SITUATION GROWS MORE ACUTE IN NICARAGUA TODAY

Much Speculation As To Use Of American Forces If Rebels Begin To Get The Upper Hand.

Washington, Dec. 3.—(INS)—American troubles in Nicaragua, instead of being ended by the elevation of Adolfo Diaz to the Presidency, appeared today to be just beginning.

Despite the presence of American Marines along the coast, despite American warships patrolling Nicaraguan waters, and despite the warnings of the State Department, Dr. Juan Sagasta has revived the liberal revolution and there has been severe fighting within thirty miles of the American forces.

An ugly situation may easily develop. The sympathy of the Mexican government is with the Sagasta revolutionists, and they apparently have been fairly well equipped with arms and ammunition of the Mexican origin, for there is an embargo in effect from American ports.

The State Department is supporting President Diaz. He was, in fact, inducted into office under the protecting guns of the American warships, and under the auspices of the State Department's representatives at Managua. He has formally asked the State Department to maintain him by whatever means it considers necessary. To date those means have been the continuance of American armed forces in Nicaragua for an indefinite period.

Whether the American forces will actually engage the Sagasta revolutionists, if they appear to be getting the upper hand, remains to be seen. It was said at the State Department that the traditional American policy in such cases was to refrain from taking sides in actual hostilities—but officials there would not say today that the occupational forces would not go to Diaz' aid if it was necessary.

Meanwhile, the State Department's policy in the situation is being carefully watched on Capitol Hill. If the Marines actually are sent into action to quell the liberal rebels, there will be an explosion in the Senate when that body meets next week.

Senator Wheeler of Montana, already has announced his intention of introducing a resolution calling for the immediate withdrawal of American armed forces from Nicaraguan territory in order that "these people may have a government of their own choosing."

The Nicaraguan situation is serious enough of itself. Taken in conjunction with the controversy with Mexico it becomes increasingly more so.

ROMANIAN KING APPEARS IN PUBLIC AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Bucharest, Dec. 3.—(INS)—King Ferdinand appeared in public today for the first time since he was stricken seriously ill several weeks ago.

The King drove from his suburban palace at Cotroceni to his palace in Bucharest, to receive the Spanish minister.

The King drove in a closed car but except for a pallor he appeared in good health. He was recognized by the public and given great cheer.

REPUBLICANS TO FIGHT BACK FOR SENATE CONTROL

Threaten To Contest Seating Of Democrats Unless Fight Against Vare And Smith Is Withdrawn.

Washington, Dec. 3.—(INS)—With President Coolidge taking the lead in smoothing out Republican differences in congress, administration leaders, today plotted a defensive war to protect their own vote control over the senate in the seventeenth congress.

Anticipating a Democratic effort to wrest control by exclusion of Senator-elect Frank L. Smith of Illinois, and William S. Vare of Pennsylvania, the Republican chief, drafted plans for legislative retaliation, contests against at least four incoming Democratic senators, the right of Smith and Vare to take their seats challenged, the republican leaders said.

Unless an agreement is reached shortly, the republican leaders said, the challenge will be leveled at enough incoming Democrats to insure republican control of the Senate.

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The Republican similarity will give attention to the demand of M. C. Birmingham, A. Burkett, Neb. citizen, who memorialized the Senate to initiate investigations into every senatorial reelection in the South this year, charging the "free use of shotguns" had destroyed the Republican form of government in these states. It has been no secret in congressional circles that the leaders of negro movements are demanding more action by the Republican party toward protecting the race in Southern States and the filing of contest, against these Southern Senators might easily "kill two birds with one stone."

This program of action was agreed upon following a series of conferences between Republican leaders. One of the conferences was attended by Vare himself with his campaign manager Harry Moeckel of Philadelphia. Vare told the republican leaders that he would not only fight an effort to bar him from the senate but would be ready to defend himself against any contest to unseat him. The Republican spokesman, in turn, pledged his support in getting into the senate but reserved decision on whether they would support him when his election is contested.

The seating of both Vare and Smith even for a day, will insure Republican control of the new Senate and for this reason, the administration leaders are relying on their support. All this, of course, has nothing to do with the contests to unseat them later on.

The Democratic have not yet decided on a definite program. A series of majority conferences will be held after Congress convenes to determine a course of action and there are indications the ultimate decision will be to neutralize the seating of both men and then to concentrate on ousting them.

ANDREWS ORDERS RELEASE OF YACHT HELD AT NORFOLK

Norfolk, Va., Dec. 3.—(INS)—L. C. Andrews, federal dry chief, has instructed dry officials here to recommend release of the Palatial Yacht Laurentian, owned by Russel A. Alger, of Detroit. It was learned today. The vessel was held in \$150,000 bond when 700 bottles of liquor were found in a locker on the craft last June. D. Lawrence, Groner is expected to release the ship when the case is called for a hearing on next Tuesday.

RADIO BROADCAST TO BE REGULATED BY NEXT CONGRESS

Radio Enthusiasts In Congress Serve Notice That They Desire Relief That Will Be Permanent.

