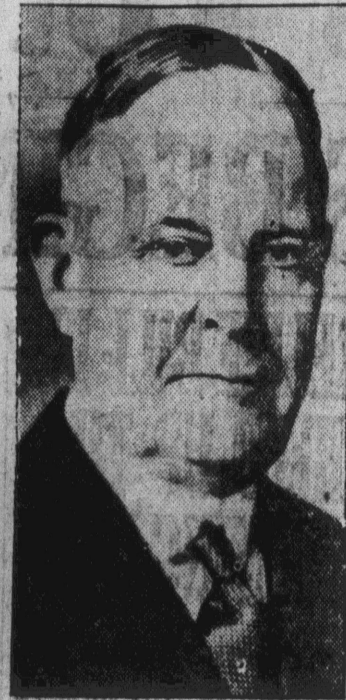

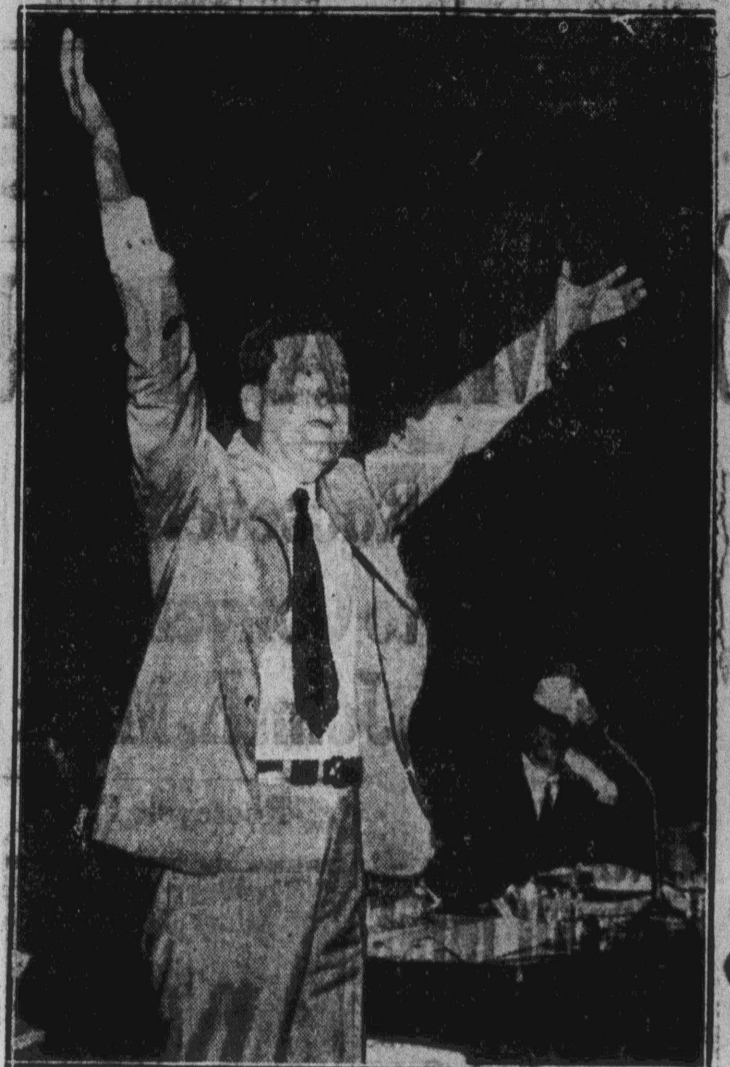

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**ABOUT TOWN**

Before the Democratic party will be able to rise to true heights of usefulness in all parts of the nation its candidates must learn the value of harmony.

In every campaign of recent years candidates have engaged in burling criticism and denunciation at one another until it has been almost impossible at times to determine if they are true members of the party.

This kind of spirit would ruin the strongest organization the world has ever known and if it is not stopped it will not only cause loss of the forthcoming election but result in eventual downfall of the high principles for which the party has been noted for so many years.

Something better than the Republicans offered was what the Democrats are after in the way of prohibition, realizing that this will be a dominant part in the forthcoming election.

