### DEATH TOLL FROM STORM APPROACHES 200 MARK

(Continued from Page One)

The storm blew up yesterday morning from Cape Hatteras, hitting Long Island in the afternoon, and sweeping northward through western New England. Reaching Vermont, weather bureau officials said, the center bored to the west, crossing the lower St. Lawrence valley near Montreal.

In that section, only one death had been reported, but the destruction of property was heavy.

To the widespread devastation of the wind was added at some points, the destruction of fire.

At one point on the Cape Cod canal, Onset, the whole population of 2,000 rushed to the village's one hill to escape inundation from great waves, which made the town an island.

Of the seven states hit by the storm, Massachusetts has the largest number of dead, well above 50.

Looting started at several points. The disaster, which struck an area that in general is the most heavily populated in the United States, called for vast and immediate reconstruction.

Anxiety grew hourly over the fate of 52 persons who are aboard two boats which put out from Bridgeport, Conn., in the path of the storm.

Swirling up from the south, the hurricane swept in from the sea late yesterday, smashing shipping and shore resorts with waves lashed to tidal power.

### HITLER AND CHAMBERLAIN MEET TO SEAL PEACE PACT

Munich at 10 a. m. Visits of Hungarian and Polish statesmen with Hitler Tuesday led to the belief Hitler might insist the minorities of these two countries in Czechoslovakia fare as well as the Sudeten Germans.

Chamberlain also said to have a list of demands, including immediate demobilization of German army reservists and co-operation of Hitler in a new non-aggression pact among Britain, France, Germany and Italy to guarantee the peace of Europe.

There was no indication how long the talks would continue, but judging from the complicated problems facing the conferees it was believed in reliable quarters they would last at least two days.

## BEARS BOTHER TO PICNICKERS

### Break Up Many Outdoor Feasts in The Smoky Mountains

Raleigh, Sept. 19.—The bears in the Great Smoky Mountains National Park are becoming so accustomed to people that they frequently interrupt picnickers and eat the lunches which they hastily abandon while in a few cases some of the more daring visitors have had some unpleasant "arguments"

with these bears, Charles E. Ray, of Waynesville, has advised the Department of Conservation and Development.

"Attracted by the quantities of food brought in on their backs by visitors and especially by the tasty tidbits left over by hundreds of picnickers, many of the bears in the park which until recently have been more afraid of human beings than human beings are of them, have lost this fear," Ray said. "So instead of running away when they scent humans, these bears have come to associate this scent of food so that they are seeking out the places where people are, especially the picnic grounds."

"At first these bears were content to overturn the trash containers at night after people had picnicked there, to get the many tasty bits of sandwiches, cake, chicken bones and other food left

**SHORT SHOTS**

Raleigh, Sept. 22.—Wallace Wade, coach of Duke University's Blue Devils has received so many tributes of one sort or another that any more may appear a bit superfluous, but the current issue of Liberty magazine has one which is a bit unusual in the qualities it attributes to Mr. Wade.

Says Yankee Stade—obviously a pen name—in speaking of graduate managers:

"He is a well paid gentleman who must—and usually does—combine in his person the major gifts of Moses, Napoleon, Beconsfield and Billy Rose."

"A good head coach has to have all the qualities possessed by the graduate manager, plus the moral character of John Wesley the resourcefulness of Gaston B. Means without the dishonesty, and the box office draw of Shifley Temple."  
 "Nearest approximation to this ideal among current coaches is probably Wallace Wade of Duke University, who is said to receive \$15,000 a year and a share of the gate receipts."

Turkeys are not going to be quite as plentiful as usual in North Carolina for this Thanksgiving Day, according to W. H. Rhodes, chief statistician of the State Department of Agriculture, who has estimated that the state's crop of the juicy birds is ten per cent off from normal.

The plaint "My neighbor got more than I did" isn't going to get a review of tobacco quotas by county AAA review committees, according to E. Y. Floyd, AAA executive officer at State College, has warned prospective complainants.  
 But if a grower can show that incorrect data were used in determining his quota, the committee will check over the facts and if a larger quota is found justified, he will be given an increase in poundage, Floyd promises.

Naming of Ronald Hocutt as safety director and John Armstrong as head of the State Highway Patrol shows that Commissioner of Revenue A. J. Maxwell concurs with Governor Clyde R. Hoey in belief that major appointments are best filled by promotion from the ranks.

Hocutt's appointment in 1936 as assistant safety director was generally regarded as completely political and a reward for his valiant service to Hoey in the primaries, but his work since taking the place has been of the kind calculated to meet with approval.

 Raleigh, Sept. 21.—Although he still doesn't know what name will go in the congressional column on the Democratic side of the ticket in the Eighth district, Raymond C. Maxwell, secretary of the State Board of Elections, is going ahead with preparations for printing and distributing the tickets to be marked in November by some three-quarter million or more Tar Heels.  
 He already has proofs of the ballot, which rather oddly will be even longer than that of 1936 despite the fact that many fewer important state officials are to be chosen this fall than were named two years ago. The difference comes about in the Superior Court judge list, with 12 such vacancies to be filled this year as against two in 1936.

So far, twenty Democrats are sure to be listed on each ballot, while there are only four Republican candidates in seven districts and three in the other four.

There seems to be some question over when the G.O.P. boys would be barred from making executive committee nominations for one Supreme Court post, for attorney general and for commissioner of labor. These three races got on this year's ballot after the primary dates by reason of resignations of Attorney General A. A. F. Seawell and Commissioner of Labor A. L. Fletcher and the death of Justice George W. Connor.

## NEW BUILDING SOON BE READY

### State Office Structure To Be Completed in December

Reflector Bureau, Raleigh, Sept. 22.—The state's

newest office building, upon which construction was begun several months ago, now looks from the outside as though it were about ready for occupancy. Workmen have even been scrubbing the exterior of the six-story structure at Edenton and Salisbury streets until it fairly shines.

As a matter of fact, there is still considerable work to be done on the interior, but it now seems that the building will be ready by December 15.

Its completion will bring to six the total of handsome state buildings grouped around the Capitol, and will center practically all state activities on Capitol square when the half-dozen agencies, now housed all over the city, are concentrated within it.

The new building is of native Mount Airy granite, known as one of the most beautiful as well as enduring materials. The design is best described as "restricted modern"—but not "modernistic"—and is in complete harmony with the Capitol building across the square.

The building is six stories high with a basement under the center, is L-shaped with two wings, each approximately 134 feet wide and a center section approximately 76 feet wide and 65 feet deep. Structural steel was used in the superstructure, granite in the street elevations and ends of each wing, bricks in the rear wall, and the insulated roof is composed of slag materials laid on insulating board.

The walls will be of granite block-
