VICTORY FOR TAX PROPOSAL IS FORECAST

(Continued from Page One) And there is always the chance that the money may run out before the court untangles the 50-odd injunctions which now block erection of competing systems.

RECORD: When HOLC Chairman Fahy was summoned to Washington to salvage the housing corporation, he found it full of politicians from cellar to rafters.

Now he's quietly going over his books to separate the sweet from the sour mortgages Uncle Sam has underwritten.

But the politicians don't like his methods. Instead of firing Democratic office-holders individually responsible for blunders, they want him to cover up records of mistakes.

SOLONS: President Roosevelt is remaking the federal judiciary faster than most people realize. His numerous appointments of New Deal judges sharpens the issue raised by Senator Dickinson—namely, that Rooseveltians will dominate the bench if he is re-elected.

In three years Mr. Roosevelt has had the appointment of about 20 per cent of the membership of the federal district court and 10 per cent of circuit court personnel. Most of the places fell vacant during the last year, for Taft, Wilson and even Harding appointees are growing old.

In most instances Mr. Roosevelt has named New Deal believers, which explains why he has fared better in lower courts than before the high tribunals. His closest advisers are jubilant at this unimposed development. They frequently assure each other that if their chief's reforms live, it must be through the courts. For the judges make the law these days.

TALE: Gov. All Landon has taken to telling of a collegiate escapade to offset the impression that he is a rabid dry. His friends are repeating it in spots where it will do the most good.

### Politics at random

Without any of the customary ostentation and ballyhoo, a senate committee is undertaking modestly an investigation which, unlike most senate inquiries may have a profound effect on the future operation of the federal government.

The committee is charged with making a "full and complete study" of the vast tangle of departments, bureaus, boards, commissions and other agencies embraced in the governmental structure. A report is to be presented a year hence.

The interest which thoughtful officials find in this effort does not arise from anything novel about the idea itself, for it is a very old idea indeed. The new thing about it is the widespread belief that something really may be done about government reorganization, after a long record of failures involving both political parties.

In large part this expectation of results is traceable to the fact that the guiding spirit of the present effort is Senator Byrd of Virginia, whose earnestness of purpose is evident and whose background of experience makes him an authority.

For years public men have professed to agree almost unanimously that the governmental machine at Washington should be simplified and coordinated. Yet the issue has been tossed about endlessly in a whirlpool of wordy promises, fragmentary effort, and final non-performance.

On February 13, 1923, President Harding even went so far as to submit to congress a detailed plan. It proposed, among other things, consolidation of the war and navy departments, and the grouping of a multitude of loose administrative ends under a new department of education and welfare. It got nowhere. President Hoover's repeated espousal of reorganization is well known. He also made recommendations, and he likewise created so many new commissions that the opposition party complained bitterly. President Roosevelt stands for reorganization, but the multiplication of governmental agencies under his administration has been constant and progressive.

### Men's Bible Class Sponsoring Contest

The Byrd resolution was introduced January 9. Outwardly the immediate response was most encouraging. It was assumed that Byrd, as author of the proposal, would be (as he is now) chairman of the committee, and everyone seemed to think that especially fitting.

When, ten years ago, Byrd became governor of Virginia, there were more than 100 state departments, boards, and bureaus. When he retired four years later, there were 12. About 30 had been abolished, the others consolidated. A deficit of \$2,500,000 had been changed to a surplus of \$5,000,000.

Nevertheless, something happened to the Byrd resolution. For six weeks the proposal hung fire in committee, for reasons still unexplained. A less tenacious senator probably would have given up.

One thing debated was how much money should be given the investigators. Byrd asked for an expense fund of \$50,000, from a senate which had spent three quarters of a million on investigations since 1933, and had voted billions for other purposes without turning a hair.

Wouldn't \$10,000 be enough? Byrd said it would not. Finally he succeeded in getting \$20,000.

It may never be possible to fathom the true inwardness of this situation—to establish whether the delay and hesitation had any relation to Senator Byrd's frequent disagreement with administration policy, or to the fact that curtailment of governmental bureaus might mean loss of senate patronage.

At any rate, it serves as a warning of possible difficulties still ahead. But Senator Byrd is a man of purpose and determination, keenly interested in results in this one special direction. If anyone can, at last, succeed in doing something about reorganization, perhaps he is the man who can.

RATE HEARING VERDICT SOON

At the present time, Judge Cowper has only two weeks open in which he could preside over another special term to hear additional oral arguments and hand down a decision. Commission Winborne said today, these are the weeks of March 23 and of April 27.
