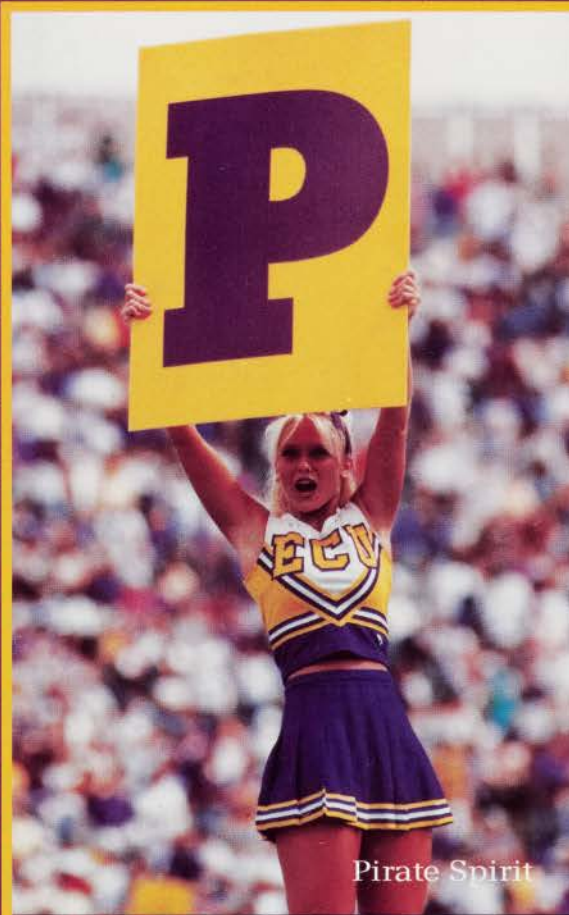

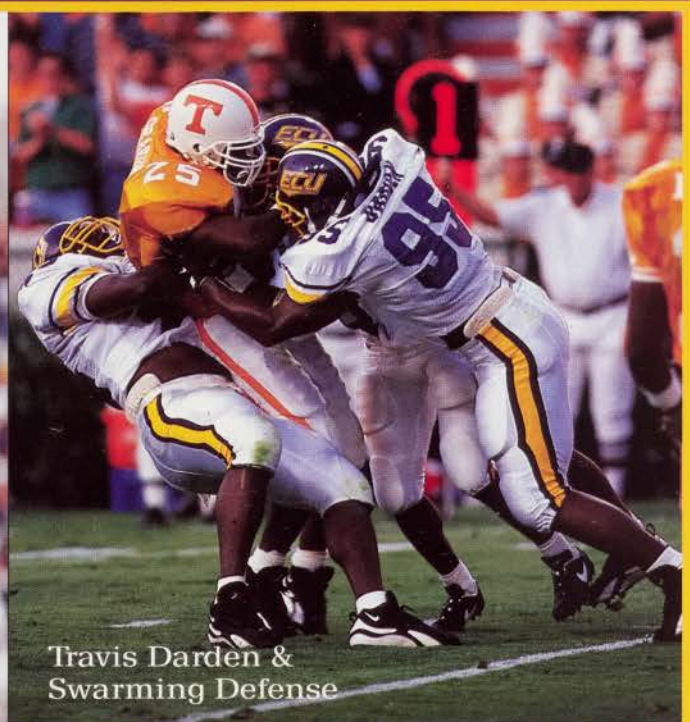

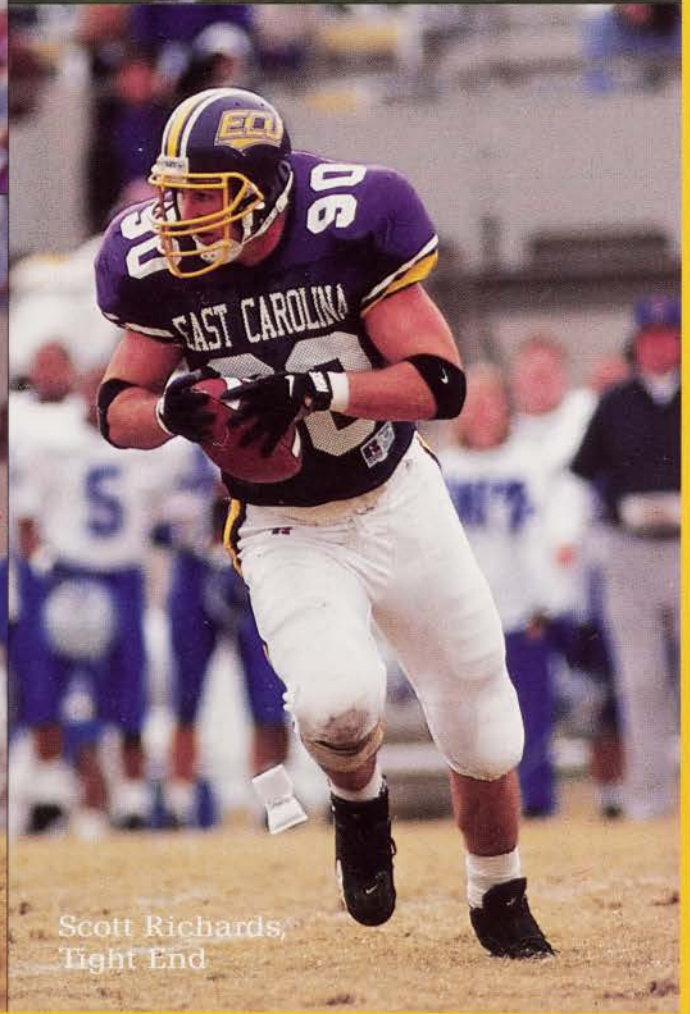

# Media Information

## Working Credentials

Credentials for East Carolina home games are for working media only and are issued on a priority basis. Credentials should be requested as early as possible. Requests from weekly newspapers and radio stations will be accepted only from those who will be attending games in a WORKING capacity and will be filled on a space available basis. Credential requests should be sent in writing on company letterhead to:

Spouses, dates and non-workers are not permitted in the press box. Credentials will be mailed if time permits; otherwise, they will be left at the Media Will-Call window located in the ECU Athletic Ticket Office.

## N.C. State Game Credentials

Media desiring to obtain credentials to East Carolina's Nov. 30 game with North Carolina State in Charlotte should also direct their requests to Norm Reilly at ECU. These requests will be reviewed and then forwarded to Raycom which will issue press box and photography credentials.

## Photographers

Credentials for sideline photographers will be issued on the basis of circulation, with priority granted to agencies covering the participating schools on a regular basis. East Carolina University follows guidelines established by the NCAA Communications Committee regarding sideline control which ensures the sideline as a working media area.

1) Each photographer is required to wear an armband at all times. Any other WORKING media who are present on the sideline must also display an armband.

2) Armbands must be picked up in the Press Box. A designated area in the press box will be established for armband pick-up.

3) No photographers are permitted in the bench area, on the playing field, or in the 12-foot area between the limit line and sideline after kickoff.

Credentials for freelance photographers may be denied depending on game-by-game demand. Freelance photographers must submit a contact sheet featuring game or sideline action to the SID office no later than four days following the game.

## Telephones

The East Carolina Press Box is equipped with five (5) long distance phone lines for general use by writers. Three of the long distance phones are positioned along press row while the other two are located on the counter top in the back press area. These telephones are available to all media outlets and are not reserved for any single outlet. Personal phones may be ordered at individual seats by contacting Carolina Telephone (919-355-4800). Please alert the SID office if you are ordering a phone so your seat location will correspond with the work order.

## Parking

Media parking passes may also be requested through the SID office. A limited number of media parking passes will be available for the lower Minges lot. Entry to the lot is off Charles Street onto Ficklen Drive.

## Press Services

Quarterly play-by-play, quarterly, halftime and final stats, final individual offensive and defensive stats, scoring summary, drive charts, coaches' quotes and notes will be provided. Information regarding postme interview procedure will be distributed in the press box. A pregame meal is available beginning approximately 90 minutes before kickoff.

## Fax-On-Demand

Fax-on-demand — is a 24-hour-a-day, 7-day-a-week service for media which instantly sends the latest media information to your fax machine. The number to access fax-on-demand is (770) 399-3066. Call the sports information office for more details.

## Player Interviews

—During Game Week

Requests for player interviews during the week should be made at least a day in advance with the sports information office by calling 919-328-4522.

Players will return telephone calls to members of the media; player telephone numbers will not be given out. A time mutually convenient for the player and the member of the media will be set up by the SID office. All long distance player calls returned will be COLLECT.

Pregame interviews must be concluded by no later than Wednesday. Players will not be asked to miss classroom time to do interviews. The best time to visit with players in person are at the Monday press luncheon, or following practice.

—After the Game

Coach Steve Logan will conduct a postgame press conference with the media in the Leo Jenkins Auditorium on the second floor of the Ward Sports Medicine Building, to the left of the Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium press box. Requested players will also be brought to the auditorium following Coach Logan's session.

Sports Information Office representatives will be available to assist in postgame interviews. Complete postgame plans, both home and away, will be announced on game day in the press box by the SID.

## To Contact Coach Logan

The best time to contact Coach Steve Logan by telephone is between 1:30 and 2:30, Monday through Friday at 919-328-4570. Joyce Stroud, Coach Logan's secretary, will assist you in this endeavor. You may also set up interviews through Norm Reilly in the SID office at 919-328-4522.

## Monday Press Luncheon

Coach Steve Logan holds a weekly luncheon/press conference each Monday during the season, beginning at 11:30 a.m. in the Ward Sports Medicine Building. Lunch is available from 11:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Coach Logan's press conference usually begins at Noon. Several members of the Pirate football squad will be available following Coach Logan's press conference. **If you wish to interview a specific student-athlete at this time, please contact the SID office in advance (no later than Sunday afternoon).** A tape of the press conference can also be made available, if needed.

## Hot Line

Daily taped reports are available on the Sprint/Carolina Telephone Yellow Pages Talking Fingers Pirate Hotline. The number is 919-758-8900. Jeff Charles "Voice of the Pirates" and the ECU Sports Information staff will provide actualities on the hotline. The code number for Pirate football is 3283. Other codes are 3281 (General Information), 3282 (Pirate Club), 3284 (Men's & Women's Basketball) and 3285 (Olympic Sports).

## Internet

East Carolina University football information will be available on the Internet. For questions about this service and the Internet address, contact the Sports Information Office at (919) 328-4522.

## Radio & Television

Visiting radio networks planning to broadcast from Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium are issued credentials by the sports information office. Broadcast lines should be ordered through Carolina Telephone (919-355-4800). Visiting networks may also want to contact Jeff Charles, Director of Electronic Media at ECU, about a reciprocal agreement for phone lines.

Also, any television outlets wishing to broadcast from Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium, must request credentials in advance from the SID office. You are also encouraged to contact Jeff Davis, Assistant Athletics Director for Operations at ECU (328-4517), concerning electrical power, set-ups, etc.

## The Facility

A three-level working media facility is available to those covering ECU football. This main press box will accommodate 92 print media representatives on Level B, along with food operations, and basic media operations. Level C includes booths for radio, coaches, stadium PA, scoreboard operations, host athletic director and security. Level D is an open-air photo deck for television and coaches' films.

## Practices

Fall practices are usually open for all media during the first hour. However, there may be several occasions during the season when practices will be closed. Contact the SID Office in advance if you are planning to attend practice. Only calisthenics and warm-up drills can be video-taped. All scrimmages will take place in Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium. Media are asked to contact the SID office if they plan to attend one of the team's scrimmages.

## Directions to Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium

### From the Tidewater, Virginia Area

Take U.S. 13 from Suffolk to Ahoskie, N.C. Take by-pass around Ahoskie (NC 11). Take NC 11 to Greenville. NC 11 turns into Memorial Drive. Take Memorial Drive to Fifth Street and take a left. Take Fifth Street to Cotanche Street and take a right. Take Cotanche, which runs into Charles Blvd., to Ficklen Drive (Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium is on the right).

### From I-95 North

Take I-95 South to NC 903 exit (Halifax, N.C.). Take left over the overpass. Take NC 903 for eight miles until you reach U.S. 301. Take a right at U.S. 301 (4-5 miles) and proceed NC 125/903. Take left onto NC 125/903 and take for 15 miles until you reach Scotland Neck. Take a right on U.S. 258 when you reach Scotland Neck and go about 1-2 miles through downtown. Then take a left onto NC 125 and take for about 15 miles to Oak City. Take right onto NC 11 at Oak City. Take NC 11 (25 miles) to Greenville where it turns into Memorial Drive. Take Memorial Drive to Fifth Street and take a left. Take Fifth Street to Cotanche Street and take a right. Take Cotanche, which runs into Charles Blvd., to Ficklen Drive (Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium is on the right).

### From I-95 South

Take I-95 North to U.S. 264 exit (Wilson, N.C.). Take right and go on U.S. 264 through downtown Wilson and head to Greenville. Take U.S. 264 to Allen Road and turn right. Allen Road turns into Greenville Blvd. Take Greenville Blvd. to Charles Blvd. and take left (ECU message board on corner). Take Charles Blvd. to Ficklen Drive and take right (Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium is on the right).

### From Triangle Area

Take U.S. 64 from Raleigh and head east. Take U.S. 264 in Zebulon and head east through downtown Wilson and into Greenville. Take U.S. 264 bypass around Greenville, which turns into Greenville Blvd. Take Greenville Blvd. to Charles Blvd. and take left (ECU message board on corner). Take Charles Blvd. to Ficklen Drive and take right (Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium is on the right).

### From Wilmington

Take Interstate 40 Northwest to Wallace. Take right onto NC 41 and head north through Chinquapin and Beulaville (about 20-25 miles). Get on NC 241 in Beulaville and head about 10 miles north to Pink Hill, where you will pick up NC 11. Take NC 11 through downtown Kinston and to Greenville, where it turns into Memorial Drive. Take Memorial Drive (past Carolina East Mall) to Greenville Blvd., where you will take a right. Go down Greenville Blvd. to Charles Blvd. and take left (ECU message board on corner). Take Charles Blvd. up to Ficklen Drive and take right (Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium is on the right).

## Directions/Media Parking

Media parking is in the lower Minges lot on Ficklen Drive, located west of Williams Arena at Minges Coliseum. Entry to the lot is off Charles Street onto Ficklen Drive, which is located just north of the large Minges Coliseum parking lot.

## Directions/Media Parking to Press Box

Walk around the West side of Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium (front of Minges Coliseum). Go under the middle of the South Stands and take elevator to press level. The B level is for working media, the C level is for radio and the D level is for photographers.

## Directions/Press Box to Interview Room

Take elevator down to ground level. Go left until you reach the Ward Sports Medicine Building. Take front entrance; use steps to go to second floor. When you reach second floor head straight until the first hallway and go left. Take first door on right (interview room).

