HOUSING PLAN RULED INVALID IN TEST TRIAL

Resettlement Administration Declared Unconstitutional

COURT APPEALS DECIDES ISSUE

Test Case Resulted From Plans for Model Community in N. J. County

Washington, May 18.—(AP)—The resettlement administration was declared unconstitutional today by a majority of the United States court of appeals for the District of Columbia.

In a test case which resulted from plans for a model community at Franklin, in Somerset county, New Jersey, the appellate court found there was no constitutional power conferred upon the federal government to regulate housing or to "resettle" population.

Rexford G. Tugwell, in charge of the resettlement administration, deferred comment pending study of the opinion. It was decided by Associate Justice Van Orsdel and concurred in by Chief Justice Martin and Associate Justice Robb.

The other two members, Justices Crozer and Stephens, agreed that constitutional authority was lacking in this case, but said the court should not have passed upon validity of the entire program.

The appellate court reversed the ruling of the District of Columbia Supreme court which had upheld the validity of the resettlement program and denied an injunction against New Jersey project, fought by a group of tax payers.

Referring to opinions of the United States Supreme court which found NRA, AAA and the original "hot oil" control act unconstitutional, Justice Van Orsdel said the same legal flaws were found in the resettlement administration.

"There is nothing in the act directly prescribing the power or duties of the president with the respect to housing," he said.

Washington, May 18.—(AP)—Attacking the 1935 relief act through a test case involving the resettlement administration in the District of Columbia court of appeals held today it transgressed the constitution.

Three of the five judges ruled, as had the Supreme Court in the NRA and AAA case, that the law appropriating \$4,880,000,000 delegated powers improperly to President Roosevelt and violated state's rights. The resettlement administration was considered invalid.

New Deal officials conferred at once on the decision. Whether an appeal would be taken was uncertain.

A spokesman for Harry L. Hopkins said the world relief program would dispute the decision.

The sweeping opinion of the court indicated that certain types of relief projects were unconstitutional, saying:

"We are not here confronted with an appropriation for internal improvements of a national character or importance or the erection of public buildings or the grant of loans to states and municipalities to carry out public works projects.

"This can be done," he said, either by calling on the local communities at their homes or by calling at the County Agents' office.

Farmers who have not signed work sheets will not be eligible to apply for grants under the Soil Conservation Act. Mr. Arnold urged that all farmers who intend to make application, do so at once.

Seven Persons Left Dead By Armed Band Of Lepers

Desperate Group Spreads Terror Among Inhabitants Following Bloody Dash From Culion Island Leprosarium in Boats

Manila, May 18.—(AP)—Six desperate Moro lepers fled before the constabulary today after killing seven men in a bloody dash from the Culion island leprosarium.

The armed lepers, under the leadership of one who called himself "Abdulrah," killed four fishermen, seized a boat and fled the colony for Palawan and neighboring islands where their ruthlessness spread terror among the inhabitants.

Stopping on Aboaba island, the marauders killed three more persons and robbed Chinese stores.

Then they proceeded to Bonobono where they attacked another Chinese merchant, but citizens of the town gathered in forces and drove them away. They seized another boat and escaped to sea.

A call for help brought the soldiers to Bonobono a few hours later. They were told that the lepers said they were sailing for Borneo.

Citizens told the soldiers they feared to seize the lepers because they were afraid of infection from the disease. Lack of police force on the isolated islands left the desperadoes a free hand.

NAME COLONEL BOLIVIA HEAD STRAW BALLOT IS CLASSIFIED

Provisional Junta Rules South American Country

La Paz, Bolivia, May 18.—(AP)—A provisional junta of soldiers and socialists ruled Bolivia today after the civil government of President Jose Luis Sorzano fell in a peaceful military coup.

The new council called Colonel David Toro back from the Gran Chaco to become president, gained suspension of a general strike movement and proclaimed as its objective to "orient the nation toward a socialistic state by prudent, gradual means, x x x"

Advices from the interior indicated absolute tranquility prevailed throughout the South American state of almost 3,000,000 people.

Colonel German Busch, acting chief of the Bolivian army general staff, led the swift successful La Paz coup de etat.

