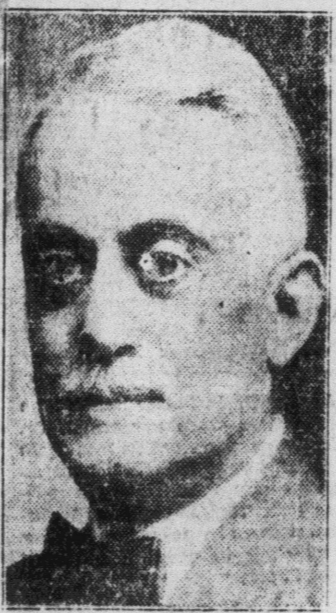

## RAID ENDS GANGSTER RULE OF NEW YORK PRISON



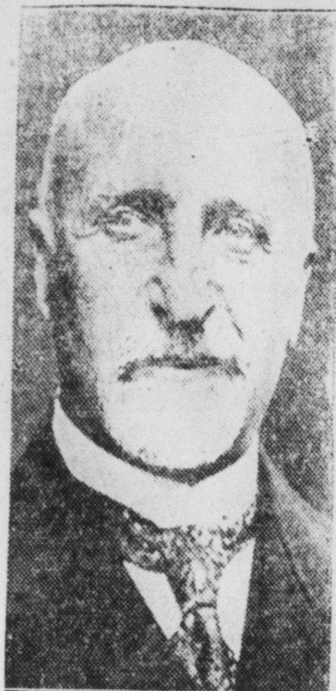

Virtually an entire new stock of groceries, meats and other products handled by the firm was being placed today and a big force of workmen was putting finishing touches on the fixtures and their general arrangement.

One side of the building is devoted to groceries and the other side to the market. The giant refrigeration system is in the back and on the market side a long row of cases has been arranged for meats, fish and other products.

E. Rose, general superintendent of Pender's, was here yesterday and today, assisting in getting the new store in shape for the formal opening.

J. S. Norman is manager of the grocery department and J. W. Bunch, manager of the meat department. Six clerks in the grocery department and four in the meat department will be on hand tomorrow to serve the opening day crowds.

**Sunny Italy Dark To Americans As Dollar's Sun Sets**  
Rome.—(AP)—Many dollar dependent Americans have deserted sunny Italy and gone back to the United States in search of a cheerier economic climate.

Before the dollar drop of April, 1933, American residents and tourists were able to convert their currency at the rate of about 19.50 lire for each dollar. Thereafter American money kept slithering until those depending on incomes from the United States estimated their exchange losses at 40 per cent.

A hoped for readjustment of the lire to the dollar's level failed to transpire. Those who held on to villas, apartments or hotel suites in the expectation that the dollar would crawl back to a "reasonable" ratio with the lire, saw President Roosevelt's recent stabilization merely preserve the status quo of their exchange losses.

Even a talk of lateral cut in Italian wages and prices has failed to materialize for the comfort of Americans.

Visible effects of the prolonged exchange difficulty abound in Florence—barometer city of the influx and exodus of English and American visitors—the American colony

has decreased by half since last April.

Dozens of American automobiles are available at absurdly low prices in Rome's big garages. They have been forfeited by American visitors who found that dollars would not buy enough highly-taxed Italian gasoline or pay enough on the sizable circulation taxes, to make motoring a pleasure.

Hotels and restaurant managers complain of the depreciated dollar as bitterly as the perennial American seeker for a kingly existence "among the natives" on a green-back pittance. One tea room proprietor who specialized in American trade, recently grew weary of waiting for the usual winter flock of tourists, ran a partition through his establishment and offered half of it for rent.

