

DEATH TOLL IN SPANISH REVOLUTION REACHES 104

Hauptmann Case Is Reported Completed Hundreds Hurt As Extremists Push Warfare

FOLEY SAYS ONLY DETAILS REMAIN NOW

Four of Five Alienists Declare Alleged Lindbergh Kidnaper Is Perfectly Sane; Hauptmann Led to Office of Foley Today; His Wife Talks With Him For 15 Minutes

New York, Oct. 6.—(AP)—District Attorney Samuel J. Foley declared today his case against Bruno Richard Hauptmann was complete with exception of the slightest detail.

New York, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Flanked by four deputies, Bruno Richard Hauptmann, alleged Lindbergh extortioner, was taken today from the Bronx County jail to the office of District Attorney Samuel J. Foley. The reason for the move was not divulged.

Mrs. Hauptmann was brought to the office by an assistant to James Fawcett, defense attorney. Hauptmann and his wife were together in Foley's office for about fifteen minutes, after which Mrs. Hauptmann emerged to the ante-room.

New York, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Four of the five alienists who examined Bruno Richard Hauptmann say that the Lindbergh kidnap suspect is sane. Not only is the German carpenter sane, but he shows no signs of ever having suffered any mental ailment, the experts declared in a recent report which they submitted yesterday to District Attorney Samuel J. Foley of Bronx County.

LEAF PRICES HOLDING FIRM

Over Ten Million Dollars Paid Out on the Local Market This Season

The Greenville tobacco market has paid out over ten million dollars during the present season and the sum will be swelled considerably above the mark before the season comes to a close.

The official report of sales made public today by K. W. Cobb, supervisor, showed the market has sold exactly \$10,187,244.98 for 33,579,780 pounds of tobacco at a general average of \$30.34 a hundred pounds. Friday's sales were lighter than usual for this period of the week but the market handled 871,306 pounds of leaf for \$267,714.54 at a general average of \$35.31 a hundred pounds.

Million pound days which marked the first of the season, in fact up to the past week, are a thing of the past now. This is due to the fact that the bulk of the crop has been sold, although there is yet a considerable amount of cured tobacco to be placed on warehouse floors. The price situation has been stronger here this week than any other period of the season. The first of the week saw the general market average nearly reach the forty cents a pound mark. It has held around \$36 a hundred since the early part of the week with indications that continued improvement will be in evidence the remainder of the season.

Greenville has led the belt from the standpoint of prices and this has caused hundreds of growers from other parts of the state to bring their tobacco here for sale. Patrons probably have come from a wider territory this year than ever before and this has been received with general satisfaction by those interested in progress of the market.

AIR ARMADA WILL FLY TO KITTY HAWK

Captain W. J. Tate, of Coinjock, to Make Flight With Government Planes

Fitzhugh City, N. C., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Captain W. J. Tate, employed in the government lighthouse service at Coinjock, will be a guest on one of the airplanes comprising an international air armada which will fly from Washington to the Wright Memorial at Kitty Hawk Monday at the opening event of the annual session of the Federation of Aeronautic International. It was in Captain Tate's home that Orville and Wilbur Wright boarded in the series of experiments leading to the first successful airplane flight in 1903.

Intensely interested in aviation, Captain Tate is North Carolina's president of the National Aeronautic Association and will attend the convention in this capacity. The Federation of Aeronautic International is composed of national aeronautic societies and thirty-three from foreign countries.

The international air fleet will leave Washington Monday morning, proceeding to Kitty Hawk to drop souvenirs on the Wright Memorial and double back to Langley field for inspection of N. A. C. A. laboratories and luncheon at the office of the office in charge. Lack of a landing field at Kitty Hawk will prevent the planes alighting there.

TWO HELD IN LIQUOR CASE

James Brannon and Ike McCoy Bound Over to County Court in Hearing

James Brannon, white, and Ike McCoy, colored, were given preliminary hearing in police court this morning and bound over to the next sitting of County Court on charges of transporting and possession of liquor for sale. They gave bond of \$200 each and were released pending trial.

Brannon, police said, was taken into custody the first of the week while allegedly placing liquor in the store operated by McCoy on Bon-Lane. Two gallons of booze had already been placed in the building when police came out of hiding and took the two men into custody. It was said that about a gallon and a half of booze was found in Brannon's machine parked near the store.