So sudden and unexpected was the movement that President Sarzano worked at his desk until late Saturday night, left the palace without noticing the slightest indication of a plot and announced he would return to his office this morning.

James H. Hodges, 49, Is Claimed By Death

James H. Hodges, 49, of near Stokes, died in the Veterans hospital at Norfolk, Va., Saturday night at 9:30 o'clock, after having been confined to the hospital for the past three years.

Funeral services will be conducted Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock from the grave in the family cemetery in Belvoir township by Rev. Mr. Perry, of Robersonville, Christian minister.

Mr. Hodges, a World war veteran, is survived by his wife and two children, Robert and Mary Hodges. Mrs. Hodges and the children have been making their home with her parents in Maine since Mr. Hodges went to the hospital.

Two brothers, N. O. Hodges, of Winterville, and T. H. Hodges, of Stokes; three sisters, Mrs. Joe Barnhill of Bethel, Mrs. Heber Whichard of Stokes and Miss Eula Hodges of Stokes, also survive.

J. G. Spencer Dies After Brief Illness

Jesse G. Spencer of Farmville died in Pitt General Hospital here Saturday night following a short illness. Funeral services were conducted at his home in Farmville this afternoon at 4 o'clock. Interment was in the Farmville cemetery.

Surviving are his wife, who prior to her marriage was Miss Frances Joyner; two children, Bettie L. and Jesse Spencer, Jr.; one brother, Abner Spencer of Hong Kong, China, and his mother, Mrs. J. Carter Glass who lived with him.

Mr. Spencer had made Farmville his home for the past 12 years and was associated with the W. B. Lea Tobacco Co.

New Jersey to Vote on Wm. Borah And Landon

NAMES ENTERED BY SUPPORTERS

Primary Also Will Furnish Fight Between Gov. Hoffman and Bitter Foe

Washington, May 17.—(AP)—A big week of pre-convention politics got underway today with major attention directed toward a strength test between supporters of Senator Borah of Idaho and Governor Alf Landon of Kansas in tomorrow's state-wide presidential primary in New Jersey.

While neither of these two Republicans officially entered the primary, their supporters put the two names into the preferential contest and entered candidates for delegates in nearly all the 14 congressional districts.

A fight between Governor Harold G. Hoffman and Franklin W. Fort for a seat as delegate-at-large to the Republican convention is a feature of the latter's activities in the Hauptmann case. Both are pledged to Landon.

On the Democratic side, President Roosevelt is assured of the state's 32 convention votes, although Colonel Henry Breckinridge of New York is entered alone in the vote for presidential preference.

DR. JOHN HAM STARTS SERIES

Conducting Services at Memorial Baptist Church

Speaking on the topic, "Walking With God," Dr. John W. Ham of Atlanta, Ga., delivered the first in a series of sermons at Memorial Baptist church yesterday morning. The services will continue through May 31.

Accounts of the morning and evening services yesterday follow: "Enoch was a rare soul. He understood practicing the presence of God. He lived in the present tense. God was in his life seven days in the week.

There are three groups in every congregation. Those who live in the past, the present, and the future tense. Some of this audience live in a past experience when they realized the presence of God in a very definite way, while their present experience is very unsatisfactory. Others may be here who have never walked with God, but who plan to do so at some future date. Still others are living in the present, a day by day, walk with God.

It is to be observed that there are nine necessary things that characterize those who live in the present tense. Enoch experienced all of these in this walk of his with God. If we are willing to meet the conditions underlying this supreme fellowship we too, may enjoy this privilege.

First, there must entire self surrender. This fact is indicated in the name Enoch, which means, "Dedicated or Yielded to God." The surrendered life of the strong life. It carries singleness of purpose, force, and depth that the nominal church member knows nothing about.

"A second fact is that of unbroken fellowship. Enoch went about his daily toil with the full consciousness that he and God were as one in purpose. They were going in the same direction. The will of God was the aspiration of Enoch. He found his deepest satisfactions in the interpretation of and translation of that will into daily practice. Unbroken fellowships begets an intimacy that becomes increasingly delightful, alluring, tender and beautiful.

