FRESH NIPPON TROOPS READY FOR OFFENSIVE

Reinforcements Sent to Scene of Recent Reverses

LINI BECOMING BATTLE CENTER

Chinese Commanders Likewise Say They Are Ready for Prospective Major Battle

Shanghai, April 19.—(AP)—As a prelude to a grand new offensive in South Shantung province, where they have met with severe reverses, 6,000 Japanese reinforcements have arrived on the Yi river, four miles from Lini.

They fought their way overland, despite constant Chinese harassing from Tsingtao, Shantung port 130 miles away, airline distance.

Lini rapidly was becoming the center of a battle which military experts said might develop into a major engagement of the nine-month-old undeclared war.

Another Japanese column was reported sweeping to the southeast of Lini.

Chinese sources said five fresh Japanese divisions had arrived in Shantung from Japan and Formosa, while 26 transports were unloading munitions.

Japanese aircraft carriers were reported stationed off the Shantung coast, presumably for a concerted air attack.

On their part, Chinese commanders declared they were ready to put 1,000,000 soldiers into the battle.

Tokyo, April 19.—(AP)—With what political circles described as "strategic politeness" in Japan's inner chamber cabinet struggle, Premier Prince Konohe has apologized for an illness that kept him from his home during the crisis.

The first statement since reports he was threatening to resign as a result of army and navy pressure for drastic military measures to deal with the conflict in China was made yesterday.

Gives Self Up In Cumberland Death

Fayetteville, April 19.—(AP)—Cumberland County Sheriff N. O. McGeachy said today Glendene Odum of St. Pauls, in Robeson county, surrendered last night after officers had sought him all day for questioning in connection with the death last week of J. B. Baumgardner, 55-year-old carpenter.

The sheriff said Odum was taken immediately to Robeson county, where he was being held on a coroner's warrant charging murder, pending an inquest.

Baumgardner reported to officers last April 2 that one of two hitchhikers attacked him after they had asked him to drive them to St. Pauls.

Last week a head injury he had received began to trouble him again. He lapsed into a coma and died soon afterwards of what physicians said was effects of a blow.

Three persons were taken into custody three days ago and questioned about Baumgardner's death, the sheriff said, adding that they were still being held.

McGeachy said Odum asserted he was not Baumgardner's attacker and quoted the carpenter as telling witnesses as much before he died.

Declines To Free Accused Murderer

Smithfield, April 19.—(AP)—Judge Luther Hamilton declined in Johnson Superior court today to issue a writ of habeas corpus for the release under bond of James Tharrington, indicted yesterday for murder in the death of John McMillan.

Superior Court Clerk H. V. Rose said the case had been continued, probably until the June term.

McMillan was fatally shot March 31 at Selma.

Solicitor Claude Canady said he would press for a first degree murder conviction when the case comes to trial.

Delegates Arrive In City from all Parts of Eastern Carolina for Conference

The twenty-sixth annual session of the Woman's Missionary Society convened at Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church this afternoon for a three-day session, with the president, Mrs. A. M. Gates of Durham, presiding.

Delegates began arriving this morning from all of Eastern North Carolina. The delegates represent an organization of 12,000 members within the Methodist churches of the North Carolina Conference. RAIL DISPUTE WON BY YOUNG

Common Stockholders Rally Behind C & O Chiefs

Richmond, Va., April 19.—(AP)—One per cent of the common stock of the Chesapeake and Ohio railway rallied to the support today of the C and O management, which Robert R. Young is fighting to maintain in office.

The management had solicited proxies for the common stock to be counted at the regular stockholders' meeting today and the official canvasses announced 41.68 per cent had responded to the solicitation.

Stock not held by the public is owned 30.8 per cent by the Chesapeake corporation, and 3.3 per cent by the Allegheny corporation, parent holding company of Chesapeake corporation. This stock was not represented in the vote today.

The stockholders, after announcement of the vote, adjourned the meeting until May 10 upon motion of Young.

Lightning Strikes In Falkland Community

Falkland citizens were almost frightened out of their wits about 7 o'clock last night when a bolt of lightning struck in the center of the town, but no damage was experienced.

As told by one witness: "A loud clatter of thunder was heard and a ball of fire came down the highway. The wet pavement was dried by the bolt. One woman was put to bed because of the shock and jar, but she was up today and none the worse for her experience."

Part of the town was in darkness for a time after the bolt.