Washington, Dec. 3.—(INS)—Radio enthusiasts in Congress today served notice that unless an agreement is reached for permanent radio regulation at this session of Congress they will oppose temporary legislation and precipitate chaos in the air.

It sometimes takes a crisis to bring action in a situation like this, declared Rep. E. L. Davis, Democrat of Tennessee, one of the leaders in the long fight for regulation of broadcasting.

Proposals for "stop-gap" legislation after Congress convenes next week were denounced by many Senators and Congressmen. Such action, they assert, would further delay a final solution of the problem.

Discussion of the pending radio bills overshadowed all other topics as Senators and Congressmen returning for the session, brought word that there is a country-wide demand for action. Responding to this demand, Republican leaders were a unit in declaring that radio legislation will be given full play if conference committees agree on a bill.

"Something must be done at this session of Congress," said Rep. Albert H. Vestal, of Indiana, Republican whip of the House, who returned to Washington today.

PRESENTS STATUE OF VIRGINIA DARE

Mrs. R. R. Cotten Presented Statue To State At Today's Session Of Art Society.

Raleigh, Dec. 3.—(INS)—Raleigh today became the ephemeral art and literary center of North Carolina.

Three literary, art and historical societies are holding their annual meetings here—The State Literary and Historical Association, The North Carolina Folk Lore Society and the North Carolina Art Society.

At the joint morning session of the literary and art societies, a statue of Virginia Dare, America's first native-born, was formally presented to the State. The marble life-size image, bequeathed to Virginia Dare's native state, is the work of the late Louise Lander, by Raleigh sculptor. The memorial was presented by Mrs. R. R. Cotten, of Farmville.

HALL-MILLS CASE WENT TO THE JURY THIS AFTERNOON

Sensational Murder Case Goes To Jury After Trial Has Lasted a Full Month.

Court House, Somerville, N. J.—(INS)—The case went to jury in the Hall-Mills murder case this afternoon after a trial that lasted a full month.

The judge read his charge from a stack of yellow note papers. The courtroom doors had been closed and none entered while he delivered his verdict to the jury.

The issues are extremely simple, Judge Parker. The defendant says he was having lunch in the vicinity of the crime. The defense constitutes an absolute denial. Hence your inquiry just revolves about this conflicting issue.

Judge Parker explained to the jury that they could return a separate verdict for each of the defendants in case one or more of the defendants were found guilty. The jury has three things to decide:

- 1. The date of the murder of Mrs. Eleanor Mills.
2. Whether the murder was committed within the county.
3. Whether the defendant did or did not commit the crime or did or have anything to do with the murder.

Firebug At Work Again In Toledo

Toledo, Ohio, Dec. 3.—(INS)—Toledo's visitation of incendiarism, attributed to the firebug who terrorized the city for weeks was continued here early today when attempts were made to burn two structures.

The Orinda Apartments, a 20-story building, was fired with a six of rubbish and the restaurant John Lee set ablaze in a similar manner.

Fire chief Lawler, whose men brought the flames under control, declared that the evidence indicated both fires were started by pyromaniacs, held responsible for a series of recent fires here.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 3.—(INS)—"I don't care if Mr. Keyes found out that Oranston bought his little blue trunk a Pasadena, or if he found out that he bought a red, white and blue trunk anywhere else."

In these words Mrs. Kennedy, mother of Aimee Semple McPherson, today scoffed at the admitted discovery by District attorney Asa Keyes of Los Angeles that Kenneth G. Oranston, W. O. The Wisp Radio operator of Mrs. McPherson's Angela, Temple, under the name of H. C. Cornell had purchased the trunk from a jewelry shop at 194 East Colorado street, Pasadena, a few blocks from his rooms at the Maryland Hotel, May 1, last.

Former Candidate For Congress Will Serve Prison Term

BREAK IN CHAPLIN FAMILY DECLARED TO BE PERMANENT

Wife Of Comedian Says She Will Not Return Home. Charge Pays No More Bills.

Los Angeles, Dec. 3.—(INS)—The "break in the stars of the family" declared by Mrs. Chaplin today, was given by Mrs. Chaplin to a group of reporters at her home yesterday.

Mrs. Chaplain left her home and took her children to the home of her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. William Curry, a divorcee, between the El Estacion and his wife. She stated this move, "I have returned to my husband's home."

Chaplain countered with a terse legal notice to newspapers that he would no longer be responsible for his wife's debts.

Although neither Chaplain nor his wife mentioned any desire to discuss the matter which led to their separation, it has become known that the couple's separation was objected to the noise made by his wife's going on the morning of the divorce between them.

"I couldn't sleep," said Chaplain, "I have been in bed for a long time. I asked my wife to get these people out of the house. She refused to do so."

Chaplain, her mother, Mrs. Kathleen, and the two Chaplain children also left today to the home of Mrs. Chaplain's grandparents.

"Mr. Chaplain has been mistreated by his husband and his subsequent statements, forthcoming from her grandfather."

This has been emphatically denied by Chaplain.