Local Man Takes Life In Taxi At Goldsboro

Goldsboro, May 18.—(AP)—A man identified by papers in his pocket as William "Buddy" Eller was shot to death in a taxi cab here today and officers said he committed suicide to avoid arrest.

Motorcycle policemen Carl Smith and Harry Morris said they saw the young man fire a pistol bullet into his head as they came along side the cab to question him.

The Goldsboro police department had just received a request from Greenville police asking apprehension of a man said to tally with Eller's description on charges of having held up a filling station. The two officers had spotted Eller in the taxi and were in the act of stopping the car when the shooting took place.

REVENUE BILL AGAIN REVISED

Estimates Program Would Provide \$642,000,000

Washington, May 18.—(AP)—The treasury estimated today that the latest compromise tax plan of the Senate finance committee would provide \$642,000,000, of which \$173,000,000 would come from individual income tax payers.

Indicative, however, of the fact that the committee still is groping for an agreement on how to rewrite the tax bill as it passed the House were requests for additional estimates on other ways of raising the \$623,000,000 of permanent revenue sought by the President.

Chairman Harrison (D-Miss.) named three sub-committees to report Wednesday morning on the "windfall" tax feature of the measure, on a provision for refunds on floor stocks on hand at the time of invalidating of the AAA and on the question of insurance that might be applied to pay the government's taxes.

Eden Says Trickery Used Get Evidence

London, May 18.—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden charged before the House of Commons today that forgery, deception and trickery were used to obtain "fabricated evidence" of Ethiopian dum-dum bullets purportedly made in England.

Local Bank Detects Spurious \$10 Bills

Officials of the Guaranty Bank and Trust Company today issued a warning to business men to be on the watch-out for counterfeit \$10 bills.

The bank found two of the spurious bills today and expressed the opinion counterfeiters were working in this section of the state. They said the only such bills found were of denominations of \$10 each.

SIX TAR HEELS ARE DROWNED

Father and His Three Sons Among Weekend Victims

(By Associated Press) Eight persons drowned in the Carolinas during the week-end. Six of them were in North Carolina and two in South Carolina.

A father and three sons lost their lives while fishing in the Tawaxay river near Brevard.

Raymond Fisher, 35, stepped into water over his head while seining and three of those who went to his rescue—Ben Fisher, 60; Odell Fisher, 28, and Otis Fisher, 19—drowned with him.

Harrison Holden, 14-year-old boy, drowned while swimming in the Valley river, near Marble, N. C.

Pinkey Marley, 21, drowned when his boat capsized on Kimmessville lake near Greensboro.

SUPREME BAR RULES GUFFEY BILL INVALID

Soft Coal Act Is Held Unconstitutional by Justices

RULE CONGRESS EXCEEDED RIGHT

6-3 Majority Opinion Holds Congress Overstepped Constitutional Powers

Washington, May 18.—(AP)—The New Deal just today in the Supreme court in its contention that the Guffey soft coal act was unconstitutional.

In a trenchant decision the court said the conclusion was unavoidable that "the price fixing provisions of the (bituminous) code are unconstitutional and dependent upon the labor provisions as conditions considerations for compensation as to make it clearly probable that the former in being held bad the latter would not have passed.

"The fall of the former (before the court) therefore carries down with it the latter.

"But neither this disposition of the matter nor anything we have said is to be taken as indicating that the courts is of opinion that these provisions if separately enacted could be sustained."

The six to three decision was delivered by Justice Southernland before a crowded audience.

Justices Cordozo, Brandies and Stone dissented.

A separate opinion was delivered by Chief Justice Hughes, who contended the act might "be sustained" in relation to the provisions for marketing in interstate commerce.

The majority held that Congress in the law had exceeded its power under the constitution in attempting to regulate interstate commerce.

Compromise Offered On Exchange Statute

Washington, May 18.—(AP)—The Senate agriculture committee considered a compromise on proposed legislative changes in the New York cotton futures exchange contract today in an effort to reach an agreement on the commodity exchange bill.

After brief consideration, however, the committee adjourned until tomorrow to receive recommendations from Secretary Wallace.

The changes suggested as a result of the agriculture committee's cotton futures investigation will restrict trading in cotton futures and reduce the number of southern points at which cotton sold on New York contracts could be delivered.

