AMERICAN DESTROYERS FIRE ON CHINESE

NEW FLOODS THREATEN TO INCREASE TOLL OF DEATH IN SOUTHWEST

Casualty List Shows 60 Dead and Hundred Injured or Homeless in Texas as Result of Freak Storms

Kansas City, April 15.—(AP)—New floods today rose in the wake of tornadoes, cloudbursts and freak storms threatening to increase the heavy death toll and damage caused by a two week's siege of unusual weather in Southwest States.

Texas headed the casualty list with upwards of 60 dead and hundreds injured or homeless. More than a score were known to have perished in Oklahoma, while several lost their lives in Kansas and Missouri.

Flood damage centered in Southwestern Kansas, Northern Oklahoma, Northeastern Arkansas and Southwestern Missouri. Hundreds of acres of fertile farm lands were inundated, many city dwellers as well as ranchers were forced from their homes and livestock losses were heavy. Highways traffic was demoralized and trains operated on slow schedules.

Heaviest loss of life resulted from Tuesday's tornado that virtually wiped out Rocksprings. Although the San Antonio Standard last night placed the dead at Rocksprings at 47. Lack of facilities for handling the bodies caused confusion in previous checks. Several of the 70 old injured, taken to San Antonio hospitals, had little chance of recovery, doctors said.

With the National Red Cross supervising relief for the injured and homeless at Rocksprings, tornadoes and high winds struck a score of widely separated points in Texas. Several persons were killed and many were injured.

Two storms struck Lufkin, Texas, within 48 hours. The second twister yesterday killed a woman and injured a dozen persons as it cut a swath 100 yards in width, wrecking houses and uprooting trees. Snow swept into the Panhandle in Northern Texas while wind drove rain inland from Gulf ports.

More rain in Oklahoma yesterday after ten days of heavy precipitation sent streams to record levels, weakened dikes and flooded mines. Nineteen miners were rescued from the old Wise mine near Henryetta after they were trapped when water entered an old shaft. Fire engines and mine pumps kept the water down until the men were removed.

The Neosho River was at the highest stage since 1904 at Miami, Okla. States were flooded and many were forced from their homes.

Memphis, Tenn., April 15.—(AP)—Mammoth barriers were crumbling slowly today before the crush of sweep of the Mississippi River and its tributaries, hasty defenses were being provided at menaced point along the line of the flood advance and families in the lower Mississippi Valley were leaving homes.

Breaks in the White and St. Francis River levees threatened Truman, Big Lake and other Arkansas towns, while Tulot and thousands of acres surrounding it were flooded when fifty feet of a protecting dike crumbled.

Between 500 and 1,000 residents of Fort Smith and Van Buren, Ark., were forced from their homes by the Arkansas River and Fort Smith's water supply was menaced by the river's invasion of the power plant there.

Six thousand acres of land at Grand Tower, Ill., was flooded while at Poplar Bluff, Mo., a wide area of land was inundated.

THOUSANDS VIEW LONG PARADE OF COLORED SCHOOLS

Several thousand colored people from all sections of the county attended concluding exercises of the colored county school commencement here today.

Commencement Day Program Brought to End With Field Day Event Here Today

The day's program was brought to a conclusion at the fair grounds this afternoon where the annual field day exercises were held. Virtually all schools of the county took part in the track day events, and the fair ground was literally packed with visiting colored people most of the afternoon.

Exercises actually got under way shortly before the noon hour with a mammoth parade of children representing the various school districts of the county. The majority of the parades carried the American flag. Each school district was headed by banners giving the name of the school and district number.

HUGE SNOWDRIFTS MAROON CITIZENS NEBRASKA TOWNS

Colorado and Wyoming Also Paralyzed by Worst Blizzard in Years

Omaha, Neb., April 15.—(AP)—Marooned by huge drifts of snow, towering as high as 15 feet residents of a score of western and northwestern Nebraska towns today were in the grip of the worst snowstorm in years. Hundreds of miles east, their fellow Nebraskans, also victims of the eccentricities of April, were defending themselves against a flood that threatened to become serious.

Denver, Colo., April 15.—(AP)—Deep snowdrifts left by the worst spring blizzard in years today paralyzed traffic in Wyoming and Colorado and endangered thousands of head of livestock.

