LITTLE TO CHOOSE BETWEEN CITY AND OUTSIDE ENTRANTS

Double Votes Offered On Country Subscriptions Big Help to Those Who Work Outside Territory

It looks like a mighty hard job to try to pick the probable winner of the \$1,500 Studebaker Custom Sedan from among the list of fourteen entrants in the Daily Reflector subscription campaign as published today. Not only are strong entrants with a good following entered from Greenville, but two very ambitious workers are entered from Winterville and Paeolus. Mrs. John Carroll representing the former and Mrs. Sugg Fleming the latter.

Greenville is well represented though, and the race for the more than \$3,000 in prizes and cash commissions which this newspaper offers ambitious folks ought to get started in earnest about the time the snow leaves the ground. Unlike the last subscription campaign conducted some year and a half ago, there are no prize winners from the previous contest entered in this one. However, Mrs. Sugg Fleming was declared winner of fourth prize some five years ago.

As announced a week or more ago, the Reflector is offering six prizes and cash commissions to non-winners who devote all or part of their time in helping this paper build up its circulation. PRAGUE ACCEPTS PROGRAM FOR ELECTRIC SUBWAYS

Prague, Jan. 11.—(INS)—Headed by the Mayor, M. Baxa, the municipality of Prague has practically accepted a scheme for underground electric railroads. Numerous offers have been made both by American and German financiers in the past few years to float similar concerns; but there has been considerable opposition to the idea of using foreign money in city enterprise.

The outgoing inhabitants welcome the scheme with enthusiasm because until now, street cars have been their only means of transportation. It is estimated that 44,000 passengers will be transported in one hour by the new system at the busy hours of the day, and that there will be a minute service of trains, traveling at 17 miles per hour. The total cost will be 110,000,000 Czech crowns.

A new order issued by the Soviet authorities forbids all persons in military service to enter saloons.

MONTREAL BURIES VICTIMS THEATRE DISASTER SUNDAY

Funeral Services for Seventy-seven Dead Children Were Conducted Today

Montreal, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Stunned by the horror of Sunday's catastrophe in which 77 children were crushed to death or asphyxiated while trying to escape from the burning Laurent Palace, movie theatre, Montreal is today seeking to learn how such a tragedy occurred. Pending resumption of the inquest, Amen Lawand, owner of the palace and three of his subordinates, are at liberty under bail.

All the dead were identified and the majority of the thirty injured had sufficiently recovered to be removed to their homes. The pastor of the church of The Nativity, who knew most of the victims, decided to preside at a general mass for them today. Many of the bodies were taken to the church.

DISCUSS CHANGES IN DIVORCE LAWS

Ministers' Conference Formulating Recommendations to the Legislature

High Point, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Proposed changes in marriage and divorce laws of North Carolina were up for discussion today. The conference was sponsored by the Ministers' Association of Leaksville, Spray, Draper and Charlotte to formulate recommendations to be submitted to the state legislature in session at Raleigh.

The meeting, an outgrowth of a movement started by the local ministerial association at Leaksville about two months ago, had the ministers of High Point for hosts at the Wesley Memorial Methodist church, with Rev. W. L. Sherrill, representative of the Charlotte ministers as temporary chairman.

Restrictions of the granting of divorce to the one scriptural cause; prohibition of remarriage of divorced persons under certain conditions; filing in advance of applications for license to register of deeds.

"We would favor a bill requiring notice of a desire to marry to be made to the register of deeds at least two weeks in advance." The bill would embody these features: a regular form for making application, containing summary of marriage and divorce laws of the state; the register of deeds to delay issuance of license to investigate and if he believes the two concerned to be under age to check their ages with their parents; and to make the application a public document, to become competent evidence in any court in the state to sustain any fact stated thereon in writing.