Official of City Court Required Enter Primary

W. A. Darden and Harry Brown, judge and solicitor, respectively, of the newly created City Recorder's court, are required to run for office in the Greenville May 2 elections, under a ruling handed down by Attorney General A. A. F. Seawell, it was revealed at a special meeting of the Board of Aldermen last night.

The attorney general decided that the court attaches could serve only until the next election under appointment. They were appointed by the Board after the court was voted on at an election held March 28.

The attorney general's order does not include the clerk, a position to which W. C. Harris was appointed. The board last night named H. B. Drum deputy clerk.

The judge and solicitor will be elected for one year.

Both the present office holders are expected to run for the positions now held. It was not known whether any opposition would develop for either post.

The board last night adopted a resolution calling for the immediate sale of bonds recently authorized at elections. It decided to proceed with the advertising and sale of \$50,000 street bonds voted on last fall and the \$35,000 athletic field and recreation ground issue authorized in the March 28 election.

Other matters discussed at last night's meeting included paving and drainage projects.

DELAYS ACTION IN TEEL CASE

Decision on Parole Petition Promised During Week

Judge J. Paul Frizzelle, presiding in Superior court here, this morning withheld action on a motion by Judge Albion Dunn, private prosecutor for the Pitt County ABC board, that a capias be issued for Medius Teel and that he be turned over to proper authorities for service of a six months' sentence, following his conviction at the November term of court of operating a tourist camp for immoral purposes.

Judge Frizzelle withheld action after D. M. Williford, attorney for Teel, asked that his ruling be delayed until Friday at noon, and agreed to have Teel in court and surrender him unless the defendant was granted a parole in the meantime.

It was explained that Commissioner of Paroles Edwin M. Gill had agreed to wire the court his decision on the application for parole this week.

It was revealed in Raleigh Saturday that Commissioner Gill had under consideration a petition for a parole for the Pitt County man and "had heard both sides of the application."

The parole petition was said by Gill to have been approved by trial solicitor D. M. Clark, as well as by Judge J. H. Clement, who sentenced Teel, and Judge H. A. Grady, who issued a capias for the arrest of Teel after his attorneys had failed to perfect an appeal to the Supreme court. After Teel was brought into court until this term.

The parole petition set forth that never before had Teel been convicted of a serious crime and he had signed a written agreement to remove the "offensive" cabins and never again operate such a place.

The three to announce were Amos O. Clark of Greenville, for treasurer; D. S. Porter of Simpson for commissioner from the fourth district; and Thad J. Cannon of the Ayden community, for commissioner from the fifth district.

Mr. Clark is the first publicly to announce for the office of treasurer, now held by J. Vance Perkins, although the incumbent is expected to seek re-election.

Mr. Clark is a native of Pitt county, having been born in Belvoir township. When he was only a child, however, his father, the late W. L. Clark, moved to Black Jack. After finishing school he accepted a position with J. O. Proctor and Brothers of Grimesland, as bookkeeper and remained with the firm until the owners retired from business. He later accepted a position with Quinn-Miller and Company and has been there for the past 15 years. Mr. Clark is well known throughout the county. He has taken an active part in church work and civic affairs.

Mr. Cannon will oppose Frank Kilpatrick, incumbent, who already has announced for re-election from the fifth district.

Mr. Porter, a merchant and farmer of Simpson, was the third to seek the office of commissioner from the fourth district, the incumbent, Roy T. Cox, and Grover Smith previously having announced.

Flint, Mich. April 19.—(P) For the second time in as many days Fisher Body plant number one and the assembly line of the Buick Motor car plant were closed today when the UOWA renewed their dues-collecting drive at the body company gates.

About 3,700 workers of the Fisher plant and 1,500 Buick assembly line workers were sent home. The Buick management said 600 additional workers would be out of work if the Fisher plant did not resume body production within two days.

Police estimated today's dues-collecting picket line at the Fisher plant at 1,200. A small detail of police was on hand. All workers who did not have credentials were turned back at the gates.

A number of fights occurred but no one was injured seriously. Union workers of the Chevrolet plant here and those of the Buick factory, both General Motors units, are to take a strike vote Wednesday because of disputes involving seniority rights and grievance adjustments.

Appropriations Committee Include Local Waterway Project In Approved Bill

Water Transportation for Greenville Step Nearer

\$328,000 SOUGHT IN TAR PROPOSAL

Would be for Purpose Clearing Channel Between Greenville, Washington

Water transportation for Greenville and this vicinity was a step nearer a reality today as a result of inclusion of the Tar river project in the rivers and harbors bill approved by the House of Representatives Appropriations Committee yesterday.

