New Tension Appears
Likely Following
Occupation of Stra-
tegic Islands

Shanghai, July 5.—(AP)—The Japanese army which in a year's fighting has crashed its way 450 miles up the Yangtze river into the heart of China, established positions today for another major effort to reach Hankow, provisional capital of General Chiang Kai-Shek's government.

The Japanese command announced today the capture of Hukow, 160 miles from the Chinese capital and a main barrier to the Japanese advance.

Chinese withdrew, leaving munition supplies and there was little fighting after the Japanese pierced Hukow's outer defenses, military officials said.

Occupation of the city put the Japanese in position for a Hankow offensive along two possible routes, both extremely difficult.

The one choice was a 150-mile drive up the Yangtze river winding through a mountainous area with its strong Chinese defenses. The other was a land and water detour to the west, in an effort to sever the Canton-Hankow railroad, disrupt transportation of supplies and force the evacuation of Hankow.

Paris, July 5.—(AP)—New diplomatic tension between France and Japan appeared likely today to result from French occupation of the strategic Paracel Islands in the south China sea about 150 miles south-east of the Chinese island of Hainan, which Japanese has been reported planning to seize.

Reports from Tokyo said the Japanese foreign office was studying the situation with "great care." It was thought here that Japan might protest against occupation of the island, which the Japanese contend belongs to China.

The French Foreign office said the occupation was a routine police matter of the French colony of Indo-China while claims jurisdiction there.

It was said at the foreign office, however, that the Paracels would serve as "excellent seaplane bases" in war time.

Board Members Discuss 1938-39 Budget While Employees Enjoying July Fourth Holiday

While most everyone else was enjoying a holiday yesterday, the County Board of Commissioners met to discuss its most serious annual problem—the budget.

The commissioners convened shortly before noon and did not complete their day's work before late in the afternoon.

Requests of the various departments were presented and discussed preparatory to final adoption of the budget.

The present county tax rate of 85 cents on the \$100 probably will remain in force for another year, although no official would definitely commit himself.

One of the major projects to be provided for during the new year is the \$7,500 each the county and city are being asked to erect a dock at Hardee's creek in connection with the dredging of Tar River to provide Greenville with waterway transportation.

PUT OFF HEARING
UNTIL JULY 13TH

Attorneys for Count-
ess Declares Count
Laughed at Proffered
Gift of \$250,000

London, July 5.—(AP)—Countess Barbara Hutton Haugwitz-Reventlow's battery of noted legal talent today accused her titled Danish husband of demanding \$5,000,000 and their two-year-old son, Lance, in return for a divorce, in a tense hearing in Bow street court.

In the course of two and a half hours of sensational testimony to support charges against the handsome Count Count, he also was accused of threatening to shoot an unnamed Mayfair society man "like a dog."

The golden-haired black-clad Woolworth heiress kept her eyes on the back of her husband's head as her attorneys declared he threatened to "put her on a spot," and had laughed at a proffered gift of \$250,000 as "an insult."

A hearing was adjourned until July 13. Today's testimony was for the countess' charges that her husband had placed her in fear of her life or bodily harm.

He was released again on bail of two thousand pounds (\$10,000) as in the case of his first hearing last Friday immediately after returning from France to face his wife's charges.

William Mitchell, solicitor for the countess, who has charged that her husband threatened her, testified he told the countess that the heiress would offer \$50,000 pounds (\$250,000) as an "out and out gift."

"The only grounds on which the countess wanted divorce was incompatibility," Mitchell added. "There was no one else concerned at all."

"The count said \$50,000 pounds was laughable. He said it was an insult. I told him I wish some one would insult me."

Asheville, July 5.—(AP)—Rufus Costner was sentenced to 20 years in the Federal Penitentiary today for his part in the \$105,000 mail truck robbery in Charlotte five years ago.