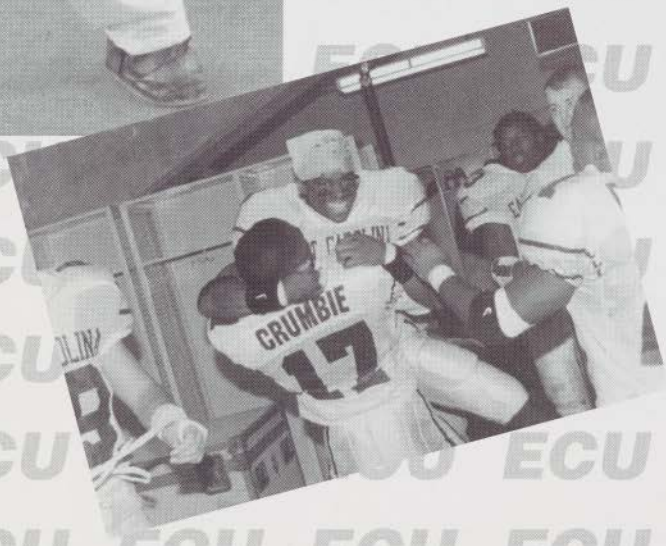
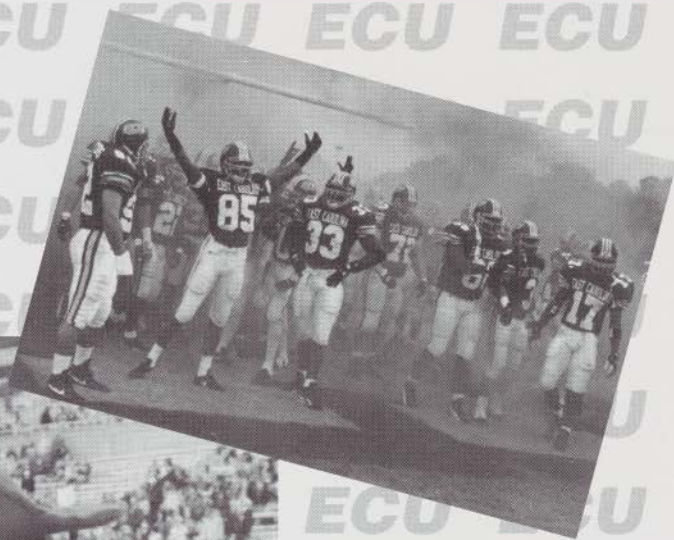
The Pirates' defense completely shut down the Cardinal offense, limiting the Pacific 10 school to just 211 yards.

## ***ECU Features Wide-Open Offense***

**F**ew teams nationally have put up the kind of numbers on offense that East Carolina has during the decade of the 1990s.

Steve Logan, who was the Pirates' offensive coordinator two seasons before becoming head coach in 1992, has been the architect of ECU's potent attack. To gain a full appreciation of the Pirates' offense under Logan, consider the following:

1) The top four marks for passing yards in a season by ECU have all occurred since 1990.

2) Four of the five highest figures for total offense in a season at East Carolina have been recorded in Logan's tenure.

3) The individual ECU passing records are dominated by Marcus Crandell and Jeff Blake — both of whom tutored under Logan.

4) ECU's explosiveness was evident at Syracuse last season when the Pirates scored 27 points in the final 31 minutes for a comeback victory over the Orangemen.

# Defense



## *Pirate Defense Now A Force*

**A**fter assuming the helm of the East Carolina program in 1992, Pirate head coach Steve Logan was adamant about improving his team's defense.

The overall program has been on a steady rise throughout the 1990s, but until recent seasons, the offense had a great jump on the progress, and prowess, of the defense. All that has changed under Logan and defensive coordinator Paul Jette.

The ECU defense is now a force to be reckoned with. A quick look at the 1995 season reveals that it was the Pirate defense which was most instrumental in several victories, including a sterling performance in the Liberty Bowl win over Stanford.

Here is a look at how far the ECU's defense has come in four years under Logan and Jette:

All operations of the Pirate Sports Network are coordinated, produced and directed by Jeff Charles, Director of Electronic Media at East Carolina.

Key market affiliates include flagship station WCZI 98.3 FM along with WGPM 94.3 FM. Major markets airing Pirate football include WEEB 1460 AM, Fuquay Varina (Raleigh); WKEW 1400 AM, Greensboro; WTOB 1380 AM Winston-Salem; WVAB 1550 AM, Virginia Beach, Va. (Tidewater); WXGI AM 950, Richmond, Va.; and WFNZ 610 AM, Charlotte.

The Pirate Sports Radio Network crew consists of ECU Hall of Famer, Carlester Crumpler, beginning his ninth year as analyst; Steve Gowan serves as pregame, halftime and postgame show host; Marty Feurer is the sideline announcer and Warren Baker and Tom Doyle are engineer-producers. Tim Moreland handles radio play-by-play assignments during Pirate Sports Television Network telecasts.

Jeff Charles begins his ninth year as the "Voice" of the Pirates. He's handled play-by-play duties for Virginia Tech, Illinois and Furman. The Piqua, Ohio native served as sports director at WSB in Atlanta and works selected college basketball telecasts for Raycom, Creative Sports and Home Team Sports. Charles and his wife, Debby, have a son, Britt, a sophomore at Western Carolina University, and a daughter, Heather, deceased.

### Steve Logan Show

The Steve Logan Show, featuring ECU's head football coach and host Jeff Charles, is a 30-minute weekly show that takes viewers inside ECU football. Chief Sports Photographer Kevin O'Brien produces the show with assistance from WNCT-TV Sports Director Brian Bailey and reporter Chris Stansbury.

Five games will be aired live on CBS affiliate WNCT-TV Channel Nine in Greenville.

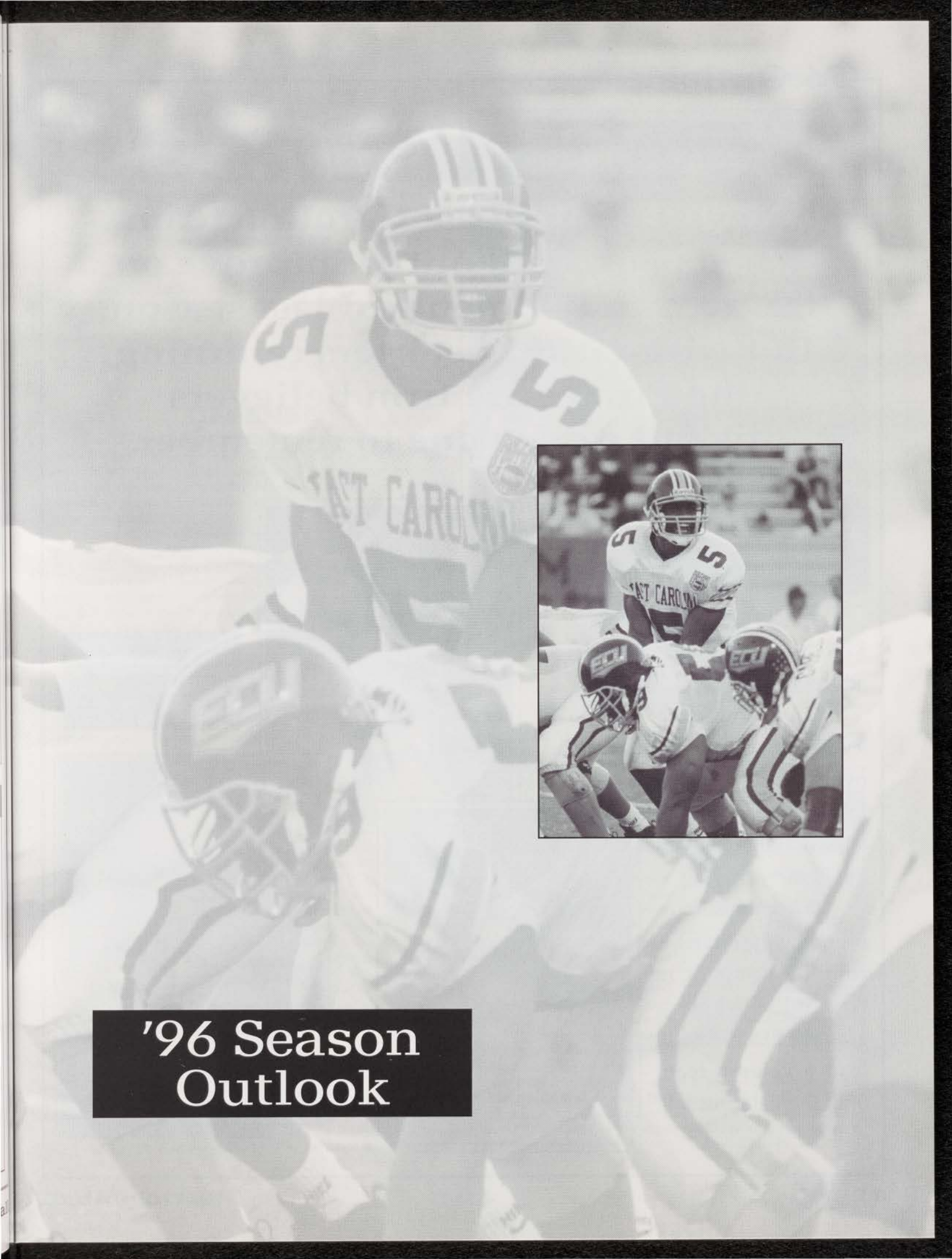
Home Team Sports (HTS) will also air the five-game package either live or delayed. Selected TV stations throughout the state will carry some telecasts. Check local listings in specific areas.

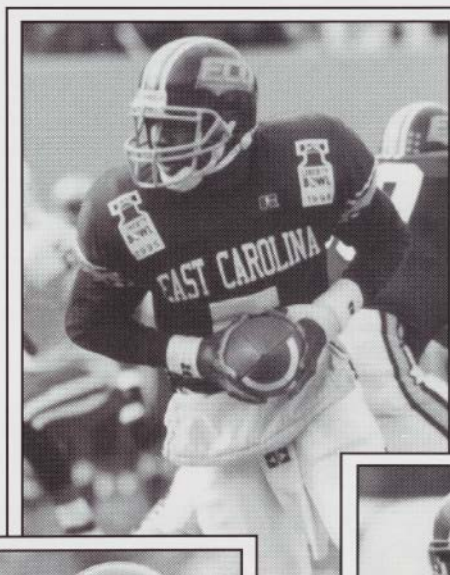
# New Business

Steve Logan's East Carolina team has its work cut out to improve on the accomplishments of last season. But with 17 of 24 starters returning, the Pirates are firm believers this fall can be one to remember.

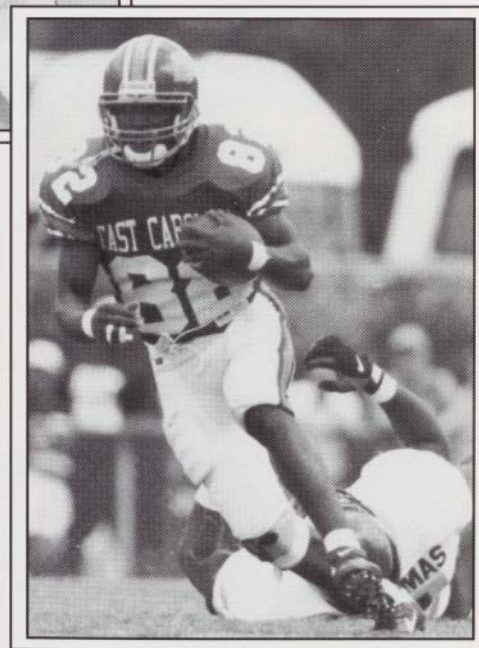
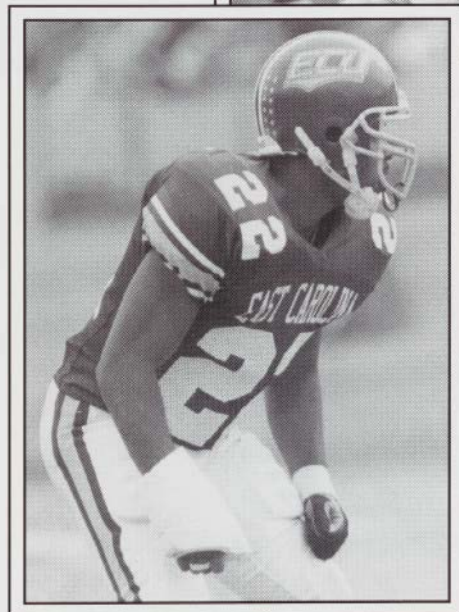
**L**ast season, the East Carolina Pirates took care of some "unfinished business." In 1996, there's "new business" to address.

Improving on the 9-3 record of a year ago, which included a victory over Stanford in the Liberty Bowl, won't be an easy assignment for the Pirates.

But optimism surrounding the Pirates is running rampant in Greenville where a group of 19 seniors will lead a veteran team onto the field this fall.

After a banner season in 1995, one which culminated with a Liberty Bowl victory over Stanford University, the East Carolina Pirates will look to continue their climb toward national prominence during the 1996 campaign.

East Carolina has provided the Carolinas with their winningest football program in the past two seasons as the Pirates have won 16 games while losing eight. ECU was ranked in virtually every final Top 25 poll at the conclusion of the 1995 season. The Pirates were listed No. 14 in the final *New York Times* Top 25 rankings after compiling a 9-3 record and defeating the Stanford Cardinal 19-13 at Memphis.

Steve Logan, who enters his fifth season as East Carolina's head coach, will welcome back the Pirates' largest senior class since 1991. In addition, nine starters from an offense which averaged 396.1 yards per game last fall return. ECU's defense was hit somewhat harder by graduation as five starters will have to be replaced.

Still, Logan and his coaching staff came out of spring practice feeling good about their team's improved depth, particularly on defense.

## OFFENSE

East Carolina again offered up one of the country's most wide-open and potent offensive attacks last season. The Pirates ranked 22nd nationally in passing offense, and with so many starters returning, including All-America candidate **Marcus Crandell** at quarterback, there is no reason to anticipate a decrease on offense.

Crandell, a 6-0, 204-pound senior, is on his way to totally re-writing the ECU record book. He already has moved past former Pirate standout and current Cincinnati Bengal Jeff Blake as the all-time school leader in total offense (6,026 yards) and passing yardage (5,691).

As a junior last season, Crandell threw for 2,751 yards as he connected on 235 of 447 passes and 18 TDs. He was named National Offensive Player-of-the-Week following his performance against Syracuse when he passed for a school record 392 yards and had 453 yards of total offense in the 27-24 victory over the Orangemen.

