Loot Taken From Moore's Bank Swells to \$22,128

THREE HELD AS SUSPECTS AT YORK, S. C.

Charlotte Men Arrested in York for Part in Moore's Bank Robbery; Fingerprints Sent to Washington; State Prison Reports Prints Check With Escaped Convict

Mooreville, N. C., Nov. 30.—(AP)—The loot of four bandits who held up the First National Bank at Mooreville here Wednesday was revealed today to be \$22,128.

Shortly after the robbery the bank officials estimated the amount taken at between \$4,000 and \$5,000, but announced this morning that an audit showed \$10,128 in cash and \$12,000 in negotiable bonds was missing.

The men held were booked as Mark Johnson, Ben F. Johnson and Charles Miller, all of Charlotte.

Raleigh, N. C., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Identification experts at State's Prison here today said the fingerprints of a man held at York, S. C., under the name of B. F. Johnson, tallied with those of Ben Johnson who escaped July 15 from the State Sanatorium while serving 18 months for larceny.

TWO HELD FOR FORGERY HERE

Ayden Young Men Charged With Passing Checks Here and At Washington

Two alleged check flashers were being held under bond for Superior Court action today after being nabbed here the first of the week while attempting to pass forged checks at a bank and local business houses.

Johnnie McLawhorn, 21, and Linwood McLawhorn, 15, of the Ayden community, were released under bond following preliminary hearing in the court Wednesday on five separate charges of forgery.

They are alleged to have forged checks amounting to approximately \$50 on Ben Robinson of the Ayden community. Checks were said by police to have been passed at a local bank, two or three business houses and two at Washington.

One of the youths, it was stated, had returned to the bank here to get his last check cashed when he was taken into custody. The bankers had investigated a check cashed during the early part of the day and seized one of the youths when he presented the second check for payment. The other one was taken into custody later.

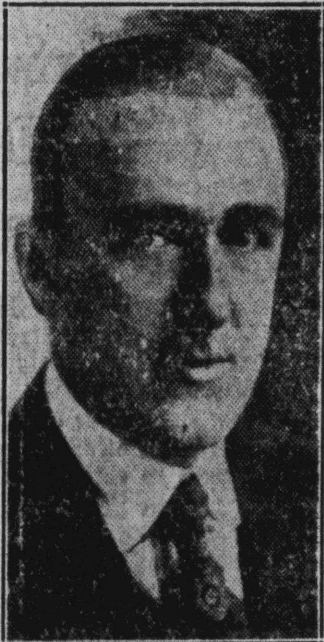
The prisoners were said to have admitted the forgeries when questioned by police.

IDENTIFY FIVE BODIES FOUND IN MOUNTAINS

R. U. Noakes of California Goes to Carlisle, Pa., to Claim Relatives' Remains

Rosville, Cal., Nov. 30.—(AP)—R. U. Noakes will leave for Pennsylvania today to claim the bodies of five persons found dead there, convicted in the mountains near here and of a man and woman slain in a shack near Altoona were those of Elmo J. Noakes, of Rosville, Cal., his niece Winifred Pierce, 18, and his three daughters, Cordelia, 8, Bewilla, 10, and Norma, 12.

State police investigators also held the conviction that the man killed his daughters by suffocation, laid the bodies under a blanket on the mountain side and later shot his niece and took his own life at a railroad shanty at Duncannon, about 100 miles further west. The motive, however, was lacking.

It was the finding of the abandoned automobile at Mazeytown, midway between Carlisle and Duncannon that provided the clue to the identities of the bodies. By means of the automobile serial number that police at Rosville learned the car was sold to Noakes on October 31 by a Sacramento dealer. They learned further that Noakes, a fruit shipping company employe, had left his home in Rosville either November 11 or 12 with his niece and daughter without collecting two weeks pay due him.

MAN SAWS OUT OF CITY JAIL

Police Seeking Otis Moore Who Escaped From Calaboose Early Thursday

A man believed by police to have been suffering from what they described as "moonkeys," sawed his way out of the city jail Wednesday night and today had made good his escape.

Chief of Police George Clark revealed this morning that Otis Moore, 38, who has his address at Johnson City, Tenn., and who was being held here for questioning regarding his peculiar conduct, was being sought after employing expert tactics in breaking out of the calaboose.