PROFITS RISE
THROUGH RAIL

Carolina Company
Reports Gain Over
Previous Year

Raleigh, July 5.—(AP)—The Carolina Power & Light company, operating in North Carolina and the Pee Dee section of South Carolina, reported today it made a 1937 net profit of \$2,564,680.84, an increase of about \$450,000 over the 1936 profit.

The report was filed with Utilities Commissioner Stanley Winborne.

The firm operates in the eastern North Carolina area around Raleigh and around Asheville in the western part of the state.

It listed 1937 income at \$12,196,821.30, compared with \$11,770,051.48 in 1936 and said expenses last year were only \$9,632,150.46, as compared with \$9,654,633.63 the year before.

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Death Toll On Holiday
Shows Highway Wrecks
Claimed Most Victims

Fatalities From Fire-
works Practically
Eliminated

THIRTEEN KILLED
IN N. CAROLINA

New York, with 39,
Leads Nation, Fol-
lowed by Pennsylvania
and Michigan

(By Associated Press)

The toll of America's holiday deaths—at least 515 died violently celebrating the 162nd anniversary of independence—showed today the nation has practically eliminated fireworks fatalities, but has failed to quell the menace of the motor car.

Only three persons were killed by fireworks—all of the "home-made" variety. Motor crashes on packed highways, however, claimed at least 256 lives, half of the entire number.

The rush for beaches and lakes and river resorts to escape moderate heat in some sections of the country resulted in 140 drownings.

Reports from 46 states and the District of Columbia also showed 27 persons were shot to death, 20 committed suicide, 18 were killed by trains and 50 died in various mishaps, such as falls lightning and home accidents.

The toll of 515 was below that of the Fourth of July week-end in 1937, when 563 were killed, but more than double the number for the Memorial Day week-end, 250.

New York, with 39 deaths, led the state, Pennsylvania was second with 33; Michigan third with 27.

Meanwhile the holiday-week-end toll of accidental deaths in the Carolinas stood at 21 on the basis of reports tabulated today.

North Carolina had 13, South Carolina eight.

Victims in North Carolina included: Drowned, Carol Briggs, of Craddock, Va., 16, at Bay View; Automobile accidents, Weldon Parrott and Herman Hickling, near Elizabethtown; George Edwards at Roanoke Rapids.

SEEKS ADVICE
ON CONDITIONS
IN SOUTHLAND

Roosevelt Asks Group
of Southerners To
Begin Survey

SAYS UNBALANCE
CAN BE RIGHTED

Announced Purpose
Is to Expand Rehab-
ilitation Work Al-
ready Started

Washington, July 5.—
(AP)—President Roosevelt asked a group of Southerners today to begin a survey of methods to improve Southern economic conditions—

which he described as the "nation's number one economic problem."

"We have an economic unbalance in the nation as a whole due to this very condition of the South," he said in a letter to those at a meeting called by the National Economic Council.

"It is an unbalance that can and must be righted, for the sake of the South and the nation."

"No purpose is closer to my heart at this moment than that which caused me to call you to Washington."

"That purpose is to obtain a statement—or perhaps I should say a re-statement as of today—of the economic conditions of the South, a picture of the South in relation to the rest of the country, in order that we may do something about it; in order that we may not only carry forward the work that has been begun toward the rehabilitation of the South, but that the program of such work may be expanded in the directions that this new presentation shall indicate."

Meantime, the President starts out Thursday on a journey to San Francisco which may become the most spectacular bit of political torch-bearing he has ever done.

Such evidence of his intentions as can be gleaned from his own remarks indicate he is on the verge of striking a bold new course in politics—of venturing personally into realms which he previously left to his lieutenants.

The President has put in good words personally only for Senate Leader Barkley of Kentucky and Senator Duffy of Wisconsin, and McAdoo of California. Now, it appears, he may give up indirectness in many cases.

Other developments: Senator Logan (D-Ky.), said he felt certain neither President Roosevelt nor Vice President Garner would seek a third term in their respective offices.