Scores of persons were marooned in automobiles and buses. More than 50 motor cars were stalled last night between Palmer Lake and Greenland, Colo. The central and northern sections of Wyoming were blanketed by deep snow.

Will Not Curtail the Tobacco Crop

Winston-Salem, N. C., April 15.—The Eastern Carolina tobacco crop will not be curtailed this year, it appears, as farmers in this part of the belt started preparations for transplanting. Millions of plants are to be moved from seed beds to the fields during the next few weeks.

Woman Files Suit Against Surgeon

Charlotte, April 15.—(AP)—Charging that he had "unskillfully" performed an operation on her that caused her to suffer from blood poisoning and peritonitis, Miss Margaret Jane Carpenter, daughter of J. Lee Carpenter, a farmer living near Newton, today filed suit in superior court here for \$25,000 against Dr. W. E. Wishart, prominent Charlotte physician. The operation allegedly was performed in a hotel room here.

Big Navy Men In Congress To Fight For Greater Fleet

TODAY News from the Ganges. Sacco-Vanzetti. Moron Kultur. Harsh Words Justice in Two Hours. (By Arthur Brisbane)

Many "Reds" killed in Shanghai and other places in China. One of the Chinese leaders is expected to send Uncle Sam a rather sharp, unpleasant note, concerning Uncle Sam's demands. That's part of the news from Asia.

Other news tells of 26 pilgrims, Hindus, killed in the spring rush to be first to bathe in the holy Ganges river.

The Hindus have a religious bathing ceremony, and the more ignominious believe it is particularly meritorious to be first into the river.

In addition to being the great Hindu bathtub, the "holy" Ganges river, is also a burial place, corpses are set afloat in it, and it doesn't matter much what disease they died of. Plagues have spread all around the earth, starting on the edge of that "holy" river.

We know that not the first to bathe in the Ganges river, but the person that never bathes, there is the one to congratulate.

Remarks attributed to Senator Rivers, Johnson, of Warsaw, on the floor of the Senate, and private remarks made by Dr. John B. Wright, state board of health member, occasioned the Attorney General to invite the two men to submit formal charges of graft. They have not done so.

"In addition to this I have had interviews with and communications from other parties who evinced an interest in the subject," Mr. Brummitt declared.

These, he explained in his letter to the Governor, were from Senator A. E. Woltz of Gaston county, who complained of the strictness with which the board of health enforced the sanitary law and R. W. H. Stone, president of the Farmers' Union, who stated "since the work they did has not been thought necessary in any other state and has not proven of any value whatever in this state, we contend that what amounts to graft has been perpetrated upon the people by the sanitary bureau of the State Board of Health."

Mr. Brummitt told the Governor that this did not amount to a charge of graft but was merely a grievance which could be remedied only by the General Assembly.

The Attorney General concluded: "No charges of graft have been filed with me. No information evidence involving the State Board of Health or any of its officers, members or employes in graft has been presented. Therefore, upon this preliminary inquiry I am without material upon which to proceed with an investigation. If such charges, evidence or information are presented later, I will make a further report."

Yankees Failed To Annex Third Victory

Heavy Hitting Could Not Win For The Yankees But Clash Ends In Tie Score

(By The Associated Press.)
The thumping New York Yankees realized today that hits alone do not win ball games. They had their first setback in the current American League season yesterday.

Nine runs on 14 hits couldn't win for the Yankees against Philadelphia. The Athletics, after two severe detents, fought out a wild 9-9 draw with Huggins' men in a 19 inning scrap. Four pitchers bailed for each camp. Sammy Hale clicked off four nice hits for the A's and almost in self-defense caught a whizzing liner from Lou Gehrig's bat in the eighth that would have broken up the game and probably Sammy's head if he had missed it.

The Washington Senators, with Tris Speaker's bat muted, climbed all over the Boston Red Sox again 3 to 2 and stayed right up at the head of the American procession with the Yankees. Each team has won two victories and lost none. Hollis Thurston in his first Washington performance turned in a nice hurling exhibition, holding Boston to four singles. Cleveland had but one big inning against Chicago, but it was enough to win 3-2. Detroit and St. Louis were tied out.