"I have never in my life been mistreated by my husband or my grandfather. I have a very happy home but it seems impossible."

Continue Search For Run Runner And Dry Officers

New Orleans, Dec. 3.—(INS)—Fears that J. B. Matthews, assistant chief of the snuff zone and auctioneer's mate, have met with foul play at the hands of the crew of the run runner Arseno J. were dispelled today by O. D. Jackson, prohibition administrator.

The men are safe, Jackson said after a conference with Captain Jacob Hommeland, aide to the Bienville base commander. Hommeland reported that no harm has come to Jackson and Handley, who were kidnapped by the Arseno J. last Monday.

Jackson said he may have some definite statement to make later regarding the whereabouts of the missing dry officials. At the same time he revealed that the master of the runner is Frank Wood, a Grand Cayman negro, who figured in the seizure of the schooner Joe Luis off Mobile some time ago. Wood is a notorious smuggler.

DECLARES FALL KNEW ALL ABOUT THE OIL LEASES

Witness Declares The Legality Of The Leases Was Questioned From The Beginning.

Washington, Dec. 3.—(INS)—"None of us want Mr. Doherty to get in trouble" counsel for the government in the conspiracy trial of former Secretary of the Interior, Albert B. Fall and E. L. Doherty, McManis of magnitude, forced this statement into the record today as allegedly trying to influence the interior department's policy at the time Doherty was securing a \$100,000,000 contract and lease in the naval oil reserve.

The statement was noted from a letter written to Fall at his New Mexico ranch by H. Foster Bohn, then director of the Bureau of Mines, on May 12, 1922. This was less than a month after Doherty had been awarded a contract to construct a huge oil storage project at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, and six months before he was awarded a lease on the Elk Hills, California Naval oil reserve.

The letter urged Fall to ask Attorney General Daugherty for an opinion on the legality of the Doherty contract. This move is suggested because of the trouble Doherty is in congress. On April 29, 1922, the LaFollette resolution providing an investigation of all oil leases had been adopted by the Senate.

Both's communication established furthermore that Fall had been in constant touch with the lease negotiations.

SEEK DISPOSITION OF MUSCLE SHOALS

Washington, Dec. 3.—(INS)—The Senate today will take up the disposition of Muscle Shoals, Ala., which will be introduced both in Senate and House, C. Pascoe, former secretary to President Coolidge, said today.

CORONER'S PROBE FORSYTHE KILLING NEARING A CLOSE

Waring Today Indicated Investigation Mysterious Killing Near Raleigh Would End Tuesday.

Raleigh, Dec. 3.—(INS)—While the investigation into the mysterious slaying of mighty Forsythe continued to be shrouded in secrecy today indications were that the sensational probe rapidly approaching a climax.

Coroner L. M. Waring, who has taken the leading role in the investigation since Forsythe's lifeless body was brought to a hospital here more than a week ago, told International News Service today that the investigation probably would be brought to a close Tuesday.

The coroner will not intimate whether or not he would call the coroner's jury, which already has met three times to review evidence in the case, together before Tuesday. The coroner said, however, that the jury would be called to reconvene "within the next few days."

Four persons had been arrested in connection with Forsythe's murder up until noon today. They were: Evelyn Britt, 18 year old Durham girl, released on \$5,000 bond.

Harry Bacon, formerly of Raleigh, alleged run runner, held in jail without bond.

Arcus Thompson, of Durham, held without bond as an alleged accessory to the Forsythe killing. Thompson was still searching this afternoon for Robert Stephenson, alleged to have been a participant in the automobile murder of Forsythe, Seprak and the man when Forsythe was murdered, apparently with some sharp instrument.

Thompson, officers investigating the case believe, drove an automobile from Durham to Raleigh on the night of the Forsythe murder, bringing with him Evelyn Britt, a defendant in the case. Thompson, officers said they were led to believe, transferred the girl to the run car driven by Seprak, and in which Forsythe is alleged to have been slain.

Robert Seprak, driver of a run car, has expressed his willingness to go before the coroner's jury when it reconvenes and tell his story of the killing of Forsythe, Seprak and the man who was killed in the run car. Although Seprak has indicated his desire to testify before the coroner's jury, he has declared that he will reiterate his story to the coroner's jury only if he is held by bail, but received the fatal blow in falling from a speeding automobile.

New Movement To Gain Freedom Harry S. New, Jr.

Los Angeles, Dec. 3.—(INS)—A new movement was launched here today to gain freedom for Harry S. New, Jr., son of the Postmaster General Harry S. New, now in San Quentin prison for the alleged murder of his former sweetheart, Freda J. Lesser.

Pretty Ena Clancy, Los Angeles business woman and half sister of young New, admitted she was making another effort to have Governor Friend W. F. Chandler pardon her half brother.

"I have never given up hope that some day I would see Harry of the crime of which I follow 'Jim Inoué'," Mrs. Clancy declared.