Behind Crandell there is some talent but not a lot of experience. This is one of Logan's concerns heading into the '96 season. Junior **Dan Gonzalez** (6-3, 210) and sophomore **Ernest Tinnin** (6-1, 203) are the backups to Crandell. Gonzalez made strides in the spring of grasping the offensive system, according to Logan, but must perform under fire to prove his capabilities.

The running game will feel the departure of Jerris McPhail who ran for 910 yards last season despite being hampered by a variety of injuries. McPhail was a versatile weapon both as a runner and receiver as he also had 38 receptions for 342 yards. Logan has been fortunate the past several seasons to have had stability at this

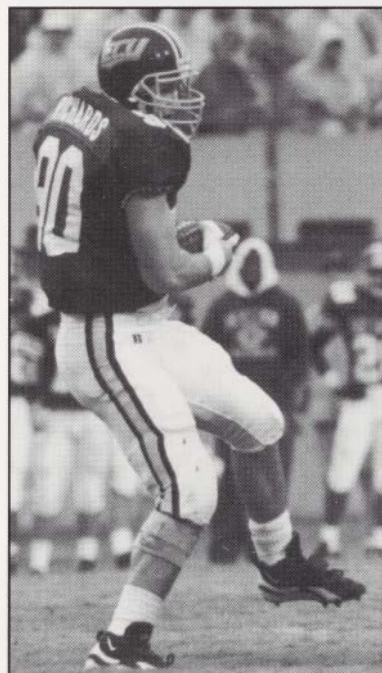
position. Before McPhail, all-time ECU leading rusher Junior Smith held the job for nearly three-plus seasons. But the situation is different this season, and Logan will be looking for one of his candidates to step up and develop into a consistent and effective runner. Logan has also said he's not opposed to rotating his backs on a regular basis if their cumulative results came close to equalling that of McPhail or Smith.

The list of Pirates has several candidates to look to fill the void in the one-back set.

Sophomores **Scott Harley** (5-10, 200) and **Raymond Mabry** (5-7, 180) each saw duty last season. Harley had 61 carries for 263 yards and enjoyed his best afternoon against Temple when he started in place of the injured McPhail and rushed for an ECU freshman-record 175 yards. Mabry's playing time was more limited though he is expected to become a larger factor in 1996. Another player to watch is **Damon Davis**, a red-shirt freshman from Orangeburg, S.C. with limited size (5-8, 170) but blazing speed and quickness. Davis was his state's top track performer as a senior after winning the 100 and 200-meter dashes, as well as anchoring the 400 and 1,600-meter relays.

Crandell and Co. will be happy to see the majority of the East Carolina receiving corps back for another season. In fact, ECU's top five pass catchers among receivers in 1995 will return this fall. Leading the group are wideouts **Mitchell Galloway** (46 catches, 619 yards, 3 TDs) and **Jason Nichols** (43/502/2). Galloway, a senior, and Nichols,

# '96 Outlook

a junior, each rank among the Pirates' top five in career receptions. Nichols enters '96 fourth on the ECU list with 85 receptions while Galloway is fifth with 83. Junior **Larry Shannon** (24 receptions for 346 yards) and sophomore **Troy Smith** (15 for 242 yards) provided the Pirates with a formidable one-two combination at split end. Shannon led the team in touchdown catches (five) while Smith was the ECU leader in yards per reception (16.1). **Perez Mattison** (6-1, 185,

Jr.) will also return after sitting out the '95 season for academic reasons. Mattison is a versatile player who will likely also see action for the Pirates as a kick returner.

Senior tight end **Scott Richards** was one of the team's most valuable performers in 1995. The 6-5, 260-pound South Carolina native caught at least three passes in seven of the final 10 games last season and played a key role in the Pirates' 36-34 win at Southern Mississippi as he caught a pair of TD passes from Crandell. Senior **Sean Richardson** (6-5, 232) provides

excellent depth at the tight end position. Sophomore **J.J. McQueen** (6-4, 225) sat out last season but had an outstanding prep career and gives ECU yet another talented option at the tight end position.

Up front, Logan has some concerns as he looks to replace departed senior center Kevin Wiggins and part-time starter Charles Boothe. Only Wiggins and right guard **Lamont Burns** (6-5, 273, Sr.) started every game last season. Senior **Ron Suddith** (6-2, 297) missed two early season games last fall with an ankle injury but is regarded as perhaps the Pirates' top blocker. Burns is again slated to be the starter at right guard.

Senior **Jamie Gray** (6-2, 293) started all 12 games, seeing action

on the left side both at guard and tackle. Logan will also look to senior **Shane McPherson** (6-3, 280) to take on an increased role. Sophomore **Danny Moore** (6-4, 285), who sat out the 1995 season, will get a long look at center along with **Ed Watkins** (6-4, 275, Sr.) who was moved from the defensive line last year. The Pirates are also counting on Stacey Whitehead (6-6, 298, Jr.), who was listed as the No. 1 left tackle following spring practice. The status of **Mpumi Masimini** (6-4, 280) remains in question as he continues to rehabilitate from a knee injury suffered in last October's game against Temple.

## DEFENSE

It was just a few seasons ago that most of East Carolina's success could be attributed to the Pirates' offense. In 1991 as ECU was on its way to 11 consecutive victories and a Peach Bowl win over N.C. State, the Pirates gave up an average of 408.8 yards of offense per game. Just four seasons ago, ECU ranked 105th nationally in total defense, 106th in rushing defense and 98th in pass efficiency defense.

But things have changed. Logan and his staff have worked hard to upgrade the Pirate defense and their diligence has paid off the past two years. Last season, one could credit the ECU "D" for playing large roles in several victories, including the bowl victory over Stanford. The Pirates limited the Cardinal, who featured one of the Pac-10's most potent offenses, to 211 yards and a single touchdown. The Pirates jumped last season to 38th nationally in total defense, No. 7 in pass efficiency defense and 51st in rushing defense.

East Carolina returns more defensive starters than it lost following the 1995 season, but the Pirates will be without several quality players who played large roles in the success of the past two seasons.

Among the losses are linebackers Mark Libiano, the Pirates' leading tackler each of the past three seasons; and Morris Foreman, a "do-it-all" performer who Logan says is as good a big-play performer as he's ever been around. Aaron Black, another linebacker, was a solid performer as well. Also missing is cornerback Emmanuel McDaniel, who ranked

No. 8 nationally in interceptions with six and who finished his career sixth on ECU's all-time list (13 INTs). McDaniel (fourth round pick of Carolina Panthers) and his running back teammate McPhail (fifth round, Miami Dolphins) were the two East Carolina players selected in last spring's NFL draft. The departures of tackle Walter Scott, who has been a Pirate starter since 1992, and cornerback Hank Cooper, will also be felt.

But despite the losses, there are plenty of reasons Logan and defensive coordinator Paul Jette are optimistic that East Carolina's defense will again be a strength for the Pirates.

On the defensive line, senior end **Lorenzo West** (6-3, 255) is a force. West can also make the big play as he was in on 56 tackles and ranked among the nation's leaders in sacks with nine. He also made six tackles behind the line of scrimmage. Nose guard **Travis Darden** (6-3, 273, So.) started all 12 games as a true freshman last season and has an extremely bright future for the Pirates.

Certainly one of many positives to come out of spring practice was the development of several of the Pirates' young defensive linemen. Because of this, ECU could be a deeper unit up front during the 1996 season. **Mondell Corbett** (6-3, 270, So.) and **Dwayne Ledford** (6-5, 275, So.) both had productive springs and figure significantly in the defensive line plans for the coming season. **Terrell Williams** (6-2, 270, Sr.) provides solid backup help at nose guard. In addition, **Alphonso Collins** (6-3, 280, So.) returns this season to bolster the line after sitting out the 1995 season.

At linebacker, the bad news for the Pirates is that Libiano, Foreman and Black are gone. The good news is East Carolina has three seniors and a talented sophomore back after they gained significant experience last season. In fact, the Pirates split time at linebacker between their group, giving them great depth last season and a comfortable situation looking ahead to the 1996 campaign. And if that's not enough, the Pirates also loaded up at linebacker with their 1996 recruiting class.

Senior **Marvin Burke** (6-0, 248), **B.J. Crane** (6-1, 236, Sr.) and **Carlos Brown** (6-1, 245, Sr.) all

ranked among the Pirates' top seven tacklers last season from their linebacker spots. Burke was third on the team in stops with 91 while Brown added 61 and Crane 59. Crane, who backed up Burke inside last season, will move outside to his more natural position to take over for the departed Foreman. Backing up Brown at the "Willie" LB spot will be **Jeff Kerr** (6-4, 225, R-Fr.) and **E.J. Gunthrope** (6-2, 225, Sr.). The coaches are high on Kerr after his outstanding spring while Gunthrope gives them another experienced linebacker.

Sophomore **Roderick Coleman** (6-3, 250), whose playing time increased significantly as the season progressed, is expected to take over at an outside linebacking spot after his exceptional freshman campaign. Many observers feel Coleman can become the Pirates' top sack artist and he gave an early preview of that in 1995 as he had three sacks and a team-leading 20 "QB pressures" while making 45 tackles. **Tomha McMillan** (6-4, 250, So.) and **Freddie Claybrooks** (6-5, 234, R-Fr.) back up Coleman at the "LEO" position. Junior **Matt Semenza** (6-3, 213) and sophomore **Shep Sepaniak** (6-2, 235) offer depth at linebacker though much of their experience last season came on special teams. Logan also will give **Brian Bentley** (6-3, 225, So.) a look at inside linebacker.

Three of four starters return to the secondary unit which was seventh nationally in pass efficiency defense. **Daren Hart** (5-10, 195, Sr.) and his twin brother **David Hart** (5-10, 183, Sr.) occupied the starting strong and free safety

positions for most of last season. Daren was the Pirates' second-leading tackler last fall with 92 stops, including a team-leading 10 behind the line, while also coming up with three interceptions. In addition, it was Daren who ignited East Carolina and its faithful with his 39-yard interception return for a touchdown in the first quarter of the Liberty Bowl against Stanford. David Hart also played a vital role in the Pirates' fortunes with 65 tackles. Senior cornerback **Dwight Henry** (5-11, 175) is one of ECU's fastest players and has started 30 games in the past three seasons. He had 58 tackles and six pass deflections in '95. There's also plenty of youth to provide depth for the Pirates. Perhaps at the top of the list is **Kelvin Suggs** (6-2, 192, So.), who by season's end last fall, was seeing significant playing time. Suggs was listed as the starting "Bench" cornerback following spring practice.

ECU will also look to several other players with limited secondary experience for contributions to the defensive backfield. **Deeone McKeithan** (6-2, 210, So.), **Tavares Taylor** (6-3, 192, So.), **Tabari Wallace** (5-11, 177, Jr.) and **Kendrick Phillips** (6-3, 211, So.) are all in the mix for added duty in 1996. In addition, **Bernard Lackey** (5-11, 197, So.) and red-shirt freshman **Kevin Monroe** (6-1, 180) offer help.

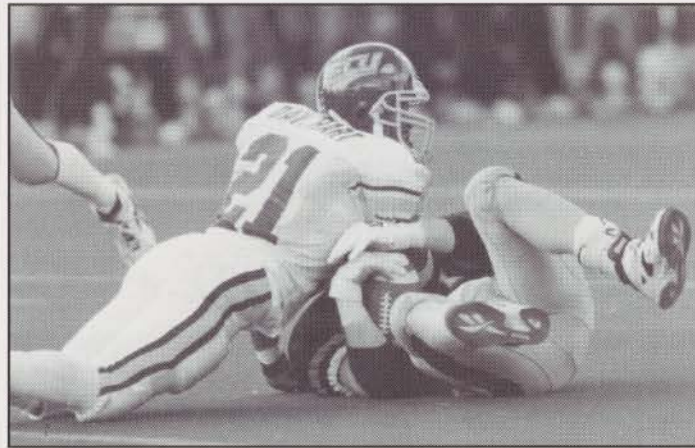

## SPECIAL TEAMS

The area of special teams is one which the Pirates are hoping to improve in 1996.

Senior placekicker **Chad Holcomb** (6-2, 175) converted 10 of 17 field goals during the regular season but experienced spells of inconsistency at times. Holcomb had game-winning kicks against West Virginia and Southern Mississippi, and then in the Liberty Bowl, the Smyrna, Ga. native booted four field goals en route to earning game offensive MVP honors for East Carolina in the six-point win over Stanford.

The punting game dropped off from the previous season as **Matt Levine** (5-9, 205, Jr.) averaged 37.1 yards per kick after a 42.6 average as a freshman.

Logan and his staff also included a placekicker and punter amongst its '96 recruiting class.

- Ranked by *The Sporting News* as the No. 7 quarterback in the country in publication's preseason issue
- First-team QB for 1995 All-Independent Team
- Has finished past two seasons ranked among top 10 nationally in total offense (8th in 1994 & 10th in 1996)
- Enters senior season as ECU's all-time leader in passing yards (5,691) and total offense (6,026), surpassing former Pirate and current NFL standout Cincinnati Bengal Jeff Blake
- Named top college football player in North Carolina for 1995
- One shy of Blake's school record for career TD passes (43 to 42)
- National Player-of-the-Week by *The Sporting News* for performance in win over Syracuse last season (453 yards total offense, 392 passing yards and 4 touchdowns) — both marks are new East Carolina single-game records
- His 74 offensive plays against the Orangemen was also a school single-game mark

- A heavy hitter, he was second on the team in tackles last season with 92, including 61 unassisted stops
- Set the tone for Pirates' defensive effort in '95 Liberty Bowl victory over Stanford as he returned an interception 39 yards for a touchdown in opening quarter
- Was named ECU's defensive player-of-the-game vs. Stanford
- Was in on 16 tackles in contest against Illinois
- Tied for second on team in interceptions in 1995 with three
- Has totalled 263 tackles during career, including 17 behind the line of scrimmage

## **#51 Marvin Burke, Senior Linebacker 6-1, 250, Jacksonville, Fla.**

- One of team's most physical linebackers
- Ranked third on squad in tackles in 1995 with 91
- Had a season-best 15 tackles in 23-20 victory over West Virginia
- Also had double-figure stops against Tennessee (11), Illinois (12) and Tulsa (11)
- Had four pass deflections and a pair of sacks in 1995

## **#21 David Hart, Senior Safety 5-10, 185, Winston-Salem, N.C.**

- In same mold as his twin brother Daren
- One of the team's most intense players and a leader on defensive side of the ball
- Ranked No. 5 on Pirate squad in tackles in 1995 with 65, including 38 solo hits
- Recorded a season-best 20 tackles in 31-25 victory at Army last November
- Has been in on 153 tackles during career with five interceptions

## **#1 Jason Nichols, Junior Flanker 5-11, 170, Norcross, Ga.**

- Another of Pirates' talented receivers
- In his first two seasons at East Carolina, he has been on the receiving end of 85 passes (42 as freshman and 43 last season)
- Has started 22 of 24 games with the Pirates thus far in career
- Was team's No. 2 receiver last season with his 43 grabs for 502 yards and a pair of TDs
- Already No. 4 on ECU career list for receptions with 85 — just 17 shy of Luke Fisher's all-time Pirate mark
- Enjoyed four-game stretch last season when he caught 24 passes for 337 yards
- Also averaged 8.1 yards on 22 punt returns

## **#90 Scott Richards, Senior Tight End 6-5, 260, North Augusta, S.C.**

- A sure-handed pass receiver, Richards is also an outstanding blocker
- Became one of Pirates' most reliable offensive weapons in 1995 as he caught 33 passes for 341 yards and three touchdowns
- After failing to catch a pass in the season opener, he had at least one reception in final 11 games of the campaign

- Finished with a team-high nine sacks for the Pirates, number which ranked 26th nationally
- Also had six tackles for loss during season
- Named to the ECAC first-team defensive squad following junior season
- Against West Virginia, West recorded eight tackles and registered three sacks as the Pirates defeated the Mountaineers 23-20
- Has recorded 12 career sacks

## BACK-TO-BACK BOWLS & WINNING SEASONS

ECU has made back-to-back appearances in the St. Jude Liberty Bowl, defeating the Stanford Cardinal 19-13 in the 1995 event at Memphis. The Pirates also have recorded consecutive winning seasons for the first time since 1982 and 1983. ECU finished 9-3 last season after a 7-5 mark in 1994.