Of the 95 million dollars to be appropriated for rivers and harbors

The following telegram was received by The Reflector today from Congressman Lindsay C. Warren:

"Am pleased to inform you that I have secured budget approval of three hundred twenty eight thousand dollars for the improvement of Tar River and it is included in lump sum appropriation for Rivers and Harbors which will pass the House this week. This project was only passed by Congress last August and I am securing this appropriation at least three years before it was expected. This news should be very pleasing to the people of Pitt county and if the bill goes through I am hoping that contract can be let within the next six or eight months."

work during the fiscal year beginning July 1. \$328,000 will be for the purpose of clearing a 12 foot channel 100 feet wide in Tar River between Washington and Hardee's creek near this city and for a turning basin 1,500 feet above the mouth of the creek. This was the largest of the five new projects for North Carolina included in the bill.

The efforts to procure water transportation for Greenville has been under way for several years and local citizens who have been active in the matter, today expressed delight that the matter had been included in an appropriation bill approved by the board of engineers. When the project was proposed several years ago it received an unfavorable report from the district engineers and would have been a dead issue had it not been for Congressman Lindsay Warren who was successful in getting the matter reopened for hearing. The project in its original form sought the waterway all the way to the city but investigation by the engineers revealed that the great cost to overcome difficulties at Red Banks just below Greenville would cause them to make an unfavorable report so the request was changed to make the terminal of the channel in Hardee's creek three miles below the city. In the form the matter finally was approved by the War Department Board of Engineers about a year ago but even then it was anticipated.

Italy - France To Open Talks

Will Not Wait for Appointment of Rome Ambassador

Paris, April 19.—(AP)—Italy and France decided today to undertake friendship talks without waiting for appointment of an ambassador to Rome and a source close to the French foreign office said the question of extending "international cooperation" to include the United States and Britain would be studied.

Inclusion of Italy and France would be discussed during the visit April 28 of Premier Daladier and Foreign Minister Bonnet to London, it was said.

Though no specific questions were placed on the agenda, it was indicated the entire scope of diplomatic, financial and economic collaboration would be considered.

Jules Blondel, French charge d'affaires in Rome consulted with foreign minister Ciano today and it was agreed to begin conversations for a general settlement of problems between the two countries immediately.

The possibility the appointment of an Ambassador to Rome might be announced shortly before the League Council meeting May 9 was given precedence in authoritative circles.

Declared to Have Surrendered Without Resistance

Perpignan, France, April 19.—(AP)—At the Spanish Border—Spanish Government troops in the Aran valley just below the French border today surrendered to the advancing insurgents, handing over Viella, the capital of the Aran district, without a struggle.

The insurgents continued toward the border, only 19 miles north and west of Viella.

Two hundred civilians crossed the frontier in front of the approaching insurgents. An additional 4,000 decided to remain inside the French.

4-H Club Members Make Fine Record

C. D. Griggs, assistant county agent in charge of 4-H club work, today revealed results of corn demonstrations carried out by members in the county.

Thirty-five members in 13 different communities in the county enrolled in the project. Thirty-three members completed the demonstrations, growing 1,233 bushels of corn on 35 acres of land, or an average of 54.9 bushels per acre. This average is 35.9 bushels per acre more than that for the county in 1936.

The value of the corn produced was \$961.95.

The outstanding record made was by Elmer Tucker, who produced 72.5 bushels on an acre of land at a cost of 24 cents per bushel. His record shows that he paid \$5 for rent, \$5.19 for fertilizer and a total of \$8.10 for time, including his own. This makes a total expense of \$13.29. He sold the yield for 50 cents a bushel, bringing \$36.25, a net profit of \$17.96 for the acre.

Elmer Bloom, Greenville attorney and merchant, yesterday assumed his duties as solicitor of the Ayden recorder's court, succeeding Harry Brown, who at the same time assumed a similar position with the Greenville Recorder's court.

Mr. Bloom said court would be held each Monday morning.

The local attorney entered the primary for the office of County court selector two years ago, but later withdrew his name.

Increase Payments on Three Types Tobacco

Washington, April 19.—(AP)—The AAA said today benefit payment rates under the soil conservation program had been increased for three types of tobacco.

For flue-cured and dark air-cured tobacco the rate per pound on a farm's normal yield per acre was increased from 1.5 to 1.3 cents. For Georgia-Florida type 63 tobacco, the per pound rate on the same basis was changed from 1.5 cents to 1.6 cents.