DAMAGED STEAMER ARRIVES IN PORT

Vigo, Dec. 3.—(INS)—Elaborate preparations taken by the port authorities to check the fire reported on board the Holland-American freight and passenger lined Meisdam were found unnecessary for the vessel arrived here with the fire extinguished.

The fire, which broke out Tuesday was put under control when the vessel was still at sea. Considerable damage was done but no injuries to the ship's personnel were reported.

PLANES TO LAND ON NEW ST. LOUIS P. O. STRUCTURE

Platform For Passengers Included In The Landing Arrangement.

St. Louis, Dec. 3. (INS.)—Featuring an airplane landing platform atop the structure, a new post office building modern to the finest detail, will be constructed in St. Louis, according to reliable information given out here.

The airplane platform would give considerable time in the handling of air mail, which now is carried by truck from the post office to the flying field. At the present time, about an hour is required to handle the mail to the flying field after it has been made ready to dispatch.

With the public recognizing the advantage offered by air mail, it is imperative that St. Louis provide better facilities for the speedy handling. Postmaster Louis J. P. declared in discussing the plan for the new building. "The hour now required to transport mail to and from the flying field could be saved by building an air station on top of the postoffice.

It is my opinion that provision should be made for planes to take on and discharge passengers on the platform. Within the next few years airplanes will be used almost exclusively for carrying mail great distances.

"Business men will be willing to pay the extra postage in order to have letters delivered in New York the morning after they are mailed in this city. Railroads will be used only in cases of short haul, where they can transport mail for delivery the next day. Work will be started on the new building within the next 48

months, according to present plans. A few months ago a representative of the United States Treasury department was in this city to study the facilities of the present building and confer with St. Louisans on the advisability of a new one.

The decision to build such a type of building resulted from this visit. Postmaster Alt said that the landing platform feature is an necessity to meet the increase in air mail that is anticipated within the next two years. Such facilities are not only feasible but necessary for the adequate handling of air mail, in his opinion.

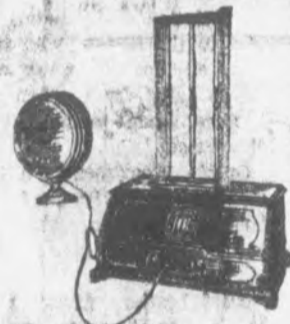

WILLIAM ELIJAH PROCTOR

Beginning years ago as a poor boy he made a marked success both as a farmer and business man and at his death was considered one of the sections leading factors. Many are the times that without hope of earthly reward he has extended a helping hand in time of need. During the years of his activities "Lige" Proctor, as he was generally known, gained an ever widening circle of friends many of whom today stood with bowed heads beside the open grave to pay their tribute to one of Pitt's outstanding citizens.

New Haven, Conn., Dec. 3rd. (INS.)—George Pierce Baker is likely to become known as the theatrical miracle man, one of these days, now, that the new Yale theatre is in operation and little leaks indicate the thing, peering on under Professor Baker's guidance behind the outwardly grim walls of the million dollar Harkness theatre at Yale. Some 150 students have been laboring in the new theatre since the college year began late in September and from among these students some day will come the famous producers and playwrights of the nation.

When the applicant for instruction in Yale's department of the drama has accepted he is started through a course that should lead to heights hitherto unknown in the great world of the stage. The student works all the time under adequate supervision. He must do everything from stage carpentry to directing a finished production including of course the high point of writing his play. Designing costumes and then making them are a portion of his duties. He makes tables, chairs. He sets scenery that he has designed and then made and painted. In fact the drama student at Yale becomes the Jack-of-all-trades. It is in the books that the Jack of all trades is good at none. The Yale drama student is good at all.

The new Yale theatre, gift of Edward S. Harkness of New York City, is to be opened with a series of performances on December 10, 11 and 13. Five thousand

and people will be invited to attend these performances, five in number. Yale University has announced the occasion thus: "This will be the first time in the history of the drama that in a University a building specially built for a department of the drama has been opened with students in the work, this including producing science and costume designing and lighting."

There are something to be shown the public on these nights which will indicate the high point Professor Baker has reached a point perhaps far beyond that he attained at Harvard where he had the famous 47 Workshop. The absolute control of all scenery from a switchboard is looked upon as something unusual. The theatre has been built without a fly loft. The lightning system is a thing unusual, the lights becoming more absolutely than ever the servants of a single guiding person. There seems to be wizardry in it all.

Once upon a time the producer put signs on the stage to indicate what he had in mind. "This is a forest" or "This is the sea" ran the legend and the audience adjusted its mind to comprehend the thing. In this new Harkness Yale theatre the audiences' minds are adjusted by other influences altogether.

Why does a youth desire to go to college? Chiefly for educational reasons, according to students in Yale University's three undergraduate departments. As selecting Yale as their alma mater more students did that for family reasons than any other though a fairly substantial number came because of social interests. Such are some of the facts brought out in a survey conducted by Yale authorities, recently announced.

"Among the influences grouped under the general heading 'Cultural Interests,' says the Yale developer, 'is Prestige of a Yale degree which may have a social as well as a cultural significance and which was considered to be the most influential single determinant for both school and college associations.'"

