London, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Refusal by the Cantonese foreign minister, Eugene Chen, to sign any agreement fixing the future status of the British concessions at Hankow and Kiating unless the British desist from concentrating their forces at Shanghai, while not alarming the British authorities, will delay the hoped-for settlement of the complex Chinese problem.

Wilson, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Defense witnesses took the stand today in the Ernest Boswell murder trial and court officials predicted a verdict by nightfall.

Boswell went on trial yesterday for the second time charged with the murder of Clayton E. Beaman, slot machine salesman, Feb. 7, 1925. He was convicted of second degree murder last year, but was granted a new trial by the Supreme court on the grounds that certain letters, inadmissible as testimony, had played a strong part in the first conviction.

ADD TWO MILLIONS TO WAR DEPARTMENT APPROPRIATIONS BILL

Washington, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Besides approving the House provision for an increase in the size of the standing army to 118,750 men, the Senate Appropriations Committee has added \$2,295,135 to the annual War Department appropriation bill exceeding the budget estimate by \$224,856.

Gossip of Staff Correspondents at World Centers of Population.

Detroit, Feb. 3.—(INS)—Business life in Detroit is more intense than in any other city in America. Rev. Lynn Harold Hoag, pastor of Central Methodist Church told Detroit New Century Club members. The bread and butter problem here makes such great demands on the nervous energy of the breadwinner of the family that nervous breakdowns among men are common, he said. This frequency of nervous breakdowns among men of my parish is one of the most serious things with which I have to deal. Men work under great pressure to give the women a chance to be civilized. A tremendous moral responsibility rests on the women to keep our civilization going and to maintain high standards. Only by reading great books can civilization be preserved.

Many uncivilized persons are walking about, well dressed and well groomed. It doesn't take any books to be well dressed. I am not pleading for a society of frowny line stockings. There is not an uncivilized woman in the world per se. Books are human experience distilled. Is there a woman who is not interested in human experience?

The companionship of books at the fireside is a moral responsibility for getting civilized. The civilized people are those taking a long view down the ages, a view that only books can give.

Liquor toting students of the University of Detroit will no longer be able to state the co-eds of that institution, the fair ladies have decided following an exhortation by Father Louis Weltzman.

S. J. head of the sociological department. Father Weltzman spoke his opinions in chapel in answer to undergraduate requests that the prohibition question be discussed bluntly and forcibly he denounced the moral impoverishment of youth in general. He urged those who must drink to be at least gentleman enough not to carry a flask while escorting young ladies. His remarks made such an impression on the co-eds that a general meeting was called at which the girls decided to bar all flask-carrying escorts.

Some of the leaders of the movement were Anna Wagoner, sophomore; Margaret Winthrop, freshman; Louise De Mattia and Florence Van Eckhoorn.

We of the faculty of your university, said Father Weltzman, are not aloof academicians. It would be futile for us to be ostriches and hide our heads in the sand and then imagine that there is no liquor problem for youth today. We are not saying that there is no liquor problem in this or any other country, but we are saying that the problem of today is drinking and you gentlemen are representative. I hope of the best of your class.

Be the authors of your school and remember that obedience to a law even to such an unpopular law as that which gives us prohibition, is more necessary to human civilization than steam or petrol.

Leave liquor alone until you are at least 25 years old in order that you may be saved from becoming slaves to a habit which pulls thousands into the gutter every day.

SCHOOL NEWS

CURTIS-REED BILL BEING EXTENSIVELY DISCUSSED

In the past few years queries of interest to the state only have been discussed in triangular debates. This year discussion will center around the Curtis-Reed bill, or, resolved: That Congress should authorize the establishment of a federal department of education

with a secretary in the Cabinet. Strong arguments are available for both the affirmative and the negative. This bill, if passed, will place a Secretary of Education in the President's Cabinet.

One of the most important duties of this secretary and his department will be research work, or studying conditions all over the country, where more schools are needed, what kinds are needed for the various sections of the country, and finally a problem that has worried America for many years, that of immigrant ignorance.

It is said that the present Bureau of Education, that is under the Department of Interior, is inadequate. Although much valuable material is distributed thru this office it has no ways of providing for any individual school except the two that controlled directly by the government, West Point and Annapolis.

Much illiteracy was exhibited during the World War; a great percentage of the soldiers were poorly educated and as equally a large number were not educated at all.