Bandits Massacre Thousand People

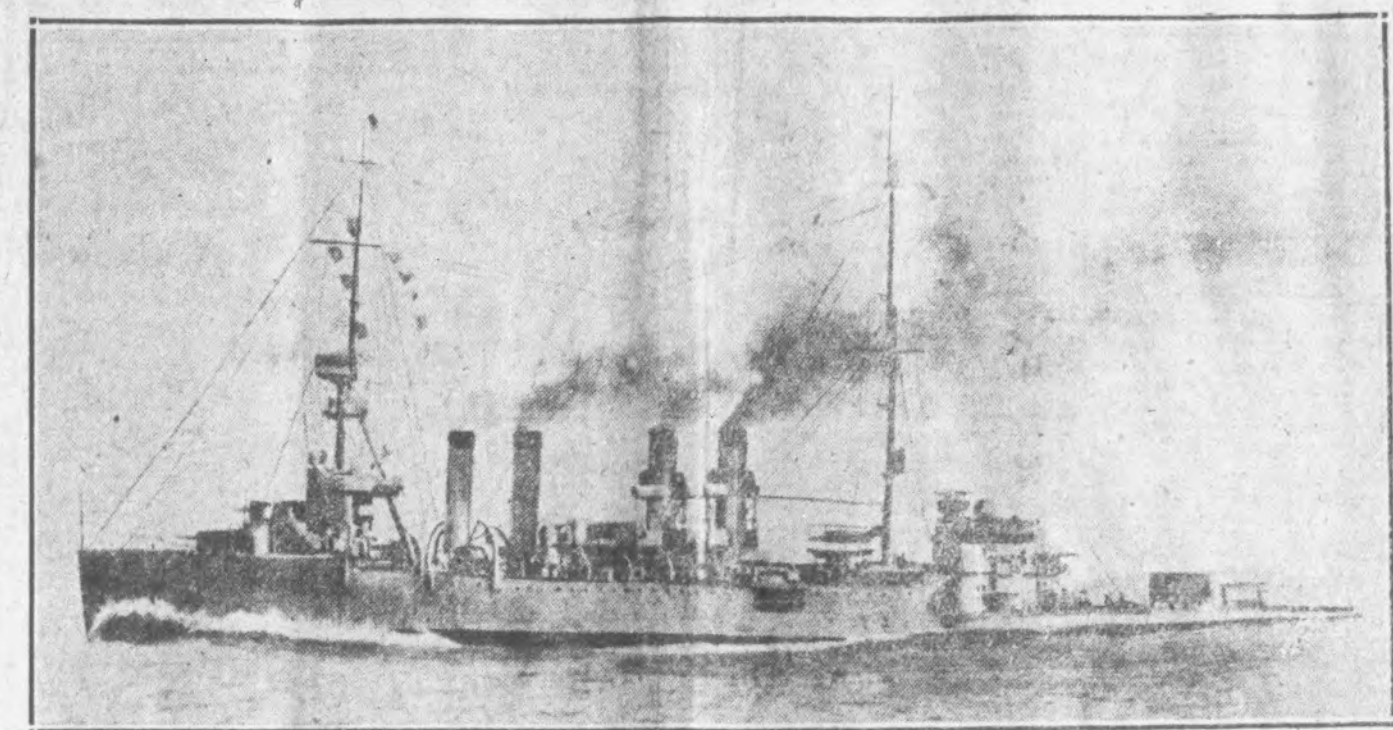

SAYS EIGHT MONTH TERM NECESSARY

Allen Declares it is First Step Toward Equalizing Educational Opportunity

Raleigh, Jan. 11.—(AP)—A uniform eight months school term as the first step necessary in equalizing educational opportunity in the state is the proposition of the state department of education to the legislature.

In his biennial report, A. T. Allen, state superintendent of public instruction, marshals an array of figures, graphs and facts to support this contention. Coupled with this proposal to submit to popular vote an amendment to the constitution which would increase the term from six to eight months, the superintendent discusses in detail matter of state aid, which, he says, must be rendered a majority of the counties before they could run their schools eight or even six months.

The budget commission is asked to recommend two and one-half million dollars for this fund for the next two years and this was one of the requests not cut by the commission.

With recommendation of the budget commission, approval and advocacy by Governor McLean, Mr. Allen said he believed the increase for this fund would be voted by the legislature.

The explicit plan is that the first million and a half be distributed the next year as it has been distributed in the past. Of the remaining million dollars, Mr. Allen suggests that \$200,000 be set aside to aid transportation, \$200,000 be set aside as a stimulating fund to aid counties in getting ahead of the present six months term and that the remainder be distributed by the commission.

At next school year's beginning a new basis for distribution based on an equalization of tax values in the different counties is suggested. A commission of three, attached to the department of revenue, would make a complete study of tax values in the state, equalizing values as between counties only to distribute the fund. Ability of a county to support its schools would be discovered.

Nearly 32 1-2 million dollars was spent on schools last year, compared with a million and a quarter in 1900. The state spent \$39.62 per child last year, against a national average of \$74.96.

More Neutral Zones Declared in Nicaragua

Managua, Nicaragua, Jan. 11.—(AP)—United States naval forces have ascended the Escondido river 60 miles to establish a neutral zone in the interior today. Another neutral zone had been declared at the mouth of the Wawa river.

To Consider Farm Relief Measure in Secret Session

Washington, Jan. 11.—(AP)—The Senate Agriculture Committee today voted to consider the new McNary-Haugen farm relief bill in secret session.