Two uprisings featured the day in the National League with Philadelphia overcoming the Giants 9 to 6, and the Boston Braves trouncing Brooklyn 7 to 3. Pittsburgh Pirates kept the lead with a record of two wins and no losses by settling the Cincinnati ship again, 6 to 2, but the little fuyored Braves now are found in second place, a slaying spot for a team picked by the experts to finish among the also-rans.

The Boston victory was due in large measure to the cool hurling of Foster Edwards, secret-topped Dartmouth graduate, who only two seasons ago was pitching in the time of "Walshie Wab."

The Dodgers found him for only six hits. Jack Scott, erstwhile member of the McGraw clan, a no-nonsense to his former mates in the Philly victory, while four Giant hurlers looked alike to McInnis' followers. Chilly weather prevented the St. Louis-Chicago contest.

Raleigh, April 15.—(AP)—All the bond acts of the 1927 Legislature are valid in his opinion, Assistant Attorney General Frank Nash said today.

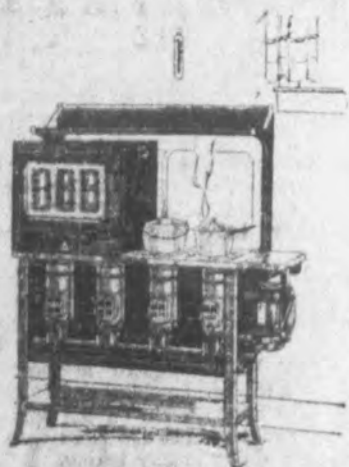

CHANGES IN RULES FOR BASKET BALL WILL AID GAME

Madison, Wis., April 15.—(AP)—The new basket ball rule limiting the dribble to one bounce will careen major ailments of the game, in the opinion of Dr. Walter E. Meunvell, a member of the rules committee which promulgated the new order, and coach of the University of Wisconsin team.

Dr. Meunvell, originator of the short bounce pass, exponent of the dribble and regarded as one of the outstanding basket ball coaches in America, said he was firmly convinced that the elimination of the dribble would prove a boon to the game, which now is reaching international importance.

He said the new rule would do these things for the game:

- Place basket ball on a team basis in contrast to "one man performance." Save the game to the small clever man now relegated to the showers.
- Virtually eliminate "stalling" by the team in the lead.
- Tend to eliminate the accidents resulting from efforts to stop a dribble.
- Eliminate 70 per cent of the whistle blowing which now is caused by double dribbling.
- Force coaches to perfect real plays instead of being merely bench warmers.
- Take a great burden off officials who have had to decide when a dribble was "double" and illegal.
- Moderate the speed of the game and give the lighter clever men a chance to break through the defense of big men.

"The action of the rules committee was not a snap judgment," Dr. Meunvell said, "but resulted from long consideration of some measure to bring about cessation of criticisms. In basket ball today it is quite possible for one great dribbler to win a game and carry his team through many games. If we do eliminate this type of play, we cut down spectacular, overwhelming 'lilient men but we are tickled to death to do this and substitute team play."

"We have gone on record as favoring the development of basket ball along team lines.

"The one bounce rule will also save the game for the type of man now being lost—the small man. The Western Conference is now a six-foot group and the little man is noticeably for his absence. The 190-pound man with the dribble couldn't be stopped."

