

ROOSEVELT SEEKS NATION-WIDE HOUSING PROGRAM

Great German Spy Ring Found By Paris Police

AGENT TAKEN INTO CUSTODY BY OFFICERS

Warrants Issued For Other Members of The Organization; Captain Forge Arrested After He Had Been Almost Cleared of Espionage

Paris, May 2.—(AP)—Police announced today that a "huge German spy organization" had been uncovered with the arrest of an agent in Paris and that warrants had been issued for other members of the group.

Secret service agents were said to be searching for the spies but even the names of the agents arrested here was not made public.

The organization was uncovered authorities said, as the result of investigation of charges against a French army officer, Capt. Forge, who was taken into custody in connection with the mysterious disappearance of plans for the defense of the city of Belfort.

Authorities declared the organization was as large if not larger than that for which Mr. and Mrs. Robert Gordon Switz of New York and New Jersey and thirteen other persons now are in prison.

Captain Forge, who had been under investigation for a long time, was just about cleared of all charges police said, when the secret service caught an accomplice in the act of espionage.

BELHAVEN CHILD FATALLY BURNED

Belhaven, May 2.—The funeral of Mary Fortescue, 7, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Fortescue, who died of burns suffered while playing Monday afternoon, will be held from her home this morning and interment made in Belhaven cemetery.

The child's clothes caught fire from some embers from burned trash while she was playing in a neighboring yard. She was rushed to the Washington Hospital but lived only a few hours.

DIES FROM INJURIES INFLICTED BY ROBBERS

Wilmington, May 2.—(AP)—Karl Hayduck, 26-year-old farmer of the Castle Haynes road, died in a hospital here last night of a fractured skull received when he was struck down and robbed at his home Saturday night.

Two negroes were being held by county officers for questioning in the case, but officers were seeking a third man as the actual assailant they said.

Hayduck was struck down as he worked on his automobile. He was dragged to a ditch some distance away and his pockets were rifled of about \$70. Found in the ditch a short time after the attack, he never regained consciousness.

LOG HOUSE HOLDS FIFTH GENERATION

COUNTY COURT HAS BUSY DAY

Number of Cases Disposed of in All-Day Session Here Yesterday.

After remaining idle during a double week term of Superior court, County court got into action yesterday and disposed of quite a number of cases accumulated during the period of inactivity.

Numbers of cases were transferred to Superior court while others were continued until another sitting, but around twenty-odd cases were actually given hearing, the defendants either being fined or sent to the roads. Several were adjudged not guilty.

Members of the whiskey selling profession, rounded up here by police during the last several days, found their way to the roads or were released on payment of fines.

Willie Settle, colored, charged with driving drunk, was sentenced to six months on the roads.

Clinton Cox, colored, charged with possession of whiskey for sale, was given 90 days on the roads.

Judgment was suspended in the case of Annie White, colored, charged with illegal possession of whiskey for sale.

After being sentenced to six months at the county home on a charge of illegal possession of whiskey for sale, Annie Brady, colored, appealed to Superior court.

Conviction of illegal possession of whiskey, John Atkinson, colored was fined \$50, cost to be deducted.

Sentence was suspended in the case of Louis Pitt, colored, charged with larceny of an automobile license plate, providing he pay for stolen license. He was given a concurrent sentence of six months for driving an automobile without license. His license was also revoked for six months.

Eva King, colored, charged with assault with a deadly weapon, was fined \$20, cost to be deducted.

Ida Bell Gorham, fined \$10 and cost on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon, filed notice of appeal to Superior court.

Junie Jackson, colored, assault with a deadly weapon, \$50, cost to be deducted.

BI-METALLIC MONEY PLANS IN THE MAKING

Pres. Roosevelt is Reported as Working on Future Monetary Policy of U. S.

Washington, May 2.—(AP)—President Roosevelt is working on his announced policy for bi-metallic money standard but the White House maintained the strictest silence today on the move in this direction.

Inquirers were referred to the several statements made by the President during the past year on the money situation.

In these he had definitely proposed that silver share gold money as a base.

White House aids have repeatedly contended that international action was required to deal with the silver problem because of its unknown quantity in the world market.

Questions on the prospects of early action brought the response at the White House that there "is hope."

Meanwhile there was no indication of any change in the Roosevelt monetary policy or any action for legislation.

WARD PULLS OUT OF RACE

One of six Candidates for Treasurer's Office Announces His Withdrawal.

The bumper crop of candidates for County Treasurer was lessened by one today by the withdrawal of the candidacy of W. H. Ward, who announced several days ago he would be in the race for the office.

In announcing his withdrawal today, Mr. Ward merely stated that "unforeseen circumstances" caused his action.

