Japan Accepts League Proposal To Halt Warfare

Chinese Give Way Before Terrific Jap Assault

Troops Fall Back In Face Of Hammering By Fresh Storm Forces

JAPS CLAIM GREAT GAINS

Whole Japanese Line Along Entire Battle-front Between Kiangwan and Miaochunchen Forces Chinese Back on Mile Front; Chinese Retreat Toward South, Covering Themselves With Machine Gun Fire.

By MORRIS J. HARRIS Associated Press Staff Correspondent Shanghai, China, Wednesday, March 2.—(AP)—Hammered by the new strength of Japan's fresh troops, the Chinese line in the Kiangwan sector gave way early this morning and fell back foot by foot, covering the retreat with machine gun fire.

The Japanese line along the entire battle front between Kiangwan and Miaochunchen was strengthened out and headquarters reported that the attack had succeeded along a one-mile front.

The Chinese were retreating southward in the direction of Chapel. One cross roads which has been under heavy fire for several days, the advancing Japanese reported they had found more than 200 Chinese dead.

Their own casualties for the day were not given. Backed up by 12,000 reinforcements who landed here during the last 36 hours, the Japanese early this morning began a tremendous assault along the whole front. They used artillery, airplanes, machine guns, and a squadron of tanks in the tremendous push which Tokyo expected to defeat the Chinese.

A terrific explosion which shook the entire city of Shanghai without being clearly heard, took place when two mines blew up close by 150 Japanese warships in the Whangpoo river. Inhabitants of the international settlement rushed to the streets, screaming that an earthquake had struck.

The Japanese lines struck with a fury unknown heretofore in the conflict, their tanks dashing backward and forward like maddened monsters. They said they had achieved an advance of more than a mile.

Americans Told To Evacuate the Zone of Danger

Shanghai, March 1.—(AP)—Americans living along the railway lines which the Japanese have threatened to bombard to prevent movement of Chinese reinforcements were advised today by Edwin S. Cunningham, the consul general, to evacuate.

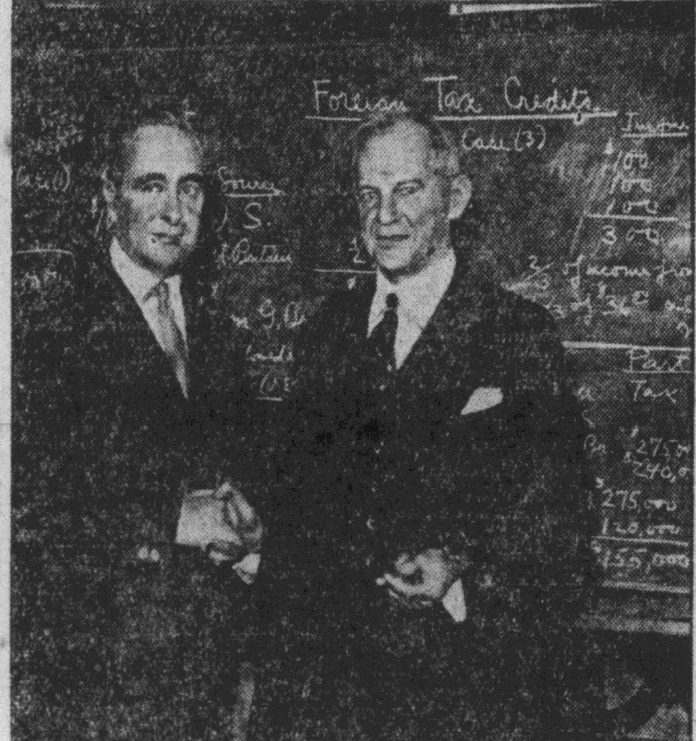
Health and happiness are the main requisites of life, and nobody knows it better than Greenville Rotarians who last night confined their program to consideration of the subject.

ABOUT TOWN

These are perilous times for members of the illicit whiskey traffic in this immediate section. Virtually a dozen stills and a similar number of bootleggers have been nabbed by federal agents operating in and around Greenville the last three weeks.

The majority of the operators were bound over to Federal court and will probably find their way to the pen or receive long terms on the roads.

It is impossible to estimate the extent of the traffic in this part of the state, but it is safe to say the economic depression has not hampered the operations. In fact, it is to be assumed from the success of raiding parties that the traffic has increased in scope, offering as it does a field of opportunity—although a dangerous one—for those who have found making a living unusually difficult.