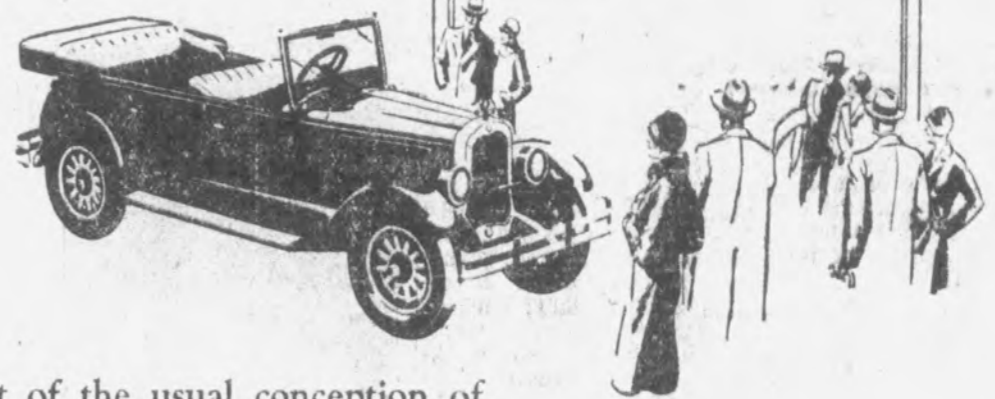

AGAIN LEADS
 The Greenville Tobacco Market, living up to its reputation of the "Best Tobacco Market in the State," has again led the new bright leaf belt for average price paid for the weed. Many years the price on the Greenville market has exceeded that of the markets that handle anywhere in the neighborhood of as many pounds per season as is handled here and this has no doubt been one of the great factors in the market's continued growth. Last season the local market not only led the entire belt in the average price, but sold just a fraction less than fifty million pounds of tobacco which was the largest season in the more than thirty years history of the market. The tobacco business is Greenville's greatest industry, and already plans are being laid to make next season surpass the high record of the season just closed. Let's all get behind this movement for an ever bigger and better tobacco market here, and make the coming season eclipse all former ones.

TWO WITNESSES STILL MISSING
 The Associated Press reports that counsel for the Government will appear in court to-day in Washington to ask for a postponement of the Fall-Sinclair trial until next autumn. This case is already 33 months old, the original indictments having been returned on June 30, 1924. Counsel for the Government is now to ask postponement for another half-year because the Government cannot lay its hands upon two missing witnesses. These witnesses are James E. O'Neil and H. M. Blackmer. Both are American citizens. Both are prominent oil men. Mr. O'Neil was formerly President of the Prairie Oil and Gas Company. Mr. Blackmer was Chairman of the Board of the Midwest Refining Company. Both left the United States for Europe suddenly in January, 1924, soon after the disclosure of the Continental Trading Company deal, out of which the Government alleges Fall received \$230,000. These two men were wanted by the Government as witnesses at the time of the Cheyenne suit for recovery of Teapot Dome in 1925. They refused to return from Europe. In 1926 Congress adopted the Walsh act, giving the courts authority to summon Americans from foreign lands through the agency of American Consuls. To this authority Congress attached a penalty of confiscation of property up to a maximum value of \$100,000 for those who failed to answer to subpoenas. American Consuls in Europe set out at once to

serve subpoenas on Blackmer and O'Neil. The two men fled. No consular officer in Europe has been able to discover where they are hiding. Now counsel for the Government in Washington throws up its hands and with the date set for the Fall-Sinclair trial only eleven days away decides to ask for a postponement.

It is fair to hold only Blackmer and O'Neil responsible for what Blackmer and O'Neil may do. But it is also fair to say that associated with Blackmer and O'Neil in the Midwest Refining Company and the Prairie Oil and Gas Company are many wealthy and influential men who have never publicly rebuked these executives whom they employed for skipping out and hiding abroad, and never publicly appealed to them to come back home and face the music. Gentlemen in an industry which expects much of the Government owe it to the Government to do all within their power to throw light on the deal that lies behind the lease of Teapot Dome. In this duty they have failed.—N. Y. World.

