JAP SOLDIERS SCORE GAIN IN RAILWAY AREA

Reported to Have Occupied Village Near Lunghai Line

CHINESE HOLDING IN PIHSIEN AREA

Reinforced Japanese Troops Attempting to Capture Suchow, Strategic R. R. City

Shanghai, April 30. — (AP)—The left wing of the Japanese army fighting southward along the Shantung battle front was reported today to have occupied the village of Nanlakow, only five miles from the Lunghai railway.

Neutral observers said Japanese blasted Chinese offensive with artillery fire and airplane bombardment to make the advance possible.

Nanlakow is nine miles southwest of Tancheng in southeastern Shantung province.

The same sources said Japanese forces were pushing rapidly to the south along the Tientsin-Pukow railway with the Chinese retreating in orderly fashion.

North of Pihsiens, however, the Chinese were said still to be blocking the Japanese drive, despite heavy casualties.

The Japanese reinforced by thousands of troops in recent weeks are trying to capture Suchow, strategic railway junction.

Neutral observers said the Chinese lost nine planes and five pilots in the spectacular air battle over Han-kow yesterday. They said the Japanese lost nine large planes and 13 small ships.

About 36 Japanese planes tried to raid the temporary Chinese capital, but were met by a dog fight, one of the biggest of the war, resulted.

Places Blame For Grundy Explosion

Washington, April 30.—(AP)—The Bureau of Mines said today that the use of "unapproved methods" in the firing of a blast was responsible for the Grundy, Va., mine disaster in which 45 lives were lost.

The explosion in the Keen Mountain mine of the Red Jacket Coal Company occurred April 22.

In a preliminary report the Bureau said the explosion was caused by the firing of what is termed a "bulldozing shot" for the purpose of breaking up an accumulation of roof rock.

The rock, it added, had fallen before the day shift left the mine and the "shot" was fired shortly after the night shift had come into the shaft.

Ignited coal dust in the immediate area, resulting in an explosion which killed every person in that part of the mine, the Bureau declared, adding the death toll probably would have mounted to more than 100 persons if underground workings of the mine all had been connected.

The Bureau said it found there had been "rock dusting" which is designed to prevent dust explosions.

C. W. Phillips, director of Public Relations of the Woman's College, University of North Carolina, delivered the commencement address at the Farmville high school last night.

The graduating class is composed of 20 boys and 14 girls. Heretofore the number of girl graduates has exceeded the number of boys.

Frances Bivens Smith was valedictorian of the graduating class and Frances Newton was salutatorian. Diplomas were presented to the seniors by J. W. Holmes, chairman of the school board.

May Reopen Case In Labor Dispute

Philadelphia, April 30.—(AP)—Charles Fahy, general counsel for the National Labor Relations board said in the United States Circuit Court of Appeals today the board was considering reopening the cases of the Republic Steel corporation and "several other firms."

Fahy made the statement at a hearing on Republic's appeal of the board ruling ordering it to reinstate 5,000 employees who had struck and signed a contract with the Steel Workers' Organizing Committee.

The NLRB had ruled the corporation, the nation's third largest producer of steel, violated the Wagner labor relations act.

More Than Three Hundred Seek Legislative Seats

Raleigh, April 30.—More than 300 North Carolinians probably nearer 400—seek to have a part in making the 1939 laws by becoming members of the House of Representatives in the next General Assembly. Only eight can settle peacefully back in their arm chairs, stretch out and count themselves already "in" without opposition of any sort. Which leaves 112 of the 120 Representatives still in more or less doubt.

These figures are based on complete legislative slates from 84 of the state's 100 counties. In eight others there will be no primary elections to choose House candidates and from the remaining eight this bureau has sought in vain to get authentic information. Incidentally Raymond C. Maxwell, Secretary of the State Board of elections, is having the same trouble, even more in fact.

Temporary Spanish Capital Subjected to Bombardment

WEATHER STOPS EASTERN BATTLE

Dispatches from Opposing Armies Disagree on Point of Insurgent Advance

Barcelona, April 30. — (AP)—Two insurgent air raids today subjected this temporary capital of Spain to the worst bombing of the past six weeks.