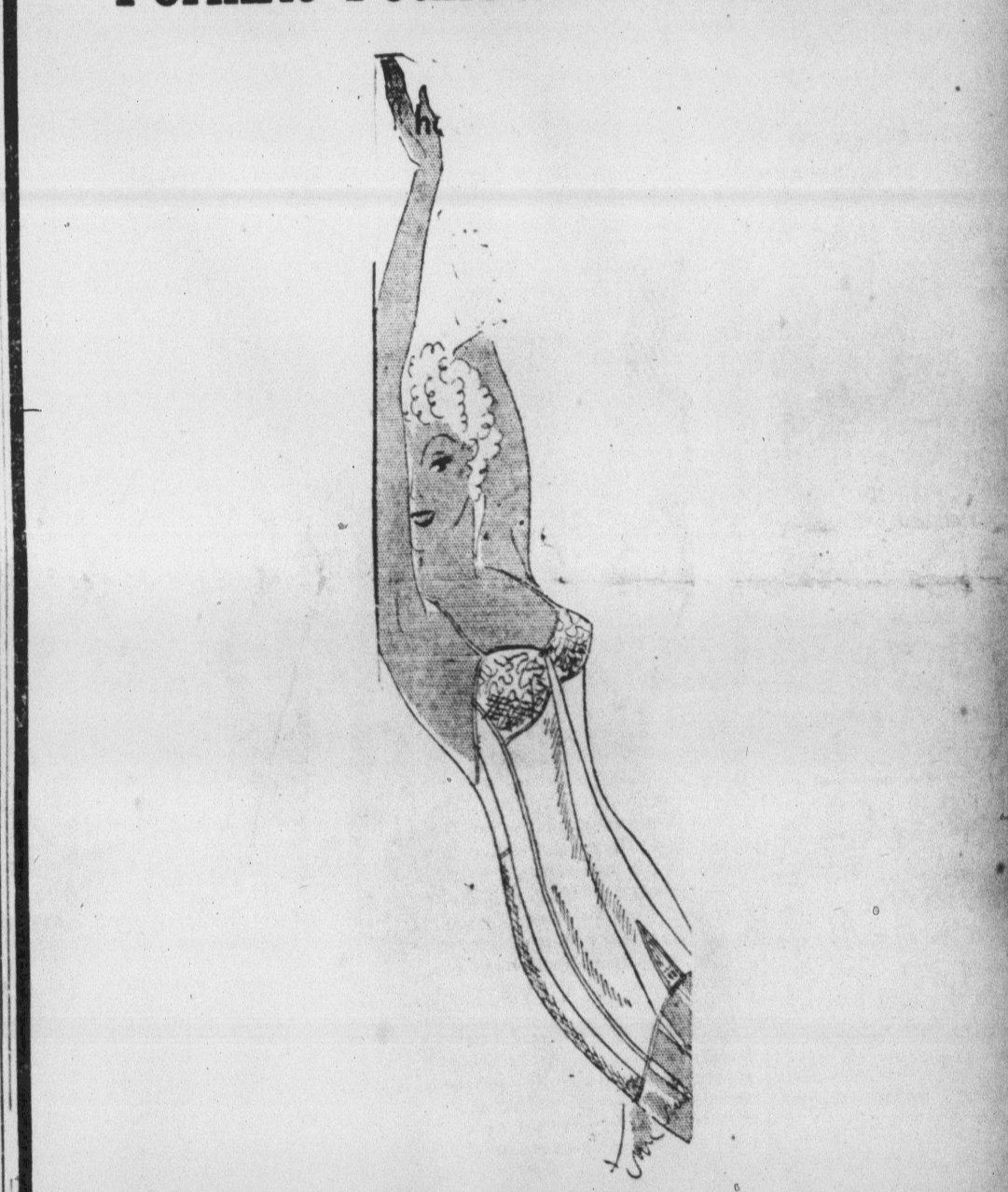

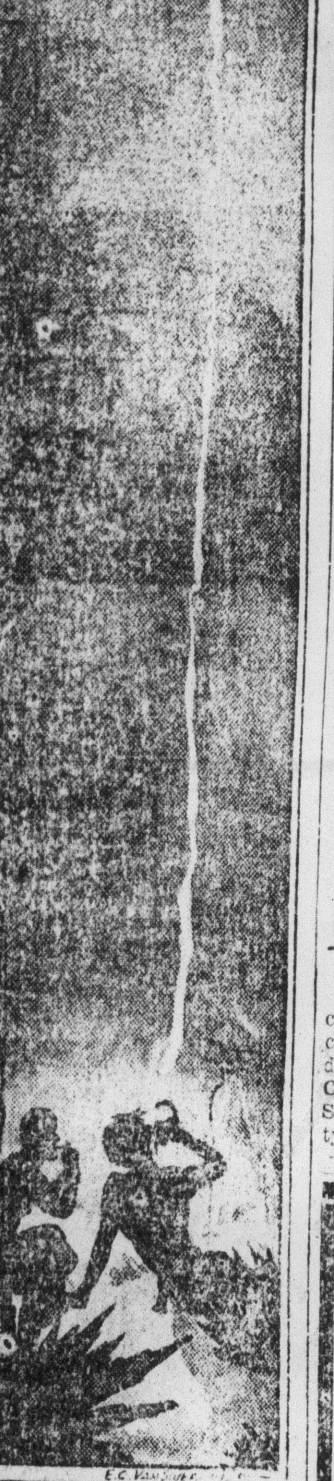

## RURAL LIFE COMMITTEE TO MEET HERE

Plan For Selling Eastern Carolina to Government to be Talked Wednesday

The Eastern Carolina Rural Life Committee of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce appointed by President Guy Elliott, to have charge of the big task of selling Eastern Carolina to the Government for a few more Substantial Homestead Projects will hold its first meeting in Greenville, next Wednesday, at 11 o'clock at the Proctor Hotel. While the first 25,000,000.00 appropriation has already been allocated, it is more than likely that at least \$250,000,000.00 will be made available within the next year or two. Eastern Carolina already has one project, Pender's in Pender County, but the sectional organization believes that there is room in the East for at least two or three more and every effort will be made to secure these for this section. Pitt County's representatives on the committee are: J. E. Winslow, E. G. Flanagan, R. A. Fountain, J. R. Harvey and M. O. Blount. Other counties in the East have similar representatives. "The whole program will be explained at this committee meeting," Secretary Bartlett said.