The country apparently is desiring of a change of the prohibition law, and that being the case the two dominant parties, representing the bulk of the people, must give them a chance to vote on the question.

The Republicans voted for re-submission and it will be up to them to satisfy their constituents if they should be returned to power next November.

The Democrats find themselves in the same boat. They will be required to live up to their decision on the question, and its reception by the public will determine largely the extent of the vote it will be able to swing the way of the followers of Jefferson in the future.

People are more upset over this single issue than they have been in many a day, and there will be no more peace until referendum has been realized and the matter fully threshed out.

The economy bill has been completed by Congress and the people are now waiting to see what is going to be done with the unemployment relief measure.

If there is anything needed for improving the condition of the jobs at this time it is the application of federal funds to this purpose. Relief measures have been proposed from time to time during the last several months but this is the first time any serious consideration has been given to the matter.

With millions of unemployed people walking the streets at this time it is highly imperative for the government to take some action for their relief until the employment situation improves.

It is the worst condition with which this nation has been confronted in history and it is impossible to estimate the outcome of the titanic struggle against privation unless immediate steps are taken to aid the sufferers.

Congress has the opportunity of doing a great service for humanity in the passage of this one bill alone and the sooner it is done the better.

Those Tar Heels at Chicago were instructed to support Roosevelt but they are not going to be bound by anything they think isn't exactly in keeping with party traditions and principles.

When the fight for abrogation of the two-thirds rule came about, North Carolina was the first to balk and they wouldn't move a peg until the fight had been abandoned by the New Yorker's forces.

They again bolted the Roosevelt machine when they voted to unseat the Louisiana delegation headed by the fiery Huey Long.

Delegations of this kind are representative of the great commonwealth which they serve and North Carolinians are truly proud of the action which showed the convention the Tar Heels have minds of their own and are ready always to use them for what they believe to

Adding another to its long list of victories, the Pats shut out the Hornets last night, 2-0 to gain their new position of distinction. Lefty Kleinhaus gave the Hornets only four hits and beat their hurler, Chester Martin, in a fine war on the mound.

At the same time, the Asheville team was suffering defeat at the hands of the Winston-Salem Twins, also a shut-out, 4-0. The Twins took only seven safeties from the offerings of hurler Sharpe of the Tourists, but they made six of them count for marks on the scoreboard.

Another excellent game was pitched in Raleigh by Dewitt Perry, right hander, to defeat the High Point Pointers by the close score of 3-2. Perry struck out 12 men, but he couldn't do a thing with Odie Strain. The Caps' manager went to bat four times and got four hits.

The Durham Bulls, seeming to have lost some of the pep and drive that lifted them out of the cellar last week, played a slow game in Wilmington last night, though they did manage to beat the Pirates by a count of 11-7. Len Shires' one drive for a run-around was the only highlight of the game.

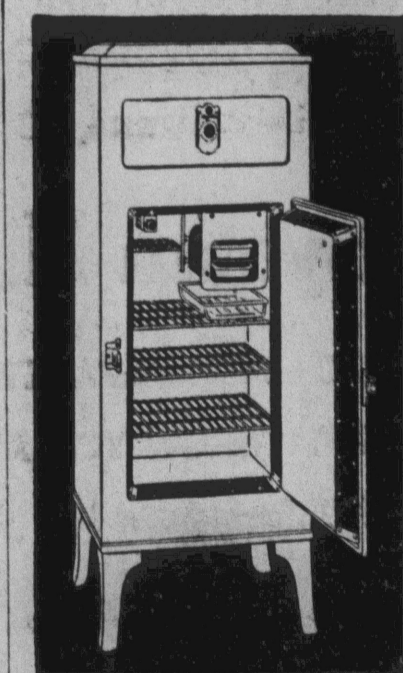

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## Stock Market

New York, June 30.—(AP)—The stock market ended the first half of the year today with prices still dragging along the average lows reached a month ago.

