U.S. PROTESTS TO JAP CONSUL OVER BOMBING

Note Delivered to Japanese Official at Hong Kong

PROJECTILES HIT NEAR BUILDINGS

Congress, Meantime, Is Working Toward Adjournment With Wage Agreement

Washington, June 8. — (AP)—The American government protested to the Japanese Consul General at Hongkong today against the bombing by Japanese airplanes of the campus of the American-endowed Lingnan University at Canton.

The State Department said this country's protest was delivered to the Japanese official by A. E. Southard, U. S. Consul General at Hongkong.

The department said Southard cabled that three Japanese bombs fell on the western end of the campus at the edge of the athletic field 200 yards from houses occupied by Americans.

No buildings were struck. In protesting to the Japanese Consul General, Southard pointed out, the department said, that the property was partly owned by Americans, as well as the direct American participation in the institution's financial support and administration.

Meantime, a joint congressional committee compromised wage-hour legislation by agreeing to imposition of a universal wage of 40 cents an hour and all inter-state industries at the end of seven years, except where such a wage should cause unemployment.

The compromise, adopted with the approval of 12 of the 14 conferees, would provide for a minimum wage of 25 cents an hour, with no acceptance, for the first year. This would be advanced to 30 cents the following year.

After this board appointed by a central administrator would be empowered to examine conditions in individual industries to determine the minimum wage to be paid by these industries. The board, made up of representatives of the employers, employees and public, would be charged with the duty of increasing the minimum to 40 cents an hour as rapidly as possible.

U. S. PROPERTY IN CANTON HIT BY JAPANESE BOMBS

Canton, China, June 8.—Two new bombardments today raised civilian casualties in this crippled city to at least 3,000 killed and 5,000 wounded in 12 successive days of Japanese air raids.

Two American-owned properties, the Lingnan university and oil tanks of the Standard Oil Company were struck by Japanese bombs today.

The oil tanks burst into flames, spreading a conflagration that burned the terminal of the Canton-Hankow railroad and a 16-car train that had just arrived from Hankow.

At least 300 new civilian casualties were inflicted on Honan island, an industrial district. Several Japanese bombs apparently aimed at the river bridge, exploded in Honan's congested areas, demolishing about 100 houses.

It was estimated fully 500,000 inhabitants of this war-torn city of about one million had fled. About a third of its residences have been vacated.

Shanghai, June 8.—(AP)—Casualties in recent fighting in Central China have raised the Japanese total to well past 300,000 and the Chinese to more than one million, foreign military authorities estimated today.

These estimates, based on undisclosed sources of information, said Japanese lost 32,000 killed between April 1 and May 22.

In the Shanghai and Hangchow area it was estimated the Japanese had lost 300 killed and 700 wounded, mostly in guerrilla fighting.

Reprieve Is Granted Guilford County Man

Raleigh, June 8.—(AP)—Governor Hootch announced today he would not intervene in behalf of Emile Baldwin, sentenced to be executed Friday for rape in Columbus county, but a 30-day reprieve was given Ben Sims, convicted of murder in Guilford county.

Baldwin, a Negro, was convicted in January of attacking Miss Kathleen Polley.

SIX DIE IN MAY OF ACCIDENTS

Troop A of Highway Patrol Releases Its Monthly Report

Six persons were killed on highways of Eastern North Carolina during May, as compared with four in April, the monthly report of Troop A of the State Highway patrol revealed today.

In addition to the six fatalities 25 persons were injured in the 54 accidents investigated by the force. During April 25 persons were injured, besides those killed, in 47 accidents investigated.

The patrolmen made 372 arrests for driving drunk during May, while in the previous month 363 arrests were made, 38 of the defendants being charged with operating a car while under the influence of whiskey.

Of the 372 cases heard as a result of activities of the patrolmen, 360 defendants were convicted and 12 acquitted. Sentences ranged from eight months, three and one-half months and one day.

Fines amounted to \$3,169.86 and costs \$2,223.82. In addition the force recovered stolen property valued at \$1,200 and collected \$4,358.20, for a grand total of \$11,951.84.

During the month 1,266 applications for driver's license were examined, 1,159 being granted the permits.

The entire personnel of Troop A spent 11,935 hours on duty, traveled 114,597 miles, using 473 pints of oil and 4,602 gallons of gasoline.