## ECU BEST IN CAROLINAS LAST TWO YEARS

East Carolina has offered the most successful football program in the Carolinas the past two seasons. The Pirates have won 16 games over the past two years, more than any other major college in North Carolina and South Carolina. In addition, ECU is one of only two schools in the Carolinas to be invited to participate in bowl games each of the past two seasons.

## LOGAN BEGINS FIFTH SEASON AS HEAD COACH

East Carolina University head coach Steve Logan (Tulsa '75) will be entering his fifth season at the helm of the Pirate program. Logan has compiled a record of **23-23 (.500)** during that time. He has guided ECU to back-to-back appearances in the St. Jude Liberty Bowl. The Pirates culminated a successful 1995 season with a 19-13 victory over Stanford last December at Memphis. The Pirates were 5-6 in Logan's first season and 2-9 the following fall. But the last two years, East Carolina has recorded marks of 7-5 in 1994 and 9-3 in 1995. He came to ECU in 1989 as running backs coach and served in 1990 and '91 as offensive coordinator. The 43-year-old Lawton, Okla. native has also been an assistant coach at Mississippi State (quarterbacks, 1987-88), Colorado (running backs, 1985-86), Tulsa (offensive coordinator, 1983-84) and Oklahoma State (tight ends, 1980). Logan also served as the head coach at Hutchinson (Kan.) Junior College in 1981-82.

## CRANDELL ALL-TIME PASSING LEADER AT ECU

Individual records don't seem to mean too much to East Carolina senior QB Marcus Crandell, but he better get used to them. His assault on the Pirate record book hit high gear in 1995 and will doubtless continue during the '96 season. Already among the marks Crandell has rewritten are a pair of noteworthy ones previously held by former ECU great and current Cincinnati Bengal QB Jeff Blake. Here are a few of the records Crandell has surpassed or is nearing as he heads into his senior season.

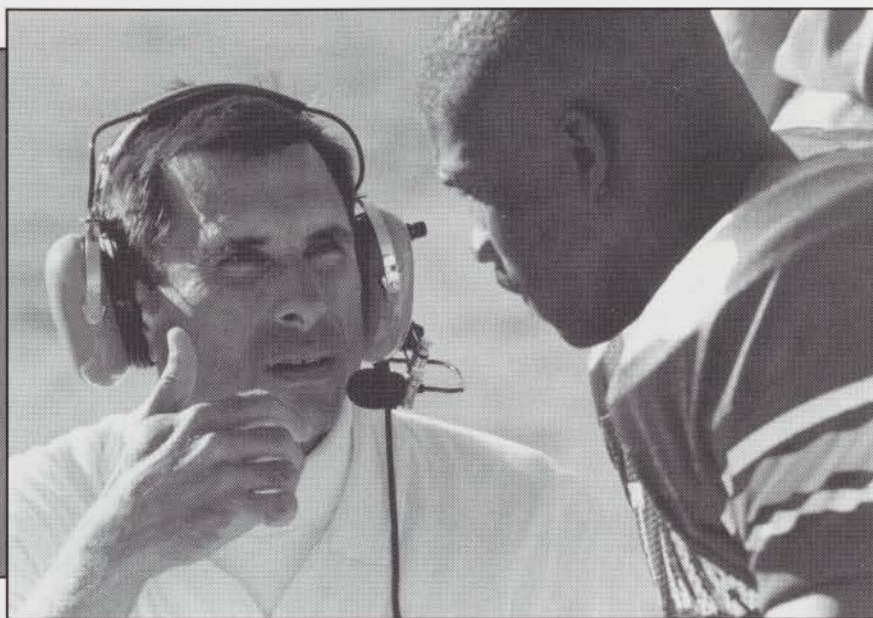

# Head Coach Steve Logan

## Fifth-Year Head Coach Developing Program's Consistency

*During the decade of the 1990s, East Carolina has been one of the country's fastest-moving programs. Certainly one of the biggest reasons for the Pirates' rise to prominence and national respect has been Steve Logan. Logan, set to begin his fifth season as head coach, has guided East Carolina to its position as the winningest program in the Carolinas over the past two years. In addition, ECU is one of two programs in North Carolina or South Carolina to participate in bowls in back-to-back years.*



One of the goals Steve Logan has had since he became the head football coach at East Carolina was to instill an increased level of consistency in the program. Consistency builds tradition and tradition is what the great college football programs all possess.

Logan sees that kind of opportunity with the Pirates.

After back-to-back winning seasons and bowl appearances, in addition to being the winningest Division I program in the Carolinas the past two years, East Carolina is on the brink of a major breakthrough on the national level. The Pirates have long been a respected squad in the minds of opposing coaches. But it has been an on-going battle to gain the national attention from the media the program so much deserves. By winning nine games last season, including six to conclude the year, and finishing in nearly all of the final top 25 rankings, ECU is gaining some well-deserved attention across the country. And Logan has been at the controls guiding the charge toward new-found notoriety.

Now set to embark on his fifth season as the man at the helm of East Carolina football, Logan approaches his job with an intensity rivaled by few in the business. He is a competitor who challenges his players to excel on the practice field on a daily basis. But while Logan has well-defined expectations of his players, he also has a genuine interest in their lives away from football.

He takes great pride in the ECU football family and its closeness. It's no surprise that so many of the Pirates' recent signees, when asked why they chose to attend East Carolina, simply say they felt comfortable in what they perceived as a great, family atmosphere. When one combines that factor with the Pirates' success on the field, it is easy to see why Logan and his coaching staff have continued to enjoy stellar recruiting classes.

There is no doubt that Logan is overseeing one of the fastest-

moving programs in the country. One can point to ECU's recent talks with Conference USA, the Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium expansion project, or its ever-growing television exposure — including its unique five-year arrangement with ESPN — as signs that Pirate football is finding a significant place on the college football map.

Over the past two seasons, Logan's Pirates have compiled a record of 16-8 and earned consecutive invitations to the St. Jude Liberty Bowl in Memphis. No Division I school in North Carolina or South Carolina has enjoyed a better two-year record than the Pirates and only one other program has participated in bowl games in those seasons as the Pirates have.

Last season, Logan and his team culminated a banner year by finishing with a six-game win streak which included a 19-13 win over Pacific 10 power Stanford in the St. Jude Liberty Bowl at Memphis. The Pirates were ranked No. 23 in the final *USA Today*/CNN poll and were listed at 14th in the *New York Times* computer rankings.

Logan developed much of his coaching philosophy through the influence of several head coaches. He worked on the staff of current Ohio State coach John Cooper at Tulsa, with Miami Dolphins coach Jimmy Johnson at Oklahoma State and with Bill McCartney, formerly the head coach at Colorado, and with Bill Lewis at East Carolina.

Logan is widely recognized as the architect of the potent Pirate offensive attack of the 1990s.

His offensive ideas were implemented into the ECU system when he served as offensive coordinator during the 1990 and '91 seasons. In 1991, East Carolina finished the season with an 11-1 record and reached a Top 10 national ranking. The grand finale that year was a thrilling, come-from-behind 37-34 victory over North Carolina State in the Peach Bowl. While holding the position of coordinator, Logan tutored quarterback Jeff Blake, who after a sensa-

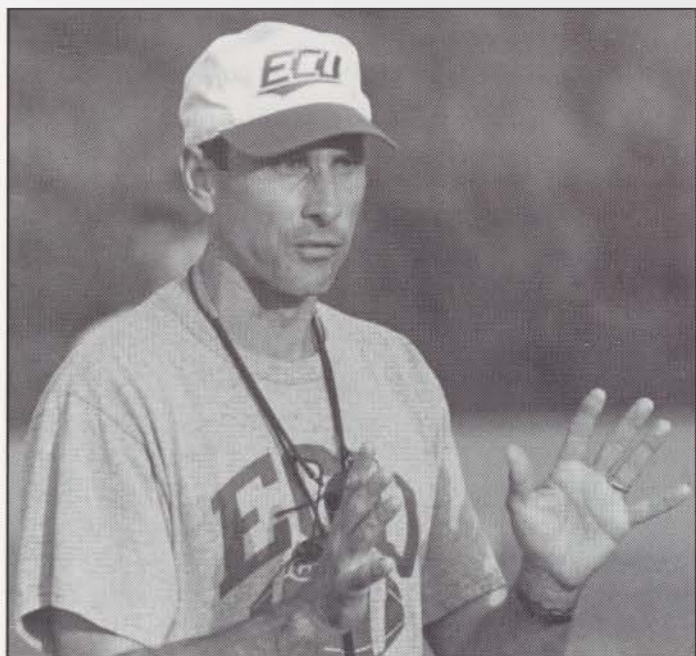

tional senior season in 1991, has gone on to become an NFL All-Pro signal-caller for the Cincinnati Bengals. And now, Logan coaches the quarterback who is shattering all of Blake's ECU records — senior Marcus Crandell. Last season among the marks Crandell rewrote — the Pirates' all-time records for total offense and passing yards.

While Logan has earned a name for his offensive creativity, he has been determined in his efforts since becoming head coach to upgrade East Carolina's defense. In Logan's four seasons as head coach, the program has made huge strides defensively. In 1992, the Pirates ranked 105th nationally among Division I schools in total defense; last fall, ECU was 38th. In scoring defense four years ago, East Carolina was again near the bottom at 101st but last season, the final rank was No. 30. And in pass efficiency defense, the Pirates were 98th in '92 compared to No. 7 in 1995. No longer are the days when the Pirates' offense carried the fortunes of the team on its back. Last season, the ECU defense played a large part in several key victories, including the Liberty Bowl when the Pirates held Stanford's highly-regarded offense to only 211 yards.

Logan came to ECU in 1989 after serving as quarterbacks coach at Mississippi State for two seasons. During his first season with the Pirates, he coached the running backs.

His coaching career started in 1974 as an assistant coach at Union High School in Tulsa, Okla. He began in the collegiate coaching ranks in 1980 as a tight ends coach at Oklahoma State under Jimmy Johnson and moved to Hutchinson Junior College the following year where he was the Jayhawk Conference Coach-of-the-

Year in 1982.

In 1983, he became offensive coordinator at Tulsa under John Cooper, who is currently head coach at Ohio State. Logan left Tulsa for Colorado in 1985 and coached the Buffalo running backs for two seasons before going to Mississippi State, where he coached the Bulldog quarterbacks.

The year before Logan went to Colorado as running backs coach, the Buffaloes were 1-10. In 1985, Logan's first season at CU, the Buffaloes were 7-5, playing Washington in the Freedom Bowl. The following season, Colorado went 6-6, playing Baylor in the Bluebonnet Bowl.

Many players that Logan recruited to Colorado were on the 1990 squad, which finished 11-1-1 and won a share of the national championship.

While at Tulsa, Logan did not play football and had plans to get a doctorate degree and become a college professor.

"I realized I wasn't going to the NFL," said Logan. "But, I had to teach in the public schools before going to graduate school. There (Union High School) they wanted me to coach football. I got addicted."

Leaving Union High School, Logan coached tight ends at Oklahoma State and it was there he became hooked on the college game.

Logan and his wife Laura, are the proud parents of two sons — Vincent (14) and Nathanael (12).

