GERMANY TO CUT COMMERCIAL TREATY WITH U. S.

Spain Suspends Phone Service To France Another Trade Agreement Will Be Sought Soon

ATTEMPT TO HALT FALSE NEWS SPREAD

Divers Other Means Of Communication Left Open by Government; Spain to Give Accurate Information Abroad On Conditions Existing There

Paris, Oct. 13.—(AP)—All international telephone communications with Spain were cut today and the Spanish embassy here announced that the government at Madrid had suspended the French telephone service to prevent "the transmission of false news with the deliberate purpose of injuring Spain."

Sanford, N. C., Oct. 13.—An accident with near-serious consequences occurred at 5:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon when an automobile driven by A. F. Jordan, owner of the Commercial Cafe of this city, and one driven by Weedy Kelly, a colored chauffeur of Carthage, collided at the intersection of Carthage and Gulf Streets.

In the car driven by Kelly were Miss Annie Lee McDonald and Mrs. George Muse, of Carthage, both of whom received minor injuries. Mr. Jordan suffered a broken shoulder bone and other injuries and was taken to Lee County Hospital, as was Kelly, who suffered injuries to his chest.

C., Oct. 13.—(AP)—The economically harassed German government today made a drastic move to clarify its involved economic and financial relations with the United States by announcing its intention of terminating its unconditional most favored national commercial treaty with this country on October 14, 1935.

Consumption Drops. Washington, Oct. 13.—(AP)—Cotton consumption during the September was reported by the census bureau today to have totaled 295,990 bales of lint and 54,690 of lint compared with 499,482 of lint and 74,666 of linters during September last year.

Imports for September totaled 7,870 bales compared with 10,940 bales in September last year.

Exports from September totaled 479,861 bales of lint and 195,488 of linters compared with 869,244 of lint and 5,910 of linters for September last year.

Child King Takes Throne. Belgrade, Oct. 13.—(AP)—A scene of unprecedented popular acclamation greeted the child king Peter as he arrived today to take the throne of his assassinated father.

Peter arrived at 9 A. M. accompanied by the widowed queen and her mother Dowager Queen Marie of Rumania.

Three weeks ago the 11 year old Peter left here as a simple school boy on his way to England to be educated. Today he returned a king.

City Appeals \$32,825 Verdict

Greensboro, N. C., Oct. 13.—After ten days of high-powered legal conflict, Guilford Superior Court yesterday afternoon late heard a jury bring in a verdict giving Tom Pemberton and his wife \$12,825 damages against the city of Greensboro for damages to their real estate and \$20,000 damages to their dairy herd and other personal property. Pemberton was suing for \$227,000. Counsel for the city at once gave notice of appeal to the State Supreme Court.

Pemberton claimed the city was negligent in handling sewage at its treatment plant and that his bottom lands were infected with anthrax in 1931 causing the loss of his dairy herd and business, as well as the section of his land.

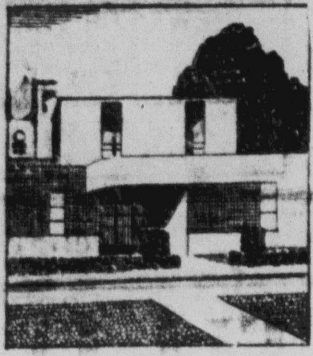
Clemency Plea For Doomed Goldsboro Slayer to be Presented Friday

Raleigh, N. C., Oct. 13.—(AP)—Counsel for Rufus Satterfield, who faces electrocution on October 26 as the convicted murderer of Herbert Grice of Goldsboro, will appear before Edwin Gill, Parole Commissioner, Friday to present clemency pleas.

C. All of the injured were brought to Henderson for treatment, Fleming being held in jail here, and, while no charges have been preferred against him, Sheriff J. E. Hamlett, who investigated the accident, said he would probably be charged with reckless and careless driving and damaging property on the highway.

awful lot of attention to next month's elections and plan to start their serious recruiting next year. Competent neutral observers nevertheless doubt that 1936 will produce any definite realignments. They predict personalities will overshadow and confuse the efforts to make voters forget old party labels and accept new ones.

Also, Democrats—whether liberal or conservative—will think a long time before giving up their party name. This is particularly true in the so-called Solid South where Democracy is a religion.

Aid: After many long and dark months the railroads are beginning to think they can detect a ray of light.

In the first place they have a hunch the Interstate Commerce Commission is going to grant them all or part of the 7 per cent rate increase they have demanded. This wish may be father to thought, but some of the biggest railroads believe they have such a good case that the I. C. C. won't be able to turn them down.

Further, they are looking for President Roosevelt to demand of Congress in January that competing bus, truck and water transportation be regulated immediately.

Either gesture will be a Godsend to the carriers staggering as they are under mounting deficits. If they should get both they will start believing in Santa Claus again.

It will be late January or early February before the I. C. C. hands down a decision on the rate-increase plea. Prolonged hearings have to be held in key cities all over the country, following which the roads will be given ample time to prepare their final briefs and arguments.

Some of the railroad men thought at first it was a mistake to ask for a general increase, which would take in agricultural commodities. Their brothers in arms convinced them that the roads have a compelling argument even to get the farmer's rates up a little. It is being pointed out that government money has been poured into grains, hogs and catch, and that therefore the carriers should be entitled to a slice of the manna.

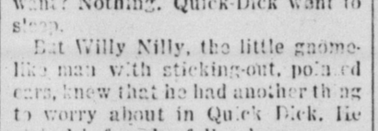
Now he would be able to settle down more, and talk more quietly of the old days.

June 30. Preliminary estimates indicate it was in excess of \$15,000,000 end mounting steadily. Tons of stuff have gone out from NRA alone.

Forecast: The smallest cotton crop since 1890, with one exception, is in prospect for 1934. The estimate is 9,443,000 bales. This is 1,917,000 bales less than the Bankhead limitation.

Some Americans returning from abroad say it's a big mistake to curtail cotton production while foreign countries are increasing output—especially Soviet Russia, the Sudan, India, Argentina and Brazil. Other travelers see the cut as wise provision of permanently reduced outlets for the South's great staple. American cotton exports are now up to par and they are going up against increasing competition.

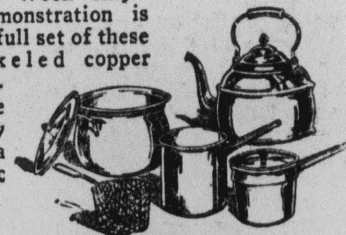