Activities included: vehicles inspected, 2,024; lights corrected, 2,327; warnings issued, 39; courtesies extended, 350; cars recovered, three vehicles stored, 19 vehicles weighed 13, with 10 found overloaded; complaints investigated, 286; citations made 249.

REA Officials Studying North Carolina Program

Raleigh, June 8.—Director Dudley Bagley and other officials of the State Rural Electrification Authority are scratching their heads hard in an effort to map out a comprehensive plan for continuation of the program to light up the homes of Tar Heel folks who live in the state's nearly 300,000 farm dwellings.

In view of the fact that \$2,000,000 in Federal funds will be available for use in the next fiscal year (beginning July 1) and of the further fact that practically all the private power companies of the State have co-operated with the REA's projects and are willing to go along further, however, any study of the situation which goes deeper than scratching the surface indicates there is real grounds for looking before leaping pell mell into the business of electrifying the nearly 90 per cent of farm dwellings still without the juice Ben Franklin discovered and Edison made famous.

An official of the Federal REA was here recently on what he called a "planning tour." He came with the glad tidings that there will be \$2,000,000 to allocate in the state next fiscal year. He thought there should be no trouble at all in finding where to spend that amount.

CLEAN BILL OF HEALTH GIVEN COTTON CO-OPS

Senate Committee Votes 11-2 to Withdraw Charges

ACCEPTS PLANS FOR LEGISLATION

To Instruct Secretary of Agriculture To Prepare Measure for Grading Cotton

Washington, June 8. — (AP)—The Senate Agriculture committee voted 11 to two today to clear the American Cotton Cooperative Association of all charges raised against it during an investigation started more than a year ago.

The committee adopted a report prepared by Senators Bankhead (D-Ala.), and Ellender (D-S. C.), which gave the cooperative a clean bill of health on each of the specifications raised by Lawrence Westbrook and the special staff named to prove ACCA.

At the same time the committee accepted a suggestion of Chairman Smith (D-S. C.), that the Secretary of Agriculture prepare legislation which would provide a complete government quality rating on every bale of cotton ginned.

Sensors Smith and Prazier (R-N. D.), did not join in the majority report. They indicated they would file a separate report later.

Meanwhile Uncle Sam may spend \$100,000 or more this year in applying the art of salesmanship to cotton, the nation's leading agricultural export product.

The money would be used to "dress up" the American bale of cotton so that it might stand on a par in appearance with cotton of competing countries in the world markets.

Plans for the dressing up program are being prepared by the Agriculture Department, largely as a result of a report of its foreign cotton market specialist, P. K. Norris, that the American bale is a "disgrace" in appearance.

The AAA announced also that farmers in east central states have until June 18 to submit information indicating they plan to cooperate with the soil conservation phase of the 1938 farm program.

The states included North Carolina and six other states.

John B. McMullan Not to Ask Run-off

Elizabeth City, June 8.—(AP)—John B. McMullan of Elizabeth City, runner-up in the four-cornered contest for the solicitorship of the First District, announced today he would not ask for a run-off primary, but would concede the nomination to Chester Morris of Currituck, high man in the first primary.

McMullan attributed his decision to reluctance to put the district to the expense of a second primary when there are few county contests, to a desire to promote party harmony and to a feeling that "my present disadvantage is too great to warrant my requiring this expenditure on the part of the several counties involved."

JOHNSTON MAN ASKS RECOUNT

Hearing On Request Scheduled for Friday Morning

Smithfield, June 8.—(AP)—The Johnston County Board of Elections has ordered a hearing Friday at 11 o'clock on the request of J. R. Young of Lillington for a recount of this county's vote in the fourth district solicitor primary, in which Young lost to C. C. Canaday of Benson, the incumbent.

Walter Siler of Pittsboro presented the board a petition yesterday for Young, alleging that irregularities, he said he had been informed, occurred at the two Smithfield precincts, the Selma, Banner and Meadow precincts, and "other precincts."

The petitioner alleged votes were suppressed and there were irregularities and inaccuracies in all precincts.

Canaday, who got 7,683 votes in this, his home county, to 2,002 for Young, told the board he would welcome a recount if the board thought it advisable. Siler said he would present affidavits Friday to sustain his charges.

The Election Board declared all other results J. D. Benton of Benson was officially announced the state's senate nominee by 23 votes over Elmer Wellons, Lawrence Wallace of Smithfield and R. T. Fulghum, and incumbent, won the house nomination.