Using saws believed by police to have been concealed in his shoes, Moore sawed his way out of a cell and then through the bars of a window in the jail lobby. The escape was believed to have been made about 3 o'clock Thursday morning. The man was taken into custody about 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon.

Chief Clark said Moore represented himself over telephone and then in conversations with police as being a member of the "United States Department of Detectives," a salesman, and private detective seeking a kidnapper believed to be in this section, when it was decided to take him into custody for examination. The police head said they thought the man probably had escaped from some asylum and desired to hold him until they could confer with police in other sections of the county.

After escaping from jail, Moore returned to a hotel where he had been staying since the last of last week, left his key on the bed and escaped without paying his bill.

Police said he was riding in an old car when he was arrested and that he left town in it.

HUGE LIQUOR STILL NABBED

Forty Gallons of Liquor and 500 Gallon Steam Plant Captured Near Red Banks

The Thanksgiving liquor supply was diminished somewhat by sheriff's officers in four or five raids in various parts of the county during the early part of the week. It was made known today.

The largest and most important of the raids was that made Wednesday near Red Banks in which forty gallons of whiskey, four thousand gallons of beer, a steam plant and accessories fell into hands of the officers.

The still was running at full blast, but four men said to have been looking after the plant escaped. The distillers obtained a view of the officers as they were crossing the river and immediately fled.

TWO DEATHS IN CAROLINAS ON THANKSGIVING

Accidental Discharge Of Guns Cause Loss Of Two Lives in the Two States

Charlotte, N. C., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Business activities returned to normal today in the Carolinas after an almost complete shutdown over Thanksgiving.

Federal, State, county and municipal government offices were closed during the holidays, and business as a general rule, also closed for the day. Special church services were held in many places.

Two fatalities were ascribed to the day's activities. Thomas Reid Tomlin, 21-year-old Cold Springs youth, was accidentally shot and killed while rabbit hunting, and Mrs. Adrian C. McManus, 34, socially prominent Greensboro woman, was accidentally killed by her husband at Greenville, S. C., while he was examining a new shotgun after his return from a hunting trip.

No serious automobile wrecks occurred.

SWIFT CREEK TO GET RELIEF

Work on Incompleted Drainage Project to Begin in Near Future

Washington, N. C., Nov. 30.—Congressman Warren has obtained speedy relief for the citizens of the Swift Creek section of Pitt County and within two weeks the incompleted drainage project in that vicinity will be resumed again.

This news comes to Congressman Warren from J. M. Coleman, Director Works Division of the ERA. The project which has caused great anxiety to the people of Swift Creek was started several months ago and then abandoned. It caused water to pond and a very serious malaria condition resulted. For a long time citizens have been trying to get some remedied.

Congressman Warren took the matter up direct with Harry L. Hopkins, National Administrator of the ERA, who assured him that a quick investigation would be made. His investigation viewed the situation a few days after and now the order has been issued to again start the project.

While out of the city the office of the administrator will be in charge of Mrs. W. L. Whitchard.

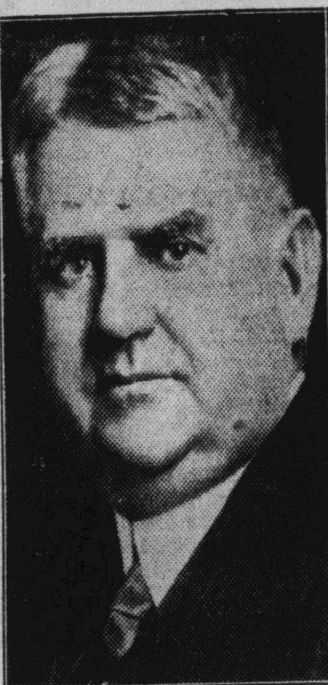

BLONDE BEING SOUGHT OVER A WIDE FRONT

Police Believe Woman's Arrest Will Bring John Hamilton, Dillinger Gang Leader, to Justice; Both Believed With "Baby Face" Nelson When he Was Slain

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 30.—(AP)—Find the woman and show her no quarter! This was the stern order Federal agents were under today as they hunted Mrs. Helen Gillis, 94-pound synthetic blonde widow of George "Baby Face" Nelson, leader of the rapidly diminishing remnants of the gang of the late John Dillinger.

