

Seventy-Two Die In Explosion Of Mine In England

MANY INJURED IN GAS BLASTS

Question of Danger from Explosions Up Before House Commons at Very Minute Victims Caught In Two Violent Gas Explosions

Duckmanton, Derbyshire, England, May 10.—(AP)—Seventy-two miners were killed, 49 were known to be injured and a number of others were entombed in the wrecked workings today after two violent gas explosions in the Markham coal mine.

While rescue squads searched underground for trapped victims, Capt. Crookshank, minister of mines informed the House of Commons of the disaster.

Through grim coincident, the question of danger from explosions in mines was up before Commons. Ellis Smith, Laborite, asking what was being done to prevent repetition of such blasts as the one last July when 27 miners lost their lives.

Sobbing women gathered around the pithead as the dead and injured were brought to the surface. Scenes were particularly grievous in the little mortuary where wives and relatives tried to identify the bodies.

One woman found four members of her family were still in the blasted workings, their fate undetermined.

The two terrific explosions trapping an entire shift in the colliery, spread grief through the little village of Duckmanton, a neat cluster of red brick cottages some distance from the mine.

Children whose fathers were in the pit bravely went to school. One asked a teacher, "Please, Miss, is it bad?"

Scores of rescuers stripped to the waist, fought through roof walks toward the trapped men. Police broadcast a call for oxygen.

Exercises Honor Confederate Dead

Brief, but impressive Memorial Day exercises were conducted in Greenville today in honor of the Confederate dead.

The program began at the high school auditorium, where Bill Cobb, high school boy, made a talk on the history of the Confederate flag.

Led by the band, the entire high school student body then marched to the Confederate monument of the court house lawn. Flowers were laid at the foot of the monument, later to be taken to the cemetery and placed on the graves of the old soldiers.

Judge G. V. Cowper was introduced by Mayor M. K. Blount and made a brief talk. The sounding of taps and the benediction by Rev. W. A. Ryan completed the exercises. There is no living Confederate veterans in Pitt county.

One Miner Killed In West Va. Blast

Wyoming, West. Va., May 10.—(AP)—A blast killed one miner, left two others injured today in a Welch hospital, one of them possibly fatally hurt.

Officials of the Red Jacket Junior Coal company said the premature explosion, which killed 33-year old Arthur Brooks of Key Rock, occurred while he was tamping explosives in a "shot hole."

Organization Victories Foreshadow Quiet Confab

Raleigh, May 10.—The absence of contests in most of the precinct conventions Saturday and the victory of organization candidates in those places where there were fights foreshadow one of the quietest, least spectacular state conventions in several years.

It now looks as if the Democrats of Tar Heel will send their representatives to Raleigh next week to do much "pointing with pride" but very little "viewing with alarm."

The lack of fighting in the precincts indicates that practically every county convention will be composed of journeyman politicians who haven't the slightest desire to offend anyone by taking a drastic stand on anything.

It follows that the county meetings will in turn send to the state gathering worldly wise representatives who know well how to keep one foot on each side of the fence if they can't perch steadily atop it.

So far nobody has advanced any controversial issues, with the possible exception of a plank calling for approval of the principle of crop control marketing quotas, a principle which Senator Josiah W. Bailey has fought very vigorously. But even in this single instance there's small likelihood that the fight, if it can be dignified with that name, will get very far even in the platform committee, much less on the floor.

Neither Reynolds nor Hancock partisans appear to be plotting any deep, dark schemes. If either Dyes or County Controllers have any idea of starting anything they have kept it a deep, dark secret.

And so anyone who wants to see a good old-fashioned knock down and drag out battle such as marked conventions like that of 1928, may just as well stay home. This time, it seems, the state's Democrats are going to get together, sing a few bars of political harmony, join in lustily in a chorus of "Ain't Democracy Grand" and then go home until the next meeting.

SPENDING BILL PROVIDES JOBS FOR 4,135,000

House Appropriations Committee Reports Figures

SAYS CHIEF AIM FOR EMPLOYMENT

Concedes Might Be Disappointment By Failure to Earmark Any of Relief Funds

Washington, May 10.—(AP)—The administration's \$3,054,425,000 spending-lending bill will provide jobs for 4,135,000 persons, the House Appropriations Committee estimated today.

The committee included that figure in a report recommending enactment of the bill, submitted shortly before the house began debate on the measure.

The primary purpose of the legislation, the report said, is to furnish "direct employment on the site and indirect employment away from the site of work, for some of the many millions who are unemployed and destitute or harassed by the specter that haunts the doomsday of that two large-unfortunate groups."