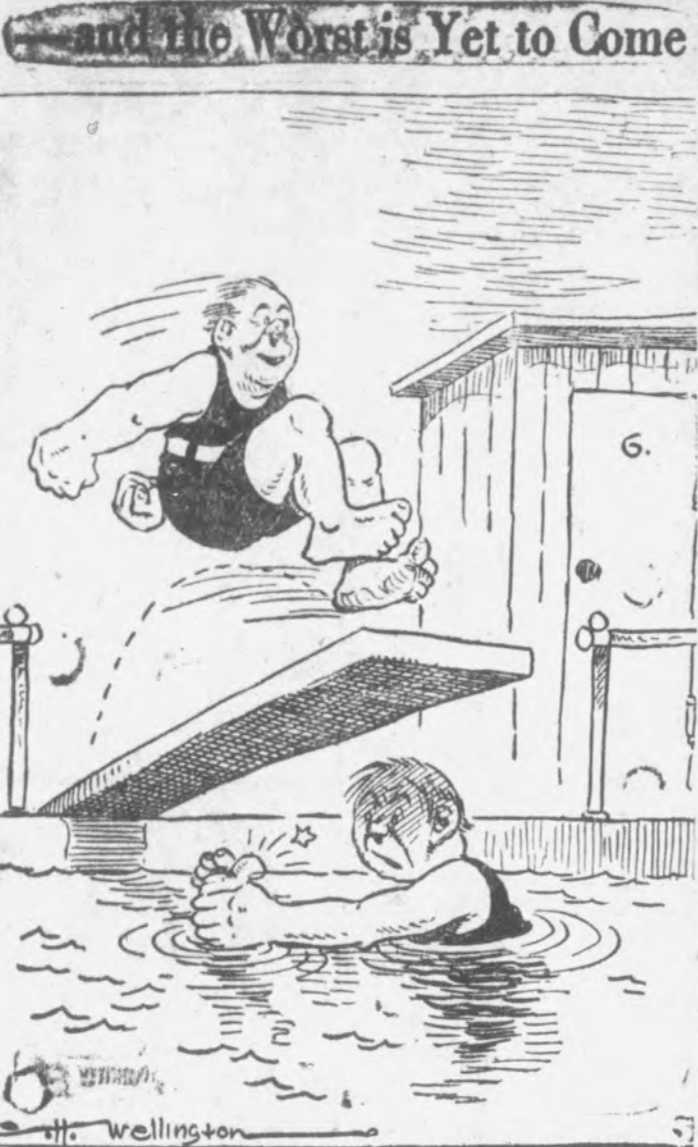
CHILE CHECKING UP ON DAMAGE OF SEVERE QUAKE

Several Killed and Many Injured by Series of Shocks Along Chilean Coast

Santiago, Chile, April 15.—(AP)—Santiago, Valparaiso, San Bernardino and other points along the Chilean coast and Mendoza, across the Andes in Argentina, were taking inventory today of the loss of life and damage caused by the series of earthquake shocks early yesterday. Police reports indicated that seven persons were killed in Santiago, and that in San Bernardino, a mother and her baby were killed in the collapse of their home. Fifty-five persons were injured in Santiago. Two women died of heart attacks during the quake at Los Andes, and another was killed by a falling wall. It appeared at first as though the shocks had brought a long list of casualties in Mendoza, some reports saying it might reach 100, but a message from the provincial Governor to President De Alvear of Argentina said the dead numbered two, fifty persons injured, seven of them seriously. The damage at Mendoza nevertheless was considerable. The quake was felt with varying degrees of intensity over a thousand mile stretch along the Chilean coast, from Copiapo southward to Valdivia. At Valparaiso ten persons escaped from the jail when a section of the wall was shaken down by the quake. They did not get far before being captured.

CONSUMPTION OF COTTON IN MARCH SETS NEW RECORD

Consumption of 694,193 Bales Breaks Former High Record of Last Year

Washington, April 15—(AP)—Cotton consumption during March reached a record for all time, totalling 694,193 bales of lint, the census bureau's report today showed.

Consumption during March totalled 694,193 bales of lint and 68,174 of linters compared with 590,447 of lint and 60,336 of linters in February this year and 635,896 of lint and 65,636 of linters in March last year.

The largest consumption in any one month before was in March last year, when it totalled 635,896 bales.

For the seventh consecutive month cotton exports for March exceeded a million bales, bringing the total quantity of cotton exported in the first eight months of the cotton year, which began August 1, to 8,829,056 bales including linters. For the same period a year ago exports totalled 6,506,362 bales.

Germany has taken more than a quarter of the cotton exported in the eight month period and more than any other country, the total being 2,346,541 bales including linters. The United Kingdom took slightly less than one-fourth of all the exports with a total of 2,183,398 bales. Japan was third with 1,268,719 bales.

Cotton on hand March 31 was held as follows:

In consuming establishments 1,980,103 bales of lint and 226,587 of linters compared with 1,933,077 of lint and 195,106 of linters on February 28 this year and 1,771,897 of lint and 183,508 of linters on March 31 of last year.

In public storage and at compresses 4,491,955 bales of lint and 799,140 of linters compared with 5,443,820 of lint and 71,988 of linters on February 28 this year and 4,164,062 of lint and 87,763 of linters on March 31 of last year.

Imports for March totalled 41,267 bales compared with 39,702 in February this year and 45,726 in March last year.

Exports for March totalled 1,129,537 bales, including 45,495 bales of linters compared with 1,010,507 including 31,818 of linters in February this year and 519,732 including 7,711 of linters in March last year.