SCHOOL BOARD CASE QUASHED

Action Follows Motion by Commissioner Woodard

Wilson, June 8.—(AP)—The commissioners' inquiry into the alleged unaccounting of \$76,000 of county school funds was quashed today after four hours of testimony.

The swift action followed the motion of commissioner Thomas Woodard to end the proceedings and adjourn the meeting.

More than 300 spectators had crowded into the court room to hear testimony before the Wilson County Board of Commissioners, which is inquiring into the county education board's handling of the school funds.

The hearing was called after several tax payers told the commissioners a proper accounting had not been made of the \$76,999 expenditures by the board in the past year.

W. A. Lucas, chairman of the Board of Education, and H. G. Connor, Jr., represented the Education Board. Fifteen witnesses, including school officials and the complaining tax payers, were on hand.

Otha High, manager of the county school garage office, the first witness, testified about the number of employees and their duties, which he said included not only maintenance of the fleet of school trucks but of school plants as well.

High told the commissioners records of repairs to buildings were made in triplicate, one copy going to the county superintendent and the third into a file in his own office.

Jesse High, supervisor of transportation for the county school system told of salaries paid by the state, the amount of the county's supplement, methods of making charges for repair work on buildings and of fixing allowances per truck for maintenance by the state.

TESTIMONY OF PITT SHERIFF IS COMPLETED

Direct Evidence Finished During Morning Session

BEING EXAMINED BY PETITIONERS

Cross Examination of Whitehurst Expected to Consume Rest of Day's Hearing

Sheriff S. A. Whitehurst completed his direct testimony in the ouster proceedings against him at 10:50 this morning, and following a brief recess, the prosecution launched its cross examination of the witness.

Whitehurst took the stand as yesterday's first and only witness. His cross examination will probably consume the balance of today's hearings and a good portion if not all of tomorrow if the cross examination continues as detailed as it was begun.

The sheriff's testimony yesterday morning dealt with his efforts at law enforcement during the twelve year he has held the office and told in detail of his cooperation with the ABC board in an effort to enforce the liquor laws since the establishment of the ABC system in this county.

Yesterday afternoon and this morning were taken up with testimony regarding records of the sheriff's office.

Referring to audits presented by the petitioners purporting to show that the sheriff owed large sums to the county and other persons, the sheriff gave testimony to the effect that in every instance of money that had been entrusted to his keeping or collected by him for other persons it had been paid to the proper persons and that if there were any such items unpaid he was ready, willing and able to pay same of and when the matter was brought to his attention.

Fees for the service of foreign process which the petitioners contend he owes the county, he declared belonged to his office as a result of an agreement by a former board of county commissioners, and therefore he was not indebted to the county for these fees. With reference to homestead fees paid into his office he testified that all unused fees had been returned to the parties to whom they belonged but said that he did admit, according to these records, he probably owed the county \$48 such fees on homesteads that had been allotted. As to proceeds from the sale of rabies serum to various inspectors throughout the county, profits from which are being claimed by the county, the sheriff said that he had handled the serum personally as a convenience to the inspectors and that any profits from the same were his and not the property of the county.

With reference to two checks, drawn by him on the sheriff's fees or trust fund account, one for \$505.70 and another for \$580.00, the sheriff testified that these checks were drawn from the account for his own personal use, but that by virtue of his own funds that had been deposited to the account, the money was rightfully his own and that the drawing of these checks on the account was not a diversion or appropriation of the county's funds.

At this point in the proceedings there was strenuous objection on the part of counsel for the petitioners as to the admission of this evidence, on the ground that the book showed the fund to be trust funds and not the property of the county. Defense counsel argued that by virtue of the previous agreement with the old board of commissioners such of the sheriff's fees as had been deposited to the fund were rightfully his own personal property and that he had a perfect right to draw upon the fund for the whole or any part of such fees. Judge Cowper, questioning the legal right of the former board of commissioners to make any agreement with the sheriff as to his keeping certain fees, sustained the objection by the prosecution counsel and the defense took exception in order that the evidence might be put into the record. It was the contention of the defense that this hearing charged the sheriff with bad faith but that if he was acting under agreement with the former board of commissioners, even though the board had no legal right to make the agreement, the sheriff could not be charged with "bad faith."

