases where the disease is widely disseminated, little is to be expected from any form of treatment, although it is found that many of the distressing symptoms are often alleviated by the use of the antitoxin.

This, according to clinical reports, is especially shown by the relief of pain, cessation of offensive discharges and the clearing of mental confusion and lethargy.

Dr. Glover concludes further that the best results are obtained with cases treated in institutions where they may be kept under constant observation and given the necessary attention.

In New York, the clinical work has been done by Dr. J. Willis Amey. In no instance here has a change been made for the treatment. In the Amey clinic, 80 patients suffering from cancer in the most malignant and advanced form, were observed and treated. According to his records shown to the International News Service correspondent by one of the doctors, 10 patients died. Of the rest, all but three were recorded as showing improvement, in many cases showing no sign of cancer.

The actual effect of the antitoxin, according to clinicians, is to neutralize the toxins of the disease and enable nature to function properly and complete the healing process. Many of the cases treated at the clinics had, according to reports, run the gamut of the X-rays, radium and surgical methods.

Scientists whose research work confirms the microscopic origin of cancer included Young, McCormack, Nuzum and Ochsen, Chicago, Gye and Barnard, London, London, Howard and McCormack, Toronto, and others.

Commenting in brochure form on Dr. Glover's work, London and McCormack, Toronto, say:

"We have been able to culture the germ from the blood of cancer cases which we have investigated. The diagnosis was confirmed by consultations."

"The clinical work of Glover and his associate shows that an antitoxin of great value of incipient and post-operative cases has been produced."

Statistics show that the cancer mortality rate is heavy. Ochsen gives the average toll per annum in the United States as 100,000. A bulletin of the New York Board of Health shows that in this city, from August 7 to October 30, inclusive, there were 1,755 deaths from cancer, an average of 131 a week, or a grand average of more than 6,000 a year.

Medical history shows that cancer was prevalent hundreds of years before Christ and was treated by Hippocrates 2,000 years ago by cauterization with hot irons.

Approximately 200 actors and 100 mechanical and creative minds participate in production of an average American picture; across the sea 2,500 players are used in the