Brannon is charged with transporting whiskey for the purpose of sale, and McCoy is held for possession of whiskey for the purpose of sale.

SENATOR AIDS LIQUOR HAUL

A. B. Corey Chases Rum Runners and Causes Them To Abandon Machine

A. B. Corey, State Senator from Pitt County, turned detective yesterday and aided police in the capture of an automobile containing two five-gallon kegs of whiskey, although two colored men in the machine escaped.

The machine was said to be the property of Louis Adams, white, of Grimesland, and police were busy today in an effort to determine if the machine was stolen by the two negroes who caused so much excitement here yesterday.

Some youths were popping firecrackers in a residential district, and police notified of it, sent a cop to investigate the matter. As the policeman drew near to where the crackers were popped, he noticed a high-powered machine pull away.

Speeding down Greene street the car came mighty near running over Senator Corey who was preparing to drive his car across the intersection. Corey thought the other machine was driven by drunks and gave chase. He followed the machine to Evans and Ninth streets where the car was parked and the two occupants jumped out and fled.

Corey investigated and found two fine looking kegs of liquor in the back of the car. Both the machine and liquor were confiscated by police, who refused to express an opinion until they had interviewed the owner of the automobile.

Senator Corey was highly complimented by law enforcement agencies for his ability as a sleuth, and he carries his new faculty to the state capital next year Pitt County may expect to hear far more from him than it did in the last term although he was quite active.

DRIVING HOOVER CART WHILE DRUNK CHARGED

Sanford, N. C., Oct. 6.—Judge T. J. McPherson of the Lee County recorder's court, frequently has before him persons charged with driving automobiles while under the influence of whiskey, but at this session of the court, before him was George Windham, a Jonesboro white man, charged with driving a Hoover cart, while intoxicated.

Highway Patrolman Roy Fisher testified that he found the man driving the cart in a reckless manner and that he was intoxicated and apparently had no control over the dilapidated vehicle and horse which were coming from one side of the road to the other.

YOUNG SLAYER SENTENCED TO DIE IN CHAIR

Robert Allen Edwards, 'Ladies' Man' Convicted of Slaying Freda McKechnie

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Robert Allen Edwards, the youthful hard coal surveyor who called himself a "ladies' man," was convicted today of the "American tragedy slaying" of Freda McKechnie, unemployed telephone operator.

The jury recommended death in the electric chair. Edwards set a record for the verdict. Only Frank McGuigan, Jr., of the counsel set beside him, the youth listened to the verdict with bowed head and slumped into the chair as the poll of the jury was made.

There were only a few persons in the courtroom when the jury filed in. News writers, less than a dozen spectators and State police were on hand.

Neither Frank McGuigan, Sr., chief of Edwards' counsel nor his assistant, John Phillips, were with him at any time during the morning.

District Attorney Thomas M. Lewis said: "It was a very proper verdict. It has been my hardest task, but justice must prevail."

His assistant, J. Harold Manney, agreed it was a proper verdict. Edwards stumbled as he was handcuffed back to his cell in the county jail. John Phillips, of defense counsel, announced before the case went to the jury at 8:15 last night, that an appeal would be taken.

The jury retired for three hours' sleep at 2:35 o'clock this morning, but came back to take up deliberations at 6 o'clock.

Edwards was accused of bludgeoning to death Miss McKechnie as they swam together in Harvey's Lake the night of July 31. Miss McKechnie was to have become a mother and the State charged that Edwards killed her so he could be free to marry Miss Margaret Crain, East Aurora, N. Y., teacher, whom he had met at Mansfield Teachers' College several years ago.

FLEISCHMANN RETURNS HOME

Baptist Minister Arrives Here Last Night After Vacation in California

Rev. A. W. Fleischmann, pastor of Memorial Baptist Church returned to his home here last night after spending his vacation in San Francisco, California.

Mr. Fleischmann was in California five weeks, and preached four Sundays in the Central Baptist Church at San Francisco.

One of the outstanding members of the church is Dr. John H. Humber, former Greenville man, and one of the leading cancer experts of the world.

Mr. Fleischmann declared there was not much evidence of depression in San Francisco, but noted signs of devastation in Western States where the drought has caused much human suffering and loss of property. He said he was particularly impressed with the desolation in Wyoming and Nebraska where the drought apparently struck with the greatest intensity.