# Q&A

## With the Pirates' Head Coach

**Question** — *“Going into last season, the team was anxious to rebound from a disappointing loss to Illinois in the '94 Liberty Bowl and used the phrase 'Unfinished Business' as a motivational message. This year, the situation is totally different as you're coming off a big win over Stanford in the bowl game. Talk about the team's approach to this season compared to last.”*

**Answer** — *“The thing I have talked to our players about is continuing to slam away at the door to gain respect where people don't continually raise their eyebrows when we win a game. I know before you get accepted, so to speak, you've got to prove it over and over again. I'm sure that Bobby Bowden went through this at Florida State. I'm sure that Miami went through when they were coming up out of the ashes. We're trying to break into the club and we just can't lose any of the momentum that we've got rolling. And we've got a decent amount of momentum going right now, on and off the field. No one game is going to break us. I say over and over, 'win the next game.'”*

**Question** — *“You must feel the program has made great progress from a recruiting standpoint in the state to gaining more respect on the national level. Do you think that situation is better?”*

**Answer** — *“I think it is getting a little bit better. I think the national media, whoever they are, still have a little bit of a hard time with us. And that's okay. Last year's final AP poll is a good example. I wonder how many people studied the records and who we beat. I think some of these people still can't get a handle on who we are, what we are and where we are.”*

**Question** — *“Each season you have been the head coach, there have been strides. Have you been pleased with the progress of the program and what is the next step?”*

**Answer** — *“The next step, for probably the next two or three years, is to continue to win substantial numbers of games in the*

*context of 7-4, 8-3, 9-2. Those things have got to happen for us to continue to convince the high school prospects in this region that we are THE place to consider. That happened this past year. We were more than competitive in a prospect's home against whoever. It didn't matter. We signed 17 football players out of 25 out of North Carolina and that hasn't happened at East Carolina in a long, long time. When we finish the expansion of our stadium, I think that is going to be the icing on the cake to take us over the top as far as our image and having us where our program should be.”*

**Question** — *“Looking at this year's team, you made the comment coming out of spring practice that you now feel you can really go two-deep solidly at pretty much every position. As the head coach, you have to feel good about the depth this season?”*

**Answer** — *“In this day of 85 scholarships, I think it's about all you can say to have two at each position and that they can go perform at a level which will allow you to win. I think we're close to that. Our running back situation is a little bit iffy. Our quarterback situation, as far as No. 2, is iffy. The rest of our positions we feel good about. Honestly, we quietly played two-deep last year and we've got a lot of those kids back. The main thing that does is it will keep us from being fatigued. And I have always thought that fatigue causes injury. To me, it's a giant sign for progress and the other indicator is that this freshman class coming in is going to be more hard-pressed than any since I have been associated with East Carolina to get on the field. But the red-shirt thing is not a big thing with me. I don't red-shirt just to red-shirt. If a young man can help us win, I'll play him. I don't care if he's a freshman or not.”*

**Question** — *“When one looks at this year's senior class, one can see quantity and quality. Comment on this year's group of seniors.”*

**Answer** — *“This will be the biggest senior class we have had since the '91 campaign when we had 23 seniors. I think I've got 19 going into this season. This senior class is my first class of signees. We signed 23 that year and got to the finish line with 21. I had one*

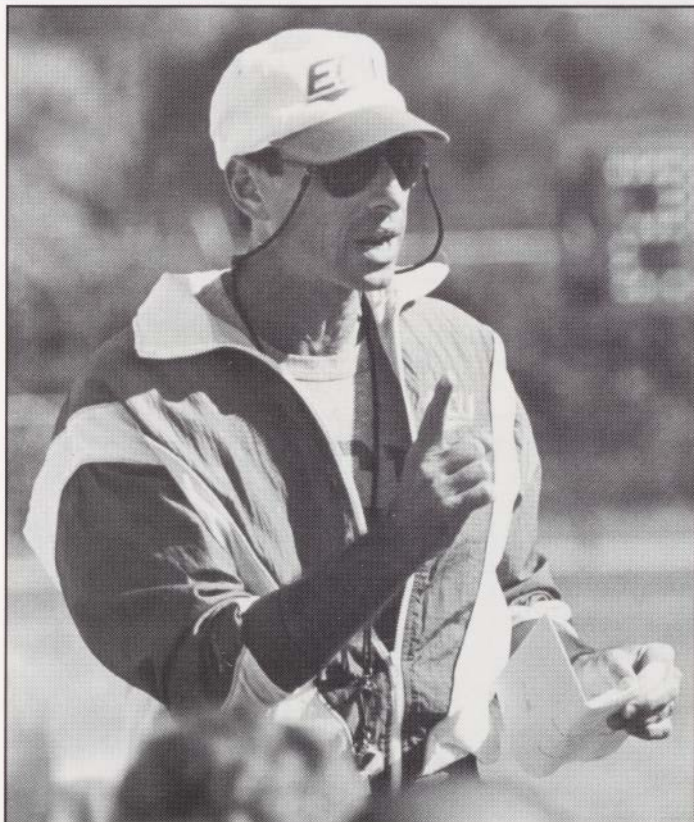
young man get tired of football and quit, and another man go out on medical. We had Mark Libiano and Morris Foreman in the original class who didn't red-shirt. It has been an exceptional group of kids as far as all of them staying interested, staying dedicated and being willing to pay the price. And that's a healthy situation. They are all on schedule on graduate and they have done everything properly."

**Question** — "You mentioned Mark Libiano and Morris Foreman. Those were two of last year's seniors who played key roles. Talk about the guys you lost from last year's team."

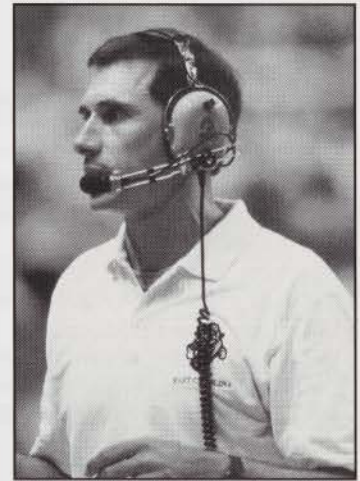
**Answer** — "The four that jump off the top of your head are Foreman, Libiano, (Walter) Scott and (Emmanuel) McDaniel of the defensive side of the ball. Those four kids have played a ton of football. Those four have literally played four years of college football almost from the day they hit campus. You don't just replace those guys. Somebody has to grow into those positions by degrees. I think we've got the people to do it. I think Buck Collins and Mondell Corbett can do what Walter Scott did. We're probably going to move Dwight Henry into Emmanuel's position, which is Dwight's natural position. We've been playing four or five LBs all along. (B.J.) Crane, (Marvin) Burke, (Carlos) Brown have all played a ton of football. We're going to move B.J. outside to his natural position. I don't think we'll see as big an impact losing those players as people think, even though they were all outstanding players."

**Question** — "What are your biggest concerns heading into the season?"

**Answer** — "The running back situation is a concern. We had Junior Smith for three and a half years and then when he graduated a lot of people were worried. But I felt totally confident that Jerris



McPhail could and would do the job. And he did, and of course, he was an NFL draft pick. Behind Jerris, we didn't have a guy of that caliber. We're going to look for someone to step up and get the job done. I'm concerned, but we went through the '91 season when we really didn't have a running back. We had good kids, but we didn't have a 1,000-yard rusher. We can exist okay, but right now, we don't have that kind of back. We're going to have to develop one."



**Question** — "What do you see as the team's primary strengths?"

**Answer** — "I'm hoping that our character should be something special this year. I've seen large senior classes get content and self-centered and I'm monitoring that to make sure that doesn't happen. It can happen despite your best effort some time. Our senior class is large, but out of 19 guys, there might just be two legit NFL guys there. And that's okay, because you can win as long as you've got real good college football players. I think we've got 19 seniors who are pretty good college football players. Their chemistry and their character are going to have to be assets to them. In my opinion, I don't think we've got the raw talent just to show up and win. I don't think we're in that elite category yet."

**Question** — "Marcus Crandell seems to be the perfect fit for the offense ECU runs and his numbers speak for themselves. You have made the statement that you wouldn't trade him for any other quarterback in the country. What makes Marcus stand out as such a special person, on and off the field?"

**Answer** — "There are 10 answers to that one question, because he's just a special guy. The thing that I get such a conscious kick out of is Marc's ability to grasp the situation. I've never been around an individual who learns as easily as Marc on ANY issue, not just football. He has the most absorbent mind of any young man I've ever worked with. He has such a deep sense of appreciation for information, and he processes it so quickly that sometimes it absolutely boggles my mind."

**Question** — "So much of the attention ECU has received has centered around the offense, yet you have been determined to improve the defense and the results are apparent now. Talk about your emphasis to building the Pirate defense."

**Answer** — "Well, it's recruiting. When we go recruiting, we go searching from Long Island to Miami for defensive, front seven football players. We're looking for nose guards, defensive ends, defensive tackles and linebackers. We are going to stop people from running the football. There are enough defensive backs and receivers for everybody to get, but there aren't enough defensive, front seven people. That's what we target our recruiting."

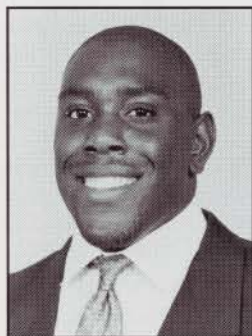
## **Terry Tilghman** **Graduate Assistant**

Tilghman and his wife, Jennifer, have two children, Terry Jr. and Jordan.

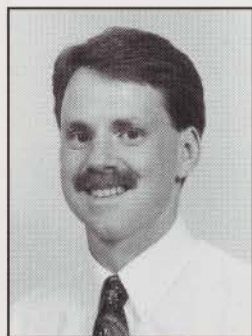


## **Damon Wilson** **Graduate Assistant**

Mike Hanley begins his seventh year on the Sports Medicine staff at East Carolina, and the fourth as head athletic trainer.

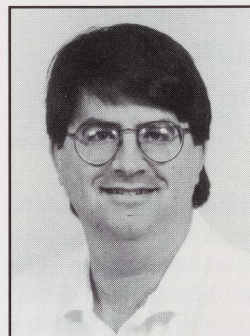

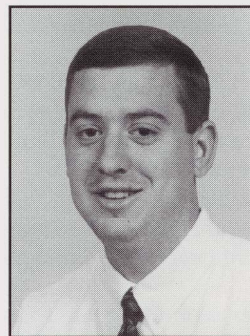
Doyle produced the highlight video of the 1991 East Carolina football season

James Frazier, 26, begins his second year as Director of Athletic Equipment at East Carolina University.

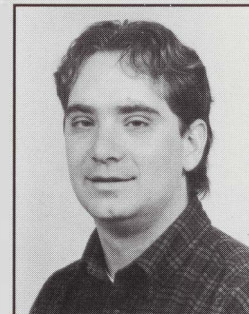
Frazier, a native of Baton Rouge, La., worked as a member of the football equipment staff at his alma mater, Louisiana State University for three years before joining the Pirates' program.

Frazier, a certified member of the Athletic Equipment Managers Association, is single.

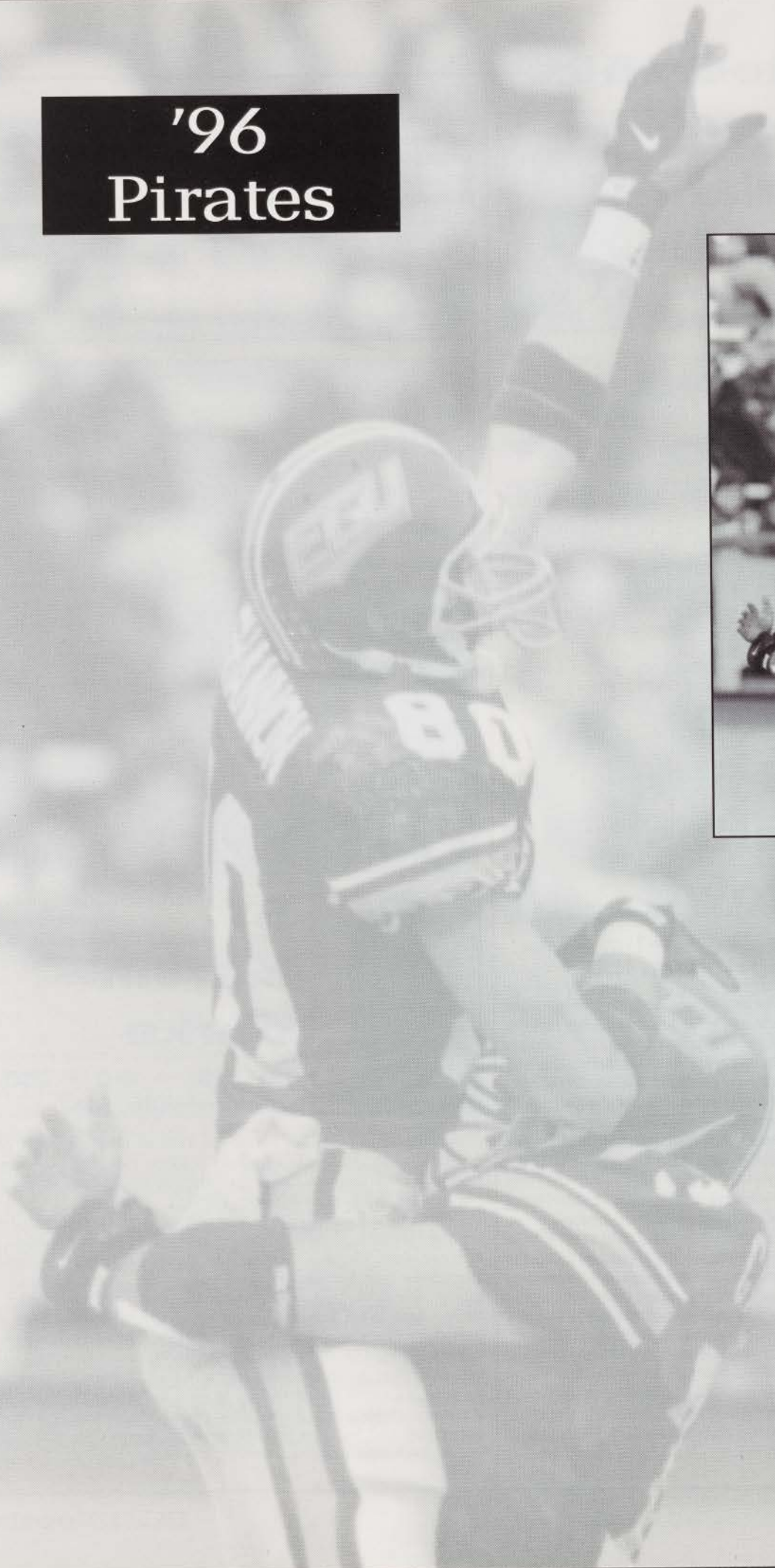
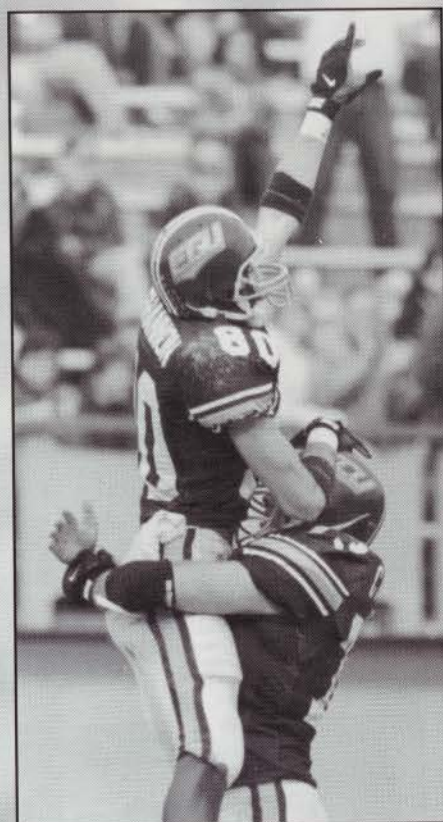

# Back-to-Back

*Pirates earn second straight Liberty Bowl invitation and cap nine-win season with victory over Stanford*

The mission of "Unfinished Business" for the 1995 East Carolina football team has been well-documented. The issue proved to be a successful rallying point for coach Steve Logan and the Pirates during the season.

Determined to make amends after its showing in the 1994 Liberty Bowl (30-0 loss to Illinois), ECU approached the '95 season with anxious optimism. The Pirates felt they had the weapons and experience to turn their trip to Memphis in 1994 into a distant memory.

