part in the forthcoming world economic conference at London have given rise to interesting speculation in Washington political circles. Ramsay MacDonald upon his return to Great Britain from discussions here with President Roosevelt told the House of Commons that success of the conference depends on concurrent war debt negotiations. France, with a payment due the United States on June 15, is reported as urging debt discussions warmly. The question then arises, if the debt question is to be gone into at London, will provisional powers for Mr. Roosevelt be necessary, during the time that Congress is in recess and if so, will Congress consent to give him such powers?

The London conference promises to be a long and drawn-out affair. Some have estimated that it will last at least six months. Congress is certain to be in adjournment most of this time. With opinion abroad as it is on this question and in the face of the known attitude of the Senate and House on debts in general, the whole thing is decidedly delicate. The problems involved cannot be solved by men merely sitting down together and working out a proposition which seems to them reasonable and just. The important question, "What do the people back home think of this?" inevitably arises.

This appears the principal reason that war debts haven't gone far to date in the discussion stage in Washington. There have been some of course, who have intimated that drastic readjustments will have to be made. But usually when it came to a showdown they voted otherwise. President Hoover's failure to have the debt commission recreated late in 1931 was a weather vane.

But the situation is far different now. President Roosevelt has been

given powers by Congress which a year ago were undreamed of. The emergency banking act, the farm bill with the inflation amendment, and the economy act—to mention only a few—have bestowed upon him vast permissive authority.

Congress has put into his hands the weapons to do what it is admitted they were unable or unwilling to do. Will they be willing to put the debt question into his hands? Whatever he might do would, in the end, have to be approved by Congress. But with provisional powers he might at least have a chance at reaching a workable agreement on the question. Congress could reserve the right to approve or reject later on.

Always A Barrier

ANCIENT ROMAN FORTRESS FOUND ATOP SAHARA HILL

Algiers—(AP)—A fine Roman fort has been discovered 40 miles from Tammanasset, in the heart of the Algerian Sahara, by a French savant, Professor Reggasse. It is a vast stone structure on top of a hill, containing eleven chambers, and is in a perfect state of preservation. The building, locally known as the Tomb of Ahalessa, was supposed to be a Touareg mausoleum. The grave of a Targui princis having been found there years ago. A close inspection by Professor Reggasse disapproved this. In addition to evidence furnished by the nature of the construction, he found relics of Roman origin.

'Baby Steel Mills That Roll 'Onion' Skin' Sheets Help Industry To Itself Out Of the Depression

Cleveland, Ohio—(AP)—Operating percentages of the steel industry are on the climb again—which means a smoky pall over the valley mills and fiery skies at night from Bessemer converters along the Mahoning. Operations at 40 per cent of capacity, anticipated by many before long, man optimism today, though that is far short of the 85 per cent in prosperous years. The reason is that economies have been effected and new inventions developed, so that it is a common saying among steel men that they can operate at only 40 per cent today and a profit. New "Baby" Mills Built Perhaps greatest among the changes are in the rolling mill operations. Eight sheet and strip mills were being built in January, and seventeen were completed in 1932. Since the first of the year two other contracts have been let. But they are "baby" mills compared to the continuous mills, costing from \$2,000,000 to \$25,000,000 erected in the five years previous to 1930. With ten or twelve stands or rolls in a line and a reheating furnace midway, the continuous mills roll the hot ingots to the finished product in a continuous operation of a few minutes. Costly On Small Orders Ideal for big orders, they proved expensive when the rolls had to be readjusted all along the line and much material wasted for each small order after a period of idleness. Costing a seventh or an eighth as much and able to produce a third as much, according to its inventor, A. P. Steckel, the "baby" mills have entered the picture. Instead of ten or twelve stands of rolls, Steckel built a mill of one stand, four rolls high, through which he passed a ribbon of steel back and forth from one bobbin to another. Some of the licenses have gone to companies already owning big continuous mills, presumably because the "baby" mill can be operated on Tuesday, and still make a profit. The steel trade sees two possible results from the single stand mill. Comparatively inexpensive, it may lead to construction of rolling mills by small companies thus encouraging a decentralization of industry. Another possibility is new products. Steckel has rolled "onion skin" steel to the thickness of .001 of an inch—thinner than newsprint. Easily torn across with the fingers, it is impossible to pull it apart by hand.

