Germany Declares She Will Not Submit To "Dictation"

STANDS FIRM FOR BETTER DEFENSES

Foreign Minister Neurath Says Days Of Imposing Ultimatums And Dictations On Germany Are Gone; Assails France For Trying To Keep Germany In Inferior Ranks

Berlin, April 28.—(AP)—Germany serving notice she no longer intends to submit to dictation stood firm today for adequate defense armament—despite a blast of criticism from other nations particularly France.

KIWANIS PUSH BOOK DRIVE

Club to Send Committees Before Commissioners to Ask for Contributions.

Kiwanis continued their effort to increase the stock of Sheppard Memorial Library at their regular meeting at the Woman's Club last night by designating two committees to go before the Board of County Commissioners the first of the month and ask for a contribution for the library.

The club at a previous meeting contributed numbers of books and then sponsored a canvass of the city through which over two hundred other volumes were provided for the cause.

The decision to send committees before the commissioners came after Dr. G. R. Combs, pastor of Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church, who at a former meeting told of the depleted stock of children's books in the library and the need for works of all kinds, explained the results of the canvass and said librarians stated the works presented by the Kiwanians were the best over given the library.

Dr. R. S. McGeachy, president of the club, instructed members of the Objectives and Public Affairs committees to appear before the commissioners at their regular meeting the first Monday in May.

The principal address of the evening was made by Judge J. Paul Prizzelle of Snow Hill, resident judge of the Fifth Judicial District. He spoke on the subject, "Law Enforcement," and brought out many pertinent facts in this connection. He called especially attention to the fact that officers of the law are unable to fully enforce the law without public sentiment supporting them. He called for a more tolerant attitude on the part of the citizenship with a disposition to do their bit to make law enforcement more complete.

The program was in charge of Sheriff Sam Whitehurst and regular club singing was conducted by Berry Bostic with Miss Sue Barrett at the piano.

SPEED LEAF CHECKS HERE

Farmers of Pitt County Receive \$234,424 In Government Checks This Week

Farmers who participated in the government tobacco crop production campaign today had received through rental and equalization payments the comfortable sum of \$234,424.17, it was made known today at the office of E. F. Arnold, farm director, who is charged with the responsibility of distributing the payments.

A total of 1,791 rental checks, Mr. Arnold said, had been received calling for \$162,985.11. He said 1,160 checks for equalization payments had been received and the total of these was \$71,439.06. Mr. Arnold said there were around 1,800 checks, both rental and equalization, yet to be paid out in this county, and that when all have been received the total amount received by growers would be \$500,000.

Farmers were urged to await letters advising them of their checks before applying at the farm department, Mr. Arnold said, and that will speed up delivery of checks to all parts of the county.

EXTEND SEED LOAN PERIOD

Government sets May 15 for Ending Filing Period for the Seed Loans.

It was announced from the local office of the Crop Production Seed Loan this morning that the loan period had been extended until May 15. The time limit was scheduled to expire April 30.

T. O. Edens, manager of the local offices stated he had received instruction from the federal department to continue receiving applications for seed loans until the middle of May, and advised farmers desiring to obtain funds from this source to get busy and file their applications at once.

He said approximately 700 applications had already been received by the local office and that checks had been returned shortly after approval of the applications.

Mr. Edens said his office was handling applications in an effort to get checks back to the growers in ample time to assist in getting their farming operations under way.

Resolution of Sympathy Adopted at Closing Session at Pinehurst Yesterday.

A resolution of sympathy to the family of Dr. Robert H. Wright, President of East Carolina Teachers College, who died here Wednesday morning, was adopted at the closing session of the North Carolina Bankers Association at Pinehurst yesterday.

The resolution was prepared by J. H. Waldrop, cashier of Greenville Banking and Trust Company, who with Mrs. Waldrop and J. S. Picklen returned home last night from Pinehurst where they had been since Wednesday attending the convention.

The resolution also spoke in feeling terms of the outstanding service which Dr. Wright rendered the educational forces of the state and nation and expressed deepest regret at his death.

Speaking of the convention today, Mr. Waldrop said it was one of the best in years, and from the standpoint of attendance the best. He said two of the outstanding things of the gathering were addresses by Speaker Henry Rainey and Governor Black, head of the Federal Reserve Board.