WRIGHT FUND HALF RAISED

New Drive to be Started for Subscriptions To \$10,000 Fund at College

The Robert H. Wright Memorial Fund Committee reports that half the sum, \$10,000, set as the goal, was pledged last spring, but most of it was by members of the college faculty and student groups. There was no intensive drive made outside of college walls then, as the season seemed untimely, but hope to raise the remainder this fall.

There will doubtless be many people in the community who will wish to contribute to the cause, some who were associated with him in community activities, or were personal friends, and others, who are interested in education or in helping young people to help themselves will welcome an opportunity to help build a living, self-perpetuating monument to Dr. Wright, one that will carry on his work in future years.

The twenty-fifth anniversary of the opening of the doors of the college, which marked the beginning of Dr. Wright's active career in the community, is a fitting time for taking up again the cause so near to his heart. He would have rejoiced yesterday to have seen the throng of girls and boys, nearly a thousand, assembled for chapel exercises, and his mind would have gone back to the morning of October 5, 1909 when he faced for the first chapel exercises a small group, about a hundred and fifty.

The material growth in the great institution he built in the quarter of a century is represented by the growth in numbers and by the contrasts of the size then and now of the campus, the number of buildings, the size of the faculty and staff, and in many other things evident to the eye.

The great work he did for education and for young people cannot be so readily seen by the eye. He was greatly interested in helping worthy, but needy, students to remain in college, and from the first the college encouraged loan funds. Many an excellent teacher in the State owes her success to the fact that she was able to borrow from one of these funds. It seemed that no more fitting monument could be established to his memory than a large loan fund.

This fall the faculty committee, composed of Miss Graham, E. L. Henderson and M. L. Wright, will be in charge of the campaign for getting subscriptions for the other \$5,000 needed for completing the fund.

COTTON TAX CERTIFICATES ARRIVE HERE

Farm Office to Begin Distribution of Exemption Tags Next Monday Morning

E. F. Arnold, director of the local farm department, announced this morning that cotton tax exemption certificates had arrived and said distribution would begin next Monday morning.

Letters were being mailed out today notifying cotton producers of the arrival of the certificates and the rush to the farm office the next several days is expected to be pronounced. The farm director made it plain that growers must apply at his office and sign receipts for the certificates.

The certificates are available to all those who applied for allotments under the Bankhead act, except those who applied on a 33 or 34 per cent base. These will be handled on a ten per cent allotment to come out later.

Farmers were requested by the farm head to bring all tenants when they apply for certificates or have them sign the authorization enclosed in the letter mailed out today.

Numbers of farmers have been ready to sign their cotton in this section but were unable to do so because they had not received their certificates. Some have hauled their cotton to gins and left it there while others housed it at home until they could receive permission from the government to begin ginning operations.

A considerable part of the crop has already been picked in this county and the rush for tax exemption certificates is expected to hit its full stride Monday morning and continue until all growers have ginned their crop and placed it on the market.

NEGRO AGAIN IN TOILS LAW

Louis Batts, Who Paid Fine Several Days Ago Nabbed Again Last Night

Louis Batts, colored, fined \$100 in County Court last Tuesday and released with a twelve-months' suspended sentence hanging over his head for violation of the prohibition law, again fell into the toils of the law last night on a similar charge.

Given preliminary hearing in police court this morning, the negro was bound over to the next session of County Court under bond of \$200 and was remanded to jail in default of bail.

Several days ago police raided the home of Lizzie Braxton, colored, and found several gallons of whiskey. Batts claimed the liquor was his and Lizzie Braxton went free. Later police again raided the woman's home and found a quantity of whiskey in her possession. She was arrested, given hearing in County Court and sentenced to ten months in prison. She claimed she was sick and she was ordered held in jail until an examination could be made to determine whether she was able to serve time along with some work thrown in to keep her occupied in a more lawful way.

Police described both as old offenders of the law, but this last offense of Batts is expected to put him on the roads long enough so that it will be quite a while before he sins against the public again.