This leaves five candidates in the field to compete for the office including Thurman Moore, the present incumbent.

The field for virtually all offices is fairly well filled this year but it is probable the greatest fight will be centered about the Treasurer's office and for House of Representatives where four candidates are bidding for election.

The sheriff's office evidently is in or a pretty fair stage of view of the fact that Sam Whitehurst, incumbent, is being opposed by Sam Dudley, member of the Board of County Commissioners, and Richard (Dick) King, Greenville township constable.

There is also plenty of activity for the Board of County Commissioners with around a dozen entered for the various seats.

COMMUNISTS CALL STRIKE AT HAVANA

Protest Is Registered Against May Day Disorders in Cuban Capital Yesterday.

Havana, May 2.—(AP)—Communists called a one hour general strike today protesting May day incidents which left one dead and ten wounded. Disorders were feared.

Bombers got into their work early this morning. Two bombs exploded in mid-town Havana. Damage was slight.

A woman was among those wounded when snipers fired from house-tops yesterday into massed thousands marching in the communist parade.

The communists charged the snipers were members of the politically powerful ABC society. Authorities accused the communists of planning the shooting to incite outbreaks.

Mrs. Elks was the daughter of the late Charles Brown and Eliza Grimsley Bowen of Green county. She has spent most of her life in the community where she died.

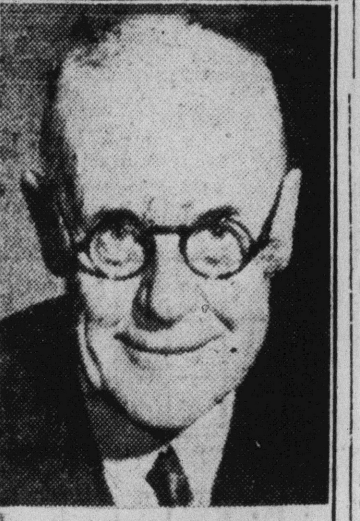

Late News Flashes

Stock Market Bill Delayed. Washington, May 1.—(AP)—The House enactment of the stock exchange regulation became but a matter of time today and the controverted air mail legislation was given the next major place in line.

In the swirl of coincidences Senatorial activity the bank committee decided to limit the proposed federal reserve bank loans to industry to a quarter billion dollars aggregate and not more than \$1 single million to a borrower.

Silverites on that side obtained another conference with the President to attempt a compromise to increase the metal's buying power. This will not take place until Saturday with a lot of pre-arranging between now and then.

A Republican of the Interstate Commerce Commission, Maers of Michigan, joined a Democratic member, Pettigill of Indiana, in praise of the stock market bill.

The rules committee voted to allow only one hour of air mail debate but left the bill open to amendment. It was explained that the special commission to determine aviation policies would not include members of the House or Senate in order to keep politics out.

The Senate bill penalizing transaction of kidnaping ransom demand was approved by the House judiciary committee. It was the tenth of the federal crime measures the committee has ready for House action.

BRITAIN WILL STAND FIRMLY BACK OF CHINA

Chinese Government Informed that its Interest at Heart of recent Notes.

London, May 2.—(AP)—The Chinese government has been assured by Great Britain, it was learned today, that China's interests were uppermost in the mind of Sir John Simon, Monday when he said, "Japan's special rights in China are recognized by other powers."

The statement was made in the course of a speech before the House of Commons in which Sir John, British foreign secretary, refused diplomatic exchanges brought about by Japan's restatement of policy toward China.

It appeared likely today that assurances similar to those given China have been given by the American government but this could not be confirmed owing to the aversion of both Britain and the United States to any appearance of acting together on the Far Eastern affairs.

A member of the staff of the Chinese legation—not the minister as reported erroneously—came yesterday to the British foreign office and inquired concerning Sir John's remarks.

The declaration was actually intended as a declaration to aid China, it was said in authoritative quarters while the British foreign office was said to be disturbed over the opposite meaning that had been construed by both American and Chinese officials.

Will Present His Plans to Congress In Couple of Days

Reduction Of Tax on Liquor Not In Sight

Washington, May 2.—(AP)—President Roosevelt is not inclined to reduce the new liquor tax at this session of congress, preferring other methods of attack on bootleggers.

The president is hopeful that removal of the quota restriction on whiskey imports will be of benefit in curtailing bootleg activities.

There is no immediate contemplation of lowering the tariff rates on liquor but should the reciprocal tariff bill be passed by congress there is every expectation Mr. Roosevelt will use this power for reduction of the liquor tax.