Many other prominent men from other sections of the country were also present, he said, and contributed greatly to the success of the annual gathering of North Carolina's bank men.

Mr. Waldrop who has been active in Group One of the North Carolina Bankers Association for a number of years, was elected group committeeman.

Mr. Waldrop said they fully enjoyed their stay in the great resort of the Sand Hill country, and especially the entertainment program, which was one of the most varied in years.

Late News Flashes

Vote On Air Mail Plans. Washington, April 28.—(AP)—Administration striving for a new air mail setup won today in the Senate with successive 56 to 19 the rejection of Republican attempts to alter the plan.

The banking committee there approved the Glass plan by which industry can get over \$250,000,000 in loans from Federal Reserve Banks. JAPAN ISSUES RESTATEMENT CHINA POLICY

Foreign Minister Koko Hirota Says Nation Not Indifferent To Foreign Effort

Tokyo, April 28.—(AP)—Japan issued an "official" interpretation of her restated policy toward China today.

Foreign Minister Koko Hirota said in a statement that Japan "cannot remain indifferent" to foreign efforts to aid China that endangered the peace of Asia.

"Japan has no desire to interfere with the right of other powers in China," the statement added "and will welcome other nations dealing with China provided their dealings rebound to China's benefit. Hope was expressed that the statement would convince governments alarmed by the April 17 declaration that they never had any intention to assert Japan's right to censor the relations of occidental nations with China.

Atty. General Brummitt Speaks Before Tax Body

"It cannot be denied that the proposed Constitution removes every definite and useful restriction on the power of taxation," said Dennis G. Brummitt of Raleigh, Attorney General of North Carolina, addressing a mass meeting at the courthouse here this afternoon at two o'clock.

Speaking under the auspices of the Pitt County Tax Relief Association, Mr. Brummitt explained in detail the proposed New Constitution which the people of North Carolina will vote upon in the November election. He said it would enormously extend the field of taxation, permit without a vote to the people, the levy of taxes for anything a court would hold to be a public purpose to any extent, in any form, and without any limit, and by any system of classification, short of what might be declared a violation of the Fourteenth Amendment to the Federal Constitution.

Judge F. M. Wooten, president of the Tax Relief Association, presided over the meeting, which was attended by numbers of people interested in the New Constitution and the fight now on foot for and against its adoption at the November election. Referring to assertions by A. J. Maxwell, commissioner of revenue, and Clarence Poe, editor of the Progressive, that the Constitution speaker, a message came from the exercise of the power of tax-

NEGRO DRAWS 30 YEARS IN MURDER CASE

Claude Clemmons, Stokes Negro, Convicted in Criminal Court Friday.

Found guilty of second degree murder by a jury in criminal court here yesterday afternoon, Claude Clemmons, 50-year-old Stokes negro was sentenced to 30 years in prison at hard labor by Judge Frank A. Daniels, of Goldsboro, who presided. Counsel for the defense immediately filed notice of appeal to Supreme court.

The case went to the jury about 5 o'clock and the verdict was returned in ten minutes.

Clemmons was charged with the death of Louise Roseason, negro girl, who lost her life in a fire which destroyed the home of Cora Roberson on the night of last January 17. Two other negro children were also burned to death and several other persons sleeping in the building narrowly escaped death.

Clemmons, who during the first of the week was acquitted of a charge of arson in connection with the same case, went on trial in the second degree murder charge Thursday.

State's evidence in the second case was similar to that offered in the arson charge and when the State rested shortly before noon yesterday, W. J. Bundy who represented the defendant, made a motion to dismiss the case out was denied. Bundy announced he would offer no evidence.

Clemmons was arrested here shortly after fire destroyed the home of the Roberson woman. The state alleged that he threatened his wife because she had previously left him and made her home with the Roberson woman for giving his wife shelter, and burned the house because of his resentment.

Two of the principal witnesses for the state were children of Clemmons who testified he was absent from home the night of the fire.

A letter said to have been written by Clemmons while in jail to the children, telling them what to say on the stand, disappeared in the court room late Tuesday and was never found in spite of a long search for it.

Clemmons was originally charged with arson and three separate case of murder.