TWO CONTESTS ARE ARRANGED

Local League Team to Play Exhibition Games May 29-30

The baseball season of the Coastal Plain League gets into full swing on June 2, but Gus Forbes, vice president of the Greenville unit of the league said today that the Greensies would give the baseball lovers of the city an opportunity of the type of material which is to represent them before the season starts.

Mr. Forbes said that the team would play two exhibition games. The first will be played at Williamston May 29, and the second to be played here Sunday, May 31.

Everyone who can is urged to see these exhibition games and give the Greensies the element which they will need all during the coming baseball months; that being, support.

Texas Relays Claim Edge Over Others

Austin, Tex., May 14—(AP)—Statistics give the nation's "infant" track and field carnival, the University of Texas relays, a good-sized nod over the more famed Penn. Drake and Kansas relays this spring.

An event-by-event comparison of the four relays gives the Longhorn school's ninth annual meet and edge on the basis of performances. There were 13 events in common among the four meets.

Best performances in five of these 13 events were made by athletes competing under a March sun in Texas. Four best performances were established at the Kansas games two weeks later and only two each and Penn and Drake relays.

Nequaled at any of the "foreign" relays were the winning pole vaulter's swing of 13 feet, 9.7-8 inches; the shot put of 51 feet, 9.3-8 inches; the discus heave of 152 feet, 8.1-2 inches; Glenn Hardin's 400 meter hurdle's gallop of 54.9 seconds; Sam Allen's 120-yard high hurdle flight of 14.5 seconds and the University of Texas' mark of 1 minute, 25.6 seconds in the half-mile relay.

The man with the pencil also figured that the Texas relays would come off best if compared with the other three meets on a dual, performance-to-performance test. Event by event, the Texas relays outdid the Penn relays in 7 of 13 events; the Drake relays 8 of 13 and the Kansas relays in 9 of 14.

As for the Texans themselves: Alton Terry, Hardin-Simmons university javelin hurler, threw the spear 222.65 feet at the Drake relays for a new American record.

The University of Texas' great quartet of sprinters—Harvey (Chink) Wallender, H. V. Reeves, Beverly Rockhold and Tiny Grunewald—cracked a 9-year-old Penn relay record in the 440-yard relay and shattered the listed world's record in the 880-yard relay. Their flawless passing of the baton astounded eastern coaches.

Jess Petty, Rice Institute weight man, hurled the discus 152 feet, 8.1-2 inches at the Texas meet—and his mark was unsurpassed at any of the other affairs.

Reds' 'Kid Infield'
Cincinnati, (AP)—Cincinnati's "kid infield" uses speed to advantage. In the Red's first 22 games, they made 21 double killings while their opponents completed only 13. The Reds had less luck in clearing the bases of their own players, however, leaving 165 stranded on the bags as against 146 opponents left marooned.

SPORT SLANTS

Johnny Mize, the St. Louis Cardinals' rookie first baseman, is pounding the ball at a very merry clip for a convalescent. The gigantic youth is confounding skeptical surgeons who pronounced an operation on the pelvic arch last winter a success but who doubted his ability to regain normal strength and speed without a full season lay-off. Opposing National league pitchers who have seen their pet offerings go screaming toward the outfield for extra base hits when Johnny connected would be happy to offer testimony to the effect that there is nothing wrong with Mize. Mize, a 6-foot, 3-inch athlete, weighing 210 pounds, is rated one of the best looking prospects to come up in the senior circuit in recent years. He's a natural hitter and gets plenty of distance with his blows.

The Cincinnati Reds had a chance to get Mize in the spring of 1935, when they tried him out for a few weeks. When Mike failed to shake off a limp that hampered him the Reds' management decided he was not worth the \$55,000 asked by the Cardinals. So Mize was sent back to the Cardinals' farm at Rochester.

The injury continued to bother him and he saw service in only 65 games. He did pretty well at that, for he hit a dozen home runs and finished the season with an average well over the 300 mark. When the injury failed to clear up Mize submitted to the operation. This apparently did the trick.