There are three things, it is declared by the upholders of this bill, that would be helped. Teachers would become better trained, better schools would be established and immigrant ignorance would be done away with.

It is declared that if the bill is passed the entire United States will be better off educationally, but in contrast to this statement the following disputes occur:

The present Bureau of Education could be expanded sufficiently to take care of all that could possibly be done by a cabinet member. Neither is there a crisis in education, illiteracy has decreased from seven to seven-tenths percent in nineteen hundred and ten to six percent in nineteen hundred and twenty.

There are forty-eight superintendents of education, one in each state. Under these are county superintendents, school boards and city superintendents. Organization in each state is so perfect that if in any way one of these officers were to get from office the system of schools would continue to work. Opponents of the bill declare that a department of education could do no more than is now being done.

The cost of installing this move would be one million five hundred thousand dollars. This is the initial cost only, that of salaries of members of this department.

The idea of "State's Rights" would be revived. The party in power will naturally try to run things according to their belief. The other party would raise objection and there would be party hatred created, and such hatred is dangerous for the nation.

Education is costly. So far nothing has been proved to uphold the fact that the Curtis-Reed bill would help, just a few instances where it may be able to help. Are we then to EXPERIMENT ON EDUCATION?

If the state system of organization in educational matters is not sufficient, then our schools are a complete failure.

Debating societies of practically all high schools in North Carolina are preparing debates on this subject. Greenville high school is working hard that they may have an opportunity to compete for higher honors than were accomplished last year.

Passage or failure of a bill is largely decided pending the outcome of these triangular debates. As this is the most important issue that has been discussed in recent years, great interest will be manifested. The date has not been decided upon, but it is thought that it will be set for the first

CUTS OFF NOSE OF FIANCEE TO STOP HER FLIRTING

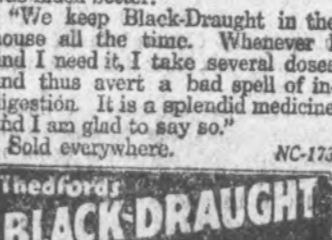

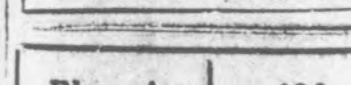

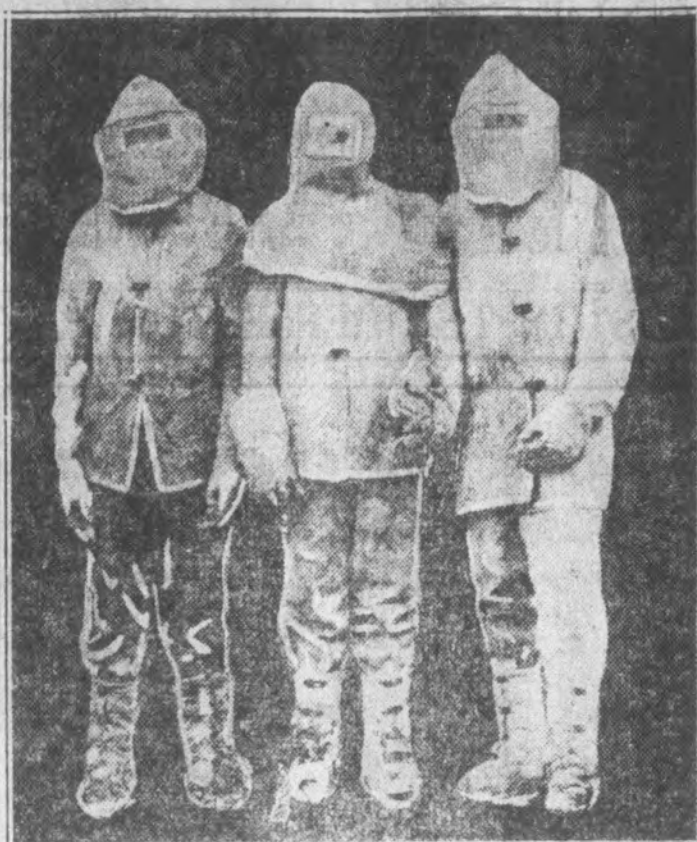

FOR THE FUTURE

Just what will be the outcome of the visit here yesterday of the legislative committee to study needs at the college we cannot venture to forecast, but we do know that if all the legislators were familiar with existing conditions they would bend every effort to make possible the training of more teachers for the school rooms of North Carolina.
 The children of North Carolina are pleading for an education and the young women of the state are seeking training in order that in turn they may impart their knowledge to the children, but the records of the institution here show that hundreds of would-be teachers fail to get the proper training because of the limited facilities of the college.