Fleming; three sisters, Miss Daisy Fleming and Miss Agnes Fleming, of Greenville, and Mrs. James Cobb, Farmville; a brother, J. D. Fleming, Jr., four half-sisters, Misses Eva Moya, Blanch, Doris and Edith, all of this county.

The suicide was said to have been the result of mental depression caused by a nervous breakdown which he suffered last summer. He was a native of this county and the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. J. D. Fleming.

PUSH SEARCH FOR HENCHMEN OF DILLINGER

William Zeidler Held At Chicago In Connection With Bremer Kidnaping; Two Desperate Fugitives From San Quentin Slain By Deputies At Victorville, California

Chicago, April 28.—(AP)—John J. "Boss" McLaughlin, a politician was arrested last night on a suppressed warrant charging him with conspiracy in possessing part of the Edward Bremer \$200,000 ransom.

McLaughlin was named in one of the warrants issued after the arrest yesterday of William Zeidler, whose possession officers found \$665 in \$5 and \$10 bills that were part of the fortune paid the kidnapers of the St. Paul man several months ago.

FISHING BAN BEGINS MAY 1

Closed Season Starts First of May and Expires June 10, ruling Says.

The closed season on fishing will begin May 1 and extend to June 10 and extend to June 10, it was made known today by Cecil Jones, game warden of this county.

During that period the boys who have been so keen on pulling fish from the various streams of the section, will have to turn their attention to business matters, or merely twiddle their thumbs until the ban is lifted.

Jones said that all persons found guilty of violating the ruling would be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law. He also said a keen watch would be kept for those who attempt to evade the law and all defendants would be handled alike.

Rule Four of the Rules and Regulations of the Department of Conservation and Development, which has been amended follows:

Open and Closed Seasons: It shall be unlawful to fish or take fish by any means whatsoever in "inland fishing waters" of North Carolina from May 1 to June 10 of each year, both dates being inclusive; Provided, that this rule shall not apply to fishing with hook and line and rod and reel or by casting in counties designated by the Department of Conservation and Development, including Bladen, Camden, Columbus, Cumberland, Currituck, Duplin, Gates, Green, Hoke, Edgecomb, Hartford, Lenoir, Pasquotank, Pender, Perquimans, Roberson, Bertie, Beaufort, Brunswick, Hyde, Franklin, Harnett, Johnston, New Hanover, Northampton, Pitt, Richmond, Sampson, Wake, Tyrrell, Warren, Wilson, Vance, Granville, Halifax Person, Martin, Durham, Washington, Dare, Scotland, Stanley, Anson, Union, Nash, Orange, Carteret, Wayne, and Alamance, Monday, Friday and Saturday of each week during closed season.

Provided further that this rule shall not apply to fishing with hook and line and rod and reel or by casting in Davidson, Chatham, Rowan, Montgomery, Catawba, Lincoln, Iredell, Randolph, Rockingham, Caswell, Forsyth, Gaston, Lee, Davie, and Moore on Friday and Saturday of each week during closed season.

"I'll get a can opener, and make a larger hole," he said, and ran back into the house.

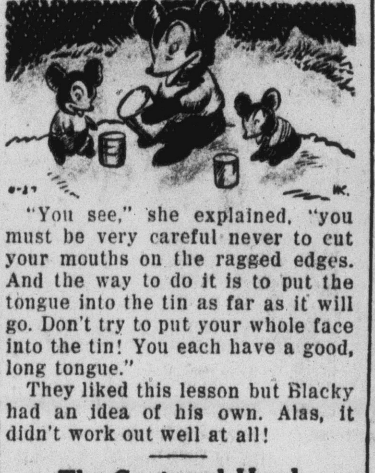
But when he came out again Blacky Bear had wriggled his head free. It was a very sticky looking head but he didn't mind that.

**Washington Daybook**

 Washington — The last hasn't been heard of the publication of the names of those members of the house who signed the petition to force a vote on the McLeod bill—the bill which would take care of depositors who lost money in closed national banks.

In the opinion of some house leaders it may prove to be the entering wedge in the effort to wipe out entirely or amend drastically the so-called discharge rule.

This rule has been a bone of contention in the house ever since the democrats took over control in December, 1931. Probably no rule of the house has been so severely condemned and so vigorously supported as this one.