Religion Still Alive. Justice By Imitation. Husband and Wife, Flying. The Arabs Won't Like It. (By Arthur Brisbane)

Rabbi Browne, says Bolshevism has not succeeded in killing religion, as it planned. Religion may be, as Sovietism says, on conspicuous signs "The opinion of the people," but if so, the people want their opinion. Some that have quit the worship of the old orthodox Christian "icons," images of saints and holy men, have substituted a new worship which he calls "Communist ikonolatry."

Lenin's mausoleum is worshipped as the tombs of the saints are worshipped and his images are rapidly becoming "holy" images. It is not surprising that a few years of Sovietism should be unable to wipe out the old beliefs. Long years of universities, public schools and public newspapers have been unable to end belief in the "13" superstition, and many well educated human beings would not walk under a ladder, or sit thirteen at a table.

Old superstition goes deep into the brain, science penetrates only a little way, as yet. Stamford's mayor advises lashing husbands that beat their wives. More imitation is not the wisest kind of justice, although men have practiced it for ages. If a man stole something with his right hand, they cut off that right hand. If he blasphemed, they cut out his tongue. If he put out another man's right eye, they put out his right eye, etc.

Modern wisdom should find better ways than mere imitation, to punish a wife beater, why not put him to work until he earns enough money to buy his wife a nice little automobile—he could do that in two years. Then let him sit at the window and see her drive by, and warn him that if he repeats his offense he will have to earn a new car for her.

Better plans could be found, but nothing could be more dull than merely imitating the wife beater, by beating him, as we imitate the murderer, by killing him. Last Saturday Sir Samuel Hoare, British Air Minister, and his wife, finished their flight from London to Delhi, India. The trip of 6,300 miles was made in 83 flying hours, an average of 100 miles an hour. Lady Hoare said it was a comfortable trip and she could use her powder puff very nicely, in flight.

Men that manage Britain's flying actually FLY, that seems very strange in this more conservative country, quite without adequate air defense, its flying in the hands of men that know as much about practical flying as a turtle knows about ice skating. We had one real flying officer, Mitchell, ranking with any flier in Europe. But his talk interfered with battleship contracts, and it did not take long to get rid of him. Arabs are picturesque, but when they come to Paris, they bring smallpox with them, and Frenchmen get it. So France will vacillate all her Arabs, whether they like it or not, which will mean a

SITUATION IN MEXICO TODAY MORE SERIOUS

Twenty Killed and Ten Injured in Clash Between Catholics and Authorities

Mexico City, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Special dispatches from Guadalupe state that twenty-one persons have been killed and ten wounded in clashes between Catholic and municipal authorities in the town of Guadalupe in the state of Jalisco. The mayor of Guadalupe and the local deputy were among those killed. The dispatches reported that municipal authorities offered opposition to a religious demonstration and a battle between the Catholics and municipal officials, employees and policemen followed. The agrarians, it was announced, had decided to support President Calles and the Mexico City headquarters, and has instructed all agrarian organizations throughout Mexico to co-operate with federal troops in pursuit of rebels wherever found.

Clearing up reports that federal forces had been defeated near Durango City, dispatches stated that the situation was merely the revival of the problem presented by the warlike Mexican Indians who always revolt when the opportunity presents itself. The Indians are reported to have taken up arms under the religious banner under orders from Damaso Barragan, "Knight of Columbus."

The report states that two Catholic priests have been arrested and lodged in the penitentiary. One figure claims to have information that important cities have been captured, the news being suppressed. These reports, however, have not been confirmed. Bandit outrages have also increased and half a dozen villages a score of miles from the city are virtually deserted, the inhabitants having fled to the capital for fear of outrages by the self-styled revolutionists.

Bishop Pascual Diaz, secretary of the Catholic Episcopate in Mexico, has been arrested. Five other prelates were taken with him. Government officials refused to give any information as to the whereabouts of Bishop Diaz but it is thought he is enroute to the port of Vera Cruz under military guard.

Ed. H. May Prominent Farmer Died at Home Early Today

Ed. H. May, 57, prominent farmer of this county, died about three o'clock this morning at his home near Winterville, following an illness of about two weeks. The burial will take place tomorrow afternoon at two-thirty o'clock at the family burying ground near the home. The deceased is survived by three brothers, Jim R. W. H. and R. L. May, and two sisters, Misses Mary E. and Susan May.

