DEATH, GRIEF GIVEN SPAIN BY WAR GOD

Other Nations Thank God For Blessings, Spain Counts Dead

Madrid, Dec. 24.—(AP)—Death, bloodshed and nationwide misery were Christmas presents forced on Spain today by the grim gods of war.

While all other Christian lands of the world were thanking God for the blessings of peace, grieving Spain counted her dead, her maimed and her starving inhabitants.

Religious leaders, including aged, ill, Pope Pius XI in Rome, pleaded for an end to the brother against brother slaughter in a land once known for its carefree contentment.

Their pleas were answered by exhortations of war leaders to kill the enemy and get peace by force. Church bells all over the world pealed the joy of Christians on the anniversary eve of the birth of the greatest pacifist, Shat, shell and shrapnel were Spain's echoes.

Here were only battlefields strewn with hundreds of bodies. Here were wrecked buildings in beautiful Madrid's squares. Peace was not the Madrileanos. Their war leaders issued December 24th commands for the troops on the fronts to fight off any Christian sentimentalism which might cause them to relax effort to kill off their countrymen insisting on a different form of government.

CHINA ANXIOUS FOR REBELLION TO CEASE SOON

Steps Being Taken to Evacuate Americans From Provinces

Nanking, Dec. 24.—(AP)—China's hope for a speedy end of Marshal Chan, Hsueh-Chin's rebellion waned today as the United States hastened efforts to evacuate Americans from unattled Shensi province.

Worried by growing reports that additional provinces had rallied to the standard of Marshal Chan, Colonel Joseph Stilwell, United States military attache at Peiping left for the interior.

He hoped to penetrate as far west as Sianfu, capital of Shensi where the rebellious marshal held Chiang Kai Shek premier of China.

With the premier were his wife and her brother, Dr. Soong, endeavoring to treat personally for their relative's release.

Colonel Stilwell planned to go first to Loyang to arrange the rescue of the Americans through the punitive expedition sent to Chiang's aid. Most concern was felt for Americans farther in the interior.

ALUMNI BEHIND STATE'S COACH

Will Make Fight to Retain Anderson As Grid Coach

Raleigh, Dec. 24.—The three newest developments in the intra-mural tempest which is still sizzling among State College alumni, student and faculty members as a result of the action by President Frank P. Graham of the University of North Carolina in refusing to approve the new contract offered Coach Hearty W. (Hunk) Anderson by the athletic council, are as follows:

1. The fight on the part of the alumni who want Anderson retained as coach will be taken before the board of trustees of the University, when it meets here in January.

2. State College alumni are going to fight for complete local self-government for State College both before the board of trustees and in the general assembly, if necessary, so that the actions of the administrative dean, faculty and other administrative bodies will not be subject to veto by the President of the Consolidated University, as is now the case.

3. The State College alumni are not going to join in any move by University of North Carolina alumni or others either to oust President Graham as president of the consolidated university or to fight consolidation.

The refusal by President Graham to approve the new contract offered to Coach Anderson by the Athletic Council is not the cause of this decision by alumni to carry their fight for the retention of Anderson before the board of trustees or to seek curb the power which President Graham is exercising or at least attempting to exercise over affairs at State College, many of the alumni who met here Tuesday night to discuss the situation, pointed out. Nor were all of them merely interested in the athletic program at State. Most of them were just as much interested in the academic growth and development of the college as in the football team and expressed the conviction that Colonel J. W. Harnwell, the administrative dean, and the faculty, should be permitted to work just the policies and future program of State College without dictation and interference from President Graham. It was intimated that President Graham has overruled several recommendations made by the faculty and Dean Harnwell with regard to academic matters just as he overruled the election of "Hunk" Anderson by the athletic council.

WANTS N. C. GET LIQUOR MONEY

Senator Hill May Join 'Drys' Unless State Gets Part Revenue

Raleigh, Dec. 24.—Senator John Sprunt Hill of Durham, personally "dry" and for years one of the most liberal "angels" of the prohibition forces ever had in North Carolina, who led the fight for a state-wide liquor control law in the 1935 general assembly, is reported to be threatening to go over to the "dry" side again unless this legislature enacts a state-wide liquor law that will give the state some of the revenue from its sale. Under the "Hill Bill" which Senator Hill introduced and backed all through the 1935 general assembly, but which the senate consistently refused to pass, the revenue from the sale of liquor in the state liquor stores would have gone into the state treasury.