The committee conceded there might be disappointments because of its failure to set aside specific sums for particular projects or types of work in definite areas.

It said, however, that it felt the "earmarking of the funds with reference to individual projects, localities, groups or otherwise would bog down the program and defeat the primary urgent end and aim of the entire proposal."

House passage of the big lending spending measure became the immediate goal of administration leaders, intent on adjournment by mid-June.

Meantime Captain Royal E. Ingersoll, chief of the navy's war plan division who worked with British naval authorities in evolving a program for bigger battleships, was prompted to the rank of rear admiral.

President Roosevelt sent his name to the Senate for confirmation and when the senate approves his new rank Ingersoll will be sent to San Pedro, Calif. to command the sixth cruiser division, consisting of four heavy cruisers.

Call For Bids On Steel For Stadium

Another step toward actual construction of the athletic field stadium was taken last night when the Board of Aldermen voted to proceed with the letting of contracts for steel structure in the grandstand and locker rooms.

The stadium is to be erected of steel frame resting on concrete footings.

Steel contractors are asked to submit sealed bids on steel delivered in Greenville, and also erected, until Friday, May 20. Bids should be addressed to the city clerk, J. O. Duval.

'Airplane Fishing' To Be Protested. Santa Barbara Calif. (AP)—The county fishing industry plans an appeal to the state legislature to halt airplane fishing.

Santa Barbara fishermen charge that planes patrol waters off Ventura and Santa Barbara counties, dropping smoke bombs when they sight schools of fish. On that signal schooners along the coast—in communication by radio—converge on the school with mile-long nets, making rich hauls.

Committee Would Probe Unamerican Propaganda Activities In The U. S.

Washington, May 10.—(AP)—The House Rules Committee approved a resolution by Representative Dies (D.-Tex.), today for a congressional investigation of "un-American propaganda activities in the United States."

Chairman Dickstein (D.-N. Y.), of the Immigration Committee, said the inquiry, which would be conducted by seven House members, was necessary to prevent "riots and bloodshed."

"There is going to be another riot next week," he said. "They are going to have a parade of 100,000 Nazis opening up Camp Siegfried, Long Island."

"A group of Legionnaires came to me yesterday and said they were ready to take the law into their own hands because they say these Nazis can't goose-step and 'Heil, Hitler' and carry on with swastikas."

American shipment of war materials to China and Japan exceeded \$10,000,000 in the five months ended April 30, State Department records showed, meanwhile. The rate was far in excess of last year.

The new figures began with December 1, the start of the fiscal year adopted by the National Munitions Control Board, which licenses munitions shipments.

During the five months shipments to China totaled \$5,296,442 and to Japan \$4,756,483.

LEAGUE ASKED PERMIT CHINA RECEIVE HELP

Delegate Requests That Council Apply Provisions

ONE POWER ONLY AIDED THUS FAR

Dr. Koo Cites Two Resolutions Recommending Members Consider Help

Geneva, May 10.—(AP)—Dr. Wellington Koo, Chinese delegate to the League of Nations, asked the League Council today to apply provisions of the covenant in giving China aid against Japan.

He cited two resolutions, one by the League assembly last October and another by the council in February, which recommended that league members consider individual aid to China.

"With one exception," he said, none of the league members have come to China's aid. He did not name the country which had supplied the help, but it was believed he referred to Soviet Russia.

"China expects to receive from other members of the League material aid and effective co-operation in restraining the forces of aggression," he declared.

"Such aid and co-operation is more urgent because it will hasten the termination of hostilities and insure the defeat of the forces of disorder and violence."

"In the name of my government I ask the council to apply provisions of the covenant and supplement the resolutions of assembly and council with concrete measures."

"By such action Japanese aggression with all its horrors and cruelty may effectively be brought to an end. The principles of the league, may be fully vindicated."

Earlier British Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax told League of Nations council that the recent anglo-Italian agreement was a contribution toward world peace.

William L. Brown Claimed By Death

William Lucien Brown, 72, prominent farmer of the Falkland community, died last night at his home at 8 o'clock from a stroke of paralysis he suffered at 9 o'clock yesterday morning. He had been in his usual health and his passing came as a shock to his family and friends.

Funeral services will be held from the late home Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock by Rev. H. M. Wilson, Presbyterian minister of Farmville, assisted by Rev. C. A. Lawrence, Presbyterian minister of Falkland. Burial will follow in Falkland cemetery.