Harry Rogers, Head of International Organization Will Be Here Next Week

Harry Rogers, president of Rotary International, will visit this city on the 19th of this month according to announcement made at the meeting of the local Rotary Club last night. The meeting, on the occasion of the president's visit, will be held at the noon hour and members of the Kingston Rotary Club will be present here for the affair. This is the first time since the organization of the local club that the head of the world-wide organization of Rotary has visited this city.

Last night's regular meeting of the Greenville club was strictly business meeting and dealt with committee reports and routine matters. Practically the entire membership was present despite the inclement weather.

THIRTEEN INCHES SNOW HERE DURING PAST THREE DAYS

Records of Local Weather Observers Show Biggest Snow Here in Nine Years

Thirteen inches of snow have fallen in this city since late Saturday night, according to a report made this morning by B. T. Clark, local official weather observer. Mr. Clark stated that Sunday's snow fall was three inches, that seven inches fell during yesterday and three more inches during the night. The total fall, however, it was stated, was greater by three inches than the total fall of the three nights and two days since that the warm temperatures Sunday and a certain amount of melting yesterday while the fall continued held the lay to a total depth of ten inches.

This is the heaviest fall of snow in this community since Mr. Clark took charge of observations here in 1919, he said. Parties who were in charge of observations prior to 1919 stated that while the old records were not now available it is believed that a fall equal to the past three days occurred here during the winter of 1917-18.

DECLARES PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE TO CONGRESS AFFRONT TO MEXICO

Washington, Jan. 11.—(AP)—The statement that President Coolidge's Nicaraguan-Mexican message to Congress was deliberate affront to Mexico was made in the House today by Representative Huddleton, of Alabama. The House Foreign Affairs Committee voted today to take up consideration of the President's message tomorrow.

SENATE MEMBERS GIVING ATTENTION SPECIAL MESSAGE

Coolidge Message on Nicaraguan Situation Comes With Unexpected Suddenness

Washington, Jan. 11.—(AP)—President Coolidge's special message to Congress in which he laid bare in unmistakable language evidence of Mexican interference in Nicaragua and reaffirmed the administration's policy as one designed to protect all the interests of the United States in Central America, came with such an unexpected suddenness that many members are still perusing the document today before making known their views. This was being given particular attention by members of the Senate who contemplate taking part in the examination tomorrow of Secretary Kellogg by the Foreign Relations Committee on the Nicaraguan situation.

Meanwhile reports from Nicaragua today said that Sacasa, the Liberal leader, has refused a request for mediation allegedly made by Liberal adherents there. Sacasa, under American recognition, in a statement issued at the capital, characterized Sacasa as a pretender to a presidency he never occupied while the Nicaraguan Minister to Washington said that the Liberal victory in his country would result in furthering Soviet interests.

MANY OF ENGLAND'S FINE OLD HOUSES ARE BEING SOLD TO RICH AMERICANS

London, Jan. 11.—(INS)—More and more of England's beautiful old houses are being sold to Americans, says Albert R. Powys, secretary of the Society for the Protection of Ancient Buildings. There are signs, continues Mr. Powys, that the American campaign to buy up the choicest evidences of early-English history is likely to be carried on in the future on a most dangerous scale. It is not difficult to understand a private individual owning an ancient work of art being forced to sell it to relieve his financial embarrassment, but there is no excuse for municipalities who, deliberately, and without necessity dispose of their ancient buildings.

The Banking District Council has declined the offer of \$1,500 which my society had offered for the purpose of retaining their Elizabethan Market Hall.

Instead the council decided to pull down the fine old building, and the timbers have been sold to an American. We are hearing of similar instances from all over the country.

MUCH ACTIVITY IN LEGISLATURE TODAY'S SESSION

Australian Ballot Bill and Uniform Tax System for Schools Among Measures Presented Today

Raleigh, Jan. 11.—(AP)—The Senate and House recessed today after brief sessions to reconvene later in joint session to conduct an official canvass of election returns. The joint session lasted only thirteen minutes. Returns from the general election last November were canvassed. Representative Winston, Bertie, introduced a joint resolution, which was passed, providing for induction of officers of all elective offices into office on January 12 with the exception of those who have already taken the oath of office. Tellers were appointed to count the votes. They were Senators Dunlap and Smith and Representatives Byrd, Eure and Price.

The Committee on Elections will hold a meeting the latter part of this week to investigate the contested election of Senator R. J. Roane, of Whittier, Democrat of the Thirty-third District.

SENATE SESSION

Repeal of the absentee voters law in North Carolina and establishment of the Australian ballot system for all forms of elections in North Carolina were proposed in two measures introduced in the Senate today. The proposal to repeal the absentee voter's law is a very short bill merely providing for repeal of those sections of the Consolidated Statutes which provide for the absentee voter to cast his ballot. This is one of the pet measures proposed by the Republicans in sessions of the legislature for many years past. It comes this time from Senator Horton, of Johnston.

