The Yankees were pitched to the victory by George Pipgras, a newcomer to the classic, who held the Pirates to seven hits and was not in danger after his mates gave him three runs in the third inning.

They added three more in the eighth for good measure. Vic Aldridge, Pittsburgh's starting pitcher was driven from the mound in the eighth.

FORMER KING BOOTLEGGERS SHOOT WIFE

Mrs. Imogen Remus Dies of Injuries Inflicted by Husband at Cincinnati.

Cincinnati, Oct. 6.—(AP)—The martial tangle of George Remus, former convict and once known as the "King of Bootleggers," and his wife, Imogene, was settled out of court today.

Remus pursued his wife through Eden park and fired a fatal shot into her abdomen after she had jumped from a taxicab and fled when she saw him in his automobile.

Remus drove to police headquarters and surrendered while detectives were hunting him. He bitterly denounced his wife and told police he could not let her "get away with what she was trying."

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Although he was never called to testify George Remus figured prominently in the investigation during 1924-25 of conditions at the Atlanta federal penitentiary which resulted in the trial and conviction of Warden Albert E. Sarjain for conspiracy to accept a bribe from a prisoner.

Cincinnati, Oct. 6.—(AP)—A few hours before they were to go to the divorce court to settle their marriage troubles, today, George Remus, once known as the "King of Bootleggers," shot his wife probably fatally when she tried to escape as he pursued her through a Cincinnati park.

Politics Begin To Warm Up In The Capital City

Washington, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Although the quadrennial National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties for the selection of their presidential tickets are nine months away, politicians of both factions apparently are engaged in increasingly serious consideration of the possible candidates and in various sections of the country movements to advocate aspirants have been inaugurated.

The presidential outlook in the Republican party was brought to the forefront by a three-day conference in Washington of the party's National Committee and the leading possibilities were discussed informally by party leaders.

The announced task of the committee which was summoned to Washington by Chairman William M. Butler was the consideration of the 1928 convention city and apparently sentiment among the committee members is divided among four cities, Cleveland, San Francisco, Minneapolis and Detroit.

The Republicans will designate their convention city a month in advance of the Democrats, whose national committee assemblies here January 8, to select their meeting place from a half dozen cities including Detroit, Kansas City, St. Louis, Washington and Chicago.

While the Republicans were considering presidential timber, one of the leading aspirants, former Governor Lowden, was the recipient of an acclamation by a group of more than 1,000 of his backers at his home at Oregon, Ill., yesterday.

Out of the Democratic political cauldron came the formation at Indianapolis of a "Woolen for President" organization to place Evans Woolen, an Indianapolis banker, in the race for that party's nomination and the proposal of a woman, Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, widow of the world war President, for the Democratic Vice-Presidential nomination to run with Governor Smith of New York, was made by Hugh C. Wallace, former Ambassador to France at Tacoma, Washington.

Another Democrat, senator Harrison of Mississippi, in a statement at Brookhaven, Miss., termed a report that he was to support Governor Smith in return for the Vice-Presidential nomination as "redoubtable." He said the party had not yet turned to the south for candidates.

STATE RESTS CASE AGAINST W. T. JORDAN

Admission of previous Marriage Features Bigamy Case at Charlotte.

Charlotte, N. C., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Admission of a previous marriage by attorneys for the Rev. Willis T. Jordan and barring as evidence for the State of records from Akron O. of the same marriage, marked the rapid progress made in the trial of Jordan on a charge of having contracted a bigamous marriage with Mrs. Emma Langridge of Washington, D. C.

Immediately after the admission of the marriage of the minister to Mrs. Vesey V. Ware-Snyder Jordan of Winding Gulf, W. Va., the State rested its case although several witnesses expected here from Virginia and West Virginia had not arrived.

The State has announced that it would rest temporarily pending arrival of witnesses from outside the State who were expected momentarily.

After a brief conference attorneys for the defendant asked that the case be dismissed on the ground of insufficient evidence, but Judge Webb held that admission of marriage was sufficient ground for sending the case to the jury.

The defense then admitted that Jordan had married Mrs. Vesey Ware Snyder, now at Winding Gulf, W. Va., at Akron, O., June 23, 1926. Dr. Davidson and Jordan then were sworn, indicating that the defense would follow its announced plan of pleading that Jordan is a victim of amnesia.

Executed for Revolt



General Arnulfo Gomez Prepares to Make Determined Stand Against Mexican Troops.