Officials estimated 30 persons were killed and 50 injured when insurgent airmen twice attacked the city in three hours.

General Franco's fliers took advantage of the first sunny weather after many days of rain to stage the raids.

The first attack came at 8:45 and the second at 11:30, when first aid workers still were digging in the ruins of the only building struck in the opening raid.

Hendaye, France, April 30.—(AP)—Bad weather prolonged the stalemate on the eastern Spanish battle front today, limiting operations to sporadic encounters.

For several days the front, running from the Teruel sector eastward to the Mediterranean, has touched seven points.

Dispatches from the opposing armies disagreed as to the point where the line reaches the Mediterranean. The insurgents said their advance post was established two miles south of Alcala de Chivert. The government reported its flank position north of Alcala de Chivert.

Judge Isaac M. Meekins, of the United States District court, delivered the address at commencement exercises at Bethel last night on the topic of "Good Citizenship."

His address was encouraging to the graduates now preparing to leave high school and go to college or take their place in life.

Judge Meekins was introduced by Mayor M. K. Blount of Greenville. Medals were awarded by W. J. Smith, member of the County Board of Education, and certificates to seventh grade graduates by O. H. Boettcher, principal of the school.

Inflation World-Wide Influence Babson Sees Cheaper Currencies and Bear Market for Cash

Babson Park, Mass., April 30.—Not one major nation in the world today is paying its bills out of current earnings! The governments of the six big powers are spending far more money than they are taking in from taxes. The resultant deficits are being met by public borrowing. This condition has been going on now for years and there is no end in sight. Moreover, the deficits for 1938 promise to be the biggest on record since the World War. Because of these astronomical shortages, I am convinced that currency inflation is a world-wide, not just a nation, phenomenon.

The fact that public finances abroad are in such bad shape is over looked by most people when considering inflation. If the pound, franc, mark, yen and lira weaken to the crumbling point they will carry down with them the value of the dollar. Following the short period of improvement after the devaluations of 1932 to 1934, the international currency situation has already again become acute. Despite the slight-of-hand tricks being played with national figures, some day, must pay the Piper. When the pay-off comes, there can be only one way out—Inflation!

Spending Back Prosperity
The seriousness of our own situation is well known. The President's new program of gigantic outlays to "lick the recession" simply accents it. Few doubt that the accepted method of fighting hard times from now on will be to spend billions. But remember that it is far easier to turn the faucet on than it is to turn it off. Since this country committed itself to a spending program, the cost of all branches of federal government has driven ahead full steam. The figures for 1938-39 will be the largest in peace-time records. Our federal debt is today \$39,000,000,000—almost double the level of eight years ago and rising faster than ever. PRESIDENT OFF ON ONE WEEK FISHING CRUISE

Departs from Charleston Amid Roar and Smoke of Salute

FDR ANNOUNCES NO DESTINATION

Heads for "Somewhere" in South Atlantic Aboard New Cruiser Philadelphia

Charleston, S. C., April 30. (AP)—Amid the roar and smoke of saluting three-pounders, the new cruiser Philadelphia, carrying President Roosevelt on a week's fishing cruise, eased away from the Charleston navy yard at 9:45 a. m. today.

Headed for "somewhere" in the South Atlantic, the 10,000 ton vessel latest addition to the navy's rapidly increasing fleet, pulled away from the dock, with American and Presidential flags fluttering in the bright morning sun and the Chief executive sitting at the star-board rail on the main deck.

The escort destroyer Fanning followed the Philadelphia away from the dock and trailed her down the channel six miles to the sea as the Cruiser and a navy yard battery fired simultaneous 21-gun salutes.

Although no destination was announced, it was believed the President would go as far as the Virgin Islands to do some trolling for game fish that abound in the South Atlantic and Caribbean. He probably will disembark at Charleston a week from today.

The President arrived at the North Charleston Depot by special train from Washington at 8 a. m., at 8:45 he went aboard the Philadelphia.

Students Prove Ability In Largest Bus System

Raleigh, April 30.—At a bit after three o'clock every school day in North Carolina 4,179 buses pull away from 1,226 rural consolidated schools.