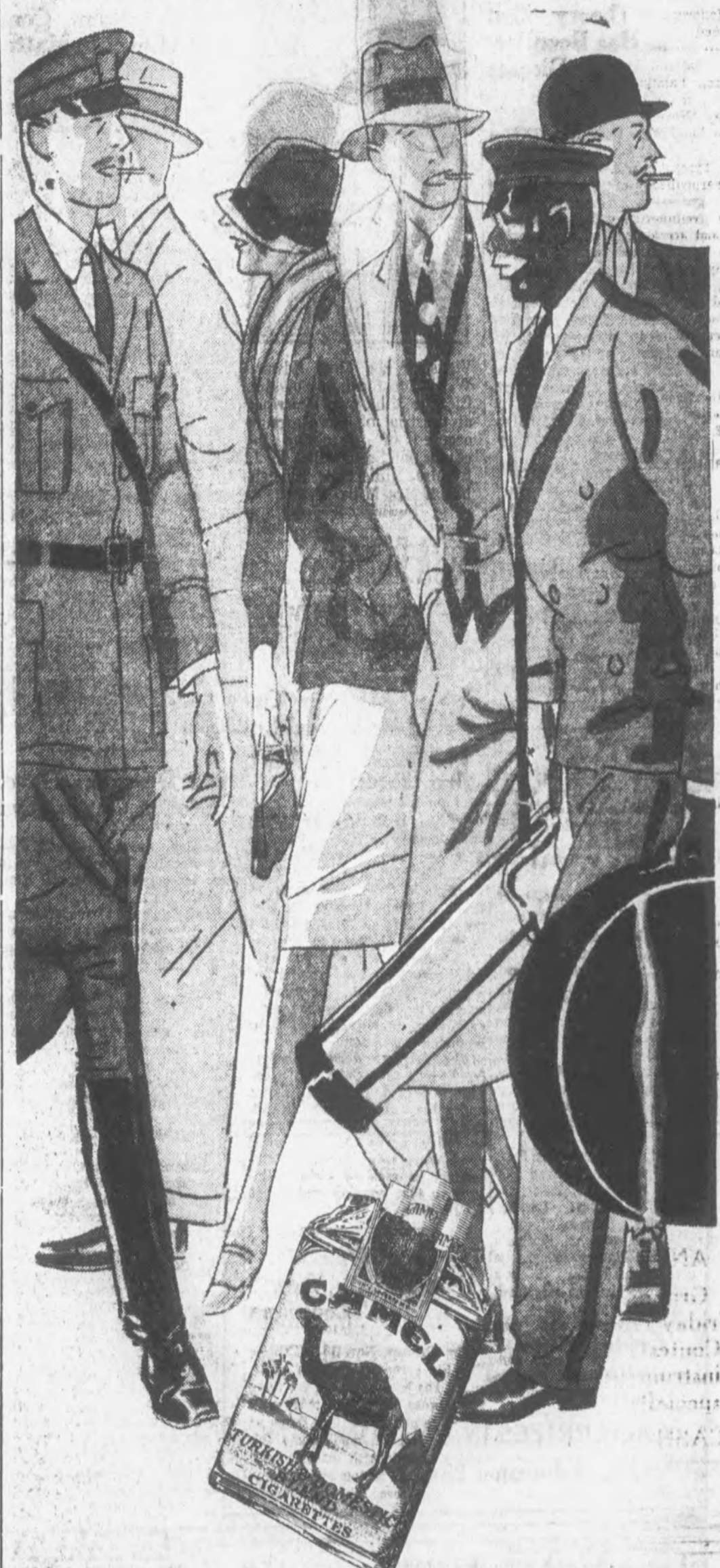

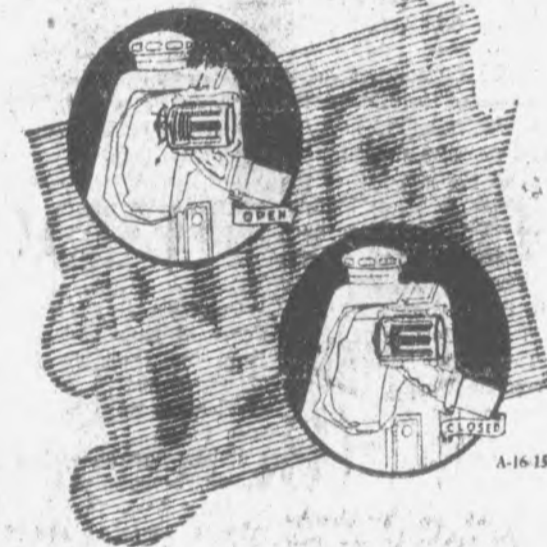

Kansas Democrats Want to Run Ayres For President

Moscow, Nov. 16.—(INS)—Moscow will be gloomier, darker and more cheerless this winter if the plans of the municipal Soviet for saving fuel are put into effect. It is proposed to cut off all electric current after midnight throughout the entire city with the exception of the central section occupied by the Kremlin and government institutions.

The use of any kind of electric apparatus such as stoves, irons, toasters, etc., is to be forbidden and the citizens are urged to burn as few lights as possible. Despite the immense forest and coal reserve of Russia, the economic machine has failed to provide sufficient fuel for the capital of the country. Wood is still the principal means of heating houses in Moscow, and the supply on hand is already 'catastrophically low,' to use the Russian phrase. Priced now at about \$12 a cord, fire wood will be selling at \$25 to \$30 a cord by December according to forecasts, and by January and February, it may be unobtainable.

All places of public entertainment, theatres, moving picture houses and cabarets, are ordered by a new city ordinance to close no later than 11:30 o'clock in the evening. Factories, mills and repair shops are ordered to begin the working day at 7 o'clock in the morning. Street cars begin service at 5 o'clock in the morning.

The new re-mentation gives a picture of early to bed, early to rise, under a thick blanket of snow on days until by more than a few faint hours of winter sunlight, and unrelieved from the monotony of toil for the ordinary Russian citizen save by the stimulus of alcohol.

So many Russians have resorted to alcohol with such unrestrained enthusiasm that the number of confirmed inebriates has alarmed the Commissariat of Health. It is now proposed to administer forcible 'Keeley cures' to drunkards. The Commissariat of Health is consulting with the Commissariat of Justice, over the framing of a law authorizing the health official, to arrest confirmed drunkards, confine them to psychiatric institutions and treat them with all the approved modern devices for quenching their immoderate thirst.

One melancholy aspect of Moscow is to be mitigated. No longer will visitors to Moscow be startled by the sight of gangs of prisoners marching down the center of the street, flanked on both sides by militiamen with drawn revolvers and bared sabres.