As pointed out by Dr. Wright in a recent address at Raleigh, the children of today are the citizens of the future who must pay off the road and other improvement bonds that are being issued by our state, and it is up to the state to give to these future citizens proper training in order that they may be better fitted to meet the obligations of citizenship.

The children must be educated, there must be teachers for this work and there must be facilities for training these teachers, or the future of North Carolina is a gloomy one.

A WAR MEMORIAL

While it is regrettable that any move toward the erection of a war memorial here must be started by a veteran's organization or its auxiliary, we congratulate the Woman's Auxiliary of the American Legion for their contemplated movement toward raising funds for such a memorial. During the great conflict there was not a section of the country that did not contribute its sons to the great cause of Democracy and it is fitting now that these various communities erect memorials that in days to come will tell in unspoken words to the children that the brave sons of the community offered their all for the principles of "right" rather than "might."

Throughout this and other states, communities have already erected memorials to its valiant sons, but so far Pitt county despite its rapid progress along other lines, has lagged behind her neighbors. The people of this county are no less appreciative than those of other counties and states, and we feel confident that once a drive is started for funds for a war memorial here, the response will be as liberal as was that to the call for men and money when our nation entered into the conflict that threatened the freedom of practically the entire world.

He made a good record in the box for Providence and is regarded as a good prospect. Herman Holshouser, an other pitcher, was picked up by scout Arthur Delvin from Charlotte, N. C. He is a big right hander.

None of the players who composed the Braves' infield last season is missing from the roster but the club has acquired several replacements. Outstanding among the new infield material is Herbert Thomas, recalled from Providence, where he ranked as the best infielder in the Eastern league last season.





Charge Slavery Being Practiced In Mississippi New Orleans, Feb. 3.—(AP)—Slavery was the subject of an extended investigation today by agents of the Department of Justice. The indictments yesterday of Webb Bellue and John D. Alford of Amite county, Miss., on charges of abducting, sale and enslavement of five negroes is to be followed by further investigation into charges of peonage in St. Helena and Tangipahoa parishes in Louisiana, Department of Justice officials said. Alford and Bellue were indicted on testimony that they had gone to the home of Crawford Allen, 50 year old negro, near the Louisiana border, in Amite county Mississippi, last August, seeking his grown daughter. When they failed to find the woman, according to the indictment, they forced Allen to get out of a sick bed and accompany them to a farm at Fulker, La. They also forced his wife and three children, all under 12 years of age, to accompany them. The negroes were taken at night and hurried from their home half-clad. Department agents charge, and was forced to work several weeks without pay and with little food. An armed guard watched the negroes.

Investigation of the case, officials said, has revealed the existence of peonage conditions under which other negroes are held in a state of virtual enslavement.

Tar Heels Win First Places in Atlanta Contest Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 3.—(AP)—The North Carolina State College team in the Southern fruit and vegetable contest at Atlanta won group first place and the three highest individual prizes, college officials here were advised today. The contest was held in connection with the South-wide gathering of fruit and vegetable growers which ended today. The victorious State College team was composed of T. D. O'Quinn, Macon; R. S. Gaston, Asheville, and R. W. Zimmerman, Lexington. Prof. C. D. Matthews, who coached the team, accompanied it to Atlanta.

REJECT PROPOSAL TO CONNECT CHANNEL Washington, Feb. 3.—(AP)—A proposal to connect a channel through the bar at the mouth of the York River, North Carolina was rejected today by Major General Edgar Jadwin, chief of army engineers, in a report to Congress. Sustaining the army rivers and harbors engineering board, he said that the cost and providing and maintaining a suitable channel would be out of proportion to the possible benefits. The tributary area is limited in size and can be adequately served by the present means of transportation, he added.

BOBS AND SILK SOX FOR ESKIMO GIRLS San Francisco, Feb. 3.—(INS)—Eskimo belles now wear bobbed hair and silk stockings right inside the Arctic Circle. Max Ernst Miller, who has spent the past 14 years in Alaska as an official in the Bureau of Education, reported upon his recent arrival here from the north. "In spite of the cold," Miller said, "the Eskimo girls have gone in for silk stockings, and, in consequence, there has been a noticeable increase in the number of tubercular cases."