Unfortunately for Logan and East Carolina, the Pirates also faced a formidable obstacle — their schedule. Included on the slate for the first month were games against four bowl teams from the previous year. In fact, the only team ECU played in September which had not participated in a 1994 bowl was Syracuse which stayed home despite finishing 7-4.

## SEPTEMBER SUCCESS

Facing four bowl teams in the opening month was no enviable task for East Carolina. But the Pirates did more than survive as they entered October with a 3-2 record after games against Tennessee, Syracuse, Central Michigan, Illinois and West Virginia. The difficult early schedule would go a long way to preparing ECU for the remainder of the season.

## A Season To Remember

- ✓ Earned second consecutive bowl bid with a berth in St. Jude Liberty Bowl.
- ✓ Posted nine victories for only second time since 1978.
- ✓ Concluded season with six straight wins, the program's longest such streak since the 1991 campaign when the Pirates won their final 11 after a season-opening defeat.
- ✓ East Carolina was perfect at home, winning all five of its games in Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium. The Pirates have won seven straight home games overall.
- ✓ Finished the season ranked in virtually every final top 25 poll, including No. 23 in *USA Today/CNN*.

## CRANDELL REWRITES THE RECORD BOOK

The 1995 season was a record-breaking one for East Carolina quarterback Marcus Crandell. Crandell, who still has a year of eligibility remaining this fall, became the school's all-time leading passer in both total offense and passing yardage. That he surpassed current NFL standout Jeff Blake only adds an exclamation point to the accomplishments. Among the other marks Crandell established in 1995 was for total offense in a single game when he amassed 453 in the comeback win at Syracuse.

## SIX IN A ROW

The Pirates will take a six-game win streak into the 1996 season. After an Oct. 10 loss at Cincinnati last fall, ECU won its last six contests, including a 19-13 victory over Stanford in the St. Jude Liberty Bowl.

## GOING BOWLING

Not only did last December's appearance by the Pirates in Memphis mean back-to-back bowl berths for ECU, but it also gave the Pirates

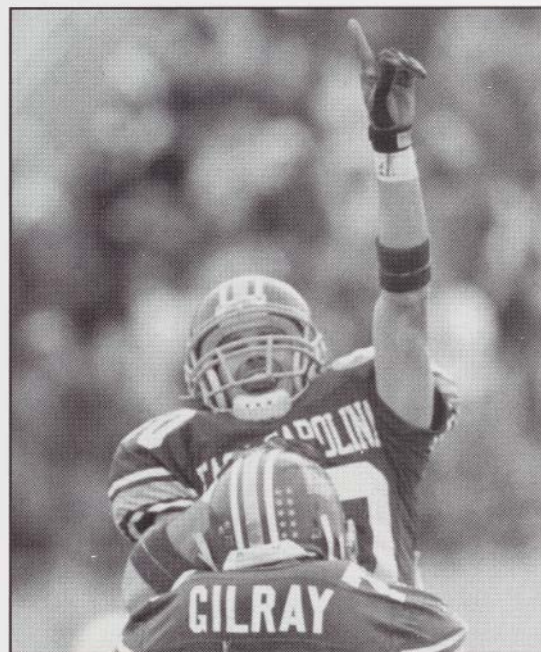
three bowl invitations in the past five years. In addition to the 1994 and '95 Liberty Bowl bids, East Carolina also played in the 1992 Peach Bowl in Atlanta as the Pirates defeated N.C. State 37-34.

## 16 WINS

East Carolina has posted 16 victories over the past two seasons and is the winningest program among all NCAA Division I schools in the Carolinas during that period.

## PIRATES DEFENSIVE

East Carolina has made great strides on the defensive side of the ball in recent seasons. Last fall, the Pirates ranked No. 38 in total defense, No. 30 in scoring defense, No. 7 in pass efficiency defense and No. 51 in rushing defense.



Six wins and a Liberty Bowl victory to conclude the 1995 season landed ECU in most of the final top 25 rankings.

## TURNOVER TURNAROUND

Certainly one of the reasons East Carolina was able to gain such late season momentum and earn a second straight trip to Memphis was the sudden turnaround of the Pirates' turnover/takeaway ratio. In the final five games of the regular season, ECU had a +9 turnover ratio with 15 turnovers caused and only six committed. The Pirates finished the season ranked 28th nationally in turnover margin.

## LIBIANO LEADS

For the third consecutive season, the leading tackler for East Carolina was linebacker Mark Libiano. Libiano was in on 122 stops in 1995 to give him 398 for his career — No. 2 all-time for the Pirates.

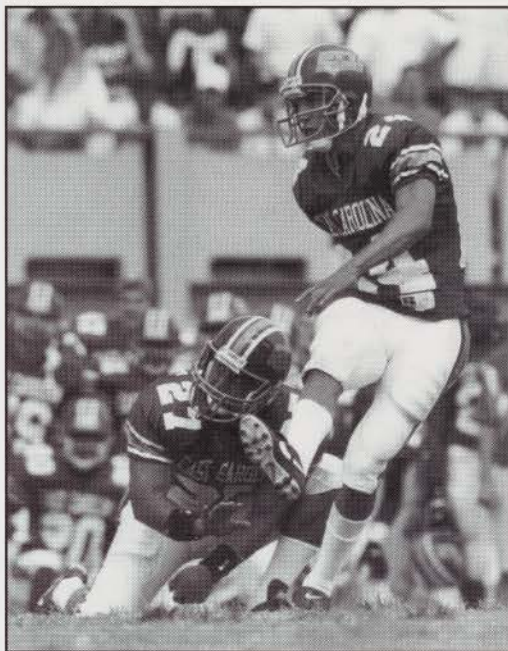

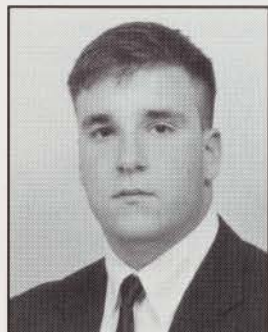

Playing before the largest crowd ever to see an East Carolina game, the Pirates fell to No. 8-ranked Tennessee 27-7 in their 1995 season opener.

After ECU's opening drive stalled, Tennessee started up their offense, driving 87 yards in 17 plays to take an early 7-0 advantage.

With Tennessee on the five-yard-line, QB Peyton Manning hit Joey Kent who was stopped one yard shy of the first down. Tennessee head coach Phil Fulmer called timeout to discuss his options. Fulmer had faith in his offense and watched Manning hand off to Jay Graham who drove up the middle for the first down. On the next play, Manning tucked the ball and dove into the endzone.

Trailing 7-0, ECU QB Marcus Crandell marched the team down the field 52 yards and into field goal range. However on fourth and 10, placekicker Chad Holcomb's 45-yard attempt sailed wide left.

The Vols took over and drove the ball to the ECU 23 before the Pirate defense stymied the drive and forced a Jeff Hall 36-yard field goal. On the next series, the game, which had been played dead-even, would take a dramatic change in direction. The Pirates, trying to catch Tennessee off-guard, attempted a halfback pass that was overthrown by FB Daryl Jones and intercepted by UT's DeRon Jenkins.

The Vols wasted no time in capitalizing on the turnover, scoring two plays later on a 31-yard strike from Manning to Nilo Silvan.

With eight minutes left in half and ECU down 17-0, Crandell regrouped his squad and led the Pirates on an 11-play, 66-yard drive to bring the deficit down to 10. The drive, which was aided by a 15-yard penalty on Tennessee, was capped off by a seven-yard touchdown pass to redshirt-freshman Mike Sellers.

Tennessee closed out the scoring with a second half FG while the Volunteer defense held the Pirates scoreless.

The Pirates finished the game with 311 yards of offense as senior FB Jerris McPhail rushed for 108 yards on 23 carries.

Riding the abilities of quarterback Marcus Crandell, East Carolina overcame a 21-point deficit to upset the 22nd-ranked Orangemen of Syracuse 27-24 in front of 39,000 fans in the Carrier Dome.

The Pirate offense racked up 360 second-half yards, outscoring the Orangemen 20-3 to take the victory. Crandell set ECU single-game records for passing yards (392) and total offense (453).

Syracuse scored the game's first 21 points, its initial TD coming after a 10-play, 86-yard drive in the opening quarter.

The Orangemen added a pair of TDs in the second period as Tebucky Jones ran in from 11 yards out and QB Donovan McNabb hit Deon Maddux for an eight-yard TD pass.

With less than 10 minutes remaining in the half, the Pirates went three-and-out and gave the ball back to the Orangemen on the SU 40 yard-line. A 49-yard McNabb-to-Marvin Harrison pass play set up McNabb's eight-yard strike to Maddox in the back of the endzone.

East Carolina would steal the momentum before the half, however, as Emmanuel McDaniel intercepted an ill-fated McNabb pass and returned it to the ECU 35-yard-line with 2:55 left in the half. Crandell rallied his troops 13 plays in two and a half minutes, finding Larry Shannon in the endzone for the Pirates' first points.

ECU took the second half kickoff and methodically marched 79 yards in just under two minutes to make the score 21-14. The Pirate defense held the Syracuse attack and Crandell, dumping off passes beneath the secondary and scrambling for first downs, led the offense back down the field to score on a 20-yard touchdown to Scott Richards with 2:43 to go in the third.

On ECU's first possession of the fourth quarter, the ECU offense drove 80 yards in 7 plays. Crandell hit Jerris McPhail near the eight-yard-line and McPhail danced in for the winning score.

In front of over 33,000 Pirate faithful who braved the wind and rain at Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium, East Carolina used a third quarter offensive explosion to down Central Michigan 30-17 in its home opener.

After missing on several first half scoring opportunities, ECU struck quickly after intermission. On the first play from scrimmage in the third quarter, senior fullback Jerris McPhail fired through a seam up the middle, broke past the Chippewa secondary and sprinted 70 yards for the score. McPhail finished the game with 178 yards on only 20 carries.

Just over three minutes later, freshman Travis Darden scooped up his second fumble of the afternoon near midfield. The Pirates looked to McPhail once again to take advantage of the Chippewa miscue. QB Marcus Crandell handed the ball off to McPhail who hit the hole on the left side and tore off another 35-yard dash before being dragged down at the six-yard-line. Two plays later, junior Mitch Galloway swept to the left side and strolled in for the score.

Galloway was the only bright spot for ECU's offense in the first half, scoring on an 81-yard bomb from Crandell. The play highlighted the first half which saw the Pirates fail to score touchdowns during five trips to the "red zone."

Central Michigan's scoring mostly came late in the game against the Pirate reserves. With five minutes left in the contest, CMU put together an 83-yard drive which trimmed the ECU lead to 30-10. Just over a minute later, third string QB Ernest Tinnen had his first collegiate passing attempt picked off by CMU's Jamell Jefferson who rumbled 30 yards for a TD.

However, any thoughts of a Chippewa comeback were quickly extinguished when Morris Foreman recovered the CMU onside kick attempt.

In a game dominated by defense, Illinois shut out East Carolina for the second time in 10 months in front of 60,545 at Champaign.

The tone for the game was set in the first quarter as the defenses forced three turnovers and five punts. After receiving the opening kickoff, Illinois opened with its ground game and immediately turned the ball over to the Pirates as David Hart stripped Robert Holcombe for a fumble which was recovered by Marvin Burke at the ECU 48-yard-line. However, a holding penalty would stall the Pirate drive and force the first of 11 Matt Levine punts on the day.

The punt-fest continued late into the first quarter until ECU senior free safety Hank Cooper picked off a Johnny Johnson pass and returned it to the Pirates' 38. The Illini took the ball right back from East Carolina however, as linebacker Kevin Hardy hit QB Marcus Crandell on a blind-side blitz, forcing Crandell to fumble. The turnover set up the lone score of the day, as UI drove to the one-yard-line before Holcombe walked into the endzone off left tackle.

On ECU's opening drive of the second half, Crandell was intercepted for the second time on the day by Duane Lyle who returned the ball to the ECU 41-yard-line.

The Pirate defense, with its back to the wall, would stand tall. After driving to the ECU 7-yard-line, Illinois was faced with a 3rd and 4 and looked to at least come away with a field goal. On the snap, Burke pressured Johnson, chasing him to the 19-yard-line before pulling him down for the sack. The play forced a failed 37-yard field goal attempt.

The see-saw battle continued until ECU attempted a miracle finish late in the game. With just 2:19 left, and the Pirates on their own 27, Crandell passed to Jason Nichols for four yards. After an incomplete pass and three consecutive "false start" penalties, ECU faced a 3rd and 21. Crandell then hit Larry Shannon for a 51-yard pass play. The Pirates continued to move the ball, driving to the Illini seven-yard-line. On first down, Crandell fired a pass to the endzone which bounced off Shannon's shoulder pad. On the next play, Lyle stepped in front of Crandell's pass intended for Troy Smith for his third interception of the day to preserve the Illini win.

Chad Holcomb's 27-yard field goal with 2:12 left in the game lifted East Carolina to a 23-20 victory over West Virginia in front of a near-capacity crowd at Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium. The Pirates had never beaten the Mountaineers in eight previous meetings.

The Pirates jumped on West Virginia early, building a 20-3 lead. After the Mountaineers settled for a Bryan Baumann 33-yard field goal on the game's opening drive, ECU quickly answered with a 67-yard touchdown pass from QB Marcus Crandell to Larry Shannon, who beat the man-on-man coverage for the score.

On its next possession after the West Virginia drive stalled, ECU looked to increase its lead and did so when Crandell scored on a 10-yard keeper to cap off a six-play, 35-yard drive. Early in the second quarter, Crandell found Shannon again for a nine-yard touchdown pass to make the score 20-3. However, West Virginia took the momentum into the lockerroom after turning a Jerris McPhail fumble on the ECU 11-yard-line into six points just before the half.

In the second half, the Mountaineers all but shut down the ECU offensive attack, forcing four Matt Levine punts, two interceptions, and a safety. Before the Pirates knew it, West Virginia had tied the ball game at 20-20 with 11:38 to play.

The Pirate defense would come through late in the game when line-backer Marvin Burke forced Kantroy Barber to fumble the ball as West Virginia was driving for the winning score.

Crandell led the hurry-up-offense down the field and helped put the Pirates in field goal position. On fourth and goal from the West Virginia 10-yard-line, Holcomb knocked in his game-winning 27-yarder.

Cincinnati scored 10 unanswered second-half points to claim a 13-10 come-from-behind victory over East Carolina at Nippert Stadium.

In a contest which featured great defense from both squads, Cincinnati was able to shut down the Pirate rushing game as the Bearcats held ECU to just 93 total yards in the second half.

After a scoreless first quarter, Cincinnati drew first blood on a 27-yard Eric Richards field goal just over a minute into the second period.