From now on prisoners being transferred from one jail to another or from the courts to jail will be carried in brand new 'Black Marias' just purchased by the city authorities.

DOUBTS IF JACK DEMPSEY WILL BE ABLE TO COME BACK

Rickard Says Most of Fighters Get Lazy When They Get Money and Quit the Ring for a While

New York, Nov. 16.—(INS)—Apparently unimpressed by the young man's virtuous resolves, Tex Rickard today informed the writer that he considered it more than probable that the uplifting and soft-soled, down-dropping art of marital maphem had seen the last of Jack Dempsey.

He strongly intimated that he entertained no great confidence in Dempsey's extravagant promise of a sweeping come back because the ex-champion had plenty of money and no particular need of anything at this time, not even a punch on the nose. Rickard didn't disguise the face that he doubted Dempsey's good intentions once Jack is firmly settled down to a life of ease and refinement.

They get lazy, Rickard said rather wistfully. He wasn't thinking of much of a great loss to a great art. He is only for art for Rickard's sake and the idea does not thrive when a meal ticket blows out of the window and foregoes to come back with the change.

I've seen it work out so many times that I hardly look for anything else, he added. Dempsey left here all peppered up with the idea of trying himself out and getting back into shape. Maybe he will prove himself an exception to the rule, but I'd rather bet on something else.

Jack was very proud of that title and would rather have it back than a million dollars. The only thing is that I feel a million dollars don't look so big to Dempsey as they did once, Rickard declared.

Dempsey's last words to the writer before leaving for the west were to the effect that he would fight again only if convinced that he could reclaim much of his former speed. How he intended to convince himself while running around California's mountain roads he neglected to explain but he did make one significant remark: They won't get met in there again, unless I'm right. Nobody will ever say that Jack Dempsey is around walking on his heels.

ROMANIAN POLICE BREAK BIG WHITE SLAVE GANG; RELEASE FIFTEEN GIRLS

Bucharest, Nov. 16.—(INS)—Roumanian police have arrested leaders of one of the most aggressive of the many white slave gangs which operate through the Balkan countries. The men were caught transporting fifteen Hungarian and Slavonian girls across the Black Sea and have been put in prison and the girls released from the enforced captivity.

In the present case fifteen girls were put in a room in the hold of the ship, which also carried a load of grain. The discovery was made by the revenue officers and the captain was arrested. He incriminated a man named Jurko Simic, who was found to have transported several hundred girls every year to Turkey and Asia Minor. The fifteen girls were to have been sold in Asia Minor, where white girls are few.

The Roumanian police declare they have evidence of other gangs who send their victims to South America.

FAMOUS FRENCH RECIPE

Paris, Nov. 16.—(INS)—For a

good Fruit Compote ala Portugaise make a marmelade of pears and another of apples, cooking the fruit separately. Pass through a sieve, then mix them together. Flavor with vanilla, kirsch or the zest of a lemon.

Prepare a sauce Anglaise with egg or a little cornstarch. Garnish a mold with caramel. Put in a layer of the cream, then one of the fruit and so on until the mold is filled. Cook in a double boiler.

Cool and remove from the mold to a compote bowl. Surround with small pears cooked in a syrup. Serve very cold.

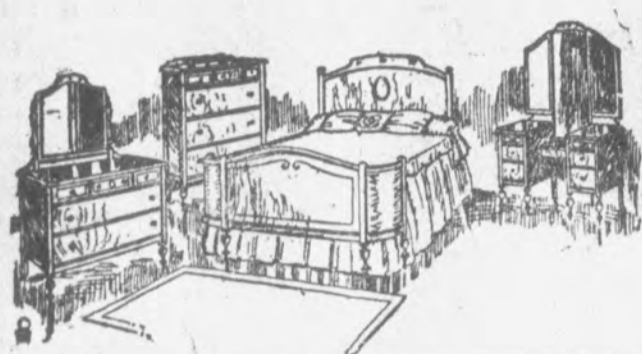

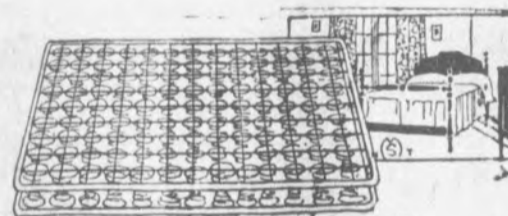