Surviving are his wife, who before marriage was Miss Mollie Weeks; two sons, H. L. Brown, Falkland and G. A. Brown, Greenville; two daughters, Mrs. Thomas Delaney of Washington, D. C., and Mrs. W. G. Craft of Greenville.

Active pallbearers will be Joe Duke, Woodrow Wilson, Milton Moore, Jack Little, Garland Hudson and S. L. Rowland.

North Carolina Electric Rates Below U. S. Average

Raleigh, May 10.—North Carolina's rates for electric power for residential use are approximately ten per cent less than the rate average for the entire country, a comparison of figures for the state (furnished by the Utility Commission) with figures for the nation, from the Edison Institute, reveal.

Throughout the United States the average electric rate is 4.93 cents per kilowatt hour, according to the Edison figures, while for North Carolina the average residential rate is 3.94 cents per kilowatt.

Nationally the average residence bill is \$34.81 per year, and the average consumption per residence is 793 kilowatts. On the basis of the same consumption as in the nation, the North Carolina residence dweller pays on an average \$31.24.

The Edison Institute figures lump all other electricity as "Industrial" while in North Carolina these figures are broken down into "Commercial," "Power," and "Municipal,"

with average rates per kilowatt of 3.95, 1.07 and 1.50 cents, respectively. "Commercial" use includes the lighting of places of business, refrigeration in such places and the like. "Power" includes current sold to manufacturing plants. "Municipal" rates are those charged by the utilities for current sold wholesale to municipalities which in turn resell to the consumers.

Figures for each of these classes on a nationwide basis are unavailable, but Utility Commission officials say that the rates on all three are much lower, correspondingly, than the national average as are the residential rates.

Electric rates have been reduced in North Carolina progressively ever since 1932 to such an extent that the Utility Commission estimates that users in the state have been saved a total of \$23,341,611, divided \$7,732,698 to residential, \$5,988,240 to commercial, \$8,023,672 to power, and \$1,696,001 to municipal users.

State's Witness Brands Previous Testimony 'Lies'

Duke Accused

The witness further testified that he was paid for his appearance before the grand jury and that Thomas E. Beaman, one of the investigators, had promised him additional money and a "good job" if he would testify against the Sheriff.

When court took its noon recess until 2 o'clock this afternoon nine witnesses had appeared on the stand since testimony was begun yesterday afternoon.

All testimony offered so far in the case of accepting bribes from the other counts in the petition having been touched on as yet.

The proceedings began yesterday morning with the reading of the ouster petition brought by individual members of the County Board of Commission, and the answer by defense counsel. The petition charged bribery, extortion, misconduct, and maladministration and defense answer denied all charges, declaring the entire accusation "maliciously false."

Testimony of witnesses at first hearing of Whitehurst case.

The first witness called yesterday afternoon was Charles R. Smith, of Washington, brother of Jesse Smith deceased, who it is alleged paid Sheriff in cash and whiskey for protection. Smith testified that from October 1928 until in 1932 he had lived with and near his brother Jesse Smith near Fleming's cross roads and that his brother was known as one of the county's outstanding pint and quart bootleggers.

On several occasions, he testified, he had seen Whitehurst come to the home for conversation with Jesse Smith and that immediately following each of these visits he and a Negro, Sam Heath, would help Jesse hide his liquor in the fields prior to the arrival of officers who came to raid the place.

On the occasion of one of the sheriff's visits Smith testified that his brother Jesse came to him to borrow \$55 in cash. When asked whether or not his brother paid the money to the Sheriff there was objection by defense counsel as to the admission of evidence as to what his brother told him, and the witness testified that he personally did not see the money delivered. He declared that on one occasion after Sheriff Whitehurst had visited Jesse Smith and the liquor had been hidden, Harris and Sellers had raided the place and found no liquor.

On two other occasions, he said, Whitehurst's visits to Jesse Smith had been followed by raids of Federal officers but that in each instance the officers found no liquor.

Upon cross examination the witness admitted that he himself had for a time been engaged in bootlegging and had been arrested several times and convicted twice for liquor law violations. He also admitted being hauled into court several on bad check charges. Asked when he had first been contacted regarding furnishing an affidavit and testifying in this case he stated that he was in Norfolk and had been visited by J. A. Nelms, undercover agent, accompanied by J. D. Tripp.

The second witness was Charles Smith of Arapahoe, son of the late Jesse Smith. He testified that his father, before his death in 1932 was a bootlegger and that on several occasions Whitehurst had come out to the house to see his father and that on three occasions he had seen his father give Whitehurst money, one time \$150.00 another time \$50.00 and a third time \$40. He testified

ANNUAL CO-OP DAY OBSERVED

Cooperative Marketing and Purchasing Emphasized

Raleigh, May 10.—(AP)—Cooperative marketing of farm products and purchasing of farm needs and a program for the production of all of all possible needs hold the solution to most of the farmers' problems, several thousand North Carolinians were told here today at annual "Co-op Day."