Mexico City, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Brought to bay by pursuing troops, General Arnulfo Gomez, the principal remaining leader in the military revolt against President Calles' government, was reported today to be preparing to battle against overwhelming odds, with his life at stake.

General Hector Alameda, former commander of the Mexico City garrison who led a body of his men from the capital Sunday night in support of the revolt, joined forces with Gomez, but they were greatly outnumbered.

The pursuing troops were last reported close to their quarry, at El Trunfo ranch, near the old fortress of Perote, state of Vera Cruz, with a battle imminent.

Mexican officials in the United States yesterday reported that General Gomez had already been captured and executed. As was his fate on Monday of General Francisco Serrano, the other leader of the revolt.

The Government forces were said to be closing in on the beleaguered rebel band in a pinch movement, the capture of a 100-man contingent from Vera Cruz under General Jesus Gonzales Espartero. Against these numbers, Gomez and Alameda have not more than 1,500 or 2,000 men at the most liberal estimate.

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GIVES REVIEW OF GROWTH OF COLLEGE HERE

Pres. Wright Speaks At Celebration of 18th Anniversary of College Opening.

East Carolina Teachers College is celebrating the 18th anniversary of its opening. President Wright gave in chapel today a brief review of the growth of the college.

"Eighteen years ago," he said, 178 students and a few teachers met for the first time in this chapel. We were a homesick bunch. The purpose of the institution at that time was to train teachers for the public schools of the State and we have never deviated from that purpose from that day to this.

"Since the opening of the second year of the college we have never been able to accept all the students who wanted to come here. We have enrolled since the beginning, not counting any names twice, 13,439 students. A large per cent of these are still teaching in the State."

He called attention to the generosity of the State toward the institution in comparison with other colleges of the State and stated that the plant was no worth more than two million dollars.

W. Cobb, secretary of the Tobacco Board of Trade.

The committee faced a diversified program with hearings scheduled on a group of commodities other than iron and steel.

Proposes Chain Of Radioes For Labor Unions

Los Angeles, Oct. 6.—(AP)—A radio megaphone for the "voice of labor," has been suggested in one of ninety-seven resolutions before the American Federation of Labor at its annual convention in session here.

The resolution, referred with the other ninety-six to committees of the convention, proposed the establishment of a great chain of broadcasting stations by the unions. The collection of an annual tax \$1 a member would finance the project.

Investigation by federal officials of charges that radio is controlled and fast becoming monopolized by capital and vested interests to the exclusion of the rights and interest of organized labor and others," also is asked in the resolution.



slow, well known business man and chairman of the Pitt County Department of Agriculture, told members of the Rotary Club and their guests in Fountain Monday night. "I mean by this that our farmers ought to produce more of the stuff which they consume. We raise several million dollars worth of crops every year, but where does this enormous sum of money go to? It isn't reflected in our bank deposits, or in the life of the business world. "The answer is easy—it goes to the business men in other parts of the country who have been wily and brainy enough to provide things we fail to provide for ourselves. "Something must be done to improve this situation if our farmers are to become as great in a financial way as they should. And there is only one way to do it, and that is raise more of the things we have been accustomed to buying from other parts of the country. "As a usual thing June Rose, superintendent of Greenville schools is a "straight" thinker. "But a few nights ago his mental faculties failed to function in a normal way, and he made a statement that was entirely illogical, and, as Fordy Harding later remarked, purely fallacious. It occurred at a club meeting which number of Greenville people attended. Each member of the club had been asked to introduce himself, giving his occupation and address, for the benefit of guests. When Mr. Rose's turn came he arose and proudly proclaimed the fact that he was "J. H. Rose, wholesaler and retailer of children, Greenville, N. C." He meant it as a pun. But Fordy Harding, Bill Rogers and Claude Gaskins thought he made a misstatement of fact, and suggested that he inject proper modifications the next time he is called on to tell something about himself. Prices soared higher on the Greenville tobacco market Monday than any other day, since the opening, Sept. 6. Growers of the weed, as a result, are more sanguine for the outcome of the season than they have been before, and good feeling prevails generally in all sections of the country. That the price situation will remain favorable during the remainder of the year seemed to be the consensus of opinion of leading tobacco acronist today. It is true that more good tobacco is being marketed at this time than during the first of the season, but this does not detract from the fact that prices are stronger on all grades. The increase bears out the prediction of improved prices made by J. N. Gorman last Saturday and supported by others familiar with conditions of the tobacco world. With the opening of the world's series yesterday, interest of the nation began to center around Pittsburgh and New York, contenders for the championship. Like all other series, opinion varies as to the outcome. Numbers favor Pittsburgh and some New York, but it is possible the Yankees will have the big end of the betting. One of the outstanding features of the contest, despite everything else, is the participation of Babe Ruth, the greatest slugger the world so far has been capable of producing. The Babe is of greater interest this year than ever before because he has been successful in defying public opinion by equaling his old slugging record. The pessimistic fan admitted sometime ago that Ruth wouldn't be able to stand the pace set by Gehrig, who next to the Babe, is the greatest wielder of the willow on the diamond today. But he has silenced even the worst of critics and sages and is today one of the greatest idols of baseball. The only justification for it is to insure big returns to investors.