They go over main highways and secondary roads, along the edges of canals and around mountain curves. They are freighted with almost 300,000 children—the biggest peak-hour of bus transportation of any American bus system.

The surprising fact is that 3,600 of these buses are driven by high school children, carefully selected, exhaustively examined and trained. And these youngsters have improved, not lowered, the safety record in North Carolina, a state which has a proverbially bad highway accident record.

In the current school year, according to records available to C. C. Brown, transportation engineer for the school system in charge of bus operation, there has been no fatality or serious accident in the school bus system. Last year there

REMOVE POLES FROM STREETS

Telephone Company Working With Water & Light Comm.

The Carolina Telephone and Telegraph company and the Greenville Water and Light Commission have started a joint project which will place all wires and cables underground in the main business area of the city.

The telephone company was granted a franchise several months ago with the agreement that the company and the Water and Light Commission would work jointly in placing the wires and cables underground.

When the immediate project is completed all wires will be underground from the Telephone Exchange to the Atlantic Coast Line railway tracks on Dickinson avenue from the exchange on Washington to Fourth and on Fourth to Co-tanche. The program probably will be extended in the future.

SEEKS PART OF RELIEF FUNDS FOR AIR BASES

Rep. May to Ask For \$124,000,000 For Five Projects

ADJO'RNMENT BY MAY 15 IS SEEN

Early Closing Date Hoped for by Barkley; Others Fix Date Nearer June 1

Washington, April 30.—(AP)—Chairman May (D-Ky.), of the House Military Committee, said today he had asked a House Appropriations sub-committee to set aside \$124,000,000 of President Roosevelt's proposed new public works funds for construction of five major army air bases and improvement of existing army posts.

One of the new air bases would be located in Alaska, May said, and the others would be established at strategic points in the United States proper.

Other developments: Adjournment sentiment gained in both House and Senate in the wake of another thrumping defeat for the administration on the revised wage-hour bill, despite President Roosevelt's latest demand for such legislation.

Senate Majority Leader Barkley held to his prediction Congress would pack up and go home by May 15. House leaders fixed the quitting date closer to June 1.

As for the anti-monopoly messengers, received from the President yesterday, the consensus was that it would not prolong the session.

Senate and House were in recess. Decentralization of the business structure became a broad new administration objective.

This goal was set by the President in a militant anti-monopoly message to Congress asking a \$500,000 appropriation for studies of virtually all fundamental aspects of the nation's business life preliminary to congressional action to break up a "concentration of private power without equal in history."

Revenue Receipts Increase In State

Raleigh, April 30.—(AP)—North Carolina's revenue collections this month totaled \$4,478,069.09, an increase of 3.31 per cent over April, 1937. Revenue Commissioner A. V. Maxwell said today.

Receipts for this fiscal year reached \$61,305,354.57, an increase of 2.83 per cent over the total through April last year the commissioner said.

Income tax collections for the fiscal year aggregated \$10,787,613, nearly last year's all-time record high of more than \$11,000,000. In the revenue division April receipts totaled \$2,056,227.06, an increase of 7.85 per cent over 1937.

Motor vehicle bureau income, however, was \$2,241,842.93, a decrease of .03 per cent from a year ago.

Oppose Merger Of Methodist Church

Birmingham, Ala., April 30.—(AP)—Union of eight million American Methodists will meet its final church barrier late today at a hearing before the judicial council of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Opponents of the merger, warning of "secession," will present arguments that procedure followed in ratifying unification did not conform with church law. If the council upholds the unification an appeal to civil courts is expected.

The general conference of Southern Methodists voted 434 to 26 yesterday to close the breach between North and South, brought by Negro slavery in 1844.

There was no indication of the length of the hearing before the nine-member judicial council, the Supreme Court of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Facing Long Negotiations
Washington, April 30.—(AP)—Labor attorneys said today it might require from three months to a year for negotiations and fact-finding to bring a showdown if the employers rejected the railroad's proposal to cut wages 15 per cent.