Cotton spindles active during March totalled 32,919,288 compared with 32,872,102 in February this year and 33,245,114 in March last year.

Statistics for cotton growing states were:

Cotton consumed, during March 497,169 bales, compared with 425,442 in February and 439,989 in March last year.

Cotton on hand on March 31 was held as follows:

In consuming establishments 1,339,185 bales, compared with 1,310,937 on February 28 this year and 1,073,045 on March 31 last year.

The Blue Devils of Duke University pushed the Easterners hard but lost a 11-inning game, 10-9, yesterday. Johnson's wildness in the final inning proved fatal to Duke. However, the game, if comparative scores mean anything, served to show that the Blue Devils are probably stronger in some respects than State and Carolina, who lost by larger margins to the Pennsylvanians.

Emory and Henry visited Elon for a game. The Virginians are scheduled to move on to Guilford for a contest tomorrow with the Quakers.

The University of Pennsylvania also arrived in Chapel Hill for a battle with the Tar Heels. They go to Durham tomorrow for a contest with Duke.

Rutherford College Hangs in Balance

C., April 15—(AP)—The fate of Rutherford College was hanging in the balance as the board of trustees of that institution and the board of education, Western North Carolina Conference convened in a joint meeting at the first Methodist church here this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock for the expressed purpose of deciding whether the Burke County college should remain where it is or be consolidated with Weaver College near Asheville. Members of the two boards who had gathered here prior to the meeting would not express themselves as to the probable action which would follow.

There has been talk of a consolidation for the past year or so, but when the boys' dormitory of Rutherford was destroyed by fire several months ago the matter was brought to a head. Many of the delegates from the western section of the conference are understood to be fighting for a consolidation, and therefore there has been no effort to build back the wrecked dormitory. The students at Rutherford are rooming at private homes.

CREEDMOOR BANK CASE NOW CLOSED CHAPTER

Oxford, N. C., April 15—(AP)—The Creedmoor Bank case was a closed chapter today, with case against its directors, charging violations of the state banking laws, marked "not pressed."

Case against N. J. Boddie was settled by suspending judgment, the defendant paying the receiver's \$929. Boddie made restitution of about \$14,000.

Although the Senator did not go into details on his constructive bill, it is assumed that the seven cruisers he referred to would be of the 10,000 ton type authorized in 1924, and for which Congress last session provided funds for the letting of bids for the last three of the eight authorized. Should the Senator's plan materialize, this would increase to 15 the number of cruisers of the 10,000 ton class, the largest warships permitted under the Washington arms treaty.

EMBEZZLER SHOT AT KANSAS CITY

Kansas City, April 15.—(AP) Shot by a city detective when he attempted to escape the officer who had arrested him in connection with a \$20,000 embezzlement case in Jacksonville, Fla. J. D. Sumner, 30, died an hour later in a hospital here today. The shooting occurred in the downtown business section. After a chase, the detective, Homer Burns, succeeded in arresting Sumner. Passing an alley, the victim again started to run and the officer fired. Police had been asked by the Jacksonville authorities to arrest Sumner. They are searching for a motor car he is supposed to have driven to Kansas City.

UNRULY NEGRO LEADS OFFICER LENGTHY CHASE

Because He Didn't Understand "Wimmen" Curly McClees Gets in Jail

"I ain't never been married but one time—I don't know much about wimmen."

That was the explanation Curly McClees, colored, gave Sheriff Whitehurst late yesterday afternoon following his arrest on a charge of getting "rough" at some while in the presence of his wife and two persons rooming in the same building where the McClees lived.

McClees was confined in the county jail here late yesterday afternoon following one of the most spectacular chases in the knowledge of local officials. Curly Stokes, township constable, did the chasing and McClees led the sprinting contest for nearly three hours.

It all started when Constable Stokes went to the McClees home to take the unruly Curly into custody. The officer was sitting at a table finishing the filling out of some legal documents. Curly sat in a chair nearby apparently enjoying himself. Suddenly he

made a break through the front door, slamming the door to as he went.

Constable Stokes, momentarily surprised at this unexpected activity, gave chase through that section known as the "Bama." The fleeing negro left the Bama behind in short order and headed directly for a nearby swamp. He made the swamp in safety, climbed into the hollow of a tree and awaited results.