It is evident the federal government realizes this fact and is attempting to break up the traffic as much as possible and give the operators a new start in life, even though it must come through a lengthy peek through prison bars.

President Hoover has called upon Congress to close loopholes in federal bankruptcy and criminal laws and to also strengthen the prohibition law.

He also advocated that Washington City be made a model city for prohibition enforcement, a suggestion presented in previous recommendations to Congress.

This last suggestion is not a bad one by any means and if faithfully carried out ought to be an inspiration to the remainder of the nation. Startling disclosures concerning whiskey conditions around the capital have been presented to public gaze from time to time, and it is needless to say the stories have been detrimental to the cause of prohibition.

"It such conditions prevail in Washington—the seat of government—lots of people argue, 'how in the world can they expect hines to improve in other parts of the nation?' The suggestion of President Hoover should receive the profound consideration of Congress and its members should take speedy action to see that the stigma attached to the nation's capital in this connection is definitely extirpated.

That crime conditions in this county have undergone a decided improvement is indicated by reports from law enforcement officials revealing few arrests over week-ends.

In recent years Saturday and Sunday seldom ever passed without the city and county jails being packed to capacity with defendants charged with nearly every crime in the category.

As the situation exists at this time both city and county officers pass through the week-ends peacefully, and courts have few cases to occupy their attention the beginning of the week.

This is a condition that will bring joy to the law-abiding people who in past years noted with keen regret the tendency toward increased violations.

Optimism over the outlook for peace in China increased to new heights yesterday with announcement that Japanese and Chinese commands had agreed to withdraw their battle lines until the conference of the League of Nations could consider the situation. Although the announcement came in the midst of booming guns along the battlefield, it was the first actual signs of peace since the Japanese started the new offensive against Shanghai and other places along the line of battle.

Should the League be permitted to proceed with its deliberation there is no doubt that terms of peace acceptable to both warring factions would be provided. The question is, Will Japan accept them? After refusal of so many overtures, it is questionable whether Japan will accede to the proposals, but it will be for her best interest

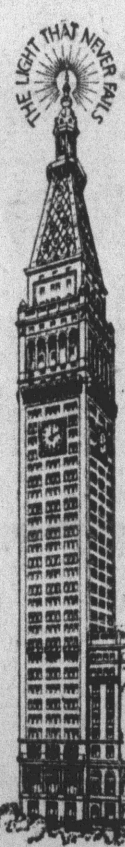

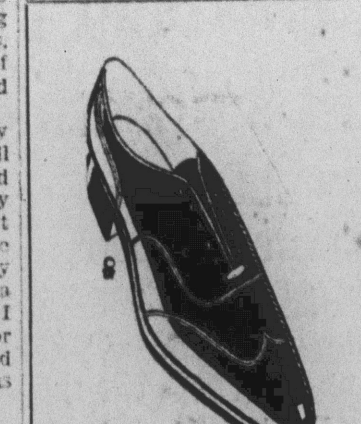

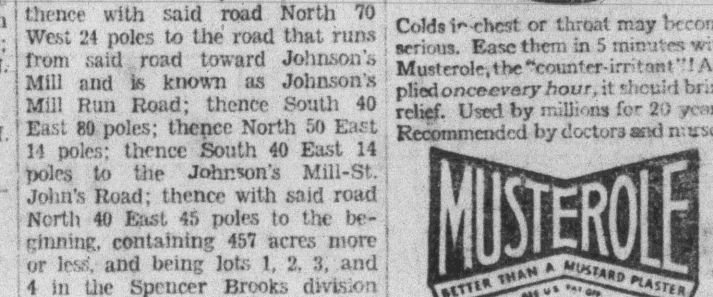

Market Report

Cotton--Stocks--Grain

N. Y. COTTON

New York, March 1.—(AP)—Cotton opened easy today at a decline of 1 to 2 points on overnight selling orders. Trading was comparatively quiet with May selling at 86.

Offerings tapered off after the early selling which seemed to come largely from abroad and subsided and prices steadied on some further price fixing combined with local buying. At the end of the first half hour, May was ruling around 6.98 and October 7.36, or not unchanged to 1 point higher.

One of the private crop reporting bureaus has issued a report on planting intention as of February 25th pointing to a decrease of 14.7 per cent in acreage, or to an area of about 35,386,000 acres for the belt, and a decrease of 15 per cent in the acreage of Texas. Liverpool cables reported continental liquidation and hedging taken by trade calling for the decline in that market, and said there were fair sales of cotton cloths to India.