PARIS POLICE BATTLE WITH COMMUNISTS

Four Policemen Are Wounded as Reds Pour Pistol Fire Into Police Ranks.

Paris, May 2.—(AP)—Police fought a pitched battle with communists, in a "tuff" quarter of Paris early today as a climax to "Red May Day" in France.

Four policemen were wounded as the communists entrenched themselves behind flaming barricades in a blind alley and windows of a municipally owned apartment, poured a stream of pistol fire into the ranks of police and mounted guards.

Only after a four hour siege were police—commanded by their prefect, Roger Langeron in person—able to storm the communists citadel and drive them from cover.

By 5:30 a. m. calm had been restored by special squads carrying shields and gas pistols went into the apartment house and routed the defenders and carried them captive off to jail.

The rioting flared at midnight when, after a surprisingly quiet day the nation over—hundreds of communists shouting defiance entrenched themselves in the alley.

WOMEN OF GERMANY GET UNIFORM GARB

Berlin.—(AP)—Women are being put into uniforms in Germany "to express outwardly their inner connection with the organization of the creative people," according to the Nazi labor front.

A uniform garb for organized woman workers, consisting of a kind of waistcoat of dark blue velvet, a light blouse and a dark blue skirt has been made the festival costume of the organization, matching the dark blue "best" suits of male members.

"Putting women into uniforms is contrary to the female character" the labor front's ordinance said, emphasizing that this is merely a "uniform, garb" and not a uniform.

TALENTED CHILD MUSICIANS STUDY IN ODESSA SCHOOL

Odessa U. S. S. R.—(AP)—A school for outstanding child musicians, ranging in age from 7 to 14, has been opened here by the Ukrainian republic.

The initial enrollment embraced 27 violinists, 21 pianists and eight cellists. They come from all sections of the Soviet Union.

Besides music, the youngsters study Marxian and Lenin doctrines being taught to regard the communist party as the agent through which they have been furnished with opportunity to develop their talents.

Found Dead

Rockingham, May 2.—A colored negro driver for Entwistle Manufacturing Company, Son Ledbetter, was found dead Saturday night about 8 o'clock near town. An autopsy was held to determine the cause of death, which was found to be heart trouble.

SAYS SURVEY SHOWS GREAT HOUSE NEED

Details of Scheme Withheld From Press Conference Today; Plans Being Worked Out by Frank C. Walker; Harry L. Hopkins Assisting President in Determining Needs of the Country

Washington, May 2.—(AP)—President Roosevelt will ask congress in the next couple of days for authority to inaugurate a nation-wide program. The administration plans called for action for both new construction and modernization of homes.

The president said at his press conference today a survey of the country had shown a real need for the housing program being worked out by Frank C. Walker, chairman of the executive council.

Details were withheld by Mr. Roosevelt pending his message to congress but it was said only very simple permissive legislation is required.

Harry L. Hopkins, federal relief administrator, is cooperating on the plans.

STRAWBERRY PRICES PICKED UP NOTICEABLY

Chadbourne, May 2.—Strawberry prices picked up noticeably today on the Chadbourne market, as compared with Monday. The price range today was from \$3.20 to \$3.85 a few loads going above \$4.00 and a few loads of inferior quality below \$3.20.

The berries are greatly in need of rain in many sections of the berry producing sections of Columbus and Horry counties.

Growers report a very light per acre yield for the most part while a few growers are getting a normal yield. Monday's movement totalled 5,371 crates.

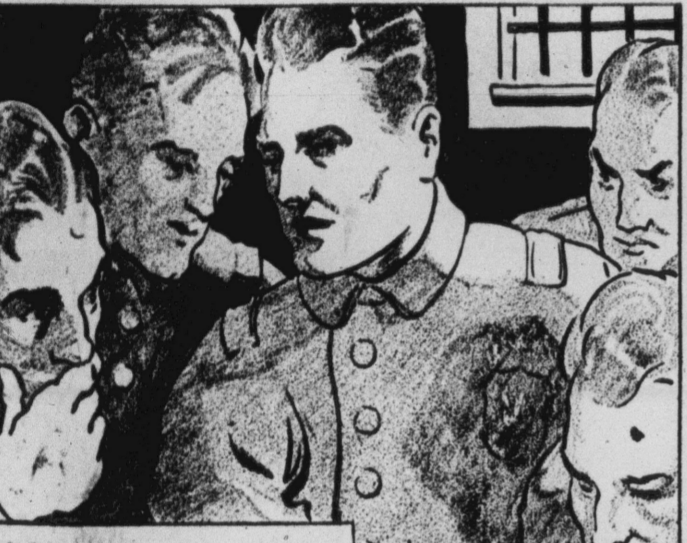