The rule simply provides that if 145 members of the house sign a petition any further consideration of a certain piece of legislation and a vote forced in the house.

**A Forced Bonus Vote**  
 The most striking example of the rule in operation is the way the house has been forced to vote on im-

mediate payment of the soldiers' bonus.

Opponents of the rule contend that sooner or later the house will get itself into a lot of trouble with this rule.

"There's no telling what we might be forced to vote on if this assinine rule is continued," says McDuffie of Alabama. "There are now about 25 petitions on the clerk's desk."

Patman of Texas, bonus advocate who has seen the rule work to his advantage more than once, counters with this argument:

"One member of the senate can force consideration of any proposal. Why shouldn't 145 members of the house have the same right as one senator?"

One group contends that under the rule the house enacts by petitions of blocs or minorities. The other argues that only by the discharge rule can the true will of the house be determined.

**Between Two Fires**  
 When newspapers publish the names on discharge petitions before the required 145 have been obtained—as they did on the McLeod petition—the reaction causes disquietude and concern among both groups.

**Moose Die On Island**  
 Duluth, Minn. — (AP)—The Michigan conservation commission is planning to study deaths of moose on Isle Royale in Lake Superior. Fishermen say several moose of the 800 that have died during the past winter and it is feared some malady may be responsible.

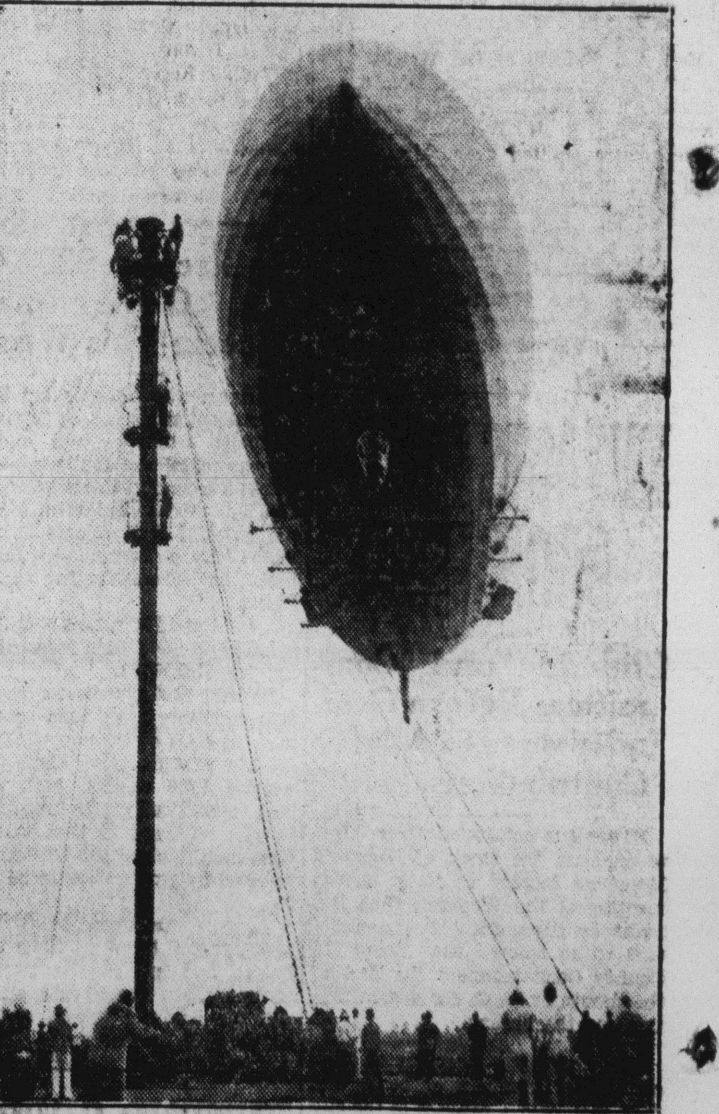

Coffin, the industrial magnate, acquired the island many years ago and rebuilt an ancient dwelling into a castle. It stands beneath spreading live oaks draped in Spanish moss and in front is a pool shaped like a Byzantine cross.