Under the two "local" bills enacted during the last two days of the 1935 general assembly, setting up county liquor stores in 18 counties, the stores are under the control of the counties, while the revenue from the sale of liquor goes into the county treasuries or is divided between the counties and the towns, as in Pasquotank and New Hanover counties.

Present indications are that a majority of the members of the 1937 general assembly are inclined to favor the plan under which the counties will retain all the revenue from the sale of liquor, whether the system adopted is a continuation of the present county control system, or whether a combination state and county control plan is adopted. The state-county control plan is recommended by the state liquor control commission in its recent report. The commission also recommended that 20 per cent of the revenue be paid to the state, and 80 per cent be left in the counties. But the reaction to this proposal has not been favorable.

Some fear that if Senator Hill carries out his threat to go over to the "dry" forces and to aid them in fighting any sort of a liquor control bill, unless the revenue is permitted to go to the state, may result in another long, drawn-out fight in the 1937 general assembly. Others, however, maintain that the legislature is going to pass a liquor control law, regardless of Senator Hill, and that if he decided he won't play with the liquor forces unless they pass the kind of bill he wants, it will just be a case of sour grapes and that the legislature as a whole will not pay much attention to him.

STRICKEN POPE MAKES APPEAL WORLD PEACE

Prays God Accept His Suffering For Peace Among All Men

Vatican City, Dec. 24.—(AP)—Pope Pius XI prayed before the whole world today that God accept his suffering for peace among men, and from his sick bed called for a union of all Christians against the "evil forces" of communism.

His eyes afixe, the stricken pontiff spoke in a throbbing voice through the microphone.

He called for "a union of all men of good will against the propaganda of the enemy" by which, he meant communism, and "prayed God to accept his present suffering" for his own glory for the conversion of all who have gone astray, for peace and the good of the entire church—and in particular for Spain.

"In Spain," the Holy Father cried, "propaganda and evil forces have wished to make the supreme experiment of all the destructive forces scattered throughout the world which they have at their command."

"Here is a new menace more threatening than ever before for the whole world, and particularly for Europe and its Christian civilization."

The Holy Father's voice trembled the whole 39 minutes of his Christmas Eve message. At times he seemed to be forcing himself on.

He spoke of the "bitter sorrow of our paternal heart caused by the many great evils which these days have fallen like a scourge on humanity, civil society and the church."

BRU IS CUBA'S NEW LEADER

Pres. Gomez Ousted From Office by Senate Decision Today

Havana, Dec. 24.—(AP)—Cuban officials assembled today to welcome a new president, Dr. Frederico Bru—after the army-controlled senate ousted Miguel Gomez for his opposition to the \$1,500,000 sugar tax bill.

Gomez, the island's ninth president in four years, was forced from his position by the senate's decision early today. He was guilty of "interfering with the free functioning of legislative power" in fighting the tax measure.

Politically the winner of the congressional controversy over the proposal to extend army training to the rural schools was Col. Fulgenio Batista, Cuba's military strong man.

Bru was to be inducted into the office of chief executive in official ceremonies set for noon.

Gomez was ejected by a 22 to 12 vote of the senate, sitting as a jury to hear the impeachment charges after a debate lasting into the early morning hours.

SEEK DATA ON SCHOOL BUSES

Commission Making Study With View to Safer Bus Bodies

Raleigh, Dec. 24.—The State School Commission has written all builders of school bus bodies in the state, also all of the manufacturers of automobile chassis, asking them to submit suggestion to the commission as to how the strength of the school bus bodies, especially the impact resistance, can be increased.

Executive Secretary Lloyd Griffin said today. They have been asked to get these replies to the commission by January 6, so that they can be presented to the meeting of the commission scheduled for January 8, at which time they will be discussed.

"The commission for years has been doing everything possible, within the limitations of the appropriation for schools, to provide safer and safer school buses," Griffin said. "We have the most rigid specification with regard to school bus bodies and are credited with having developed the safest reinforced wooden bodies that are built. Under our present specifications, every school bus body that has been purchased in recent years has been reinforced with 11,900 pounds of reinforcing steel. The result is that our wooden school bus bodies, reinforced with steel, are safer than many of the so-called all-steel bodies, yet they cost about \$300 each less than the all-steel bus bodies."