Logan made it plain he had not discussed third terms with either Mr. Roosevelt or Garner.

Most Recent Rain
To Help Tobacco

County Agent Explains That Sunday Fall Will Aid Rather Than Damage Crop

County Agent R. B. Bennett declared today that rains here Sunday helped tobacco crops, despite the fact that too much rain recently had caused heavy damage to the leaf.

The county agent explained that had the sun stayed out bright for several days following the heavy rains, the tobacco would have withered. The rain Sunday, however, served to bring out the tobacco, the county agent declared.

Mr. Bennett declared that some farmers in the county contend they have the best tobacco in history, while others contend that theirs is the worst.

'Fertilizer' To Be
Topic At Meeting

Raleigh, July 4.—The largest single production expense of North Carolina farmers—will be the subject of an all-day session of farmers, manufacturers, chemists and fertilizer salesmen who will gather at the Tobacco Test Farm at Oxford, July 22, to participate in a program sponsored by the State Department of Agriculture.

D. S. Coltrane, assistant to Commissioner of Agriculture W. Kerr Scott, will preside on the occasion to be known as "Fertilizer Day," the first assembly of its kind in the history of the state.

All farmers, manufacturers and salesmen concerned with fertilizer have been invited to attend.

Subjects to be discussed will include: "Fertilization of Tobacco"; "Fertilizer Placement Tests on Tobacco"; "How North Carolina's Fertilizer Bill Can Be Reduced"; "Improved Fertilizers"; "Fertilizer Recommendations for Cotton, Corn and Small Grain."

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peeking in. Glacier studies are car-
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logical survey engineers in Alaska.
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the United States owns any north-
western glaciers, although we must
not neglect the ones at Mount Rain-
ier, in Washington, and Mount Tim-
panogas, Utah. Perhaps there are
others.

Right now the principal glacier in-
spectors on the job in Alaska are
youngish T. W. Ranta and F. H.
Moffitt, a veteran of some 30 years
service. Neither expects to work
much at the glacier trade this sum-
mer. Their parties have mapping
and mineral survey jobs.

Unfortunately for those ambitious
to be glacier inspectors, most of the
time it is not a full-time job, and
when we went over to the air-cooled
Department of the Interior to find
it would be a full-time job this
year we learned it was to be only
incidental. (Perhaps by way of
compensation, the wing of the de-
partment devoted to glacier inspec-
tions and similar Alaskan occupa-
tions is not air-cooled. The section
devoted to sub-tropical Puerto Rico
and the Virgin Islands is air-cooled.
It's just fate.)

Life In The Old Glacier

Philip S. Smith, head of the Alaskan
division of the Survey, who told
us about Mr. Ranta and Mr. Moffitt,
is a white-haired but hardy-looking
engineer. Engineers can't talk with-
out maps and before he finished with
us his desk was stacked with them.

Many big glaciers, such as the
Mendenhall, are along the seacoast
on the southern side of Alaska near
where it joins Canada. Yet without
any hesitation, Mr. Smith took us
unland to the Black Rapids glacier.

It is a sort of pet of the division.
In 1935 it suddenly broke into the
headlines by sliding through the
gorge at the rate of several hundred
feet a day. Mr. Ranta visited it and
dispelled any fear of harm. The gla-
cier was heading for an important
highway leading into Central Alas-
ka. If it had continued across the
raging Delta river it might have
mashed a roadside way station. But
it stopped a mile or so short.

The two or three people living at
the place were fairly excited. A
mountain of ice sliding down on you
so fast you can see it move—and
hear it groaning and grinding along
—is an awesome spectacle.

Mr. Smith says you will under-
stand glaciers better if you think
of them as thick water.

That's Gold In Them Ice

One important phase of glacial
study has to do with gold hunting.
Glaciers scoop up tons of debris as
they creep along through the year,
including, naturally, some gold. All
of this is deposited at the front and
side of the glacier as it melts. Lots
of money once was wasted mining
these glacial moraines.