Constable Stokes came back to Greenville, secured additional help, and went back and extracted the negro from the tree.

Standing in the presence of sheriff Whitehurst and other members of the office, wet and shivering as if affected with the ague Curly McClees confessed that he didn't know much about women—he had never been married but one time. He presented a pitiable aspect as he made the statement. He really expected sympathy, but what he really got was a little bitter, cold philosophy concerning the inability of the best of men to understand the opposite sex. McClees will be given a preliminary hearing sometime today. His case has attracted considerable interest because of his acknowledged skill as a sprinter of the first water and his lack of experience with the perversity of fair femininity.

Carroll May Soon Emerge From Coma

Greenville, S. C., April 15.—(AP)—Earl Carroll, theatrical producer, was semi-conscious at intervals this morning, hospital attaches announced at 9:45 o'clock. They said this was taken as a good omen by his physicians who believe he soon may emerge completely from the coma which seized him early last Wednesday while en route to the Atlanta federal penitentiary. Mrs. Carroll's condition was said to be satisfactory. She was taken ill with bronchitis after her arrival from New York.

SALARY COMMISSION MAKES NEW RULING

Raleigh, April 15.—(AP)—The State Salary and Wage Commission, in a memorandum signed by Julian Price, Greensboro, chairman, has prohibited heads of all departments and bureaus of the state, from employing "members of families of state officials and employes," it was learned today. The recent legislature killed a measure similarly providing following its introduction by Senator Frank Grier of Statesville. Known as the "Nepotism Bill," it was considered only briefly.

of Mount Holyoke College, petition Governor Fuller to appoint an impartial committee to investigate the case. On the other side the Civilian Club of Boston protests against "attempts to intimidate the Governor."

Twenty-eight new communications received by Governor Fuller includes one from twenty-three citizens of Cleveland, and another from the Social Problems Club of Columbus University, both asking intervention, a similar appeal comes from Switzerland.

Mr. Mencken, who writes, is annoyed that Boston should suppress books held by its appointed judges to be immoral or otherwise undesirable. He mentions the suppression of a book by Sinclair Lewis as proof that Boston possesses a "Moron Kultur."

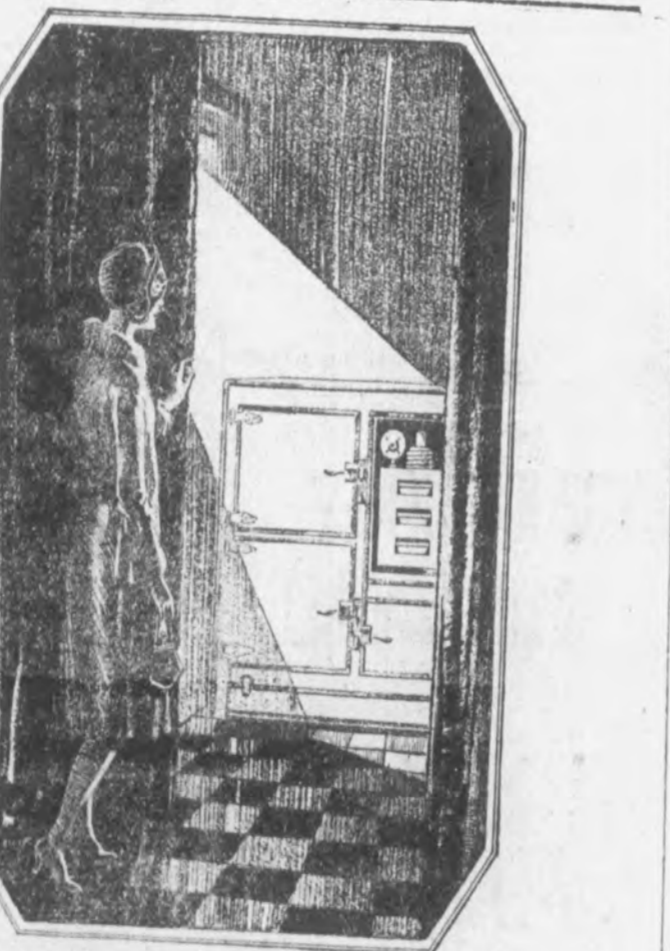
