

HOOVER IS RAPPED FOR CRITICISM OF RELIEF BILL

CURTIS WILL FACE TRIAL DURING JUNE

Indictment Believed to Be Against Norfolk Man Presented to Court Today

Flemington, N. J., May 28.—(AP)—An indictment, presumed to be against John Hughes Curtis, Norfolk hoaxer in the Lindbergh case, was handed today to Justice Thomas Trenchard who ordered it delivered to Quarter Sessions court for further proceedings.

Prosecutor Anthony Hauck would not say definitely today that the indictment had been returned against Curtis but he did say: "The Curtis case will be tried not later than the week of June 27."

As an indictment is a necessary preliminary to trial this statement was taken as positive corroboration of the general belief that one of today's indictments was against Curtis.

J. Chester Skillman, foreman of the grand jury which considered the Curtis case earlier this week, handed three indictments to Justice Trenchard, who announced that one of them dealt with Julia Winterstein on a charge of murder. The other two, he said, would be sent to Quarter Sessions.

The grand jury only considered three cases at the sitting at which evidence was presented in the Curtis case, and so it seemed certain that one of the two indictments not made public today was against the confessed hoaxer.

"I have nothing to say about the other two indictments," Justice Trenchard announced from the Supreme Court bench after making the one public and saying what action he was taking on the others.

The grand jury heard evidence on the Curtis case Thursday and after it had heard several witnesses and seen Curtis' confession reports were current that an indictment had been voted unanimously on the first ballot. This was not officially confirmed, nor was it denied.

Minister Held on Charge of Murder

Quitman, Ga., May 28.—(AP)—The Rev. J. T. Watkins, Pavo, Ga., Nazarene preacher who is 73 years old and has only one leg, is held here under \$5,000 bond on a charge of killing a neighbor with his walking cane. He was bound over on an accusation of involuntary manslaughter yesterday at a preliminary hearing.

Winston-Salem, May 28.—(AP)—Dressed in knee breeches and wearing a wig, Governor O. Max Gardner will play the part of his predecessor of 141 years ago in a pageant here late today depicting the visit of George Washington to Old Salem.

Agnew H. Bahnson, of Winston-Salem, will be welcomed in the old hall of Salem College by Governor Gardner just as the first president was by Governor Alexander Martin in 1791.

The time and arrangement of events in the pageant have been arranged to exactly coincide with the traditional account of George Washington's visit.

The make-believe presidential party will arrive at Old Salem Tavern, be greeted and cared for by the inn keeper and his seven sons just as in that day long ago, and the will be conducted to Old Salem Square, there to inspect the community industries, operated just as they were right after the revolution.

Following will be the reception by the governor, attendance at colonial dances and folk-singing, and an inspection of relics preserved from the visit of long ago. Governor Gardner is said to bear a striking resemblance to Governor Martin, whose portrait he faces daily in his office at the executive mansion in Raleigh.

CHURCH AFTER EXPENSE CUT

Presbyterians Seek A Reduction of Expense in Office of Denomination Clerk.

Montreal, May 28.—(AP)—A move to force reduction of operating expenses in the office of Dr. J. D. Leslie of Dallas, Tex., the stated clerk of the Presbyterian Church in the United States today attracted the attention of commissioners to the church's 72nd general assembly here.

Printed memorandums showing expenses of the office mounted from \$1,408 in 1919, when the late Dr. Thomas R. Law of Spartanburg, S. C., was stated clerk to \$10,791 in 1931 were distributed to the commissioners.

The pamphlets, unsigned, were mailed to many commissioners and ruling elders before they left their homes. They bore a railway post-office postmark and none of the commissioners seemed to know from whence they came.

More memorandums greeted the commissioners here. They were left in conspicuous places for free distribution.

It was pointed out by some of the commissioners that the office of the stated clerk was not a full-time position until Dr. Leslie was called to take charge in 1923.

A real indication that the commissioners were in an economical frame of mind came yesterday when Pittsburgh McMaster, a ruling elder of Columbia, S. C., voiced a plea for the assembly to "go slow" in authorizing an appropriation of \$1,000 for establishment of a correspondence school for ministers. A number of overtures have been received from presbyteries calling for reduction of expenses. Several of them specifically mentioned the office of stated clerk. The overtures are now in the hands of a committee,

WOMAN FACES TERM IN JAIL

Ella Reed Burk Confesses Taking \$65,000 From Bank in South Carolina

Charleston, S. C., May 28.—(AP)—A woman who admitted taking more than \$65,000 while bookkeeper of the South Carolina National Bank, today was confronted with a penitentiary cell, although she will not be sentenced for months.

The bookkeeper, Ella Reed Burk, who held a trusted position with the bank for years, pleaded guilty in United States Court here, to charges of violating Federal Reserve acts and making false entries.

Because of her physical condition, sentence was postponed until the October term.

The woman admitted juggling some 100 accounts, but said only three persons benefited from the manipulations. These, she said, were H. W. Lochrey, who committed suicide in Columbia March 23; Marcus Bloom and W. A. F. Schumacher, both of Charleston.

Louis M. Schimmel, assistant U. S. attorney, has indicated indictments may be issued charging Mrs. Burk, Bloom and Schumacher with misapplication of funds.

TEXAN BOOSTS RELIEF DRIVE

Says Measure is Not "Pork Barrel Legislation," as Charged by President Declares the Democrats Did Not Expect to Receive Co-operation From the Chief Executive

Washington, May 28.—(AP)—Speaker Garner today in a formal statement assailed President Hoover for his criticism of the \$2,300,000 relief program and denied that it was "pork barrel" legislation.

At his daily conference with newspapermen, the Texas booster said that the president's allusion to the proposed public works program in his relief plan as "pork barrel" came "with poor grace from one who demanded that congress cooperate with him in passing the Reconstruction Finance Corporation act."

"It would be," Garner added, "just as logical to refer to the Reconstruction Finance Corporation insurance companies, railroads and so on as a 'pork barrel' for the banks, financial institutions of the country."

"It is not 'pork barrel' nor can any other program which will extend aid in this period of distress be termed as such."

Garner smiled as he handed his statement to the newspapermen. He laughingly said that President Hoover's "opposition to the bill to relieve destitution, to broaden the lending powers of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation and to create employment by authorization and expediting a public works program was not unexpected."

"The Democrats did not expect to receive real cooperation from the president in any matter benefiting the masses and those who might be termed the middle class of American people," Garner said.

Two Clinton Men Injured in Wreck

Baltimore, May 28.—(AP)—Edison Bass and Herbert Daugherty, both of Clinton, were injured in an automobile accident on the Washington boulevard at Elkridge early today. They were driving a load of strawberries to a northern market when their truck crashed into the rear of another truck which had run out of gasoline. Brought to University Hospital here Bass was found to have suffered a fractured skull and a fractured right arm. Daugherty was treated for a contusion of the side and left the hospital.

Bass' condition was pronounced fair several hours after the accident.