NEW CLASHES REPORTED IN ASTURIAS AREA

New Outbreak Occurs Just as Premier Issues Statement That Fighting Has Ended; Anarchists, Communists and Socialists Take Part in Uprising; At Least 350 Persons Are Wounded

Madrid, Oct. 6.—The death toll in Spain's extremist revolution mounted to 104 persons at noon today with at least 150 wounded as machine guns, rifles and pistols obliterated the government statement that tranquility had been restored.

At dawn the death list stood at 99 and the government Premier, Alexander Lerroux, against which the anarchists, communists and socialists have declared war, stated the revolution was a failure and that troops were being drawn from most of the battle fronts of the last two days.

Suddenly the extremists renewed battle. Eleven persons were killed in a clash during the morning. Trouble in the mining district of Asturias accounted for six of the morning's dead.

In Madrid a boy of fourteen, on his way to school, and an unidentified laborer, were killed when caught in a cross fire between extremists and civil guards in the Cuatro Caminos district.

Final rites for Mrs. Annie Jones, 65, who died at her home near Bethel yesterday morning at 1:45 o'clock after illness of one year, were conducted from her late home this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Rev. Leslie Newman, pastor of the Bethel Baptist Church, assisted by Rev. J. O. Long, pastor of the Bethel Methodist Church, conducted the funeral and burial was made in the Taylor graveyard near Bethel.

Mrs. Jones was a native of Martin County, having moved to Bethel about 35 years ago where she has made her home. She was a faithful member of the Cross Roads Disciple Church in Martin County and manifested much interest in work of the congregation until ill health forced her retirement.

She is survived by four children: Charlie and Henry Jones, of Bethel; William J. Jones, Parmele; Mrs. Maggie Andrews, of Bethel, and a sister, Mrs. Lucy Roberson, of the Gum Swamp Church community.

The explanation is that Lou Brock, the young filmical producer, is a wireless fan, after a fashion, and he has friends and relatives who also like to "talk" to strangers. Brock, as befits a producer catering to cash customers, can't talk back. He hears the remarks only through the good offices of a friend who knows the code.

And when one of his pictures opens in a city where one of the friends or relatives lives, Brock can expect a direct reaction from critical customers right away. He is interested—very.

Goes In For 'Departures'

For Brock is an apostle of "departures" in filmical technique. He demonstrated some of them in his academy prize-winning short, "So This Is Harris," which opened the way to feature demonstrations with "Flying Down to Rio" and "Down to Their Last Yacht." He was not so pleased with the latter, although it's making money. The picture that had him in contemplative ecstasies is his next, "Adios, Argentina!"

The picture has no cast as yet, but it has a story—and I have three ideas for numbers that'll knock them off their feet," Brock asserts confidently.

For fifteen years, as a film man in foreign countries representing American companies, Brock traveled and learned.

That's why he's a stickler for

authentic backgrounds when pictures have foreign settings.

Says Surface Is 'Unscratched'

Because a picture is laid in Argentina to court, consider it a sufficient excuse to use "stock Spaniards" and Hollywood ideas of what Argentina is like. Nor is the fact that a film is musical reason enough to forget plot and discard all realism, in his opinion.

"We haven't scratched the surface in screen music," he avers. "The backstage setting, so long a standby, is practically gone. The next step has been the mechanical spectacle." Another cycle has been the screening of old and popular operettas. I believe things like those have had their day—they were for their own time, but for the screen of today we need novelty, new ideas, new stories and departures in the manner of presenting them."

"The wireless reports," he adds incidentally, have been gratifying.

tion of Labor and invitation to organized industrialists that they sponsor the banding of their employees into industrial unions.

Whether he had Presidential benediction cannot be said. The proposal was the more noteworthy, however, for having been made shortly after the Roosevelt-Johnson conferences at Hyde Park.

"I'll take," industrial employes and the public agree with the NRA chieftain, changes in capital-labor relations will be looked for. How these will operate as compared with present methods may decide whether Johnson is hero or villain.

If it results only in more friction and uncertainty, who knows but that the public will clamor for his retirement in a way that can't be denied?

Type of Union
"Toughy" Johnson, as they called him in the army in "shavetail" days, would be a hard man to choke off however. Should the noise be drawn, it may take only his NRA head and leave him fighting mad to be reckoned with while the battle goes ahead.

This was obviously no impetuous suggestion. Despite the off-and-on-

kind words between the administrator and organized labor leaders, both had long been chafing. But previous attempts at a showdown had fallen short.