Through her capture Federal, as well as State, county and city police hope to bring to justice John Hamilton, believed to have been with Nelson's widow when Nelson was fatally wounded late Tuesday in a machine gun battle at Barrington in which Inspector Samuel P. Cowley and Special Agent Herman Hollis perished in the government's drive against the nation's public enemies.

It is all very confusing. And no doubt irritating to Mr. Roosevelt, who must iron it all out personally. Sideline observers here hope his future moves are more adroit than the Ickes-Mofett "harmony" statement which was dictated at Warm Springs and phoned to Washington for release under their names.

Slans' Floyd Cliscn, Minnesota's big Farm-Labor Governor, paid a visit to Senator William E. Borah's office during the course of his recent visit to Washington. Borah had been attacking Harry Hopkins' methods of administering federal relief. Olson thought the Senator was all wet on some of his major premises.

The governor took particular exception to that part of Borah's recent radio speech in which the Senator quoted figures from certain unnamed sources indicating almost every cent of government money went for administration and only a few dollars for actual relief. "Why you might say that in a lot of counties \$8000 went for administration and \$10 for relief," the Governor admonished, "and it would be true far as federal money was concerned. A lot of counties let Washington's contributions take care of hiring office help while county money pays for the relief itself."

New York By JAMES McMULLIN Coup: The utility house is divided against itself. The Edison Institute's vigorous attack on the New Deal power program (predicted here some weeks ago) points at a sharp internal split.

Recent efforts of pacific elements in the industry to seek a rapprochement with the administration via Harvey Couch haven't sat so well with Tom McCarter—aggressive president of the Institute—and his supporters. It looked very much as if their flaming antagonism to what they consider an unfair threat against their very existence was

about to be drowned in the rising tide of business cooperation with the government. McCarter's vocabulary doesn't contain the word "concession". Insiders credit him with a neat coup to escape having his flag hauled down for him by mutinous advocates of better relations. He sought the legal aid of Newton Baker and James M. Beck on his own unofficial initiative to prove TVA unconstitutional. Naturally he knew in advance their opinions would jibe with his. Then—armed with this weighty legal artillery—he sold the Edison Institute's trustees the idea that he had grounds for an open declaration of war on the New Deal.

Good Report on Housing. Warm Springs, Ga., Nov. 30.—(AP)—President Roosevelt received an encouraging report from James Moffett, housing administrator, today on the modernization and repair of homes program.

Rivers On Rampage. Raleigh, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Rivers of Eastern North Carolina overflowed their banks today as the result of the heaviest Thanksgiving Day rainfall ever recorded in this section.

The Neuse river was in very heavy flood. Lee a Denson, in charge of the U. S. Weather Bureau here said.

Crabtree Creek which empties into the Neuse, late yesterday and last night overflowed the approaches to the bridge over it on highway 1 between here and Wake Forest.

W. Vance Baise, acting chief of state highway engineers, said at least two bridges over the Tar river on county roads in Granville county, had washed out and some bridges are going in Warren county.

"I wouldn't be surprised if there was pretty heavy and general damage in the whole section from what I am hearing but our men are out checking, putting up warning signs and arranging to take care of traffic as best we can and I won't get detail information until tonight or later," he said.

At midday today no reports of state highway being blocked by high waters or damaged bridges had been received, but word was coming in that miles of dirt shoulders had been washed away.

The wather man said it would take from 6 to 7 days for the crest of the flood in the Neuse to reach the vicinity of Kinston.

It was predicted the Cape Fear at Fayetteville would overflow its banks and reach a depth of 35 feet.

The most easterly point in North America is Cape Charles, Labrador.

New York Cotton. New York, Nov. 30.—(AP)—Cotton futures were steady, six to nine points decline in response to lower Liverpool cables which was partly offset by trade and foreign buying. The relatively easy Liverpool cables brought in considerable liquidation which continued after the call and prices sagged off another point or two with December selling down to 12.48 and March to 12.60, of about ten to eleven points net lower. The market held fairly steady at the end of the first half hour with active months about six to ten points net lower. Realizing continued during the middle of the morning, but it was absorbed by trading and scattered demand from local or Wall Street sources. Prices held fairly steady after the early decline of some eight to twelve points. At today the market was quieter with December selling around 12.54 and March 12.61, or about five to ten points net lower.