If Mize keeps up at his present pace he is likely to keep the slugging Ripper Collins on the bench. The rookie stepped in when Collins was suffering from a batting slump and moved along at such a fast clip that Manager Frankie Frisch has refused to break up a winning combination.

Bill Terry, the New York Giants' pilot, tried hard to get Mize last winter, but the Cardinals turned a deaf ear to his talk of a trade or a purchase which would involve the first baseman. Mize would have fitted nicely into the Giants' picture. Terry is ready to call it a day as far as his active playing career is concerned, but before he retires to the dugout he would like to find a capable young first baseman to take his place. At least three other teams in the National league could make good use of Mize's slugging talents.

Mize broke into baseball with Greensboro at the age of 17. He was an outfielder, plenty awkward but a powerhouse at the plate, and with speed to burn on the bases. In 1932 he was sent to Elmira, where he led the N. Y. P. loop in hitting. His outfield play hadn't improved, so the master minds decided to make the most of his slugging by playing him at first base. He reported to Rochester in that capacity and soon replaced the veteran Art Shires at the initial sack. He showed some improvement in fielding his position and ran bases well enough. But it was at the plate that he was a sensation. His big war club battered down fences in every park in the International league through the 1933 season, and established him as one of the greatest natural hitters in the minors.

RENEW SEARCH MARKER SPOTS

Additional Historical Markers to Be Placed in State

Raleigh, May 18.—A hunt for more historical spots in North Carolina is being indicated by the historical markers being erected along the highways by the Department of Conservation and Development, is yielding excellent results, according to Dr. C. C. Crittenden, secretary of the North Carolina Historical Commission.

Miss Marybelle Delamar, acting collector for the Hall of History, has just returned from a two weeks tour of the Albemarle section of the state, visiting historic places in that area. It is expected that many of these will eventually be marked with highway markers.

In the course of her trip, Miss Delamar visited the homes of former Governors David Stone and Craig in Bertie county, Eden House Point and the site of the home of former Governor Thomas Pollock. In Chowan county, she visited Hayes, the home of former Governor Samuel Johnston, the courthouse in Edenton, the home of James Iredell and of Joseph Hewes, one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence from North Carolina; the Cupola House and the site of the "Tea Party House." In Pasquotank county, Miss Delamar visited the site of the house in which the first North Carolina general assembly met and the Nixonton village. The site of the battle of Sawyers Lane, the Dismal Swamp Canal and the former home of General Isaac Gregory, likewise Shiloh, the oldest existing Baptist church in the state, were visited in Camden county.

The home of former Governor Jarvis was visited in Currituck county, also the place where the first Methodist sermon was preached in North Carolina, located in Currituck county. In Dare county she visited Kill Devil Hill, where the Wright brothers made their first airplane flights and Roanoke Island, site of the first white colony on the American coast, settled by Sir Walter Raleigh's famed "lost colony."

In Perquimans county the old Quaker church at Belvedere was visited, also Durant's Neck and Harvey's Neck and in Northampton county the home of former Governor Briggs, Colvert's Tavern and in Hertford county the old Indian Queen Tavern.

The Sportsman

The fellows were kidding the oldest shooter out at the skeet field the other day. Although he owns several guns his favorite is a relic that brings forth comment as: "Don't forget your ramrod," or "Be sure your powder is dry."

The oldest shooter, a quiet sort, with keen eyes for his age, doesn't mind the friendly chatter and smiles broadly when the score card shows him in the 20's with the youngsters. Often he registers a perfect round and gets slaps on the shoulder.

At such times he is in high good humor and declares he "wouldn't trade this old musket for the finest gun on the rack." The "old musket" is a (Spencer) twelve gauge double, with 26-inch barrels, and was used in his family as a field gun for many years.

"When I was young I thought a gun was anything that could be fired," he says. "Later I got guns to fit me. This is one. When the skeet business came along I spent a little money for stock and barrel work and this old scatter-horn suits me."

The oldest shooter represents a type of sporting gunner found everywhere. These men get "a gun that fits," and that is not as easy as it sounds. They are not cranks but they know what they want. After all, that is the secret of consistent scoring.

There are fortunate shooters who can walk into a store and pick out a gun from stock that seems to have been made to order for them. Others, not so lucky, must have a gunsmith or the factory work on their guns until they meet individual requirements.