The survey in detail showed that among reasons for wishing a University education in general 30 per cent of Yale Undergraduates were influenced by desire for vocational training, 57 per cent by cultural interests, 6 by family interests. Cultural interests guided 54 per cent in their activities in Yale, vocational training 24 per cent, social interests 16 per cent.

cent, family influence 2 per cent, while extra curriculum interests—presumably athletics, guided 5 per cent.

MANY CHANGES IN COACHING STAFFS NOW PREDICTED

Walsh Says Colleges Can't Abide a Loser For More Than a Single Season.

New York, Dec. 3.—(INS.)—Officially starting the open season on football coaches who neglected to fool some of the people all of the time, including the opposing defense, came the expected intimation today of post-season changes in coaching staffs and imposing names were bandied with considerable freedom. Among those mentioned for decapitation were Price of California; Alexander of Georgia Tech; and Ingveson of Iowa.

The latter, indeed, was under fire during the regular season, which happened to be one of Iowa's worst.

Frank Cavanaugh already has declined to return to Boston college and has been mentioned for the California berth.

Rumors of Lou Young's passing at Pennsylvania have been in the air and, according to a prominent Pacific Coast coach, Young also has been under consideration by the bears.

Only a day or so after Carnegie Tech's notable victory over Notre Dame it was said that Walter Steffen would not return in his advisory capacity next season.

As for Alexander, his withdrawal at Georgia Tech has been freely discussed throughout Southern football. His Tech teams haven't been what they were, and the glory of the past often is forgotten in the disappointment of the present. If Alexander goes, his passing will be regretted by football men throughout the South.

They say that Hugo Bezdek has outlasted his welcome at Penn State and, before the big three series, Tad Jones was under a hot fire at Yale and not by "yellow bellies and slyster lawyers," as Tad himself suggested. However, it is considered unlikely that anything will come of the Jones matter while it is entirely possible that Bezdek will hold on, at least for another year.

College football may or may not be over emphasized but there is no doubt that the value of winning is, seemingly, they can't abide a loser for more than a single season.

NEW SCHOOL A DAY IS MEXICO'S IDEA

Mexico City, Dec. 3. (INS.)—A school a day. That's the construction program the Mexican Department of Education has set for itself in the rural district and it is five schools ahead of the program thus far this year.

A spokesman for the department announcing the success enjoyed in maintaining the success enjoyed in maintaining a construction program far beyond anything of the kind ever attempted in Mexico, asserted it was due principally to the awakening of Mexican countrymen of "compensations" to the necessity of education.

The department of education has not spent vast sums of money in the construction of these schools, it was explained. That would have been impossible, because of the limited appropriation available to the department under the Cal's program of economy in government expenditures. Instead, the department has conducted an active and successful propaganda campaign with the purpose of getting communities to build their own schools.

Large landowners have been induced to erect buildings for the education of children of their employes. In other instances building materials have been obtained from one source or another and the men of the neighborhood have contributed the labor. Sometimes the department bought or helped buy the materials. All sorts of

expedients have been used, to fit conditions as they were found. The main idea has been to get the schools built.

Dr. Joe Manuel Puig Casaurang, Minister of Education, has set before himself the ideal of affording every Mexican boy or girl an opportunity to get an education. Probably that ideal is unattainable within the two years left to him of the life of the Calles administration, but he has made much progress and will make more.

'Lion Hunter' Is New State Job For Noted Hunter

Yosemite, Dec. 3. (INS.)—There is a new type of 'gunman' in California. He has 284 notches in his trusty rifle and the State

has paid him well for the job. This individual is Jay C. Bruce, official lion hunter for the California State Fish and Game Commission, who has just returned here with two new cuts in his rifle stock, marking the recent death of a large male and female lion near the Eleven Mile Station with in the park. In addition he has placed three lion kittens caught there in the Oakland Zoo. But, don't let the presence of mountain lions deter you from visiting Yosemite for as Bruce explains:

While each mountain lion in California annually kills deer valued at \$1,000, there is little danger of their attacking a human being. In all my years of hunting lions I have only seen one without the aid of dogs. Here, in this state, deer and cattle are too easily preyed upon for a mountain lion to overcome his natural fear by attacking a human being. The remarkable increase in wild animal growth in Yosemite under strict protection of the park rangers has made the park a natural habitat for the harmless animals as well as for those of a predatory nature. The wild, rugged country below Eleven Mile Station is seldom visited by humans; making this section of the park ideal for the lions' hunting operations.

Mountain lions seem to kill for fun is the opinion of Bruce, who states they will often strike down a defenseless animal and leaving the body undisturbed, pass on a few hundred feet to make another kill. This proved to be the case with the female shot in the park several days ago. After having fed on the remains of one deer she later ruthlessly dealt death to two more deer crossing her path within a quarter of a mile of the first kill without feeling off the last two.