The Hunt For Remedies

Men have always felt sure that for every disease there must be a remedy. In former ages they tested the medicinal values of everything they could think of.

Apparently nothing was too disgusting or far-fetched for such trial. Some of the ancient remedies were bloodcurdling and repulsive.

But to the credit of these unrestrained experiments stands the discovery of some of today's most useful drugs and remedies: ipecac, morphine, quinine and digitalis.

The modern search for medicinal remedies is conducted on a more rational basis, but it is still motivated by the conviction that "remedies are to be found." And the search is still largely based on observation.

We no longer experiment with "moss taken from the head of an executed criminal," but we do poke about among dyes and chemical compounds in the hope of stumbling on something of medicinal value.

The game of the hunt for remedies has been shifted from the world at large to the chemist's laboratory and the clinician's ward. Even when some new plant or animal remedy has been discovered such as ephedrine derived from a Chinese plant, or thyroxin extracted from the thyroid gland—the chemist nowadays hastens to take it apart, to analyze its composition and then to reproduce it artificially, and sometimes to improve upon the natural product.

Chemistry then is the fertile science which today promises the birth of new and effective remedies. The treatment of disease by means of chemical compounds produced in the laboratory is called chemotherapy.

Chemotherapy has yielded some remarkable remedies. The earliest and most famous one is Paul Ehrlich's salvarsan, used in the treatment of syphilis. The latest triumph

N. C. Local Units Must Include WPA Projects in Budget

Reflector Bureau
Raleigh, June 8—State Treasurer Charles M. Johnson, in his capacity as Director of Local Government and Chairman of the Local Government Commission, is issuing a stern warning to all local governmental units that they must include WPA projects to be undertaken in the coming fiscal year in their regular budgets.

The warning is in the form of a circular "Memorandum to County Commissioners and Governing Boards of Cities and Towns Regarding Expenditure of Public Money" and is being given, Mr. Johnson said, as the result of last year's experience.

In many instances, he pointed out, units prepared their budgets without WPA projects in mind, then when opportunity to take advantage of Federal funds came later, they accepted the propositions, spent funds for projects not authorized or contemplated in their regular budgets.

The Treasurer points out that "you have no legal or moral right under any circumstances to deliberately draw on your treasury for purposes not appropriated for in the current budget and particularly to use money already applied and needed for the necessary functions of government. To do this inevitably means an operating deficit and a deficit usually implies bad management."

Johnson emphasized the fact he is not trying to prevent local units from taking advantage of WPA funds and projects, but he wants to call particular attention to the fact that these projects should be considered now—not later after

Chemotherapy differs radically from the folk medicine remedies in that it specifically exploits the margin of difference between the destructive effects which a chemical compound has upon the germs attacking the individual and its toxic action on the patient's body. Juste often this margin is very narrow. Chemotherapeutic agents therefore are apt to be highly effective and highly dangerous.

Hollywood Sights And Sounds

By Robbin Coon

Hollywood — The average picture's life on the screen is finished in a year or less. The exceptional picture can expect a small taste like immortality.

Currently on the screens of the nation are 20-odd pictures that did well enough on the first release to warrant a second life. Some, however, are going forth in an effort to make up for what they failed to do on first showings.

Product shortage, result of Hollywood's recent production calm, is not entirely responsible for the revivals, although a contributing factor. The main reason is the confidence that the fans will welcome back their old movie friends.

"It Happened One Night," 1934's prize-winning picture, is probably the most popular revival. New prints have been issued, one is playing in a first-run Broadway house, and in at least a dozen theaters of the Southern California area. "It Happened One Night" is drawing patrons. To date this is Columbia's most profitable film. The same studio is re-releasing "A Man's Castle" — on the strength of Spencer Tracy's victory in the academy awards, plus Loretta Young's growing popularity.

Some "Way Passage" was successfully revived by Warner Bros., but this studio has no current re-releases on the screens, unless in isolated spots. United Artists is profiting on new showings of "The Count of Monte Cristo" — here they even re-released it — and will revive "I Owe the Waterfront." Metro's new "old ones" include "David Copperfield," "Treasure Island" and "Viva Villa," with "Mutiny on the Bounty" and "Captains Courageous" in prospect. Paramount has "Lives of a Bengal Lancer," "A Farewell to Arms" and "Ruggles of Red Gap," and Universal has put forth "Frankenstein," "Love Before Breakfast," "Dracula" and "Lady Tubb's." Twentieth Century-Fox's only reissues are the perennially popular Will Rogers films, two a year. RKO has frequent exhibitor calls for "King Kong," "Little Women" and "The Informer," but the re-issues are not yet on a national basis. Katharine Hepburn's early film "Spitfire," is being shown in some spots with Bob Burns featured. He played a minor role in the picture.