The other measure, the Australian ballot, is also another one of the pet bills of the minority party in North Carolina. This measure comes from Senator McNeal, of Ashe county, and is based on the provisions of Ashe county special law which provides for this form of voting in Ashe county.

The bill was referred to the Committee on Election Laws and the chairman of the committee announced before adjournment that his committee would have a meeting today to consider this and other measures which have been referred to the committee.

Lieutenant-Governor Long asked the Senate committees to which bills have been referred to meet during the day in order that some of the measures which have been introduced in the Senate might get on the calendar. Thereupon meetings of the various committees were called. Among these is the Committee on Appropriations which is holding its first session today to begin conferring on the general appropriations bills for the maintenance of state institutions and departments and for consideration of the proposed bond issues for permanent improvements at the various state institutions.

House Session Fourteen bills, four of Statewide import, were introduced in the House today and Speaker Fontaine announced the remainder of his committees before Assembly met in joint session to canvass the election returns.

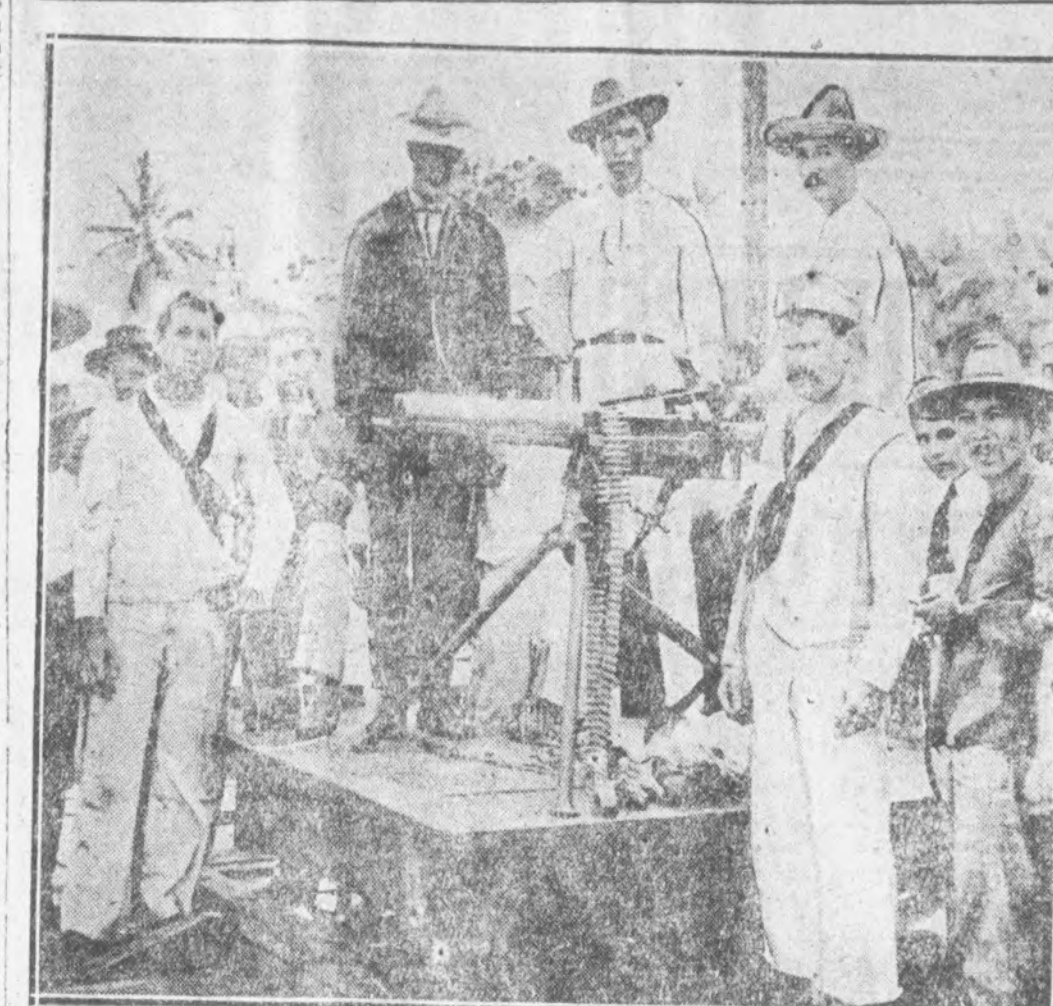