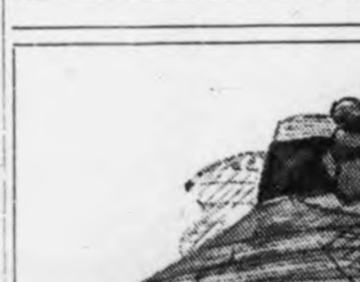

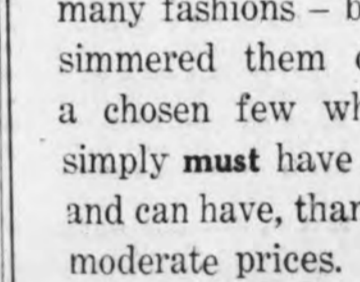

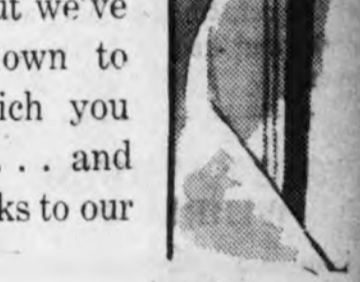

CAMPS APPEAR BE CONFIDENT

Three Leading Candidates Make Conflicting Claims

Raleigh, May 18.—There is more optimism today in the headquarters of Clyde R. Hoey than since the campaign for the Democratic nomination for Governor opened.

The severe hammering which Mr. Hoey gave Dr. McDonald and his program all last week in his intensive speaking tour through the eastern counties, together with other factors which have been at work, are causing a definite break in the McDonald support.

The Hoey forces also are convinced that Sandy Graham is no longer a dangerous factor in that he is trailing so far back in third place that he will never be able to overtake either Hoey or Dr. McDonald.

While the Graham managers and supporters agree with the Hoey forces that Dr. McDonald is slipping and heading down hill fast, they do not agree with the contention that Mr. Hoey is making any gains.

The Graham managers maintain that Sandy is making deeper and deeper inroads into the McDonald following every day, and that Hoey is scarcely denting it at all, in spite of the Hoey claims.

There is no doubt that there is more militancy in the Graham headquarters here now than ever before and that despite the efforts of both the McDonald and Hoey groups to count Graham out, the Sandy managers are more determined than ever to put him in second place in the first primary.

The McDonald leaders are still confident that their man will either be nominated in the first primary with a clear majority, or else be in first place with Hoey in second place, in which case they are confident that McDonald will win in the second primary by a tremendous majority.

FEW ESCAPEES KEEP FREEDOM

Prison Department Is Making Enviably Recapture Mark

Reflector Bureau.
Sir Walter Hotel.
Raleigh, May 17.—Even though the season for prison escapes is here and some prisoners are escaping, the prison department is making an enviable record for "bringing 'em back alive" and within a very short time after they escape. Acting Director Oscar Pitts of the prison division of the highway department pointed out here today. This fact is also greatly reducing the number of escapes, Pitts said.

"The two biggest factors in keeping the number of escapes down to a minimum this spring are first, the certainty of recapture because of the reputation we are getting among the prisoners for 'bringing 'em back alive' if possible and the knowledge that if they do not surrender when ordered to shoot," Pitts said. "The guards do not have orders to shoot to kill except in extreme cases, but they do have orders to shoot to wound a man enough to stop him if he tries to run or if he tries to attack a guard or truck driver."

Still another factor in the reduction of escapes is the fact that guards are held accountable for escapes and that in most cases whenever a prisoner goes, the guard goes too—by being fired, Pitts said. The guard who was on duty when four prisoners assaulted a truck driver Wednesday and made their escape in a road truck, has already been fired. And the four prisoners have been recaptured, two being taken that night and two Thursday morning, with the assistance of bloodhounds.

Pitts is convinced that if the guard on duty when the four men made their break had tried to, he could have prevented the escape, since he neither fired a shot at the four fleeing prisoners nor went to the aid of the truck driver they overpowered. As a result, the guard is out of a job, while the four prisoners are back in prison, trader, sadder and wiser than when they tried to escape.