STOCK MARKET

New York, March 1.—(AP)—Professional market operators looked in vain for a lamb with the advent of March in the stock market today.

Public participation was almost entirely lacking, and floor traders were left largely to their own devices, which were of scarcely any effect upon price levels. A few issues were influenced by special developments, but on the whole, the list showed negligible changes.

Johns Manville dropped 3 points on omission of the dividend and report of earnings of only 8 cents a share for 1931. Bendix fell more than a point, as the quarterly payment was cut to 15 from 20 cents. The alcohol stocks reflected a little speculative activity on the theory that production had been brought under more effective control.

Auburn shot up 6 points in short intervals, then lost much of its gain. Several of the pivotal industries ranged fractionally higher.

The congressional short selling investigation was said in brokerage circles to have intimidated or discouraged professional traders generally, for the moment at least.

While the prospect of restoration of peace to the Far East was described in Wall street as "constructive" it was without notable effect upon the markets generally.

A further cut of 1-8 of one per cent in longer maturities of bankers' acceptances was another sign of gradual improvement in the money market, but money rates generally were stationary.

PROCLAIM NEW GOVERNMENT

Five - Colored Flag Flies Over Manchuria as Independent Republic Begins.

Mukden, Manchuria, March 1.—(AP)—The foundations of the new independent Manchurian republic was proclaimed formally here this morning and the new five-colored national flag was flown everywhere to celebrate the beginning of a new era of "tating"—great unity.

The formal inauguration of the new government under the rule of Henry Pu-Yi, former boy emperor of China, will occur at Changchun which has been designated as the capital of the new state.

This ceremony will take place sometime between March 5 and March 10. A committee of the founders of the new state left here last night for Port Arthur to notify the former emperor of his nomination.

Chang Ching-Hui, representing the northeastern executive council of several thousand words in obscure classical Chinese extolling the virtues and the prospects of the new nation.

The proclamation was dated the first day of the first year of the era of Tating, and today's newspapers bore the same date.

The most important feature of the proclamation was the announcement that the new state acknowledges all the obligations and commitments to which Manchuria was bound under the Chinese government.

The committee was disappointed in one respect, however. The amount sought from industrial sources was \$100,000,000 higher, but so long was the list of exemptions they found necessary, that it was decided reluctantly to seek the additional amount through direct taxes on certain specific products.

These still are to be chosen, or at least the committee selection has not been announced. Gasoline, electricity, industrial alcohol, petroleum imports, have been under consideration.

Exempted under the schedule approved are raw foods, school books, literature for the blind, farmers' products, tea, sugar, coffee, milk, cheese, butter, fresh fish, seed and fertilizer, newspapers and periodicals. Clothing will be taxed, so will all fancy and processed foods and luxuries.

The plan approved conforms generally to the program drafted at the committee's request by the treasury taxation experts.

So, during the past 30 years, the government has been improving the seaboard waterways.

From June 1 the canal northward from Wilmington to Boston will be open for traffic and about Sept. 1 the links will be open southward from Wilmington to Florida points.

(Continued from Page One) argued before the higher court and a decision returned.

If the court should uphold the contention of the attorney, Myers will be granted a new trial and probably returned to Greenville to await hearing. If, on the other hand, the judge's charge should be sustained Myers will remain on death row and a new date for execution will be set.

Within three weeks after he held up and fatally shot the Pactolus man, the negro was captured, tried, convicted and condemned to die in the electric chair. The case was one of the most sensational heard here in years by reason of the circumstances surrounding the holdup and slaying.

Myers walked into Hodges' store at Pactolus Saturday night during the early part of January and asked to see a pair of shoes. He declined to buy the shoes, and walked down a pathway midway between the store and Hodges' home where he later lay and shot the postmaster.

Hodges was not at first thought to be in a serious condition, but he died a few days later in a Washington hospital after development of complications.

Apprehending a stolen automobile after the holdup, Myers returned to Greenville where he was captured a few days later after it had been determined that he had been seen in the Pactolus community the night of the slaying.

Under a grilling examination at police headquarters the negro confessed the holdup and shooting and also admitted implication in two holdups of a night watchman.

His last known address, Hodges was slain with one of the pistol's shots from the night watchman's gun and a flashlight and keys belonging to the slain postmaster were found in the negro's possession.