OPPOSITION TO EXPANSION OF PRESENT NAVY

Senate Opponents Of Bill Attempt to Kill Provision

WOULD PREVENT MORE AIRPLANES

House, Meantime, Accepts One of President's Suggestions for Recovery

Washington, April 19.—(AP)—Senate opponents of the \$1,156,000,000 naval expansion bill attempted today to kill an authorization for 950 additional navy airplanes.

Chairman Walsh (D-Mass.), of the Senate Naval Committee, starting debate on the floor, expressed confidence, however, of overwhelming approval.

Senator Nye (R-N.D.), one of the principal foes, contended that the navy's present 2,050 planes are sufficient and that land based aircraft are more effective for defense purposes.

Meantime the House, accepting one of President Roosevelt's recovery suggestions, decided tentatively to more than double the \$100,000,000 highway appropriation in the pending agriculture supply bill.

A few minutes earlier the Senate completed final congressional action on another phase of the President's pump-priming plan, approving a \$50,000,000 increase in the reappropriation of CCC camps for the next fiscal year.

Opposition appeared, however, to another phase of his program, Senator Glass (D-Va.), charged that the administration's proposed revival of public works duplicates the program which is possible under authority recently given the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

The road-fund, scheduled to \$100,000,000 as a budget balancing aid suggested by the President, was increased to \$201,500,000 by the House. Mr. Roosevelt rescinded his budget balancing request in his recovery messages.

Other developments: Resources of the 22 insured commercial banks in the state of North Carolina totaled \$666,703,000 December 31, 1937, a survey made public today by the FDIC showed.

Deposits in the insured banks were listed as \$402,864,000. Demand deposits of the latest call date amounted to \$217,163,000 and time deposits totaled \$185,691,000, exclusive of inter-bank deposits.

A. A. U. W. Meets. In spite of a pouring rain at the hour set for the program, a number of members of the local branch of the A. A. U. W. met in the high school library last night for their April meeting and heard a most interesting discussion of plays current on Broadway by Miss Emma Hooper of the college English department.

Saying that she read reviews of plays and comments of critics not only because she enjoyed reading them, but also because she wished to know about plays that ought to be added to the college library and because people continually ask—What plays must I plan to see when I am in New York next week? Miss Hooper proceeded to tell of some of the things she would plan to see if she were going to New York soon.

She took up by types the entertainments she would see, beginning with the most outstanding moving pictures, like "The River," which she described as a dramatic picture of the Mississippi and the struggle man has made to control it.

Another type the speaker referred to as significant was the drama of real literary worth written especially for the radio. Maxwell Anderson, in particular, is working out a technique for the radio drama.

Of the musical comedy, "an American contribution to drama," Miss Hooper described two light satires—"Hooray for What," which gives Ed Wynne a chance to be amusing; and the political comedy "I'd Rather Be Right." The second, said the speaker, "laughs us into thinking about governmental affairs."

In the field of pure drama the speaker described especially the revivals of older plays and the plays of religious nature.

Quoting the critics to the effect that producers return to Shakespeare when the stage falls on lean years, Miss Hooper told of the recent "Anthony and Cleopatra" which had \$100,000 spent on it and still was "a flop," and of the \$6,000 production of Julius Caesar in modern dress, with no scenery, and with Caesar in a Fascist uniform, which has been a decided success.

She spoke of the importance of the religious play today on Broadway, illustrating with a list of current productions, especially "Susan and God" with its satire on Buchanan and its emphasis on the evils of drink and divorce; and "Shadow and Substance," an Irish play of the church and conditions in Ireland.

Miss Hooper called the much-talked-of "Our Town," a play given without scenery and with a narrator to interpret the picture of life in a small town, "a religious drama in the deepest sense of the word," because of its insistence on the idea that there is something eternal and imperishable in the soul of every man.

With the Insurgents Before Tortosa, April 19.—(AP)—Large detachments of Government troops, including international brigade units, were captured south of Tortosa after Ebro river bridges were dynamited by the Government to hold back the insurgent movement to encircle the city.

General Vilano's legionnaires occupied the suburbs of Tortosa and the right bank of the Ebro; then started to cut off the city proper, where the Government had massed thousands of its best shock troops.

Old-Age Insurance Claims Amount To \$11,114.86 In N. C.

Rocky Mount, April 19.—Old-age insurance claims amounting to \$11,114.86 and numbering 431 were certified for payment during the month of March in North Carolina, according to a statement made today by George N. Adams, manager of the Rocky Mount Social Security Board office. The average payment to claimants in this state in March, was \$25.79.