Due to the lion's delight in killing harmless wild animals and carrying off domestic stock, such as sheep, cattle and hogs, Bruce believes the coyotes are a mild pest when compared with the mountain lion. "This viewpoint," he stated, is proven by the stomach contents of the two animals. Examinations have shown lions to feed almost entirely on deer and valuable livestock, while the coyotes' principal food is rodent and smaller fur-bearing animals.

Taking issue with persons objecting to the efforts of the California Fish and Game Commission in trying to eradicate the state of mountain lions, Bruce said, "Next to predatory animals, the biggest handicap to a program of practical conservation here in California are the sentimentalists. This, I believe, is due to their lack of outdoor knowledge concerning the life of mountain lions."

Bruce a resident of San Leandro, is in the forests throughout the year running down lions with his six trained dogs. He has established a record of 25 kills to date this year, beating a former high mark of 22 lions. In the next few days Bruce will move to Camp Nelson on the Tuolumne River for a campaign in this region.

BORDER BOOTLEGS OUTWIT DRY MEN TO BE FREE OF ICE

Ogdenburg, N. Y., Dec. 3. (INS.)—The most famous thirst oasis along the Canadian border is located near Chateaugay. It has an entrance in the United States and a bar in Canada and has been conducted by Fred Homer.

A battle of wits has been waged between the road house proprietor and officers of both Canada and the United States. Palmer's latest move has been an application for citizenship in Canada. American officers assert he is trying to seek refuge across the international line and hopes to make safety permanent by becoming a Canadian citizen. They allege that Palmer has been convicted in Canada and demanded that he be refused Canadian citizenship and be deported to the United States.

The liquor in Palmer's rendezvous is kept in Canada and patrons are served while they are standing in the United States. Canada is 4.4 per cent dry in that locality and Palmer has been raided by Canadian officers. He is invariably fined.

Ogdenburg, Dec. 3. (INS.)—In January experiments will be made opposite this port to determine if it is possible to keep the St. Lawrence River free from ice and suitable for navigation during the entire year.

D. Howard T. Barner of Montreal, specialist in ice search is coming here and will experiment to find a ray which will illuminate the rays of sunlight under water and prevent formation, and stop the growth of anchor ice, which grows at the bottom of open water.

The new artificial ray which he hopes to find will be more powerful than the light which he has previously used in shattering icebergs in the Arctic and which is much more powerful than dynamite. If his experiments are successful it will be possible to keep all the streams in the United States free of ice the year round as well as keep ice-locked harbors cleared.

Dr. Barner is the ice specialist who broke up the big ice jam at Erie, Pa., last spring.

Basket Ball Schedule For State College

Asheville, Dec. 3. (INS.)—The vanguard of team managers and franchise owners who compose the National association of professional baseball clubs began arriving here today for the association's annual winter meet.

Practically all of the 188 cities in the United States and Canada that have professional clubs have made reservation at the convention local officials declare today. Attendance was forecast at 700. The meet gets under way Sunday with the meeting of the board of arbitration. Sessions will continue through Thursday night.

Two familiar faces will not be seen at the meet of this year—Tyus Raymond Cobb, former manager of the Detroit Tigers, and this speaker, former manager of the Cleveland Indians, they having passed from the picture.

El Paso Only City Having But Few Frame Dwellings

El Paso, Tex., Dec. 3. (INS.)—No other city in Texas and only a few in the United States as large as El Paso can boast a population of 110,000 persons with only slight more than 100 frame buildings within its limits.

And while El Paso, being a resort city, is swarming with apartment houses and family hotels, it contains more than 17,000 residences.

The reason for the absence of frame houses in El Paso is directly due to the inability many years ago to get lumber and the availability of brick in plenty. The predominance of brick dwellings further was augmented in 1917 when the city council passed an ordinance banning the erection of frame structures within the city limits.

Perhaps this rigid legislation has re-acted unfavorably on Texas lumbermen, but it certainly has been profitable to the city in re-

duction of annual fire losses. El Paso stands seventh in the United States in low annual fire loss. During the last nine years annual toll has averaged approximately \$150,000.

In addition to what it saves property owners, the ordinance has saved the city large sums of money in maintenance of a large fire department. Seven fire stations with a personnel of 95 employees and 12 upper and lower Rio Grande valley over an area of probably 20 square miles. And until recently the El Paso department has answered calls in Jaurez, Mexico, across the river.

The frame houses now in the city were erected either before the ordinance was passed or were taken into the city by annexation. The small number of frame structures slowly is dwindling as fires consume a number of them each year and brick and stucco edifices

replace them in compliance with the ordinance provisions.

BRITISH BANKERS WORRY OVER DOLLAR DENOMINATION

London, Dec. 3. (INS.)—Great concern at British money policy is being shown by leading financiers in London, and talk of "dollar domination" is rife.

"The present trend of things," states the financial editor of the London Daily News, "is all in the direction of a temporary dollar denomination of London, market rates, due to conditions having been annexed to New York."

"One almost incredible proof of this is that American banks are at present lending their sterling surplus, for three months in London, at the phenomenal rate of 5 1/4 per cent per annum.