MORGAN'S—The Bank On the Corner

By J. R. BRACKETT (Copyright 1933 Associated Press) New York—(AP)—There are no great, soft, luxurious chairs in the banking house of J. P. Morgan, nor any inch-thick rugs. Some of the furniture is actually tattered. In the office of Junius Morgan, the eldest son, you can see the stuffing in the long leather davenport. All of Morgan's is plain. There are plenty of straight chairs. The floor is stone, the wall simply decorated. There is no ostentation. Morgan's, in a word, is Morgan's; no special dress is needed. In harmony with the character of their offices, Morgan and his partners seek to be inconspicuous. Whatever their power is, and whatever may be disclosed by the coming congressional investigation, the externals of the firm show very little. The House of Morgan is at 23 Wall street. (Incidentally, the same number of the address of the firm in London.) It is a three-story building, built of huge blocks of Tennessee marble, seemingly as stark as they are wide. The main story is a huge vaulted room. Its windows are perhaps 30 feet high, reinforced with a network of metal. The dome-like ceiling is molded in geometric designs. To the right as you enter this large room, and behind a plain glass grill, are rows of desks where the partners sit, easily visible to callers. Banking names to conjure with are there—Thomas Lamont, member of the firm for 23 years, who generally makes the few public appearances held necessary for the firm, and Russell Leffingwell, former assistant secretary of the treasury and leading economist. To the rear of the room are the banking windows. No one enters here except for business, and most of Morgan's business is done not at banking windows but across desks and tables. In the second story are the private offices of the partners. They are shown to a small elevator and your mission is described to the elevator man who in turn hands you over to a boy who waits in the outer hall. Somewhere is the office of J. P.

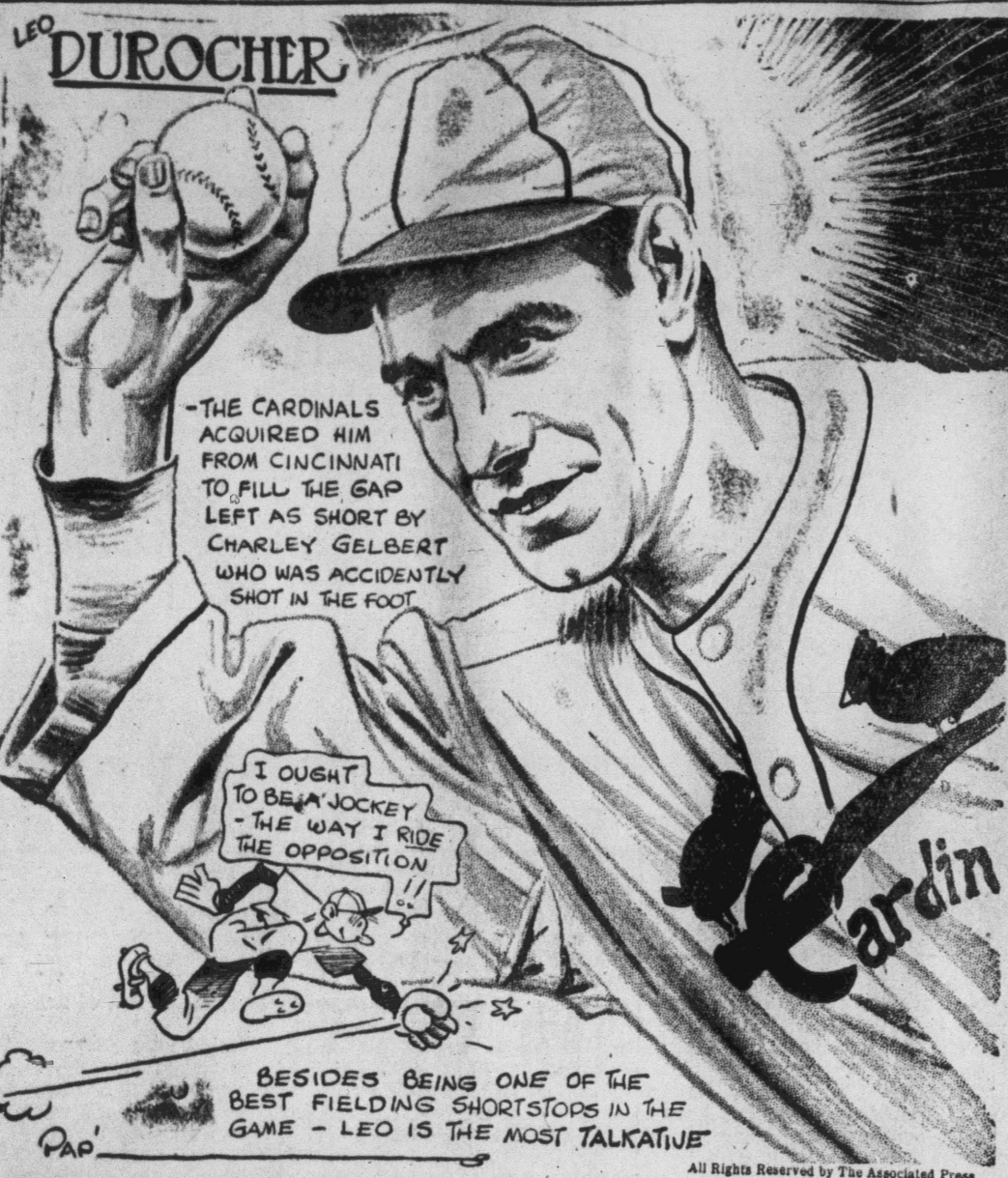