### SANFORD BOARD VOTES OUT SLOT MACHINES

Sanford, Feb. 23—(AP)—The days of the slot machines in Sanford are numbered, according to a decision of the aldermen at the meeting last night.

The matter came up for discussion, and following an opinion by City Attorney J. C. Pittman that they are being operated here in violation of the law, the aldermen decided on their removal.

The cooperation of the county officials in the matter will be asked in order to banish them from the county, so as to prevent their removal to just outside of the city limits.

A resolution from Lee County Unit Fishermen's Association, appears before the board asking for an appropriation for the work of the association in seeking to route tourist travel over the highway.

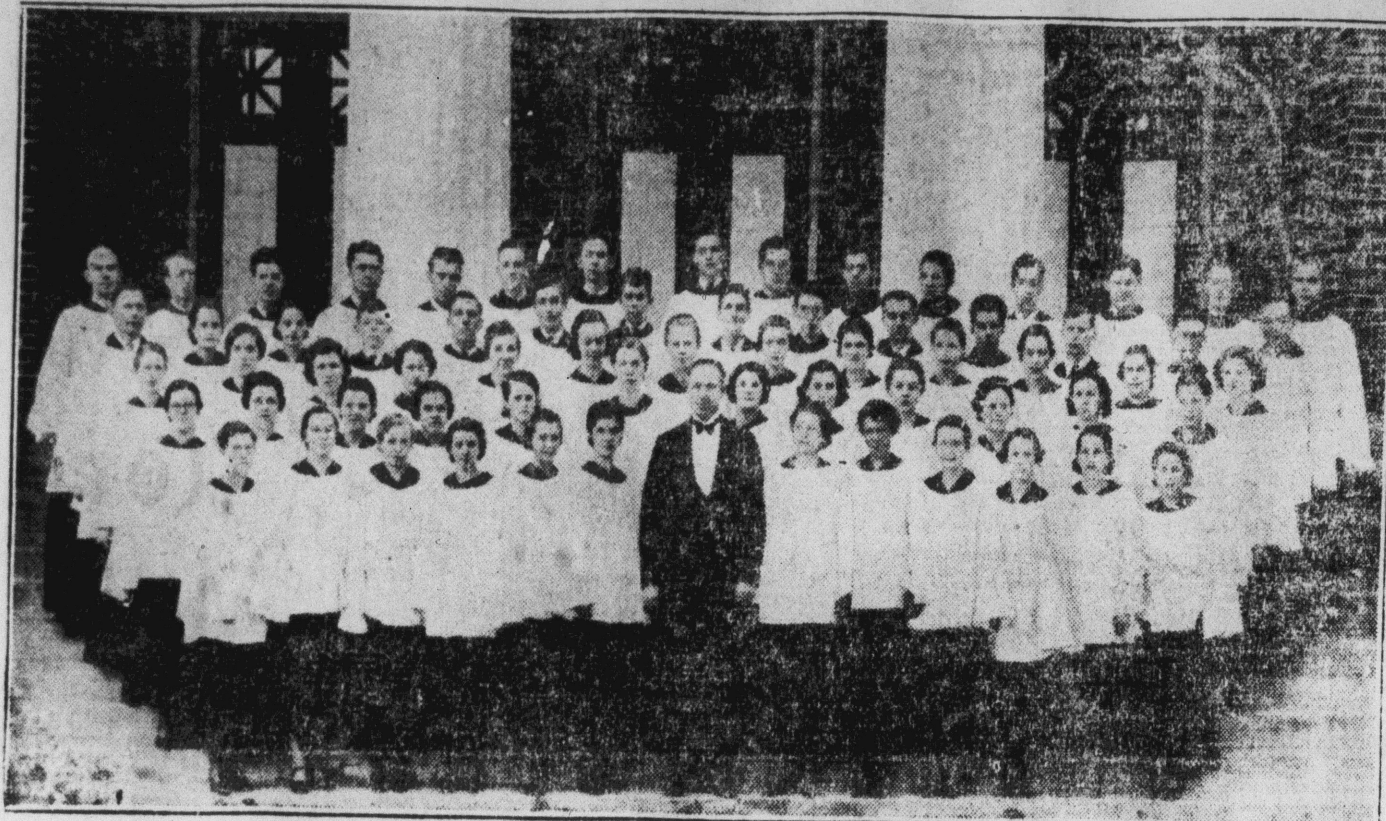