"In other words, American lend-lease a number of them each make a profit on a very short loan

of at least 2 per cent higher than before we went back to gold.

"This profit comes out of our production.

Another example of dollar domination is that every week fear of a rise in the New York Bank up set our Money Market.

"A growing feeling that our monetary policy is leading us on trade and other ills, to credit dis-

location is patent.

"This is leading to a demand for a Parliamentary inquiry into Treasury and Bank of England methods and policy.

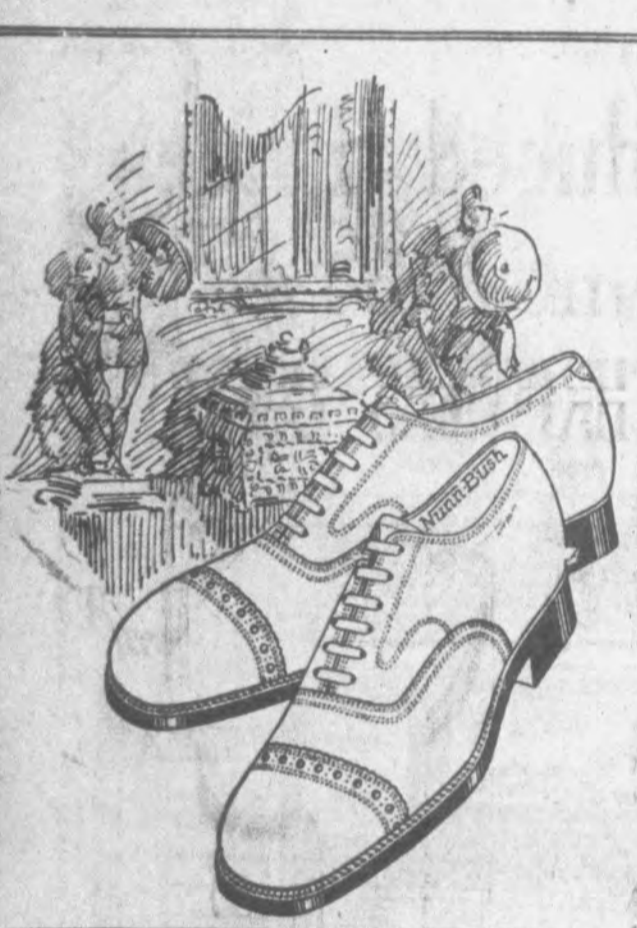

LOBSTER SHELL SILK IS NEWEST OF INVENTIONS

Washington, Dec. 3.—(INS)—Artificial silk produced by a new process from the bony structure of lobster and crab shells is the latest contribution of science to the textile industry.

At least claim for the discovery of such a process has been advanced by a German inventor, according to information to the commerce department from Trade Commissioner W. T. Daugherty, at Berlin.

The inventor, according to the statement, is Dr. G. Kunike, formerly associated with the Kaiser Wilhelm Institute fuer Faserstoff chemie at Berlin-Dahlem.

It is claimed that when chitin—the bony structure of lobster and crab shells—is brought into a colloidal solution and passed through a filter press, it can be drawn into artificial silk thread of greater tensile strength than cellulose silk.

While the process is said to be of little importance to Germany, which lacks the necessary raw materials, it is believed by the inventor that it would be of importance and value to countries possessing large supplies of the necessary shells.

It was stated that chitin can be dissolved into a fluid, viscous

state in certain highly concentrated acids. It is also said to be unknown that chitin can be nitrated or acetylated and then dissolved. Like cellulose, it dissolves pure, without coloration, in concentrated sulfuric acid with hydrolysis, according to the inventor.

Germany Plans A Reform Of Its Election System

Berlin, Germany, Dec. 3. (INS)—Germany is going to reform her election system. It has been found out by almost all parties that is too complicated, extreme and not democratic, in the ideal sense of the world.

The Government have worked out a reform program of the election system which will be submitted to the Reichstag for approval. Being a minority government and compelled to lean on the support of either the Socialists or the Nationalist if desiring to have a law passed, the government, therefore, have made a point not to propose changes involving a change of the constitution for a law changing the constitution requires a two-third majority of the Reichstag.

The government, in their reform program, purpose to abolish the system of "election lists." According to this system mandate, were claimed on the principal of "so many votes, so many mandates." One hundred thousand votes polled for a party were required to obtain a seat, regardless of whether the candidate had earned his constituency or not. Thus, for instance, it could happen that a party scored, say, half a dozen

seats without any of its candidates carrying a single constituency.

The reform program of the Government now proposes to return to the old system characterized by "one candidate—one constituency."

Saxophone Music Call Wicked to Hell Says Preacher

Cleveland, O., Dec. 3. (INS.)—The lugubrious saxophones and the baleful slip horns are bugles, blown by imps and calling the wicked to assemble in Hell, according to the Rev. Homer L. Cox prominent local minister.

Moral color-blindness and atrophy of the brain cells are caused directly by the vibrations of

syncopation causing the sufferer inevitably to become mentally intoxicated, he declares.