"The prisoners are realizing that they can't get away with trying to escape and that it is good sense to behave themselves and serve out their sentences," Pitts said.

FOUR-FACED DANCER OF MOVIES THINKS TAP CRAZE SOON WILL DIE

Hollywood, May 15.—(AP)—Film-land reverberates with the tapping of almost countless feet as the Astaires, Eleanor Powells, Ruby Keelers and Bill Robinsons dance thru film roles.

And a dancer who doesn't tap during this state of terpsichorean affairs, might be said to have little to do.

But Nona Reed, blonde, confident and 21, has come from Europe with several ideas, and a firm conviction that dancing in pictures is due to change.

Nona, the step-daughter of Comedian Herbert Mundin, specializes in what she terms "exotic" dancing, the kind in which undulating arms and swaying body are more important than tripping feet.

"Bound to Come"
"It's bound to come," she says, "sooner or later. Look at 'The

Garden of Allah,' now in production, with Tilly Losch's dancing featured. I think it may start a whole cycle of exotic dancing in films, and that is where I hope for my opportunity."

More immediately, Miss Reed is interested in a revised version of the "pluridance" she did at the Bal Tabarin in Paris. In a ballet called "Conjugation," in which the grammatical forms of verbs were symbolized in dancing, she evolved a "dance of four faces" for her role as the plural form. One of the faces was her own, the others were masks, each wearing a different expression. It was this dance which aroused the interest of film scouts and led to her trip to Hollywood.

"Musical" Applause.

WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

Washington — The success of J. Edgar Hoover and his G-men in capturing in one-two-three order the outstanding "public enemies" has revived talk here that this energetic national policeman would like to bring all federal investigating agencies under his wing.

There was an immediate denial at the Pennsylvania avenue offices of the stocky Hoover. Nevertheless the talk persisted, particularly among those agencies which would be most immediately affected.

Such a consolidation might put Hoover in command of such investigating agencies as the secret service, whose duty now is to protect the President and the currency; the internal revenue and treasury investigators; the postal inspection service, and possibly part of the coast guard.

A spokesman in the bureau of investigation put his fingers on one of the primary difficulties that would be encountered in bringing about such a consolidation. He said the opposition in the other agencies would be reflected promptly in congress, where approval would be required.

The fight in the senate over increasing the appropriation for the bureau of investigation developed that Hoover had many friends there. In fact when Senator McKellar of Tennessee sought to knock \$225,000 from the bill as the house had done, he ran into spirited opposition from Democrats and Republicans. The senate voted approval of an increase from \$5,000,000 to \$6,025,000 he had asked. Congress has expressed increas-

The bureau now has authority to deal with virtually all crime of an interstate character, such as extortion, kidnaping and bank robbing, where the criminals cross state lines in their operations.

The Lindbergh baby kidnaping started the move toward making the bureau a more effective anti-crime arm. The outbreak of kidnaping and bank robberies of that period and later gave it impetus. Hoover's critics, and there are some, commented ruefully that it was a "break" for him to have recent captures of Karpis, Mahan,

HIGHWAY MAP DESCRIPTIVE

State Has "Most Beautiful Map in United States"