A total of claims, amounting to \$48,262.86, has been certified for payment to beneficiaries in North Carolina since the first of January, 1937, when the old-age insurance provisions of the Social Security Act went into operation.

Mr. Adams explained that lump-sum payments of old-age insurance are now being made to older workers who have been employed (in jobs that come under the law) at any time since 1936, and who have reached the age of 65 since the first day of January, 1937.

Lump-sum payments of old-age insurance are also being made to relatives of workers who had participated in the old-age insurance system and who died since the first of January, 1937.

In the United States lump-sum claims for old-age insurance benefits certified during March numbered 21,868. Payments totalled \$836,867.87. The average amount certified was \$38.29.

Claims were certified by the Social Security Board during March at the rate of \$10 per working day. Of the total number certified, more than 58 per cent were filed by relatives or the estates of wage-earners who had died. The payments made to such claimants, as well as to those who had filed claims because they

something to pay a man \$10,000 a
year (Mr. Terry's salary) to worry
himself about?"

The letter goes on to say that
General Benedict, as he promised
Representative Terry, appointed a
board to investigate the system of
distributing certificates.

"The board polled the 30 lowest
ranking men in my class," Dosh
writes, "one of whom would inevi-
tably be the 'goat' and have to suf-
fer this great humiliation and exces-
sive cheering on graduation, to find
their opinions."

"Of the thirty, two favored alpha-
betical graduation. One of the two
was the alphabetical senior and he
voted that way just to get the laugh
that he knew it would provoke
among his classmates."

"I think it is ridiculous that out-
siders who know next to nothing
about this institution should be per-
mitted to dictate changes in our
traditions. Outsiders just can't un-
derstand the position of the goat or
the goats in general. The goats are
the most popular men in the class
and the wooden nature of their men-
tal faculties is one of the most pro-
lific sources of humor for them and
their classmates."

"To take away the one glory that
they may achieve before graduation
—unheard of!"

Hospital Service Among First Group Be Recognized

The Hospital Saving Association
of North Carolina is among the
first group plans for hospital ser-
vice in the country to be approved
by the American Hospital Associa-
tion under the standards recently
established according to an announce-
ment received her today by Mrs. L.
A. Brock, local representative.

The new standards were adopted
as a protective measure both
for the public and affiliated hospi-
tals. The American Hospital Asso-
ciation has launched a national
movement to require hospital ser-
vice in insurance associations to main-
tain rigid financial and ethical
standards.

Nearly 1000 Pitt County mem-
bers of the Association will be in-
terested in this announcement. The
list of approved associations was
released yesterday from the office
of the American Hospital Asso-
ciation in Chicago.

Forty associations scattered thru-
out the United States, with a to-
tal membership of nearly 2000,000
obtained approval certificates. Hos-
pital Saving Association which is
the State-wide plan operated by
the North Carolina Medical So-
ciety and the North Carolina Hospi-
tal Association, was the only or-
ganization in North Carolina receiv-
ing approval it was stated. There
were three others approved in the
Southern area. Atlanta, Richmond,
and Norfolk. None of these oper-
ates on a state-wide scale.

"I am naturally delighted that
our Association can comply with all
the high standards," said Felix A.
Grisette of Chapel Hill, executive
director of the Association then in-
formed yesterday that his Associa-
tion had been approved. "The
American Hospital Association is
rendering the American public a
genuine service in seeing to it that
this new and popular form of pre-
tection is amply safeguarded."

The measurement standards on
which approval was based are: ade-
quate representation of hospitals,
medical profession, and public; non
profit sponsorship and control; par-
ticipation by the majority of hospi-
tals of standing in each commu-
nity; provision of benefits thru

service contracts with member hos-
pitals rather than through cash
indemnification for hospital expen-
ses; adequate subscription rates or
premiums; sound accounting pro-
cedures; complete actuarial data;
segregation from hospital finan-
ces; reasonable payment to hospi-
tals; dignified promotion and ad-
ministration; hospital service ben-
efits determined by customs of the
community; non-interference with
relationships between hospitals and
their staffs; general approval by
the Committee on Hospital Ser-
vice of the American Hospital As-
sociation.