Moments later after QB Marcus Crandell's pass was intercepted by cornerback Chris Hewitt, redshirt freshman Tabari Wallace returned the favor and picked off QB Eric Vibberts' pass and returned it to the UC 47.

The Pirates took advantage of the Cincinnati miscue and captured the lead when Crandell found freshman Troy Smith behind the secondary for a 26-yard touchdown pass. However, the scoring drive would prove costly for ECU as fullback Jerris McPhail was knocked out of the game with an arm injury and did not return.

Cincinnati looked to tie as it moved the ball to the ECU 25-yard line. On 3rd and 3, Vibberts lofted the ball into the right corner of the endzone but was intercepted by Emmanuel McDaniel. The Pirates converted the turnover into three points when Chad Holcomb booted a 42-yard field goal with 27 seconds left in the half.

On their first possession of the third quarter, the Pirates drove all the way to the Bearcat 26 yard-line where they had a first and 10, but a 19-yard holding penalty killed the drive.

The teams battled for field position and UC pinned the Pirates at the ECU four-yard-line. The Bearcats forced a Matt Levine punt from his own endzone and Cincinnati's Robert Tate returned the ball to the ECU 25 yard-line. The Bearcats scored six plays later when Eric Patterson barreled into the endzone to tie the game at 10-10.

Cincinnati kept the Pirates out of its territory for the remainder of the game and with 2:07 left in the contest, Richards hit his second 27-yard field goal of the night for the victory.

East Carolina put the finishing touches on Homecoming weekend activities as it used a 19-point third quarter to pull away from the visiting Temple Owls, and win its fifth straight home game 32-22.

Redshirt freshman Scott Harley got the start in place of senior Jerris McPhail, who sat out with an arm injury. Harley more than filled McPhail's shoes, as he rushed for a freshman-record 175 yards, breaking the mark of Tony Baker, who rushed for 165 yards in 1982 against Temple.

The Pirates held the Owls to just six first downs in the first half and limited them to just 72 yards of total offense. ECU took a 13-0 lead into the lockerroom at halftime behind Crandell's 202 yards passing and 74 yards of rushing by Harley.

ECU continued putting points on the scoreboard in the third quarter, and after a five-yard Crandell pass to Jason Nichols, the Pirates found themselves ahead by a 19-0 score. However, Temple marched 74 yards in just five plays on the ensuing drive to pull within two touchdowns.

The Pirates then drove 63 yards in 1:50 to increase their lead to 25-7. Harley provided the points with a seven-yard run. Just seconds later, ECU senior Morris Foreman scooped up a fumble 21 seconds later to give the Pirates a 32-7 lead.

Temple would make things interesting though, as a fourth quarter comeback attempt was made. The Owls scored a touchdown early in the quarter, as Henry Burris rumbled in from nine yards out. After Daren Hart intercepted a Burris pass, the Pirates could not run out the clock and turned the ball over on downs. The Owls responded with a quick, two-play, 18-second drive which trimmed the score 32-22.

After stopping the Pirates again, Burris was again intercepted, this time by Emmanuel McDaniel, and the victory was sealed.

Chad Holcomb kicked a 29-yard field goal with time expiring to lift East Carolina to a critical 36-34 victory over Southern Mississippi at M.M. Roberts Stadium in Hattiesburg.

The victory gave the Pirates sole possession of first place in the Liberty Bowl Alliance standings and put them in the driver's seat for their second straight trip to the Memphis bowl.

The Golden Eagles had taken a 34-33 lead with just :51 remaining before the Pirates marched 67 yards in eight plays for their game-winning drive. On the play before Holcomb's game-winner, ECU had lined up for what looked to be a 44-yard FG attempt and only :07 on the clock. But the snap went to Holcomb instead and he lofted a long pass into the endzone toward TE Scott Richards. USM was called for interference and the ball was moved to the Golden Eagle 12. From there, the Pirates converted the winning kick.

The two teams scored a combined 53 points in the second half, and featured 841 yards of total offense. ECU's Marcus Crandell threw for 312 yards, his second game of the season with 300 yards. Crandell also tossed three touchdown passes, two of which were caught by tight end Scott Richards.

The Pirates got on the board first when Crandell connected with Richards on a 23-yard TD pass at the 2:06 mark of the first period. After Southern Miss trimmed the margin to 7-3 with a field goal, Crandell ran in from two yards out to close out the first half scoring.

Pirate senior Jerris McPhail led all rushers with 88 yards, and Mitchell Galloway was the top ECU receiver, collecting 106 yards on nine catches.

A pair of homegrown Pirate standouts — Marcus Crandell and Morris Foreman — teamed up to lead East Carolina to a come-from-behind 31-25 victory over Army in ECU's first-ever trip to West Point.

Crandell finished the game with 283 yards passing and three touchdowns as he moved ahead of former Pirate Jeff Blake on the school's all-time passing yardage list. Foreman was all over the field as he had two interceptions, a pair of fumble recoveries and was in on nine tackles on the day.

The Cadets, who had entered the game with the country's No. 2-ranked rushing offense, lived up their billing early as they rushed for 191 yards in the first half. Still, Army was able to convert their potent ground game into only 10 first half points leading ECU 10-7 at intermission. The Pirates' first half points came on a nine-yard pass from Crandell to Jason Nichols.

ECU took a lead it would not relinquish early in the third quarter when the Pirates drove 62 yards on nine plays, culminated by a three-yard run by Jerris McPhail. The Pirates added another third quarter touchdown when Crandell found SE Larry Shannon on a 11-yard slant pattern to give ECU a 21-10 lead.

With the offense in high gear and the defense finding some solutions at halftime to slow down the Army ground attack, ECU added to its cushion early in the fourth quarter on a McPhail pass reception and a Chad Holcomb field goal.

The Black Knights narrowed the gap with a pair of fourth quarter TD runs by QB Ronnie McAda. Army, trailing East Carolina by a 31-25 score with :47 remaining, had one last opportunity but had to start its drive from its own 10-yard line. The Cadets advanced the ball 21 yards to the A31 before the clock ran out.

East Carolina wrapped up a second consecutive berth in the St. Jude Liberty Bowl with a 28-7 victory over Tulsa at Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium. The victory was the fourth in a row for the Pirates who scored a single touchdown in each quarter of the game.

The ECU victory, combined with Cincinnati's loss to Kentucky, gave the Pirates the Liberty Bowl Alliance title for the second straight season and the trip to Memphis.

The Pirates scored on their first possession, driving 60 yards in nine plays. The drive was capped off by a three-yard touchdown run by senior FB Jerris McPhail. The Golden Hurricane evened the score midway through the second quarter with an 18-play drive of their own. Troy DeGar scored on a QB keeper from four yards out. That score would be Tulsa's last of the game.

ECU struck again before halftime. After taking over at their own 20, the Pirates moved to the 47 before QB Marcus Crandell found freshman SE Troy Smith on a 48-yard pass play. The play preceded a five-yard run by Crandell as the Pirates went into the lockerroom at intermission with a 14-7 lead.

It didn't take East Carolina long in the second half to add to its advantage. After receiving the second half kickoff, the Pirates took over at their 20-yard line. A motion penalty moved ECU back to the 15. On the next play, Crandell found Mitchell Galloway for an 85-yard TD pass play. The score was East Carolina's longest play of the season and third-longest pass play in school history.

The Pirates' final score of the afternoon was set up by a Tulsa turnover as ECU's Lorenzo West recovered a DeGar fumble at the Hurricane 36. Five plays later, East Carolina had its fourth touchdown of the game as Crandell kept for a nine-yard run.

Crandell finished the game with 290 yards passing and moved ahead of Jeff Blake as ECU's career leader in total offense. The Pirate defense limited DeGar to just nine of 26 passing for 105 yards.

East Carolina won its fifth consecutive game and put the finishing touches on a perfect 1995 home record as the Pirates closed their regular season with a 31-17 victory over Memphis in Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium. Senior fullback Jerris McPhail enjoyed his finest game at ECU as he rushed for a career-best 209 yards and a pair of touchdowns in the win. McPhail and the Pirate offense rolled up 512 yards, their second-highest output of the season.

The Pirate offense accounted for a single touchdown and field goal in the first 30 minutes as the ECU passing game was limited to just 65 yards as QB Marcus Crandell was limited to eight completions in 17 attempts. Chad Holcomb's 37-yard field goal and a six-yard run by McPhail were the only scores for the Pirates in the opening half.

Memphis trailed only 10-7 at halftime as Tiger QB Qadry Anderson led Memphis on a 39-yard drive after a Crandell interception. Anderson finished the drive with a one-yard plunge with 4:09 left in the first quarter.

While the Tigers held Crandell down in the first half, the record-setting East Carolina quarterback had a sensational third quarter as he threw for 159 yards, including an 18-yard TD pass to SE Larry Shannon. Crandell also ran for a touchdown — his sixth rushing score of the season — in the third period, an eight-yarder.

Still, the story for much of the game was ECU's McPhail who ran through the Tiger defense with abandon all afternoon. He scored his TD of the game in the final period when he darted 46 yards to paydirt. McPhail's 209-yards rushing total represented the fifth-best single-game effort in ECU history and the most yards in a game by a Pirate runner since 1992.

Memphis closed the scoring with a one-yard run by Joe Borich with 7:29 remaining in the game.

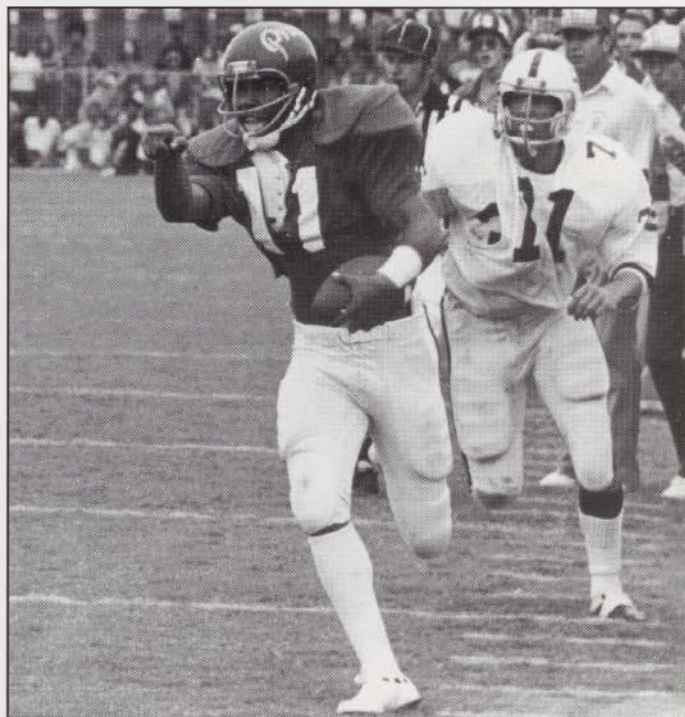

## Retired Numbers

Four numbers have been retired in the history of East Carolina University's Football Program. Those are the numbers 16, 18, 29 and 36.

The jersey number 16 was last worn by Robert Farris, a kicker from Falls Church, Va. Farris was killed in an automobile accident while returning to campus for fall practice prior to his senior season in 1967.

The jersey number 18 was last worn by Norman Swindell, a blocking back from New Bern. The most valuable player on the 1965 team, Swindell drowned near his home during the Christmas holidays following the 1965 season.

The jersey number 29 was worn by James Speight, a running back from Greenville, N.C. The MVP of the 1957 and 1959 squads, Speight still holds the school record for most points in a single game with 26, while third on the all-time rushing list with 2,700 career yards.

The jersey number 36 was worn by Roger Thrift, a quarterback from New Bern, N.C. He earned letters during the 1949 and 1950 seasons. His jersey was retired by the Student Government Association.

East Carolina began competing in football on an intercollegiate basis in 1932, with Kenneth Beatty serving as head coach. Since that time, Pirate football squads have been fielded 60 times. The overall record for ECU football is 294-273-11, a 51.8 winning percentage.

The Pirates joined the Southern Conference in 1964 and left the league in June of 1977. During that time, ECU enjoyed much success. The school record against conference foes during that time was 43-18-1, a 70.2 winning percentage.

# ECU Hall of Fame

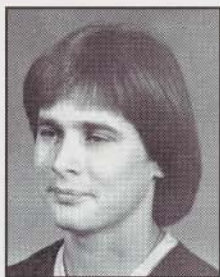
The East Carolina Athletics Hall of Fame was initiated in 1974 as an organization to honor those individuals who have, by direct participation in East Carolina University intercollegiate athletics, brought outstanding recognition to themselves and to the University.

The first honorees were inducted during Homecoming festivities at halftime of the East Carolina-The Citadel football game in 1974. Ten members were selected for the first year. Five years passed between Lawrence "Cotton" Clayton and the induction of the 1989 class—Willard "Butch" Colson, Dr. Leo Jenkins and Kathy Postlewait. Last year, Jim Bolding, Otis Melvin, Kathy Riley and Mike Tomberlin were inducted into the Hall of Fame.

To be selected, a committee of nine persons must vote with two-thirds of those giving their approval. Those five shall be the official selection committee. To be eligible for selection, a person must not have been connected with the University in the capacity to which the nominee is being elected for a minimum of 10 academic years.

## 1995

### Jim Bolding

*Football (1973-76)*

Bolding was a 1975 All-America selection as a defensive back and still holds the ECU record for most interceptions in a game (3 vs. Western Carolina, 1975), season (10 in 1975) and career (22). His 10 interceptions in 1975 ranked first nationally. Bolding, who played under head coaches Sonny Randall and Pat Dye, was a three-time All-Southern Conference selection and all-state pick.

### Otis Melvin

*Track and Field (1977-80)*

Melvin earned All-America honors as a standout sprinter for the Pirates. In 1979, Melvin gained All-America recognition in the 200-meter dash at the NCAA outdoor championships and then in 1980, added indoor All-America credits to his resume as a member of the ECU 4x400 meter relay team. Melvin was a member of the 1979 U.S. national team at the World University Games and also was a finalist at the 1980 U.S. Olympic Trials.

### Kathy Riley

*Women's Basketball, Softball (1979-81)*

Riley, a standout in two sports, left her mark on ECU women's athletics in two years of competition. In basketball, she was an honorable mention All-American for the 1980-81 season. In just two seasons, she scored 1,150 points. Riley was a member of the 1981 Lady Pirate which

ranked as high as 17th in the nation. In softball, Riley gained notoriety as the Broderick Award winner in 1981. A first-team softball All-American, Riley's success has continued since her ECU career as she was a gold medalist at the 1990 Olympic Festival.