Now it seems inescapable, with an issue being drawn as between craft or horizontal unions and industrial or vertical unions, the Federation of Labor's forthcoming convention is expected to focus the dispute.

The Federation, he said, harbors both sorts of unions. Heretofore attempts to barking about a preponderance of vertical organizations have been licked. But one of the powers in the A. F. of L., John L. Lewis, is pressing again to have more unions modeled after his United Mine Workers.

Some Possibilities
Addressing the industrialists, who awarded him loudly, Johnson took care to recommend "not company unions, but industrial ones—one for the steel industry, one for the cotton industry and so forth."

It remained to be seen just how the owner-managements would initiate the move, or whether they would seek ways of preventing a possible ultimate affiliation of the new set-ups with the Federation.

One interesting possibility is for Johnson's idea to be carried out and eventually result in a stronger A. F. of L. but one unlike the present.

This could happen if it should become a federation composed almost exclusively of industrial unions embracing more workers than joined under its aegis today.

KILLER IS GIVEN 15 TO 20 YEARS

Rockingham, N. C., Oct. 6.—J. B. Watkins, aged 30, was today given from 15 to 20 years in State Prison for killing W. C. Jarrell here August 29. Watkins was tried for first degree murder. But the jury found him guilty of manslaughter. Judge Clement in sentencing him stated that in his opinion it was premeditated murder, but that Watkins appeared not overly bright and appeared to be mentally influenced by the knowledge that Jarrell, aged 63 was intimate with his estranged wife. That Watkins had planned the killing is shown by a conversation he had with the State's executioner some weeks ago when he remarked that he might shortly be in the penitentiary on Death Row, as he intended killing Jarrell. The jury evidently considered Watkins' mental disturbance, and gave him the lighter verdict on basis of the "unwritten law."

Six Nations Discus Joint Bank
Ankara.—(AP)—Six states—Turkey, Bulgaria, Greece, Albania, Rumania and Yugoslavia—are discussing a plan to foster economic relations by establishing a "Bank of the Balkans." There would be branches in all six capitals and in Istanbul.

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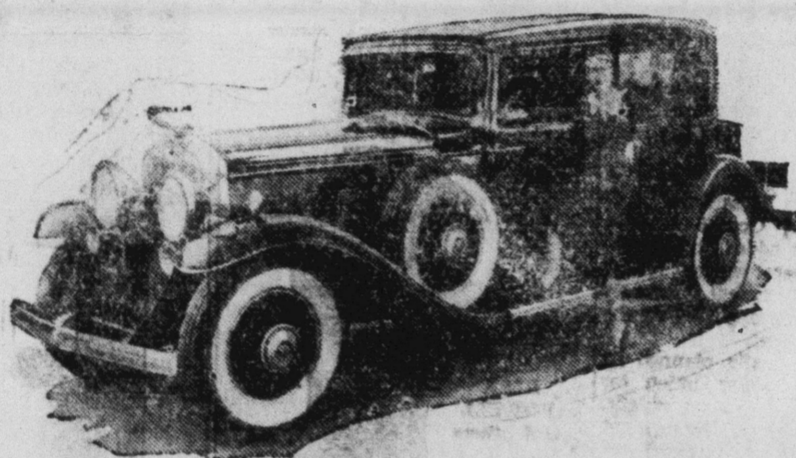