HIGHWAY CASES APPROVED

Supreme Court Approved Compromise Settlement of Routing of Catawba Highway.

Fairfax, Oct. 6.—(AP)—The highway case passed out of the Supreme Court today. The court approved the compromise settlement, as to routing of route 10 through Catawba County in course of its pending decision in its opinions late yesterday. The State Highway Commission and the Newton citizens recently filed a settlement of differences and the higher court leaves the matter there in retaining from upholding Judge Schenck's judgment which sanctioned the compromise resulting in a route 'substantially the same.' Justice Clarkson wrote, as the course originally sought both by Newton and the commission.

The Highway Commission, under the new law permitting it to relocate routings in interest of economy, won in a case from Wayne County. The Gadsboro-Snow Hill road has already been graded, in an affirmation of Judge Harris, who refused to restrain the commission from building a hard surfaced road.

MARKETS

COTTON

New York, Oct. 6.—(AP)—The cotton market opened today at an advance of 2 points to a decline of 2 points and soon showed net losses of 12 to 15 points, under further liquidation, Southern and local selling.

A favorable view of weather conditions and talk of large crop figures were factors on the decline, and while offerings were not particularly heavy, there were few buying orders in the market. December declined to 20.66 and March to 20.95. The market was within a point or two of these figures at the end of the first hour.

Another private crop report made the quotation 55.5 and the indicated yield 13,712,000 bales.

STILL PROBE MAN'S DEATH

Seek Indictment of Of Two in Connection With Slaying of New Jersey Doctor.

Hammonton, N. J., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Indictment of two persons was sought today as the investigation of the slaying of Dr. William Lillendahl was shifted to the Atlantic county grand jury room at Mays Landing.

Mrs. Margaret Lillendahl, widow of the aged Vineland physician, received a subpoena, and was told she would be "away from home a long while." Chief detective Frank J. Harrold would not say that she was one of those against whom the indictments were sought.

"Our purpose in serving a subpoena on the widow is to protect the physician's orphan, Alfred," said Harrold. "It is better to have her in Mays Landing than to have to go to her and take her away in the presence of the boy."

Mrs. Lillendahl was released in \$2,000 bail shortly after the slaying which she said had been committed by negroes while she and Dr. Lillendahl were motoring on a lonely road near here September 15. Willis Beach, 55 year old poultry farmer, who corresponded with Mrs. Lillendahl in letters addressed to "Peggy Anderson" was released in \$5,000 bail as a material witness, but disappeared a short time after he was freed. A warrant charging aiding and abetting a murder was sworn out against him after he vanished.

Mays Landing, N. J., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Willis Beach, Vineland poultry dealer, wanted in connection with the murder of Dr. A. William Lillendahl, has surrendered to police here. Beach surrendered to Captain Carter of the state police and state trooper Robert Woodward. He was accompanied by Edison Hedges, his counsel.

Mays Landing, N. J., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Willis Beach, charged with aiding and abetting in the killing of Dr. A. William Lillendahl, who surrendered early today after being missing for ten days, was taken before the grand jury investigating the slaying. He was the fourth witness called.

Beach's appearance is in accordance with a promise made by his counsel that his client would surrender whenever he could aid the court. Mr. Hedges called up prosecutor Hinkle late last night to inform him that he would have Beach before the grand jury at Mays Landing today so that he could aid in clearing up the mystery.

In China when the British built an electric road up a steep grade they had to promise not to haul any passengers, no freight. Chinese coolies, men and women, wanted to carry the freight on their heads and backs.

Some of our big companies fear "bonal" improvement as the Chinese do. They will get over it, and realize that what helps the country helps all big and little interests in the country.

At present they are the biggest power in the country, and prove it by holding back whatever does not please them.

There was "buying power" in the stock market yesterday. Somebody bought 540,000 shares of the new General Motors stock and sales totaled 3,147,300 shares. The three million shares mark has been passed only nine times in the history of the stock exchange.