S. D. Sanders, cooperative bank commissioner of the Farm Credit Administration in Washington, along with Governor Hoy and M. G. Mann, general manager of the N. C. Cotton Association and Farmers' Cooperative Exchange, talked of the values of cooperation.

Governor Hoy pointed out six years ago "a condition of prostration existed" everywhere "due to ruinous prices which then were obtained." Now, he said, new buildings, new enterprises, new homes are going up and on the farms new barns, new fences and new homes reflect a general air of "improvement and prosperity."

Government aid and cooperative aid both have played a part, he said. "The farmer is now so intimately connected with business that he is naturally affected by all changes," said the Governor.

Revival of Religion Is Imminent
Editor's Note: This is one of a series of articles given us for publication by Rev. Lowell F. Sodemann, pastor of Memorial Baptist Church of Greenville, which articles are expected to stimulate the thinking of readers and prepare the way for the series of revival services to be held in this church May 16-27.

The day of the imminent evangelist with his high-pressure, emotional appeals, the big tent and the noisy preliminaries may be past, but the day of evangelistic preaching is not past, nor will it ever pass. The fundamental purpose of the church is to maintain a sane program of evangelism, for evangelism is essentially "Christianity alive and working." We "evangelize or paralyze" in our Christian program. So, it is an encouraging and hopeful sign to see that throughout the land there is a turning to God. Revivals conducted by pastors rather than travelling evangelists are proving that people respond to the truth when it is presented to them, forcibly, honestly, and compassionately. The following paragraphs come from an article written by R. C. Campbell of Texas:

"There are encouraging evidences of a coming revival. The national and world background is favorable. Just as the waters of the ocean ebb and flow, so moral and spiritual tides ebb and flow. Pendulums swing from one extreme to the other. History shows that wickedness deepens to a point where reaction sets up. The people seek to leap from the pit of destruction into the arms of God.

"America, as well as other nations, has sunk deep into the quagmire of iniquity. Profound corruption is evident on all sides.... Low standards, immorality, shattered ideals, wrecked homes, gambling, greed for gold, atheism and infidelity, denial and defiance of God.... selfishness.... are some of the evidences of a reckless age with a blood count that reveals a pressure so high that paralysis will result unless a change comes and comes quickly. The present world background is as black as a midnight thundercloud filled with the lightning flashes of eternity, and the thunder claps of doom.

"Such conditions existed in the latter part of the eighteenth century. Then infidelity reigned. A moral stupor paralyzed Christianity. Sin had intoxicated the nation. Higher criticism had dipped her pen in venom and poisoned the age.... the Bible was no more than a cobweb to catch insects.

"The people, sick, forlorn, hungry-hearted, and needy, turned to God. The great American revival followed and the nation was turned back to God. A national catastrophe was averted. It was then, as it is now, 'Christ or chaos.' Today the self-confidence of the people is shattered. This opens the way to God. In the words of another, 'I am con-

SAYS PLANNING BOARD NEEDED

Coletrane Sees Need For Agricultural Council

Reflector Bureau
Raleigh, May 10.—An Agricultural Council or Planning Board, composed of all elements interested in growing, marketing, distributing and consuming farm products, for North Carolina would be of great service to growers and consumers alike, D. S. Coletrane, assistant to W. Kerr Scott, State Commissioner of Agriculture, believes.

Such an organization would enable farmers to meet emergencies of over-production and the like with much better chance of grappling successfully with them, he said.

Mr. Coletrane's idea is to include representatives of all groups on the Council or Board in order that the advice of each would be available. This would also make possible a more concentrated and effective campaign on any lines, he said.

As a concrete example of what a Planning Board could do, Mr. Coletrane cited the present situation with reference to cabbage and potato production. In the case of both there is a tremendous crop to be marketed and there is no general organization in North Carolina which could quickly mobilize all groups in an effort to solve this over-production problem quickly and efficiently.

The situation would not be so acute, he said, if representatives of

growers, processors, and consumer groups, had some definite plans for a campaign to increase consumption of both cabbage and potatoes within the state. The surpluses have been foreseen for some time, he said, and it would have been possible to launch a campaign to induce greater home consumption. Dieticians could have pointed out to the public the value of cabbage and potatoes as food, and could have told how to fix them in the most attractive ways. Grocers could have made them "leaders" in their advertising and a local demand for the two vegetables could have been created.