The list had a monetary upturn in the early trading as the Bank of England discount rate was cut and the Democratic repeal plank, generated a little enthusiasm here and there, but scattered selling soon cramped out. Gains were lost and a number of shares sagged 1 to 3 points under yesterday's close. The list stiffened a little in the early afternoon.

Selling of DuPont and National Biscuit seemed to precipitate the early slump. Both reached new lows, Biscuit getting down more than 2 points, and DuPont nearly two. Procter and Gamble registered a similar loss, and Air Reduction dropped 3. Homestake Mining lost nearly 8. Early gains of a point in the American Telephone, Case and American Tobacco B issues were converted into losses of like extent. Union Pacific was off 2. Among the so-called wet stocks, gains of 1 to 2 points appeared in Crown Cork, Anchor Cap, National Distillers, Owens Illinois Glass, American Commercial Alcohol and others, but these were considerably modified later. The list was up fractionally from the lows by early afternoon.

The early rise in the market was undoubtedly helped by more favorable reports from Lausanne.

The Bank of England discount rate cut to 2 per cent from 2 1/2 was viewed as constructive, although interest in it here was very largely academic. Final approval of the I. C. C. of the loan to the Frisco to meet interest due tomorrow was pointed out as a favorable development of more immediate bearing on domestic affairs.

## Senate Passes Bill to Reduce Loan Interest

Washington, June 30.—(AP)—The Senate today passed and sent to the House a bill reducing from 4-1/2 to 3 per cent the rate of interest on loans to veterans on world war adjusted service certificates.

The bill also provides that loans may be made immediately after issuance of the certificate instead of waiting two years as now provided. Senator Norris (R., Neb.), sponsored the interest reduction and Senator Copeland (D., N. Y.), the other feature. They agreed to combine the two measures and they were passed as one.

## Corner Stone Removed from Church Here

Workmen in charge of razing the old Episcopal church building on Pitt street discovered several articles dealing with the early life of the congregation and community when they removed the corner stone yesterday.

The stone, which was laid with fitting ceremonies in 1885, shortly after completion of the structure, contained a prayer book, church hymnal, a copy of Turner's Almanac, a nickel, and three copies of newspapers, two of which were the Mission Herald, Episcopal publication, and the Greenville Reflector.

The relics were turned over to Mrs. Hattie Skinner who will preserve them for inspection of members of the congregation and others interested in community life.

St. Paul's congregation two years ago moved into their new home on Fourth Street, considered one of the finest structures of this kind in this part of the state.

Demolition of the old building was started last week and will be other materials will be sold to defray expenses of razing. No plans had been made for disposition of the lot, it was stated.

In Greenville the contest is between Dick King and Gus Stokes, incumbent and runner-up in the first primary. Ten candidates sought this office in the first battle and in view of the fact that a heavy vote was cast, it was believed the two men would again rally large numbers of their supporters to their cause Saturday.

Reynolds supporters were claiming a distinct lead for their candidate, while Morrison supporters making similar claims, scoured the woods in an effort to poll a heavier vote for their leader.

In the campaign for governor, supporters of Ehringhaus and Fountain held out hopes of success. Ehringhaus concluded his eastern speaking tour here Tuesday night with a clear cut denunciation of suggestions featuring the campaign. Fountain forces were hopeful of piling up another lead for the Rocky Mount man and were working hard with this end in view.

Governor, Commissioner of Labor and in favor of one candidate or another in a great many county races.

The polls will open at sunrise and close at sunset, making the legal time of opening and closing vary according to the section of the state in which the polls are located.

At Raleigh the polls will open at 5:01 A. M. EST., and will close at 7:30 P. M. EST. The time of sunrise and sunset changes four minutes per degree of longitude. Voters in eastern counties may legally cast their ballots as early as about 4:45, while westerners may not vote until about 5:15. Polls will close in the east about 7:20 and in the west about 7:50.

Managers of all the candidates joined today in urging that the voters go to the polls early.

With interest in the senatorial race between Cameron Morrison and Robert R. Reynolds at fever heat, and with the second contest for the governorship between John C. B. Ehringhaus and R. T. Fountain, adding zest, party leaders varied in vote predictions but none was less than 300,000.