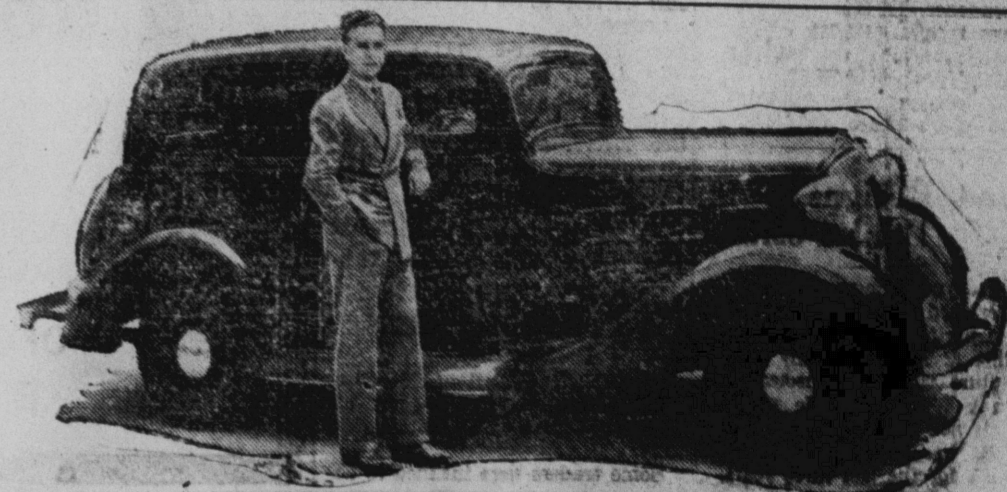

URGE HELP IN GREAT BATTLE SET FOR DUKE COMING WEEK

Firemen Here Taking Active Part in Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 4 to 10

Firemen were turning their attention today to observance of "Fire Prevention Week" launched through out the nation from October 4 to 10.

Proclamations, calling on the people to observe the week, have been issued by President Roosevelt, Governor Ehringhaus, and Fire Commissioner Boney and other steps taken to make the week everything expected of it.

Chief George Gardner of the local department said today the loss by fire in North Carolina is \$20,000,000 annually, or \$100,000,000 every five years. This enormous cost can be materially removed by remedying or removing the common causes of fire from homes and places of business, the fire chief said.

Common causes of fire as listed by the department are, Rubbish especially in basements or attics unprotected joists above furnaces, stove pipes and furnace pipes too close to woodwork, joists resting on brick chimney, stove pipe too close to ceiling, old shingle roof, inflammable cleaning fluids, defective chimneys and flues, matches left in reach of children and rats, old and rusted stove pipes, soring car under or near house, careless smoking, electric drop cords hung on nails, radio antenna not properly grounded, bridge electric fuses, wood box too close to stove, oil or gasoline stoves sweeping in registers, ashes in wooden boxes, furniture polish and other oily rags allowed to accumulate, no mat under stove, careless use of electric iron and other electrical appliances, chimneys not high enough above roof and carelessness with matches.

In an effort to remove all hazards possible during the prevention week the department has offered its services to the public in inspecting the main cause of fire. Firemen are interested in their work of cutting down annual loss of the community and are throwing their influence into the education campaign of "Fire Prevention Week."

Hearing on Cottonseed Code

Washington, D. C., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Secretary Wallace today set October 15 as the date for a public hearing at Memphis, Tenn., on a proposed code for the cottonseed crushing industry.

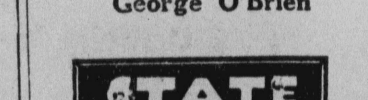

The first was Professor Raymond Moley. In the early days of the administration, Moley, as head of the "brain trust," was the most-talked-of man in the "new deal." Then came the London economic conference and Moley's retirement from the scene of action.

Next came young Lewis Douglas as director of the budget. During the economy drive in Congress Douglas was commonly supposed to be the man closest to the White House. Then gradually he moved out of the limelight until he was permitted to quit the stage entirely.

The General Johnson era of the "new deal" is the most striking illustration of the way a single personality dominated the Washington scene. For more than a year the

General held the spotlight uncontested. He excited the imagination of the whole country as well as of the world as no "deal dealer" has except the President. But he, too, has made his exit.

Climbed To Top

Thus they have come and gone. Richberg, from a more or less obscure position in national affairs, has climbed steadily to the top of the heap. Now he apparently is to have his day. He has the titles, the power—in fact, practically everything necessary for an unprecedented position in the "new deal."

Will he, too, have his day as the others and then finally move on? Or will he so function as to make of himself the undisputed holder of the title "New Dealer No. 2?"

MINERAL CONTAINING GOLD FOUND IN PLATINUM ORE

Leningrad—(AP)—Professor Zviagustev, of the Platinum Institute, has announced the discovery in platinum ore of a mineral hitherto

unknown. It contains iridium, osmium, gold and ruthenium. The new mineral is described as being white with a silvery metallic appearance.

It is found in small grains of irregular shape together with platinum, is very hard, fragile and of a high specific gravity.

Analysis showed the mineral to be a solid solution of gold, osmium and ruthenium in iridium.