The Case of "Ben-Hur" — Frequently a picture has to be revived to come "out of the red." Most notable recent example was "The Informer," a money-loser until the academy award and subsequent revivals put it in the black. Paramount may revive "Make Way For Tomorrow" which lost money but was winning in popularity when withdrawn.

Perhaps the most notable instance of a long uphill struggle at the box-office was "Ben-Hur." Tremendously popular when released in 1926, the film had to clear its original cost of nearly \$4,000,000. Through continuous showings here and abroad, through a re-release in 1931 "Ben-Hur" not only left the red but is now on the credit side of the Metro ledger. "Hell's Angels" had a similar experience, cleared out more quickly.

Longest lived feature, however, is still "The Birth of a Nation." Made in 1914, it has played continuously — somewhere in the world — ever since. Synchronized for sound and music, it was re-released in 1930 with some success.

Most exhibitors seem to welcome revivals — especially if they can choose between a one-time hit and a new feature of uncertain quality — and many make re-showings a regular practice. With a revival, at least, they know what they're selling and how the public has "bought" it before.

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Washington Daybook

Washington—Kenneth Romney, sergeant-at-arms, a Montanan by birth, thinks Texas has the ablest delegation of any state. He has been 25 years on the Hill and has this to say about some of the others:

Ablest Democrats: Speaker Bankhead of Alabama; Floor Leader Rayburn of Texas; O'Connor of New York, chairman of the powerful rules committee; Warren of North Carolina; Cooper of Tennessee, on the ways and means (taxation) committee; Jones of Texas, chairman of the agricultural committee.

Ablest Republican: Wadsworth of New York. (Used to be a Senator.)

Best lawyer in the House: Hutton Summers of Texas. (He's chairman of the judiciary committee.)

Most colorful Representative: Maury Maverick of Texas.

Best orator: Speaker Bankhead.

Outstanding humorist: "There isn't any."

Best Speaker in 25 years: Jack Garner of Texas.

Romney didn't name "most useless delegation" or "most hopeless orator." He's a far better politician than the Senate employ who a few years ago wrote a piece for a magazine. Most of what that fellow said didn't matter but the members called him out on the floor to learn what he meant by one sentence saying something to the effect that "some Senators have taken bribes." He tried to explain that he referred to the whole history of the Senate—but he lost his job anyway.

Panama Says 'Pay'

These Latin-American republics do seem to be having a good time. The latest is Panama. Ever since Theodore Roosevelt "bought" the Panama Canal right-of-way this country has been paying the little republic \$250,000 a year compensation, a sort of rent. After gold devaluation in 1933, however, Panama refused to accept pay in devalued dollars. It has refused payment ever since.

Recently a new treaty was negotiated and submitted to the Senate. It provided for increased payment as well as other changes in the treaty. But the Senate has not yet ratified it so Panama still gets no money.

Meantime, it had to keep on paying interest on bonds, many of which were held privately in the United States.

Now a virtual ultimatum (strictly unofficial) has been served on the United States, saying in effect that until the U. S. resumes payment of its Canal Zone rent Panama will pay no interest on certain of its bonds held in the United States. It was simply "you pay, then we pay."

\$100,000 magnitude—and there aren't many more places left in the state where a project of this size can be feasibly undertaken.

All over the state there are small projects literally begging for attention, but the private companies are just as scared about them as the Federal REA, with the result that much persuasive work must be done before results will be shown.

Meanwhile the REA officials take more than a little pride in the record made by the state in recent years. At the end of 1937 there were only 10 states in the Union in which there were more "electrified" farm dwellings than in North Carolina—and not one of those ten is located in the South.

North Carolina had, at the date mentioned, 32,192 farm dwellings using electricity, compared with 23,148 a year previously, giving an increase of 39 per cent, as compared with an increase for the entire United States of only 19 per cent.