Raleigh, April 30.—(AP)—Raleigh recorded its first 1938 automobile fatality early today as Peter Hicks, 10-year-old Negro, died following a truck collision here yesterday.

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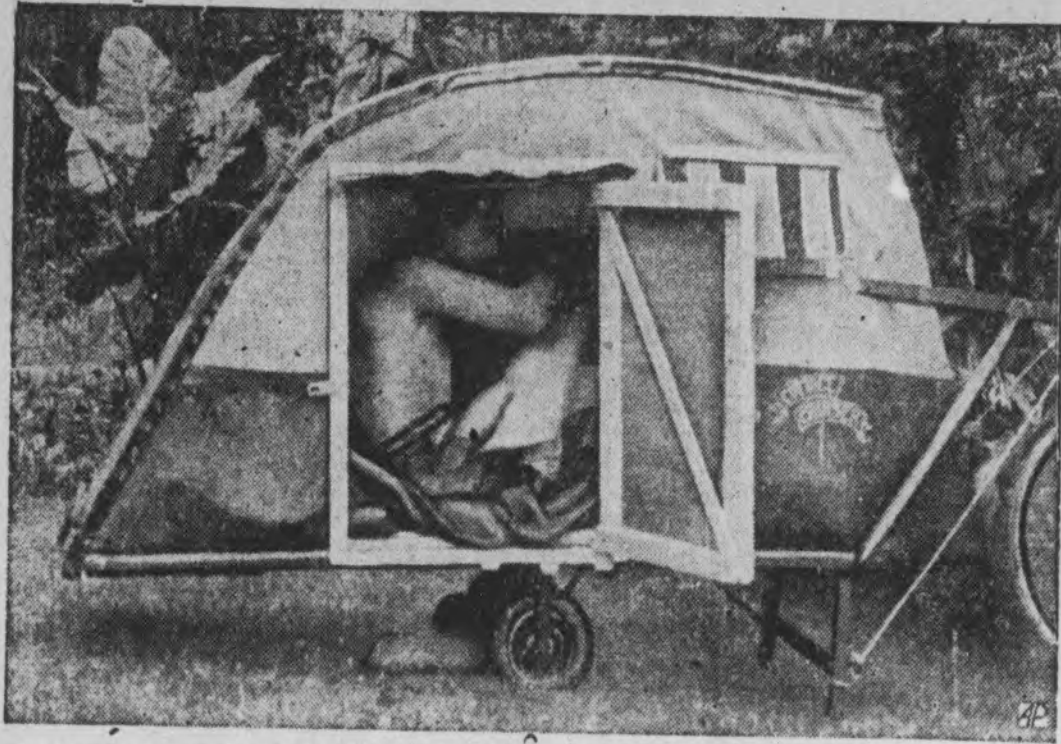
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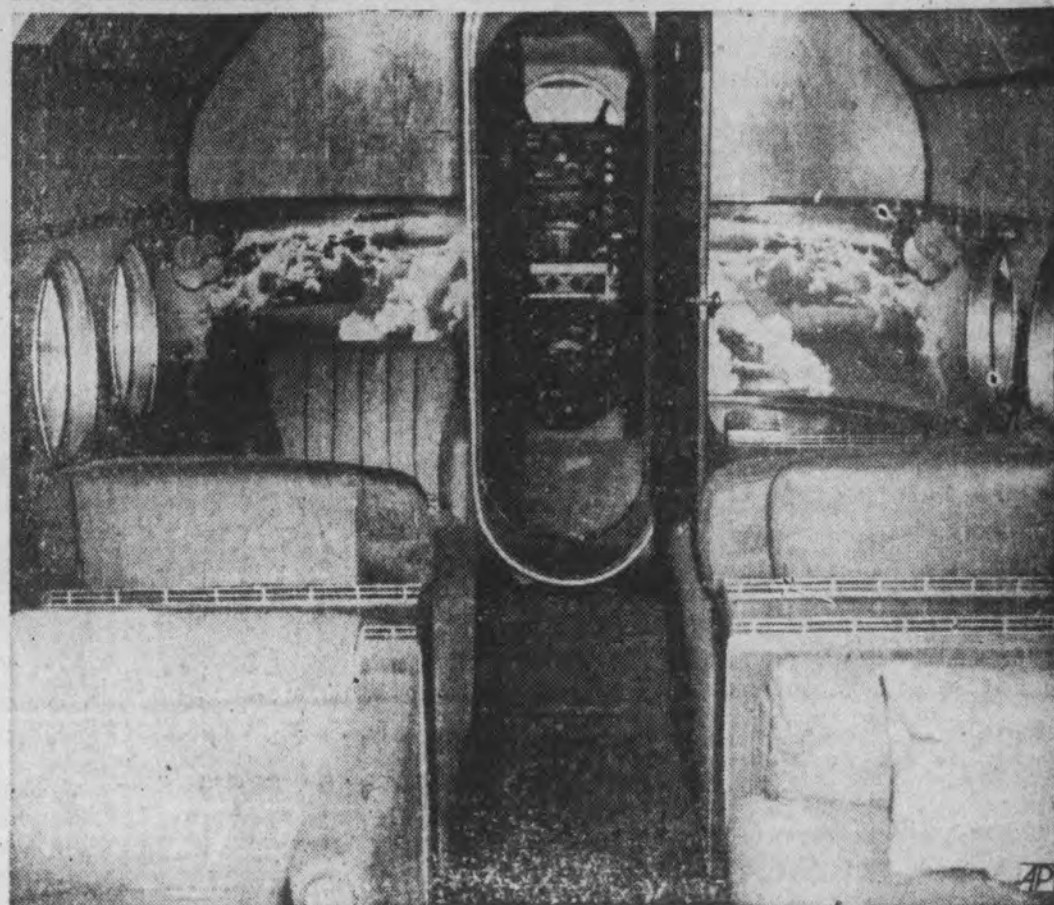
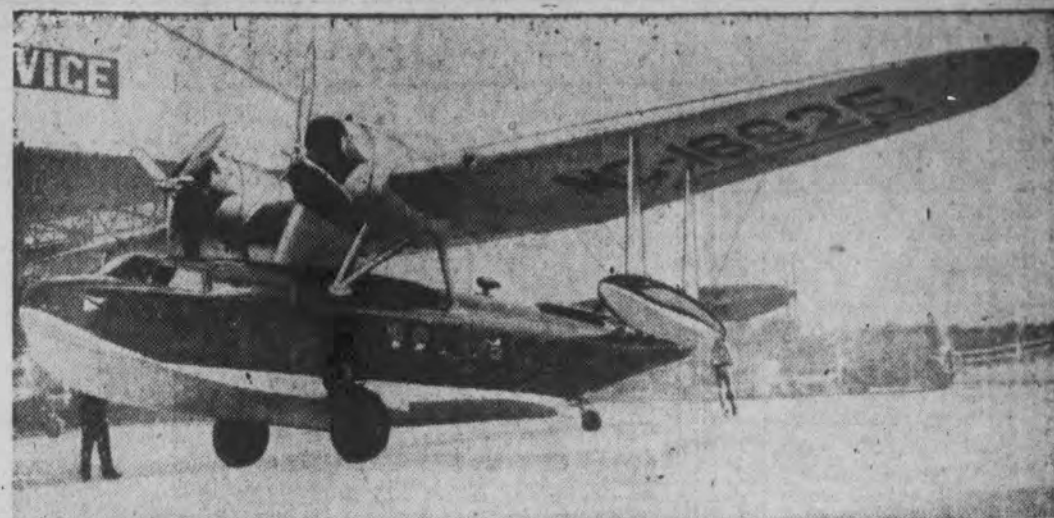