The "social surplus" of this country is ten billion dollars, which means that the American people earn each year ten thousand millions more than they need to live on. Wall street will see bigger days and stock brokers bigger prices for their seats.

Stock brokers warn customers to adopt a most conservative policy, not knowing what else to advise. The best advice is "Don't gamble and don't sell short."

Both Giobeman and Brock were detained by the police but later released.

ORDER HIGHER TARIFF RATES

United States Increase Duties on Certain French Imports To This Country.

Washington, Oct. 6.—(AP)—An unexpected order by the Treasury Department increasing duties on certain French imports to the recent increases made by France on similar American products injected the possibility of another controversy into the tariff negotiations between the two countries.

The State Department had no prior knowledge of the Treasury order until its recent announcement. It developed upon inquiry, and officials of the diplomatic branch of the government who are preparing a reply to the latest French note would not comment. The order, however, according to the treasury officials, was only a routine action and did not involve the retaliatory provisions of the tariff act under section 217 under which the United States can impose penalties on imports of countries who discriminate against American products. The action, it was pointed out, was taken under specific provisions of the tariff schedules themselves of the affected products and in view of some administration officials the order was mandatory under the law on the Treasury.

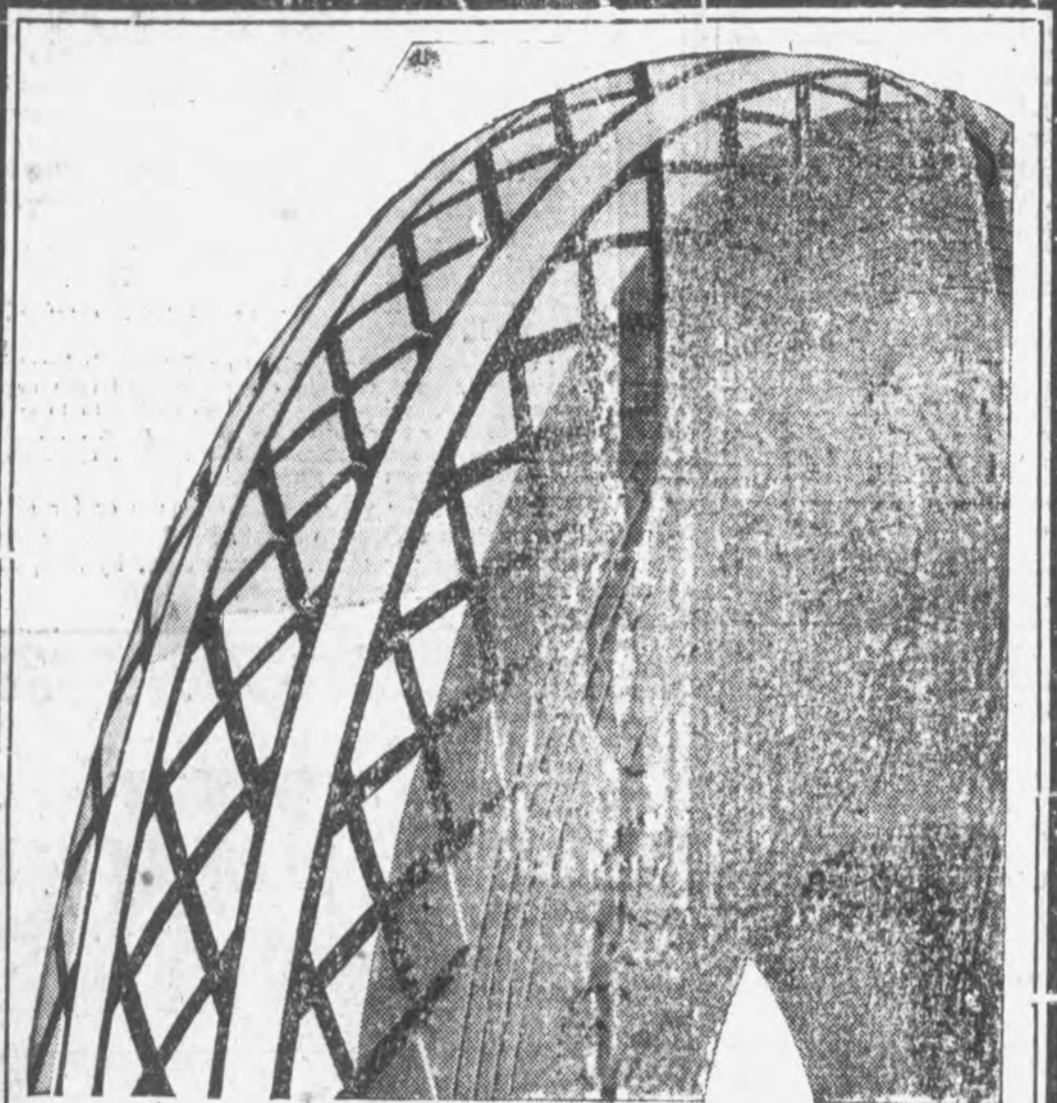

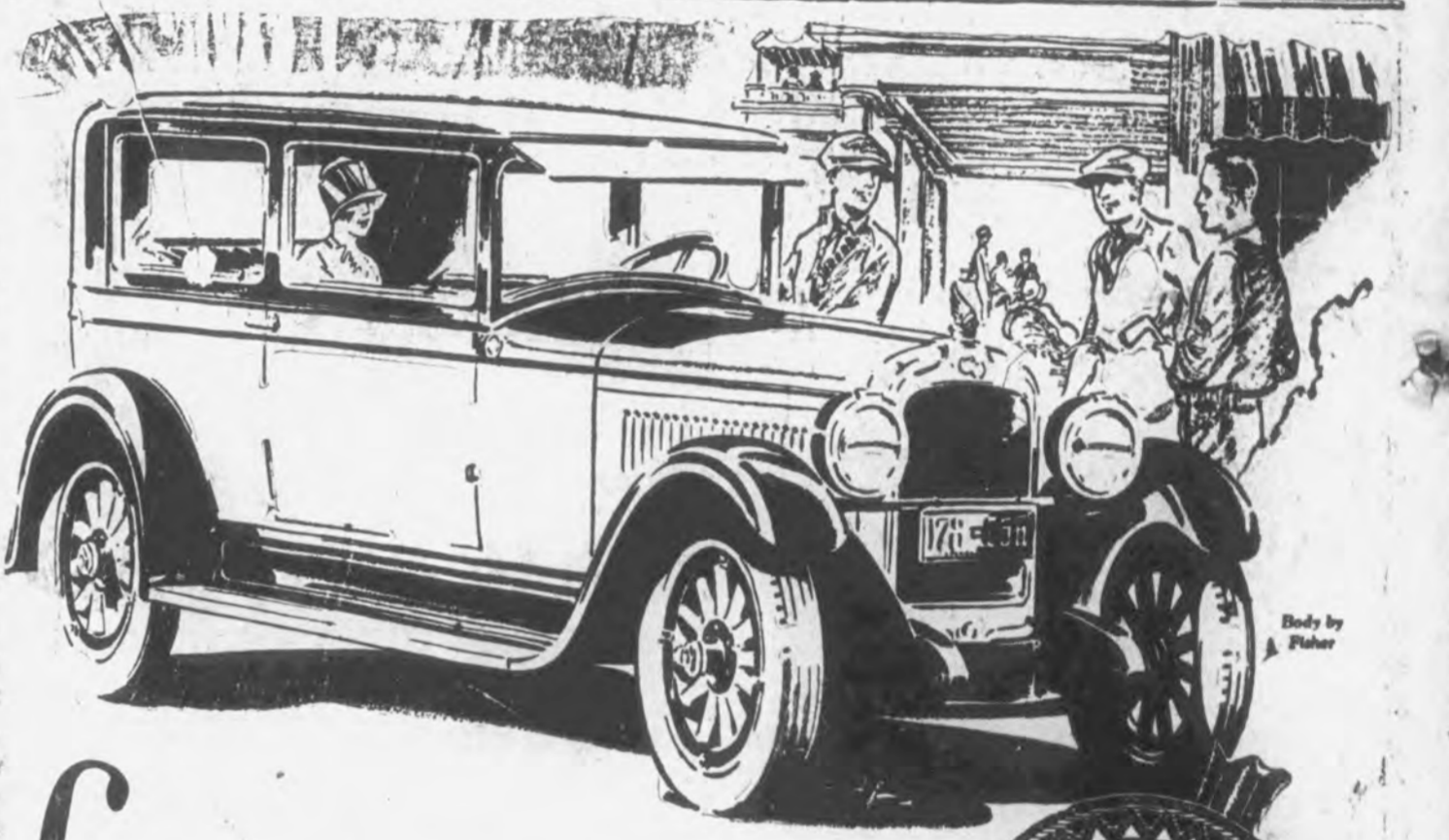