The closest Southern state was Texas, in 12 place nationally, with 31,295 electrified farms. There are

SHORT SHOTS

Raleigh, June 8.—Zeb Vance Turlington, of dry law fame and eight times a member of the North Carolina legislature, is right now celebrating his very first victory in a Democratic primary. He beat hard-bolled, capable Con Johnston by some 450 votes.

It was Mr. T's ninth legislative race, he told this correspondent while here to pay his respects to Governor Clyde R. Hoey, yet it was the one and only occasion upon which he had opposition within the party. Eight times he was unopposed for the nomination.

His last trip to Raleigh to help fashion laws was ten years ago. He made it plain that he did not come out of retirement at the bidding or request of Cale K. Burgess or any other official or combination of officials of the United Dry Forces.

Sunday's Statesville paper issued a "warning" to Mr. Turlington against taking his election as a mandate for a return to state-wide prohibition. According to the journal the veteran owes his election to the votes of "hundreds of dripping wets" who voted for him on account of his other qualifications and not because of his fame as an ardent advocate of aridity.

The maddest (grammarians probably would insist "angry" is the correct word) for those folks are too hot for that, group in the state is almost certainly the Greensboro and other Guilford supporters of J. O. Atkinson, Jr., who is making the well-known welkin ring with charges of shenanigans in High Point during the Sixth District Congressional primary.

They charge that Atkinson had more paid precinct workers in the Furniture City than he was credited with votes by the election officials. Also it's reported that young Thomas Turner, of High Point, is literally a thirsting for the gore of Lewis Teague, high man in the House primary. Tom, they say, feels he was the victim of the most wholesale hoss-trading of votes on record.

The Turner contention, as reported to this bureau, is that Teague's management swapped votes in High Point for Judge H. Hoyle Sink in exchange for Greensboro votes for their candidate. The youthful candidate for the bench is said to feel he would have carried his home city by a sweeping majority if there had been no dirty work at the polls.

All of which no doubt encouraged Oscar Barker of Durham to demand a runoff primary. Mr. B points out that the district's voters have registered no decisive choice, inasmuch as his vote combined with that given Teague did not constitute a majority of the ballots cast.

Maybe he'd better not talk too much about that, though, as it may be taken to indicate that a majority of the district's voters want neither Teague nor Barker.

One of the Jones boys made good in last Saturday's primary, but a trio of them weren't so fortunate.

In the 20th, Baxter C. dropped a decision to Solicitor Queen, and in the 19th, Ellis C. was bested for a similar post. Hamilton C., of Charlotte, was a victim of Congressman A. L. Bulwinkle.

But down in New Hanover, C. David not only was re-elected sheriff, but led the entire ticket with more than 7,000 votes to 1,100 for his opponent. Maybe those other Jones had better put the C. in front of their other surnames instead of after.

George Ross Pou, State Auditor, gave Henry Stevens one of his famous rabbit foot luck charms before the primary. George was a little doubtful but the talisman worked. The former National Commander of the American Legion even carried the home county of his opponent for the Sixth District Superior court post.

In North Carolina, however, only 280,716 occupied farm buildings, while in Texas there are 458,622; giving North Carolina an electrified percentage of 11.5, against 6.8 for the Lone Star state. These figures are taken from the Edison Institute report for 1937.

Despite its apparently good record, however, there remains the challenge of the 88.5 per cent of North Carolina farm dwellings which are not electrified, and that's the challenge the state REA heads are striving to meet.

They are confident a progressive plan can, and will be worked out, in the meantime they are shaking in their boots at the prospect—and it's a strong one—that they will be saddled by the next legislature with the little matter of extension of rural telephone service, a problem which is a whole story in itself.

Army Prepares For A "Backyard" Invasion By Putting Mexico In Secret Defense Plans

Washington—Protection of Mexico against military invasion is an important part of secret plans for defense of the United States.

For more than a century our southern neighbor—rich in resources but poor in cash—has been relying for security upon two points: its geographical isolation from expansion-minded nations, and U. S. maintenance of the Monroe Doctrine.

That reliance is bolstered by the belief, widely held in official circles of both countries, that Uncle Sam could not afford to allow an armed invasion of his "backyard" because of its threat to the safety of this country. U. S. defense strategists constantly have in mind the possibility of an attempted surprise attack by way of Mexico.