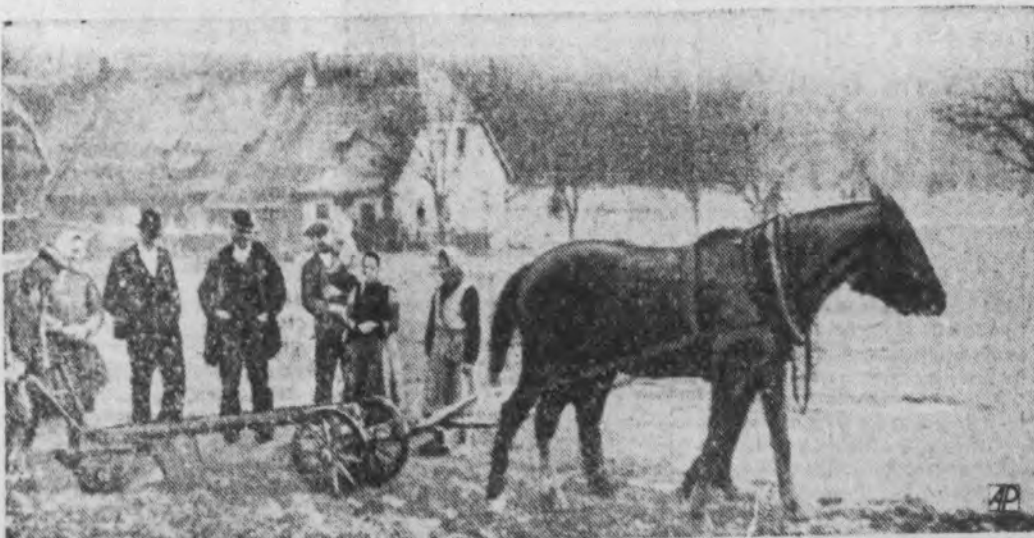

Washington—Many members of Congress, educated far from the halls of Harvard and Yale, often have expressed pain and annoyance (privately) that lawyers from the big schools appear to have the inside track on the nice jobs in the government. Finally, quiet Senator Sheppard of Texas is to take the first step to do something about it, publicly.

He has introduced a bill—and is pressing it—to prevent discrimination against Washington's "saw-down" law schools and other inner schools which wither in the shadow cast by the towering reputations of the big ones.

So far as we—or Senator Sheppard—can learn, there is no accurate nose count on which college has put the most lawyers in the government jobs. But there is a prevailing belief that Harvard has done very well, acting through Felix Frankfurter, who early was credited with putting hundreds of his "hot dogs" in the top brackets of the federal payroll.

They Work Their Way
Senator Sheppard firmly believes that there is rank discrimination against the little schools but concedes he is hard put to prove his case fully. He has written letters to heads of many departments asking them whether they restrict their selections to a limited list of schools and, if so, how they go about it. As yet he has had few replies.

His primary complaint is that numbers of departments and bureaus refuse to hire any lawyers except those graduated by schools approved by the American Bar Association or the Association of American Law Schools.

His staff has calculated that this restriction eliminates all except three of the 10 or more law schools in Texas. Equally to the point, it knocks out four of the several law schools in Washington which, he says, provide the principal opportunity for young patronage lads to get an education in law at the same time they earn a living. Youngsters come by scores from out in the states to hold minor government jobs while they go to school.

The local schools get their title of "saw-down" colleges because these lads work as Capitol police or run elevators from 9 to 4:30, then show off at sundown to law classes running from 5 to 7 p. m. They can start in with a high school education and in three years complete a law course.

Remember Prohibition?
For years the American Bar Association and the association of law colleges has pressed for higher and higher scholastic requirements and some of the top-flight schools now require law students first to finish a four-year college course before going into law.

Senator Sheppard insists that law schools which teach a man the law, without all this supplemental fancy work, should not be written off the books just because the big ones can offer more. His bill goes right to the heart of the dispute between the big schools and the "saw-down" institutions operating in old dwellings or second-string office buildings in Washington.

First, it provides that no department may reject an applicant for a job because he "has not been graduated from a particular law school."

Second, it would prevent rejection of a student who "has not been graduated from a law school which is of a particular class, or which has been approved or accredited by any association, organization or group; or has not had college training in addition to law-school training."

The bill provides that any government executive trying to get around those provisions would lose his pay.

The Senator is prepared for a long, slow fight. He has had training at that. He has spent most of his life trying to conquer the United States prohibition.