In most instances the moraine
pickings are not so good. The gla-
ciers do help in this way: They may
dump a lot of earth and ore into a
stream which in turn wash away the
waste and deposit the gold at the
bottom. There it can be recov-
ered.

Because of the increase of fore-
ign motorists in European coun-

SHORT SHOTS

Raleigh, July 5.—Dr. Carl V. Rey-
nolds and the State Board of Health
are running into some trouble with
their proposed gigantic campaign
against syphilis—at least in securing
cooperation of all the cities and
counties.

City boards of both Raleigh and
Asheville are bucking against the
cost of their participation in the
drive—in both cases it is contended
that the existing city clinics can and
will provide the same service Rey-
nolds proposes and at much less cost.

In Wake the Health Board wants
something like \$8,500 from county
and city combined. Mayor George
Isely quotes Dr. Sidney Smith of the
present clinic to the effect that the
same work as Reynolds proposes
can be done for \$2,500.

As a result, partisans of the cam-
paign are charging that the real op-
position to the city appropriation
comes from venereal specialists of
Raleigh who prefer to keep the busi-
ness of treating unfortunate victims
—and thereby getting the profit.

Respectful silence on the part of
the Highway Patrolmen who watch-
ed Bill Payne and Wash Turner die
is quite understandable—they had
nothing whatever to brag about in
connection with the affair, as it
took Federal G-men to lay the pair
by the heels after our state's high-
way patrol and all other enforce-
ment officers together had made
slightly less than no progress at all
in the matter of running them down.

Impossibility of ABC county com-
petition with bootleggers on a price
basis was vividly illustrated by Cut-
ler Moore, state liquor board chair-
man, at the ABC conference here
Friday, when he pointed out that
the lowest tax-paid whiskey is quot-
ed at \$9.02 a case, while the boot-
legger can deliver the same amount
of "stump hole" white liquor for
\$1.20.

Department of Conservation and
Development's game and fish divi-
sion won two legal victories last
week which are giving officials cause
for rejoicing.

In Columbus county, Judge N. A.
Sinclair convicted D. H. Hickman,
fish dealer, on a charge of selling
game fish. Hickman had been pre-
viously acquitted in Recorder's
court, where Recorder Jos. W. Brown
had also ordered Elvyn Hoops, coun-
ty game protector, to pay the de-
fendant for 38 pounds of game fish
seized in the Whiteville market.

Judge Sinclair ordered Hickman to
refund Hobbs this money and, in
addition, imposed a 30-day sentence
which he suspended on payment of
costs and conditioned upon future
observance of the game laws.

In Wayne, the Goldsboro Recorder's
court upheld conviction of Bud
Hooks of Kenly, in magistrate's
court on a charge of netting in closed
waters and taking game fish in
closed season.

Department officials say these
two convictions will help them ma-
terially in enforcement of the laws
and regulations.

At last Last Chance has electricity.
The State REA has just learned from
the Pamlico Ice and Light
Company that a two and a quarter
mile electric line has just been com-
pleted into the Hyde county town.

Incidentally, this company has
been doing a splendid job of rural
electrification, Dudley Bagley, REA
head, says.

In 1935 it had one mile of line in
Englehard, serving 29 customers.
Now it has 40 miles and 250 custom-
ers, and the Federal REA has ap-
proved construction of 64 miles more
—all in Hyde county.

Both Harry McMullan and Stan-
ley Winborne dismiss the matter
lightly, but Raleigh politicians who
know the outstanding ability of
Edgcombe's Cousin Willie Clark to
pick winners are pondering seriously
the Clark unofficial nomination
of one or the other of these two
state officials for the 1940 Govern-
ment race.