QUITS COTTON TO RAISE HOGS

WATSON, April 18.—I got tired raising cotton to feed the boll weevil, says J. A. Watson, seed-feed-provisions man, in a statement to the Daily Reflector. Watson, who has been in the cotton business for many years, says he has decided to quit cotton and raise hogs. He says he has been raising hogs for some time, but has not been able to make a profit. To improve the quality of their livestock and poultry, the farmers have been adopting better methods of feeding and management, and have been buying pure bred and high grade hogs and chickens. A survey has shown that 55,338 worth of pure bred and good blood stock has been placed with Negroes in the county recently.

There were 22 pure bred male hogs valued at \$660 and 41 pure bred females valued at \$51,240. Twelve young pure bred bulls valued at \$600 were acquired by individuals and "bull associations." Twenty-three pure bred and high grade cows valued at \$1,150, and 18,873 pure bred day-old chicks valued at \$1,698 were also numbered in the recent purchases.

Where individual Negro farmers felt they could not afford a pure bred bull, a group would form an association to buy the animal cooperatively for the use of all members and other farmers upon payment of a small fee.

Checking Erosion Helpful To Game As Well As Soil

Raleigh, April 19.—Halting soil erosion increases the crop of game birds and smaller game animals, as well as being of inestimable value to the land itself, according to the game and inland fishing divisions of the Department of Conservation and Development.

This by reason of the fact that prevention of erosion is by means of plants and grasses which provide food for the small game. They also furnish cover for game and are used extensively by quail, rabbits and other small game as nesting places. And so the soil conservation program of the Department of Agriculture gets full approval of the Department of Conservation and Development.

As a result of the soil conservation act and the experimental work food is provided. Lespedezes are used extensively in the soil conservation service, and these, more and more farmers have soil erosion prevention and these carried out projects to stop soil erosion provide as good food as can be found in the soil conservation program of the Department of Agriculture.

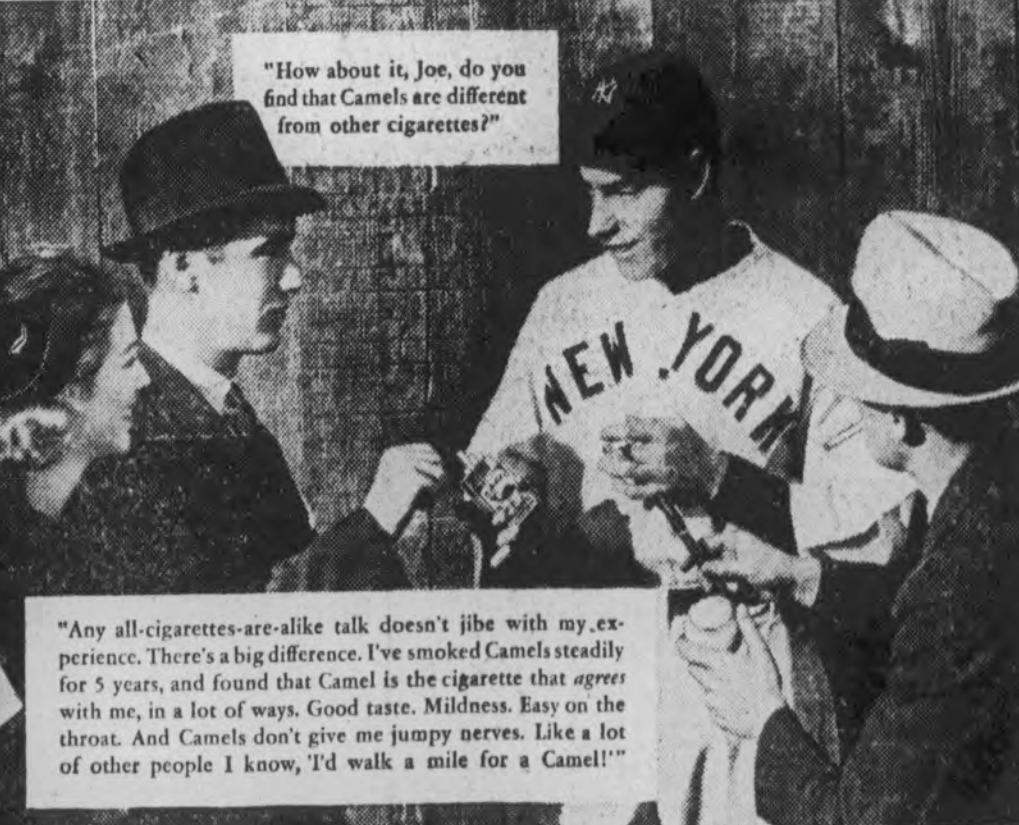