From 400 years ago—when Cortez subdued Mexico—to the present day, nations hungry for resources have cast covetous eyes on "the treasure house of the world." Tremendously rich in minerals, oil and water-power possibilities, Mexico would be rated tempting pickings for a power, or combination of powers, bent on territorial expansion in the western hemisphere.

It Happened—Once
For only one brief period in the last century did Mexico fall under foreign military and political domination—the regime of Austria's

Archduke Maximilian, set up as emperor of Mexico with the aid of Napoleon III during our Civil war.

But as soon as the war was ended, the United States punctured Napoleon's dream of a French colonial empire in Central America by forcing withdrawal of the French troops from Mexico under threat that a veteran Union army would be sent, if necessary, to drive them out.

Again in 1912 the United States uttered a "hands off" Mexico notice. The Senate, extending the application of the Monroe Doctrine to include Asiatic as well as European powers, frustrated an alleged effort by a Japanese syndicate to get control of land on Magdalena Bay, Lower California.

A Senate resolution held that the occupation by any non-American state of a harbor or other place which might threaten the communications or safety of the United States would be viewed with grave concern by our government.

Military Morale High

The Mexican military establishment has been greatly improved in the last 10 years but it lacks the warships, heavy artillery and aircraft to withstand for long an attack in force by a first class power. The army has some 50,000 men, about 60 airplanes and a small amount of artillery. The navy consists of 10 small coast defense vessels and a few auxiliary ships.

The army has a large, excellent cavalry force and the morale of all branches of the military service is rated high. Familiar with the Mexican terrain, these troops could work effectively with U. S. army units to repel an invader.

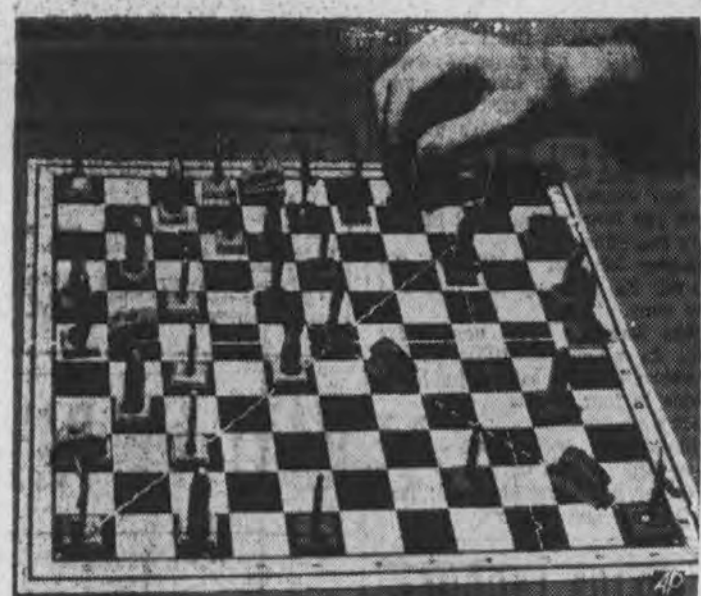
U. S. Fleet Main-Belknap
An efficient railway network in Mexico, and the new Pan-American highway running from Laredo, Texas, to Mexico City, would be valuable arteries for speeding troops, artillery and supplies from this country to a defense zone south of the Rio Grande.

But the primary protector of Mexico against invasion, assuming that the United States could employ armed intervention, would be Uncle Sam's battle fleets.

Most interpretations of the Monroe Doctrine agree that this country is determined, for the same preservation-of-safety reasons, to resist Old World aggression in other Central American countries. Such aggression would be regarded as a definite menace to a vital link in our outer chain of defense—the Panama Canal.

The canal, heavily fortified, provides quick passage for American warships from the Pacific to the Atlantic oceans. This permits a single fleet to do duty on either coast. Military experts believe that no fleet in the world today could destroy the defenses of the Panama Canal.

Chessmen Become Tanks and Soldiers As Nazis Put Game on Military Basis

Berlin—"Tat-tics," a new militarized kind of chess, is being played by Nazis, young and old, in Hitler's Reich.

Produced under army auspices, the game, it is asserted, "develops tactical and strategic thinking" and "instills qualities of modern leadership."

"Tat-tics" is played between "red" and "blue" forces, on a board of 121 squares instead of the traditional 64.

Each side plays 18 pieces: six infantrymen; four artillery figures (shells), three tanks, two bombing planes, two pursuit planes, and the main piece—a symbolic eagle, to checkmate which is the aim of opposing players.