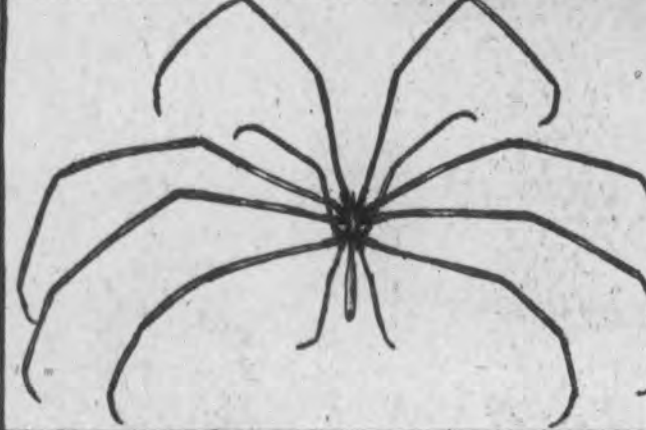

Although JUDAH PHILIP BENJAMIN became a national figure in American politics and was known as "the brains of the Confederacy" during the War Between the States, he never technically became a citizen of either the Confederacy or the United States of America. His parents made an attempt to emigrate to New Orleans in 1811, but learning that the mouth of the Mississippi was being blockaded, they decided to remain in the British West Indies where Judah was born. It was not until 1815 that they removed to the United States and later settled at Wilmington, N. C. After leaving Yale University, young Benjamin went to New Orleans where he passed the bar and started on his brilliant

career. The elder Benjamin, an English Jew, neglected to become naturalized, a fact that his distinguished son apparently overlooked. After the fall of the Confederacy, Benjamin escaped from Florida and eventually landed in England where he became one of the leading barristers in the British Empire. Thus, it was that this great American statesman died, as he was born, a British subject.

Raleigh, April 30—There are no straws showing which way the Administration (state) "wind" is blowing in the Reynolds-Hancock Set-a-torial campaign, but there are more than a few indications that a large percentage of Sandy Graham's 1936 gubernatorial wheel Foiger is doing a bit of quiet work in the field and Wake has nine, but there are three seats to be filled in each of these units. Just one example is to be found in Pasquotank, where virtually the same county organization which carried the Graham standard to victory there two years ago is now bearing the torch for Hancock.

In addition it can safely be put down in the books that A. D. (Lon) Foiger is doing a bit of quiet work for Frank, though his own candidacy for Congress naturally prevents him from being openly active.

This correspondent does not intend to convey the impression that the Grahamites, as an organized body, are tearing their shirts for Hancock, but the outward manifestations all point to the fact that as individuals they are favorably inclined to Frank's case.

And he is said, support of these Grahamites is by no means a handicap to Frank. Sandy's friends couldn't put him over in the 1936 race, but they are quite influential in all quarters of the state.

Incidentally the stirring days of 1936 were recalled by this correspondent when he saw a picture of Sandy in the McDowell News of this week. Graham, however, had done nothing more exciting than to make a short talk at Marion when the Safety Motorcade stopped there.

Those who remember the 1925 Legislature relish the possibility that some of its most exciting incidents may be re-enacted in 1939—depending upon the success of U. S. Page, the "Bladen Bombshell" in his campaign to representing his home county in the House and a victory for S. Bunn Frink, Senatorial aspirant from Brunswick.

Three years ago this pair wrote some of the most amusing, as well as belligerent, pages of the legislative journal. Frink represented Bladen, as well as Brunswick, in the Senate and he was forever at odds with Page, who was chosen by an element fundamentally at odds with Frink philosophy of politics.

They called each other everything under the sun except gentlemen and cedar trees.

Each has his work cut out for him this year, however, as Page must unseat a popular incumbent, Lloyd Elkins, while Frank's vis-a-vis is no pushover.

Victor S. Bryant of Durham is the only one of the three avowed speakership candidates who has opposition in the primary; and even

in his case it is likely that those who have announced in Durham are more after the vacancy caused by Oscar Barker's Congressional aspirations than they are after Victor's scalp.

Libby Ward and Bill Fenner are two of the eight House candidates who have no opposition either in primary or general election.