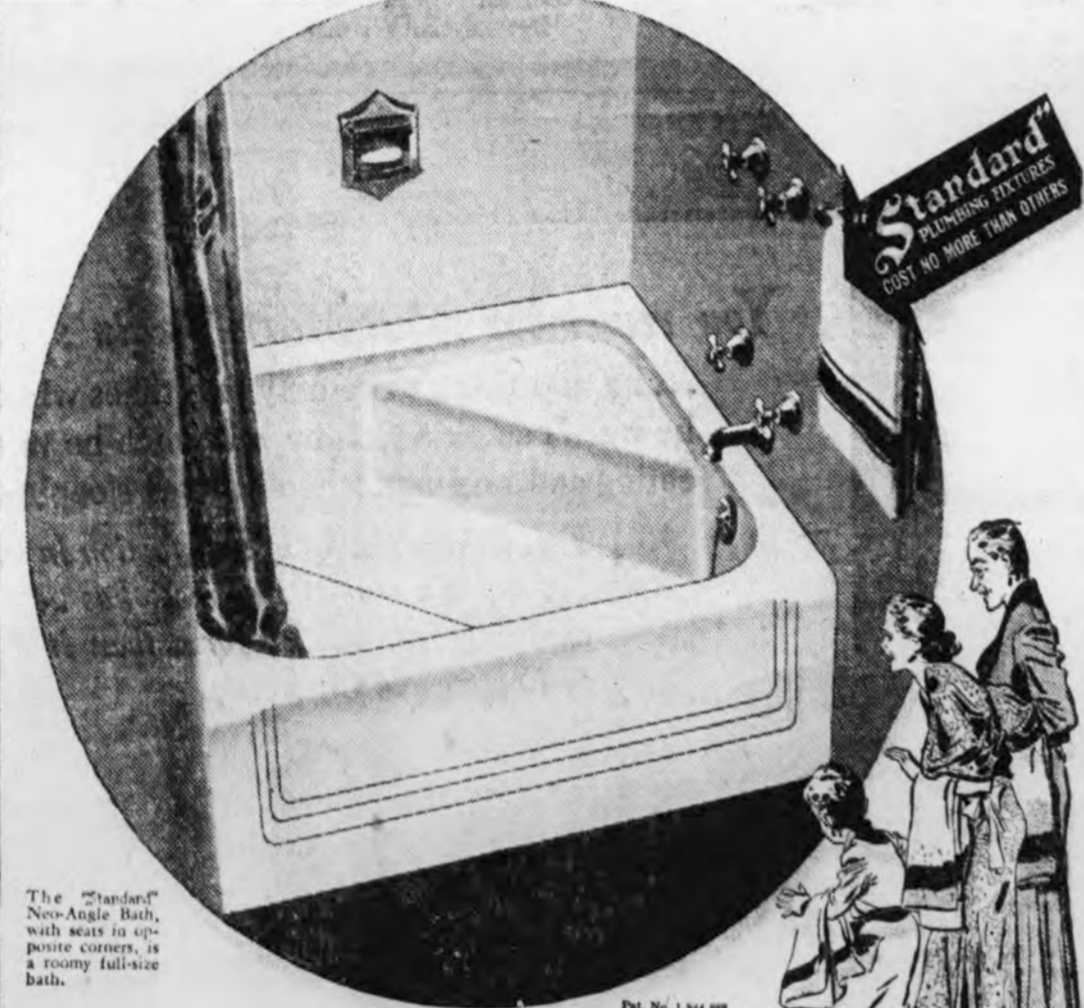

Raleigh, May 17.—North Carolina can not boast of having the "most beautiful highway map in the United States" as those who have seen the new map have designated it, according to Chairman Capus M. Waynick of the State Highway and Public Works Commission.

Only a few copies of the new maps have been received here as yet, although 100,000 copies have been ordered and are now being printed, Waynick said. The map is printed in four colors, with the U. S. hard-surfaced highways shown in red, the hard-surfaced state highways in dark blue, and the gravel and topsoil roads in red and white spaces. The Great Smoky Mountains National Park area, likewise National Forests and State Parks are shown in green, while the main body of the map is a buff or deep cream color. Rivers and county lines are shown in light blue. All of the routes are correctly numbered and a table of distances between leading cities in and outside the state is also given. The new Blue Ridge Parkway, now under construction, connecting the Great Smoky Mountains National Park and the Shenandoah National Park in Virginia, is indicated by a red dotted line.

The back of the map, however, is expected to attract even more attention, since it contains photographs in four colors, of places of outstanding interest from "the mountains to the sea." Along the top of the map's back is a four color picture of an artist's drawing of the park-to-ark Blue Ridge Parkway, said by the printers to be the longest print ever made in four colors in the history of color printing. It shows how the parkway will wind and run along the crest of the mountain ridges and through the water gaps from the Virginia line until it reaches the Great Smoky Mountains National Park in the western part of the state.

Of the 100,000 maps which are now being printed, tourist and travel agencies have already requested 60,000 maps, Chairman Waynick said. Requests for the map have been received from every state in the union and from many countries in Europe and South America. Waynick believes it will greatly stimulate tourist and travel interest in North Carolina.