"Syncopated music violates the three essential elements of music—rhythm, melody and harmony," the minister declares. The syncopator begins his tone on an unaccented part of the measure and carries it through the accented part of the succeeding measure.

BRITISH 'HUSH HUSH' TANK IS SHROUDED IN MYSTERY

Amerley, Eng., Dec. 3.—(INS)—No military weapon has ever been enshrouded in such secrecy as the new British 'Hush Hush' tank which the Dominion premiers have been allowed to inspect.

Reporters and spectators were kept at a distance of half a mile.

Only half a dozen really privileged folk were allowed to go near.

The new tank is reputed to be the fastest, most powerful and most impervious land weapon that has ever been brought into play. It has about as much in common with the original tanks used on the Somme in 1916 as the high powered car of today has with the old push bicycle.

Its mass of machinery is crowded with a central revolving turret, in which is mounted a three-pounder gun, while four other turrets bristle with machine guns. The commander is stationed in its imposing dome, and such as its mysterious qualities that, while the tractors churn up the mud in great waves the tank is manoeuvred with the ease of a small car.

Market Report

MARKET LETTER

New York, Dec. 3. (INS)—Industrial stocks displayed a strong tone today. The leaders in the moderate upward movement included the steel and copper shares, the oil specialties and a few of the rails.

Outside of the stock market the developments in the financial district were somewhat mixed. Crude oil advanced from 1 to 2 cents in response to the new stabilization plan announced by the tire and rubber houses and the banks in the financial district. Cotton declined to the lowest price of the year with January breaking under 12 cents for the first time in ten years.

Conspicuous strength was exhibited by the high-priced industrial and specialties which have been in the forefront of the upward movement since the middle of November. Baldwin Locomotive more than made up its 3 1-2 point dividend. United States Steel sold off a point higher. General Motors was in good demand above 12 and Westinghouse above 133.

Chrysler Motors, Hudson and Studebaker composed a trio of strong and active stocks in which the trading was unusually heavy. Strength in Chesapeake and Ohio was attributed partly to rumors that the Nickel Plate merger plans had failed as they involved the Chesapeake and Ohio system were about to collapse, leaving Chesapeake and Ohio free to seek other connections or to remain independent. Erie sold higher and the so-called dividend rails made moderate gains.

London houses. Lather there was scattered buying and the market advanced. Australian cables reported a delay in harvesting and the shipping in New South Wales. Estimated receipts here were 11 cars. Corn opened 1-4 to 1-2 lower in small scattered selling by local and commission houses. The market was rather light and scattered and the market moved within a narrow range in the early hours. Commercial demand for corn was dull. Estimated receipts were 70 cars.

Wheat started steady to 1-8c down in small local selling. Trade was active with the buying power. There was considerable buying on at 4 1-8 difference. Commercial demand for oats moderate. Estimated receipts were 17 cars.

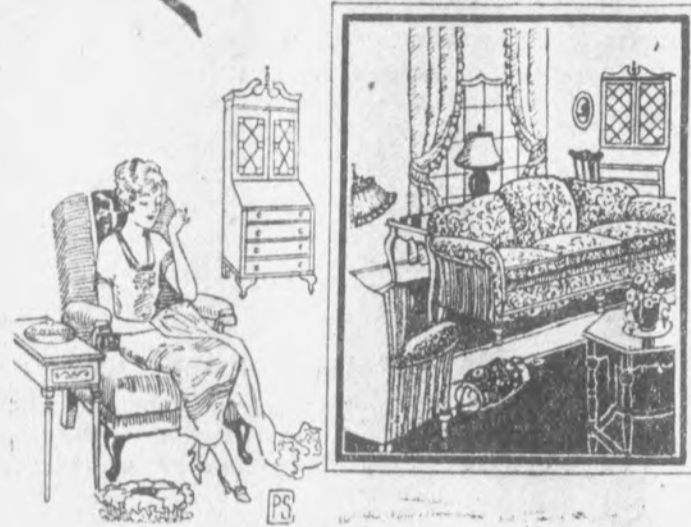

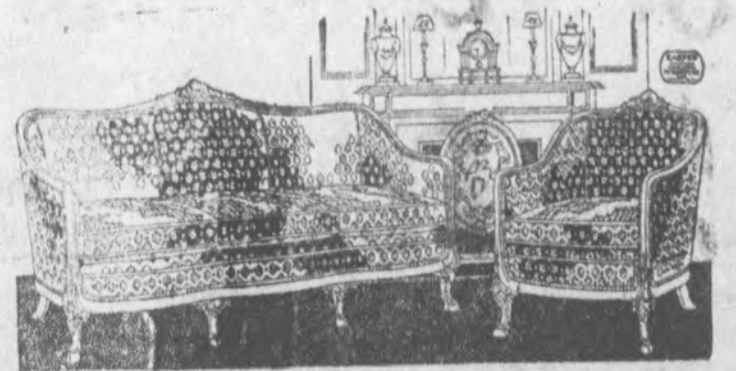