Move On Diagonals
Pieces can be moved along diagonals, indicating strategic lines such as highways and railroads, complicated by "barred" areas representing lakes or water-courses.

Different rules apply to each move. The soldierman pawn moves one square in any direction; tanks up to three squares or may move as knights do in ordinary chess; artillery up to four squares, and planes up to five.

Capturing powers are very intricate. Thus, an enemy piece may be taken by forward, backward or sideways movement, never diagonally.

Planes may jump over all other pieces, except enemy artillery or enemy planes.

All pieces may move across a river, but not along its banks—planes alone excepted. Lake sections may not be occupied or crossed. Planes may cross, but not "occupy."

Papers Run It

Artillery may capture any piece across others, but does not take its victim's place.

And so on. The winner is the side which "checkmates" the other's eagle, or "kills" all the opponent's infantry, or reaches the third enemy line with no fewer than five pieces, not including planes; or, when the opponent has no more than five artillery and tank pieces left.

Scores of German papers run a military chess corner. The German Labor Front encouraged the game from the beginning, and instituted a regular course of instruction for the game. In the first six months of its existence, 75,000 sets were sold, its promoters said.

Crusader Dewey Setting Stage For Big Political Trial

When Thomas E. Dewey hasn't been making headlines by busting New York City rackets, he's been making them by polshooting at Tammany politicians. Now he's building up to what may be the city's greatest political trial in decades. Carrier highlights:



1—Boyish-looking, Michigan-born Thomas E. Dewey first got wide notice when, in 1933, he convicted Waxey Gordon, beer baron, of tax evasion. Dewey then was the country's youngest U. S. attorney. (He's 36 now.) In 1935 he was named special New York City prosecutor.



2—Biggest catch during Dewey's two year racketbusting career was Charles "Lucky" Luciano, convicted heading a "chain store" prostitution racket. Dewey crushed other alleged rackets in the restaurant, garment, trucking, poultry, electrical contracting, and loan shark fields.



3—Elected district attorney in '37 over Tammany opposition. Dewey confers with Mayor LaGuardia, re-elected on same ticket. To reports that the Republicans might nominate him for President, Dewey responded, "pipe dream."



4—Accused of participating in the \$100,000,000 a year policy racket (or numbers game) J. Richard "Dixie" Davis was captured early this year in Philadelphia, where he's shown in court. Dewey called the ex-lawyer the brains of the late Dutch Schultz's gang.



5—Biggest surprise came late in May when Dewey arrested James J. Hines (talking to reporters) probably the most powerful man in Tammany Hall. The charge: that Hines conspired to protect Dutch Schultz's policy racketeers. Hines, pleading not guilty, becomes the star defendant in the trial, expected this summer.

marked so as to show them to be fees from foreign proceed, the sheriff admitted that he found no such items. Asked regarding fees for the collection of worthless checks, he said that some items pertaining to these matters were contained in both his "sheriff's fees or trust fund" book and others in the county fees book. He identified his bills of cost book and stated that these with the aforementioned books were all the records of his office, with the exception of the checks and other records of his bank accounts. He admitted that there was one other book that could not be found.

Questioned as to bills of costs he testified as to the system by which these items were paid over to the county treasurer at certain periods. He said that other than his bill of costs book and the copies of his turnover sheets, there were no further records pertaining to this phase of his office. Questioned as to the manner in which he settled with the county for process fees he stated that the system was the same as with the bills of cost, there being a turnover sheet in triplicate form, one of which was retained by his

office, one of which was held by the treasurer, and one of which went to the auditor's office. He testified that once each month the county auditor checked his books against his turnovers to the treasurer and marked the books OK. He said other than the county fees and the bills of cost book, the auditor did no checking.

He testified that all money turned over to the county by him was represented in the three books of his office, the two process books and the one bills of cost book. He said that only the items appearing on these books had been turned over to the county treasurer.

Of 11 process from New Hanover county, served through the sheriff's office, he admitted that only one appeared on the fees book. Of 39 process from Martin county, 16 did not appear on the fees book. From a period of October 8, 1935 until March 4, 1938, the process books revealed large numbers of process handled, but the records were complete upon but a few of the items. The books revealed the name of the defendants and the fees for the various process but did not reveal from where they came or what disposition was made of the process or by whom served, if served.
