Bone Dry U. S. Army Gets 5c Increase in Food Allowance

Washington, Feb. 7.—(INS)—The bone-dry prohibition hit the United States army as early as 1857, although laws providing for the rationing of whiskey and other spirits have never been directly revised. It is revealed by military War Department records. The study followed a Congressional request for information as to how the army intends using a proposed five-cent increase in the daily ration allowance of each soldier.

Enlisted men in the Continental Army of 1775 probably never waxed enthusiastic over their rather simple and uninteresting fare, consisting mostly of salt beef or dried fish with a bit of cornmeal and a handful of beans thrown in. But the last item brought few complaints. This provided for the soldier to each man every day of a quart of whiskey, beer or other liquor.

In 1784 the spirit of reform had begun to take effect in military circles and the liquor ration was reduced to one gill per day and five cents later, this was further cut down to a half gill. Apparently in order to compensate the soldiers for their loss of spirits, flour, sugar and salt were added to the ration in 1785 and in 1792, soft bread was substituted for flour.

The half gill of liquor must have resulted in a storm of protest from the army personnel because in 1798 this ration was doubled. But this proved only temporary soap thrown to the wet element inasmuch as the following year brought forth an act of Congress by which the whiskey ration was again reduced by half. The new law provided, however, that in case of fatigue, service or other extraordinary occasions commanding officers were authorized to dole out another half gill. The records failed to throw any light on what constituted extraordinary occasions.

When the army discontinued the liquor allowances and for the first time introduced coffee as a

solidly beverage. Alcohol was issued from time to time even after that time as a reward for "extra duties." Some of these extra duties had to do with participating in the construction of fortifications or the execution of surveys.

Within a month after the end of the Civil War the army went bone dry. The issuing of spirituous liquors ever as a reward for unusual work was permanently discontinued, although as a matter of fact the laws providing these extra rations were never revoked excepting insofar as they were nullified by the 18th amendment.

The War Department promises to use the five-cent ration increase to make the army chow more substantial. It not more appetizing by adding to each man's daily allowance two ounces of fresh beef, a half ounce of bacon, two ounces of potatoes, a small portion of onions and a similar amount of coffee and a half ounce of butter.



KING DECLARES ENGLAND WANTS PEACE IN CHINA

King George Tells Parliament British Desire Friendship and Good Will

London, Feb. 8.—(AP)—The third session of the present British Parliament, elected in 1924, was opened in state by King George, the time honored ceremony today. Huge crowds lined the streets to see the royal procession. Queen Mary accompanied the King to Parliament for the ceremony.

The King's speech opening the session—actually a ministerial statement—was unusually brief and was mainly devoted to the Chinese problem.

He explained that it had been deemed necessary to send to China an adequate force to protect British subjects because of the happenings of Hankow and other places, but emphasized that it was the desire of the British people to "remove all grievances, to renew our treaties on an equitable basis and to place our future relations with the Chinese people on a footing of friendship and good will."

"The League of Nations has been strengthened and a further step taken toward the restoration of normal international relations in Europe by the entry of Germany into the League and her appointment to a permanent seat on the council of the League. "Continuation of the civil war in China and the anti-foreign and particularly anti-British agitation by which it is accompanied, have

caused me grave anxiety. In consequence of what happened at Hankow and in other places, my government felt it necessary to dispatch to the far east a sufficient force to protect the lives of my British and Indian subjects against mob violence and armed attacks.

"But I earnestly desire a peaceful settlement of the difficulties which have arisen and my government has caused proposals to be made to the Chinese authorities which should convince public opinion in China and throughout the world that it is the desire of the British people to remove all real grievances, to renew our treaties on an equitable basis and to place our future relations with the Chinese people on a footing of friendship and good will. My government will maintain our traditional policy of non-interference in the internal affairs of China.

"I rejoice that a fair and friendly settlement has been reached regarding funding of the war debt due this country by Portugal."

The King expressed pleasure over the encouraging signs of improvement of trade and industry. A bill, he said, would be presented to encourage the production and exhibition of British pictures.

Ralph Rankin, of the University of North Carolina. Mr. Rankin will hold a similar meet at Salisbury tonight with representatives of schools in the western half of the state, when a schedule for eliminations will be drawn.

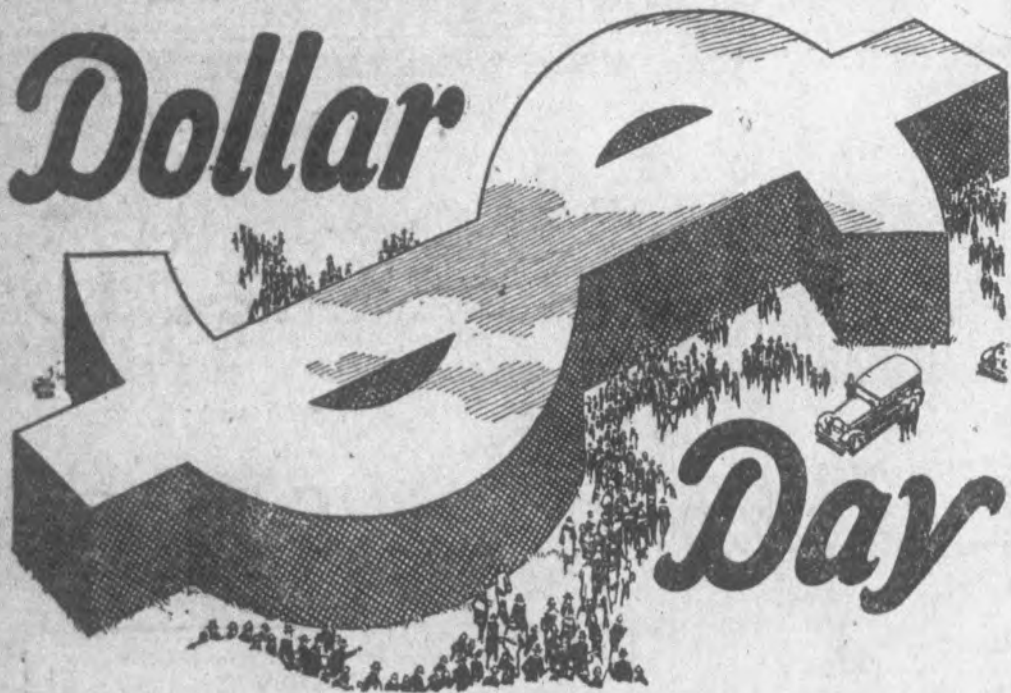