Livestock Controls Dodder in Lespedeza

Pasturing livestock on lespedeza
fields in summer is a good way of
controlling dodder, or love vine that
infests North Carolina legume
fields, said A. C. Kimrey, extension
dairy specialist at State College.
Dodder is a serious menace, espe-
cially where lespedeza is being
grown for seed.
When the animals eat this para-
site, comparatively few seeds will
be produced, but the lespedeza later
will produce seeds for harvest or
for reseeding another crop on the
same land the following year. One
dodder plant, allowed to grow, may
yield 3,000 seeds, and if harvested
the lespedeza will make the
legume dangerous to use. Under
the state seed law, dodder is classi-
fied as a noxious weed.
The surest way to fight this para-
site is to plant only lespedeza seed
known to be free from dodder, said
E. C. Blair, extension agronomist.
This means that growers should not
harvest seed from fields that are
heavily infested with dodder.
Where infestations of dodder and
other weeds are heavy, Blair ad-
vises that the crop be mowed, rak-
ed up, and burned. The blade of
the mowing machine should be set
so as to leave a four or five-inch
stubble, or higher if possible. If
this is done at once, the lespedeza
will continue growing and produce
more seeds, but most of the dodder
will be gone.
Although dodder starts from a
seed, it soon attaches tentacle-like
vines to other plants, and thereaf-
ter it lives the life of a true para-
site, feeding on lespedeza or other
plants and drawing some of its
nourishment from the air. The pale
yellow or orange colored vines are
found frequently in North Carolina
legume fields in summer.

NO ADVANCE IN ADMISSION

Finances And Executions Provided News Last Week

Reflector Bureau
Raleigh, July 5.—End of the fiscal
year, Bill Payne and Wash Turner
attracted most attention and filled
most newspaper space in Raleigh
last week, as the state's high of-
ficials joined in a Hallelujah chorus
of praise for their conduct of the
state's fiscal matters and the two
notorious bad men went wherever
they'll spend eternity, choked to
death with cyanide fumes.
On the side there was the still
mysterious shot which did not hit
Solicitor William Y. Bickett, as well
as a city board row over appropri-
ations for an antisiphilis campaign
preliminary steps in a slums clear-
ance program for the capital city.
Echoes of election fraud disclosures
and a talkfest in which county liq-
uor board members made little or
no progress in the direction of chang-
ing the state liquor board's mind on
the subject of liquor prices in North
Carolina.

State Solvent, and To Spare—Re-
ports and estimates given out at
the end of the fiscal year, which
closed June 30, indicate that North
Carolina is entirely solvent with
something to spare—though with
no surplus even approximately \$15-
000,000 and with more than a scat-
tering of financial storm clouds on
the fiscal horizon.

It was the biggest year in his-
tory, both in spending and collect-
ing. More than \$69,000,000 tinkled
into the till during the year, while
expenditures cannot yet be given,
by reason of incomplete reports.
When it was all done, however,
the credit balance of North Carolina
was about \$5,000,000 in the general
fund and \$7,000,000 in highway
moneys. Everybody seemed highly
elated, but all flashed a caution sig-
nal with respect to the coming year
and its financial outlook.

Lights out for Two—No military
honors or soundings of taps attend-
ed the ceremonies, but the lights
went out for Bill Payne and Wash
Turner, comrades in crimes for more
than a decade, who died in the leth-
al gas chamber Friday while a de-
tail of State Highway Patrolmen,
who couldn't catch the pair while
they were "on the lam" watched.

Preceding them into oblivion, or
eternal life, or somewhere, went
Wiley Brice, Negro jolted out of his
being by electricity. He killed a man
in Alamance a dozen years ago.
"Crime doesn't pay" said Payne.
Obviously not.

Governor Keeps Out—Governor
Clyde R. Hoey kept discreetly out
of the Guilford county election mess,
promise to "confer" with Solicitor
H. L. Kountz later about the
grand jury request that the At-
torney General be asked to take a
hand.

Minor election officials were in-
dicated in Johnston—Ousted in Al-
amance. The Halifax stew simmered.