In 84 counties from which this bureau has authentic legislative lists, there are no less than 251 Democratic and 74 Republican House candidates, an average of some 1.7 like four for each seat.

Pamlico sets the pace, with no less than seven candidates, one of them a woman, after the one place. Forsyth has ten Democrats in the field and Wake has nine, but there are three seats to be filled in each of these units. Last time Wake had 21.

Furthermore, practically every major city, county, and state treasury is following the same course. Relieving the unemployed and priming the pump is a good policy provided it results in money going off relief and government expenses being slashed. In practice this does not happen, however. Small pressure groups succeed in keeping costs at a high pitch while people soon learn that the government will support them if they do not work. Public expenses today equal at least one-third of our national income. In 1912 they represented only one-tenth!

of Japan's annual budget is being met by taxes. Because she is so dependent on outside countries for many raw materials, Japan may be the first nation to hit the skids.

Her situation—and like the man in your own community who is spending more than he is earning. How long can he buy on credit, no one can predict. But everyone knows that, unless he soon reforms, he will end up in the bankruptcy court.

France and Great Britain are also in a pickle. France ranks as the weakest of the democracies from a financial standpoint. Her budget is hopelessly unbalanced and has been for years. Great Britain is the only major nation to have balanced her budget in the last eight years—but she did it only three times. Her enormous rearmament load will this year carry expenses far above tax receipts—and taxes are already sky-high.

Thirty Billion Dollar Deficit
Altogether the combined government deficits of the above five powers, plus our own, will this year equal about seven billion dollars. Here is at a tabulation showing the approximate deficits of these major nations since 1930. Undoubtedly, the actual shortages are greater than even these published figures indicate:

Great Britain	2,500,000,000
Japan	2,000,000,000
France	2,000,000,000
Germany	1,500,000,000
Italy	1,000,000,000
Total	\$29,000,000,000

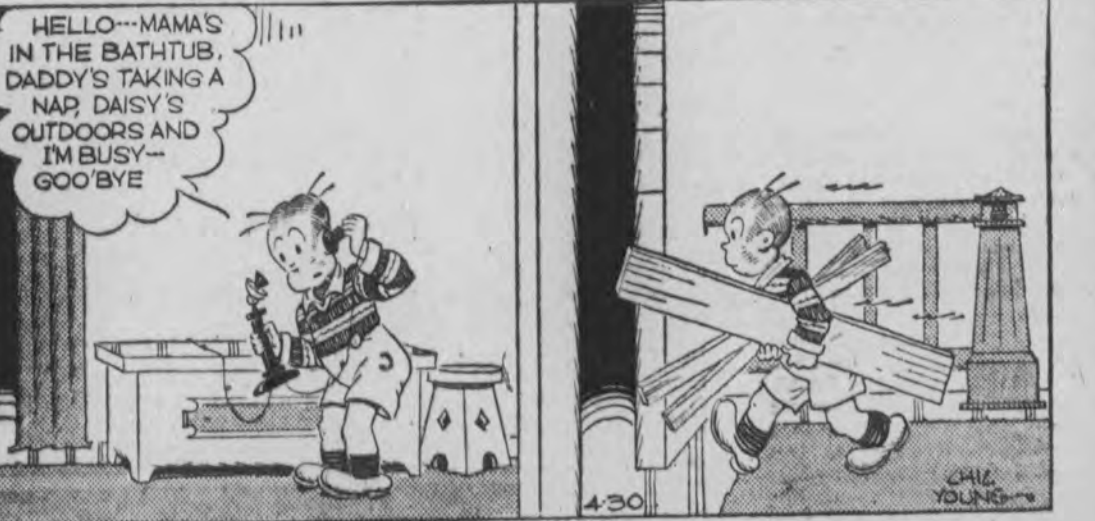

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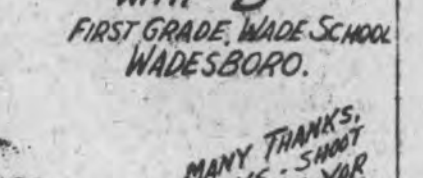
