"THE HOLY CITY" TO BE PRESENTED FRIDAY NIGHT

The Greenville Choral Club, under the direction of Frank R. Hurty of Wilson, will give their Spring recital in the rendition of a sacred cantata, "The Holy City," on next Friday evening, April 1st, at 8:30 o'clock at the Teachers College.

This cantata has never been presented in Greenville before and it is to be hoped that no one will miss the opportunity of hearing it.

"The Holy City" was composed by Alfred R. Gaul for the Birmingham Musical Festival in 1882 and has since become one of the most loved sacred cantatas pertaining to the Easter season.

The first part of "The Holy City" was suggested by the passages of Scripture, "Here have we no continuing city," "Thy Kingdom Come," and sets forth the desire for a higher life, as expressed in the words, "My soul is athirst for God," which desire is followed by other passages expressive of the higher life, such as "Eye hath not seen."

The second part was suggested by the words, "I saw a new heaven and a new earth for the first heaven and the first earth were passed away," thus realizing the desire and promises contained in the first part.

With the exception of two hymns, a verse from Milton, and three verses from Deum, the words are entirely Scriptural.

The Choral Club is composed of forty of the best voices in Pitt county and is indeed a credit to Greenville. They have been working on this cantata since Christmas, and if you appreciate really good music you will enjoy "The Holy City" and encourage the club to do bigger and better things in the future. A small admission fee will be charged.

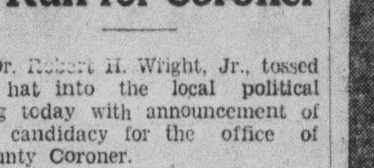

After the appeal by Speaker Garner members of the House made a gesture toward final action on the revenue bill.

With opposition from every section of the county being directed on consideration of the measure, the House has been up against one of the most monumental tasks it has had in years.

The Milk-for-Health campaign sponsored by the State Board of Health should bring good results in North Carolina, in the opinion of leaders of public thought who have watched the campaign.

The need of milk in the daily diet was never more pronounced than at this time, and the health authorities are on the right track.

Dr. Branch, director of the department of oral hygiene of the State Health Office, visited a school not long ago and found an entire class of youngsters with almost perfect teeth.

President Hoover has registered his opposition to full payment of the remainder of the adjusted compensation to soldiers who fought in the World War.

In a public statement yesterday, the president declared the payment of two millions of dollars to this cause would do much to handicap the government's program of financial recovery.

He asserted emphatically that he would veto the bill if it was finally passed by Congress.

Strange the Chief Executive should have come out so boldly against the measure with the presidential election not so far away. It is peculiar and hardly understandable in view of the fact that he will certainly incur the opposition of the thousands of men who fought that the world might be saved from the ruthless heel of German autocracy.

The payment of the remainder of the compensation, in the belief of leaders of thought, would aid materially in the recovery of the nation from the unprecedented depression. In fact, it is believed money paid out to the veterans would find its way into every channel of trade and industry and help bring about early revival.

The outspoken opposition of the president will certainly create a furor and the results will be far-reaching in the forthcoming presidential election upon which members are gazing with such fond hopes of victory.

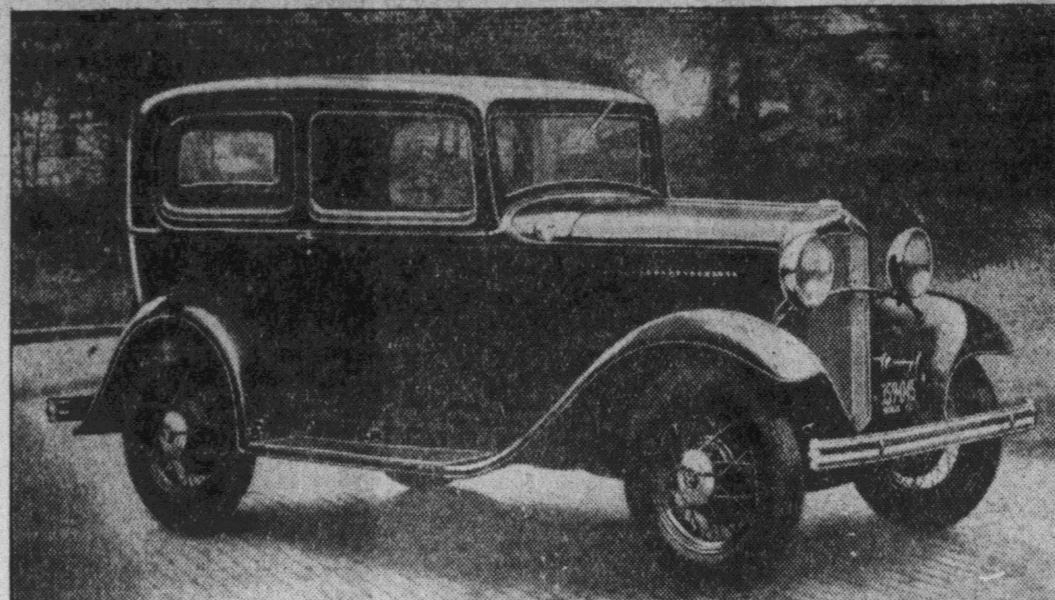

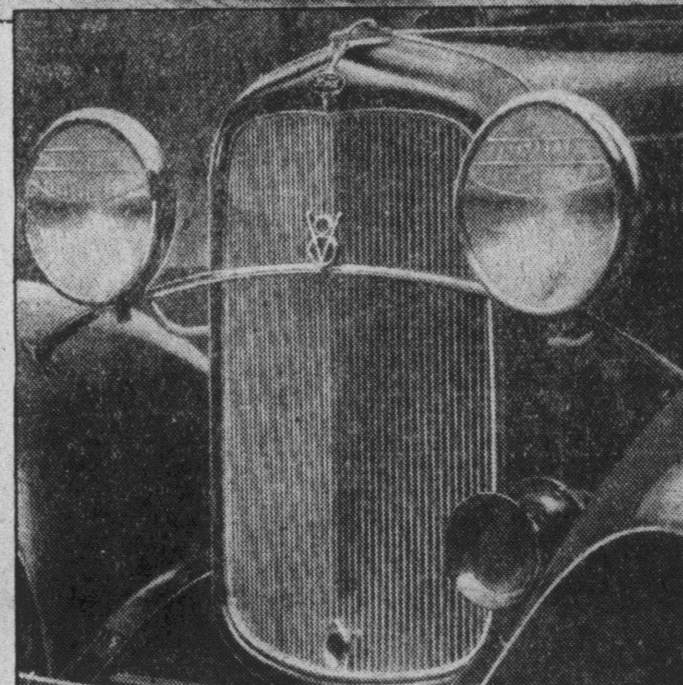