No definite steps have been taken toward creating such a Council but the department is toying with the idea.

Vacationists' Lot Now Happier One
Racine, Wis.—(AP) Vacationists have been relieved of a source of worry by Police Chief Grover C. Lutter.

Residents about to leave on a trip are requested to telephone police headquarters to give their names, addresses, time of departure and return, and the names of persons, if any, left in charge of their property.

Several times a week policemen will inspect the vacant premises. Once a week vacationers will receive postcards telling them of the inspections.

fessors left without any idea what
of spreading the doctrines of the
New Deal. Some left liking it;
others slammed the door as they
went out.

Outward Bound
Exhibit No. 1 in most tabulations
Rex Tugwell, who came from
Columbia as a professor of econom-
ics and urged farmers and labor to
urge "for this and that. He bound-
ed from headline to headline until
retired from the Resettlement
Administration to go into the mo-
vies business.

Raymond Moley came from Colum-
bia to become a front-line "brain
buster" but grew critical in time and
died to the publishing business
and further teaching at Columbia.

Prof. George Warren, head of the
Department of Agricultural Econom-
ics at Cornell, was an early Presi-
dential adviser on gold matters, al-
though he never left his post at
Cornell. Now he is retiring as head
of the department and is being suc-
ceeded by William I. Myers.

Myers, one time professor of farm
economics at Cornell, came to the gov-
ernment early in the New Deal and
recently has headed the Farm Secu-

school he kept 5,000 chickens in-
dustriously laying by treating them
scientific food and ultra-violet
rays.

James M. Landis, law instructor
at Harvard, almost in his boyhood
passed through the Federal Trade
Commission and the chairmanship
of the Securities and Exchange
Commission before returning to
Harvard as dean of law.

Lloyd K. Garrison, member of
the first National Labor Relations
Board, now teaches law at Wiscon-
sin University.

John Dickinson, once assistant
secretary of Commerce and later
assistant Attorney General in charge
of the anti-trust division, now is
an of law at the University of
Pennsylvania. Earlier he had taught
at Pennsylvania and elsewhere.

Fred D. Fag, Jr., bounded from
law chair at Northwestern Univer-
sity, through the chairmanship
of the Bureau of Aeronautics and
up to top job in the Northwestern
University school of commerce.

O. M. W. Sprague, professor of
economics at Harvard, served for a
time as special adviser on economics
to the Treasury Department but left
after an extended disagree-
ment on policy and continued at
Harvard.

Two Recruits
Thurman Arnold, Yale law pro-
fessor, is the most recent New Deal
recruitment, coming in as assistant
attorney general in charge of the
anti-trust division. Another out-
standing Yale law teacher, William
Douglas, now is chairman of the
courtesy and Exchange Commis-
sion.

One thing noticeable about these
recruits is that most of them come
from the minor leagues in the teach-
ing profession, turn a trick or two
for the government and go back to
be in the academic big leagues.

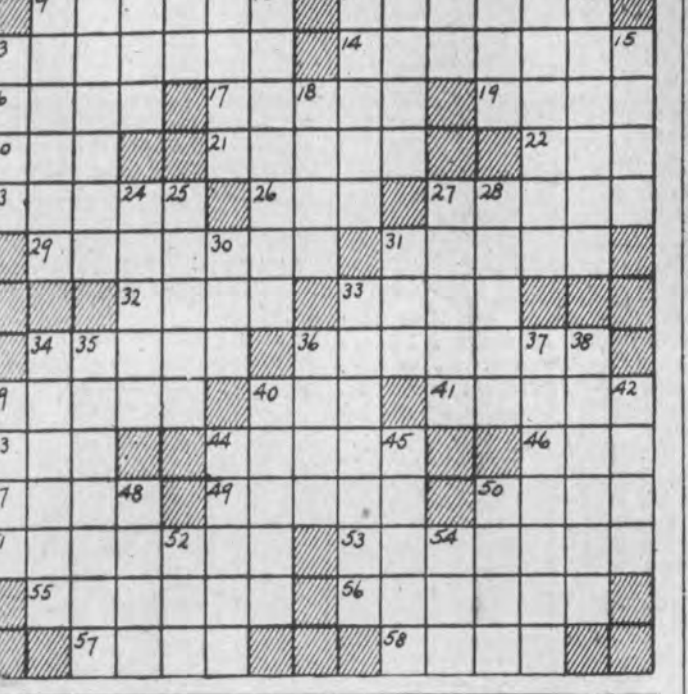