### Mike Tomberlin

*Swimming (1966-69)*

Tomberlin is one of the most decorated swimmers in ECU history. The 1967 national 200-yard backstroke champion, Tomberlin earned seven All-America awards during his career from 1966-69. For three straight years, he was an All-American in both the 100 and 200 backstrokes. Tomberlin was a nine-time Southern Conference champion and was the league's record holder in the 100 and 200 backstrokes, as well as the 400 medley relay. Tomberlin was an assistant coach at ECU from 1969-70.

## 1994

### Hal Baird

*Baseball (1970-71)*

*Assistant Baseball Coach (1977-79)*

*Baseball Coach (1980-84)*

Hal Baird was a standout in baseball for 15 years as a player, assistant coach and head coach. As a player, he was a superb pitcher, once striking out a school record 20 batters in a single game. As a coach, he directed ECU to three NCAA Tournaments. In 1982 and 1984, ECU won the ECAC-South Championship. Currently, Baird is the head coach at Auburn University, where he led the Tigers to a College World Series berth in 1993.

### Mary Denkler

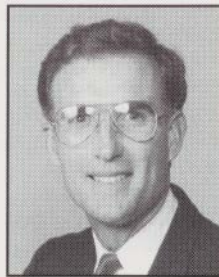
*Women's Basketball (1980-83)*

Mary Denkler was ECU's first women's basketball All America, named in 1983. She was also the recipient of the NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship. Denkler is second in the school history books in scoring with 1,789 points and fifth in rebounding with 801 boards.

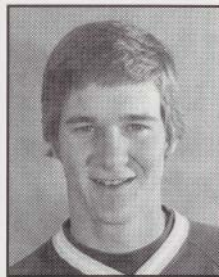
### Bob Patterson

*Baseball (1978-82)*

In 1981, Bob Patterson helped ECU record the lowest ERA in the NCAA, 1.94. Since then, Patterson has enjoyed a fine career in the major leagues. He has played with the Pittsburgh Pirates, Texas Rangers and California Angels.

### Joe Shanabrough

*Swimming (1962-66)*

Joe Shanabrough earned four All-America honors in the 400 individual medley, 200 butter-

fly, 100 butterfly and the 400 meter relay in the 1963-64 season. At the 1964 NCAA College Championships, Shanabrough won the 400 Individual Medley, breaking the NCAA record and becoming ECU's first NCAA Champion.

## 1993

### John Christenbury

*Football, Basketball, Baseball Head Coach (1940-41)*

Christenbury coached the East Carolina Teachers College football team to a 7-0 record in 1941, the only unbeaten season in school history. The year before, he coached the football squad to its first-ever winning season, a 5-3 record. Following his death, Christenbury was honored with the naming of ECU's gymnasium on 10th Street as the John B. Christenbury Memorial Gym.

### Charles Futrell

*Football, Baseball (1938-41)*

Futrell, a 1942 ECTC alumnus, played football and baseball at ECTC from 1938-41. As a senior on the baseball team, Futrell served as team captain and batted .404. Following college, Futrell served as a U.S. Air Force physical training instructor during World War II and was a successful high school coach in Maryland. A world-class triathlete, he was the U.S. male champion in the 70-and-over category in the Gatorade Ironman World Championship Triathlon in Kona, Hawaii.

### Leora "Sam" Jones

*Women's Basketball (1981-82)*

Jones helped East Carolina's women's basketball team to back-to-back AIAW and NCAA tournament berths. She currently ranks sixth in career scoring average (16.0), fifth in season steals (75), and sixth in career assists (252) in the ECU record book. In 1982, Jones was introduced to the sport of team handball, and, since then, she has competed in three Olympic Games and has been named as the U.S. Team Handball Federation Athlete of the Year three times.

### Jim Raynor

*Baseball (1963-64, 1966)*

In three seasons as a pitcher for East Carolina's baseball team, Raynor had a record of 17-2. Following his freshman season where he had a 3-0 record, Raynor was named most outstanding pitcher in 1964 with a 6-0 mark, 2.27 ERA and 65 strikeouts. That same year, he was named all-state. After missing the 1965 season with an injury, Raynor had an 8-2 record with a 1.50 ERA and 92 strikeouts. He was drafted in 1966 by the Los Angeles Dodgers and played with the organization through 1971. In 1972, he played for the New York Yankees and is now a coach and a teacher at Clinton (N.C.) High School.

## 1992

### Catherine Bolton

*Field Hockey, Gymnastics, Tennis Coach (1969-75)*

*Volleyball Head Coach (1975-76)*

*Women's Basketball Head Coach (1969-78)*

Bolton was the foundation of women's athletics at East Carolina University in 1969, when

she served as head coach of practically every women's sport. She began as head coach of the field hockey, gymnastics, tennis and basketball teams and also took on the duties of volleyball coach in 1975. During her 12 seasons as basketball coach, her teams were 103-51 with eight winning seasons. Bolton currently works in ECU's School of Health and Human Performances.

## **Willard "Willie" Bryant, Jr.** *Football (1973-75), Wrestling (1974-75)*

Bryant was an all-star performer in football and wrestling for two seasons at East Carolina University. As a heavyweight wrestler, Bryant won two Southern Conference titles in 1974-75. In 1973, Bryant won the North Carolina Collegiate Championship. In football, Bryant was named All-Southern Conference as a defensive tackle. Bryant has also been selected to the Gloucester Junior College and National Wrestling Hall of Fames.

## **Dick Corrada, Jr.** *Football (1967-70), Baseball (1968-71)*

Corrada was a two-sport star during his career at East Carolina University. He lettered in football and baseball three seasons at ECU, earning honors in each. In 1970, Corrada earned honorable mention All-America and All-Southern Conference honors as a wide receiver. After 22 years, Corrada still holds the single game reception mark at ECU with 14 catches for 169 yards against Southern Illinois in 1970. He is still ranked in career receptions and receiving yards at East Carolina. Corrada was also a starter at shortstop on the baseball team and signed a professional contract with the Kansas City Royals at the end of his senior season. He was also an All-Southern Conference pick in baseball. Corrada is now Director of Human Resources at King's Dominion in Doswell, Va.

## **William M.A. "Bill" Greene** *Football, Basketball (1940-41)*

Greene was a member of East Carolina's 7-0 football team in 1941, the Pirates' only unbeaten, untied football team. After graduating from East Carolina in 1943, Greene served for 30 years in the U.S. Navy. After retiring from the Navy, from which he received the Bronze Star for service in the Vietnam Conflict, Greene served as Executive Director of the North Carolina State Ports Authority from 1977-85. Greene continues to be active in ECU Athletics, helping to organize the annual reunion of the 1941 football team.

## **1991**

## **Charles "Charlie" Adams** *Basketball (1956-59)*

Adams played three years at East Carolina, helping lead the Pirates to a 41-29 cumulative record during that span. He earned his bachelor's degree in 1959 and his master's in 1962 from East Carolina. Adams went on to coach at Cary High School from 1962-66 and was athletics director, dean of men and assistant principal at Garner High from 1966-67. He then began working for the North Carolina High School Athletic Association and has served as its executive director since 1984.

## **Debbie Freeman** *Volleyball, Basketball, Track and Field (1976-78)*

Freeman earned letters in volleyball, basketball and track and field and still holds many ECU records. She was the Lady Pirates' Most Valuable Player in basketball in 1976 and 1977 and in volleyball in 1977. She was a three-time NCAIAW Division I All-State choice (basketball), one year in volleyball and was the association's Field Events MVP in track in 1978. She still holds Lady Pirate records for single-game rebounds and field goals made, and is third all-time in scoring and rebounding (basketball). After leaving ECU, Freeman coached for seven years at Jacksonville High School and has been coaching since at Broughton High School.

## **Jerry Tolley** *Football (1963-65)*

Tolley earned three letters in football under coach Clarence Stasavich, including two seasons that ECU had back-to-back bowl victories (1964-65). He won the E.E. Rawl Memorial Award for Academic Excellence in 1965. He returned a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown against Western Carolina in 1963. After graduating from ECU, he coached at Elon College and was named headcoach in 1977. During his head coaching stint, his teams won two national championships (1980-81) and were the national runners-up in 1978. He was the National Coach of the Year in 1980. Tolley is now Assistant Vice President at Roche Biomedical Laboratories.

## **Jerry Woodside** *Basketball (1964-66)*

Woodside still holds ECU records for most free throws made in a career, is second in career field goal percentage, seventh in career scoring and field goals made and ninth in career rebounding. A three-year letterwinner in basketball at ECU, he led the Pirates in scoring during the 1964-65 and 1965-66 seasons. Since leaving East Carolina, he has taught and coached in high schools throughout North Carolina. After serving as basketball, cross country and golf coach at Burlington Cummings High School since 1976, Woodside returned to Greenville and became head coach at J.H. Rose High School before the 1991 season. His teams have won 11 conference championships, five district championships and were the state runners-up in 1978.

## **1990**

## **Ronnie Barnes** *Sports Medicine (1971-76)*

Barnes went through East Carolina's Sports Medicine program, becoming an assistant trainer and instructor after graduation in 1975. He moved on to Michigan State University, where he earned his master's degree and became head trainer and an assistant professor. In 1980, he was named head trainer of the New York Giants of the NFL. He was named the National Professional Trainer of the Year by the National Athletic Trainer's Association of America in 1983. He has also been selected to Michigan State's Athletic Hall of Fame.

## **Dr. Ray Minges** *Pirate Club*

Minges served as president of the Century Club, now the Pirate Club, from 1964-70 and was

a charter lifetime member within the organization. He later served a second term on the Pirate Club's Executive Committee from 1982-84 and remained active in the Pirate Club until his death in 1987. Also a surgeon, he traveled with the Pirate football team as doctor during the 1960s.

## **Rosie Thompson** *Basketball (1976-80), Assistant Basketball Coach (1987-92), Head Basketball Coach (1992-95)*

During her playing career at East Carolina, Thompson became the school's all-time leading scorer (2,352 points) and rebounder (1,183 rebounds). She also holds school records for scoring in a season (723) and rebounds in a season (358). She is the only Lady Pirate ever to have her jersey (10) retired. She also has the school's high marks for free throwing and was named as the NCAIAW Player of the Year in 1978.

## **1989**

## **Willard "Butch" Colson** *Football (1967-69)*

Colson was named Southern Conference Player of the Year in 1967, rushing for 1,135 yards and scoring 15 touchdowns. He holds the school record for most carries in one game (41) and is fourth in career rushing yardage (2,512) and sixth in total yardage (3,025). His 92 points scored in 1967 is the fourth-most in school history.

## **Dr. Leo Jenkins** *Chancellor (1960-78), Chancellor Emeritus*

It was under Jenkins' leadership and largely at his personal direction that the former small, regional, liberal arts college developed into a large, multi-faceted comprehensive university with the third largest student enrollment in North Carolina. Jenkins directed the building of Ficklen Stadium, Minges Coliseum, Scales Field House and Harrington Field along with other facilities in the athletic complex.

## **Kathy Postlewait** *Volleyball, Field Hockey*

Today, Postlewait is one of the top players on the Ladies Professional Golf Association tour, and has career earnings of more than one million dollars. She won the 1983 San Jose Classic, the 1987 Mazda Classic, the 1988 McDonald's Championship and the 1989 Sara Lee Classic.

## **1984**

## **Lawrence "Cotton" Clayton** *Basketball, Baseball (1959-61)*

During his two years of athletic participation, Clayton was named All-America in both baseball and basketball as well as All-North State Conference and all-district. Perhaps baseball was his top sport. He led the 1961 Pirate team to the NAIA national championship as the team's leading hitter playing outfield and third base. Following graduation, he played in the Baltimore Orioles organization for seven years.

## **1983**

## **Howard Porter** *Head Basketball Coach (1947-49)*

Coached in more games and had more wins

than any other ECU coach (183-101). His 1953-54 team was best in school history with 23-2 record and a trip to the national championships in NAIA. Never had a losing season.

## J.C. Thomas

*Basketball (1952-56)*

Played on three conference championships and two that made the national championship tournaments. During his four years, the Pirates were 75-18. He started each season at ECU. He was a team captain and an All-North State Conference selection.

## Bill Hill

*Wrestling (1971-74)*

Finished fifth in the NCAA Championships in 1974 and named All-America, the only one in ECU wrestling history. Finished his career with a 122-15-1 record and four Southern Conference titles. Also had four North Carolina Collegiate Championships.

## Dick Cherry

*Football (1952-56)*

One of the finest quarterbacks in ECU history. Three times made All-Conference, while also earning All-State and honorable mention All-America honors in 1953. Set school record with four TD passes in a single game and 16 TD passes during the 1953 season. Both of those records still stand.

## 1982

## Louis John Hallow

*Football (1953-55)*

First football All-America at ECU, gaining those honors in 1955. Played center and linebacker and made All-North State Conference three years. All-State for two seasons and won the Lanche Blocking Trophy twice, three times named outstanding defensive player and MVP as a senior. Drafted out of college by the Los Angeles Rams.

## James Martin Gregory

*Basketball (1969-71)*

Co-Player of the Year in the Southern Conference as a senior, the first Pirate ever to get player of the year honors. Named first-team All-Southern Conference and team MVP in 1971. Currently ranks fifth on the ECU all-time scoring list with 1,193 points and is tied for the highest career rebounding average with 11.1 per game.

## Carl Leigh Summerell

*Football (1971-73)*

Twice named honorable mention All-America while quarterbacking the Pirates. Named Southern Conference Athlete of the Year in 1973-74. Was Southern Conference player of the year in 1973 and tabbed as starting quarterback in Blue-Gray All-Star Classic. Team MVP in 1970, 1972 and 1973 and all-State the latter two years. Still holds three school records.

## John Walter Welborn

*Assistant Athletic Director (1976- ), Head Cross Country Coach (1986- ), Head Wrestling Coach (1966-77)*

As head wrestling coach, the Pirates were 94-14-3 and had five consecutive Southern Conference titles, the most won in a row by any ECU sport. Three-times, he was named Coach of the Year in the conference. In ten years, he lost but one in-state match and never lost to rival North

Carolina. Also coached golf team to two conference titles and is currently cross country coach and assistant athletic director at ECU.

## 1981

## Jack Boone

*Head Baseball Coach (1948-52)*

*Head Football Coach (1952-61)*

He is the fifth winningest coach in ECU football history, with a mark of 49-45-5. He coached ECU to its first bowl game ever, the Lions Bowl in 1952 and the Elks Bowl in 1953. He was Coach of the Year in the North State Conference in 1953 with an 8-2 mark.

## James Speight

*Football (1955-58)*

Runningback in the split "T" formation under Jack Boone. One of only three Pirate players to have jersey retired (#29). Ran for 2,700 career yards, third on the ECU all-time rushing list. Scored four touchdowns and a two-point conversion in 1959 game vs. Norfolk Navy for 26 points, a school record that still stands.

## Robert Kingrey

*Diving (1960-62)*

Won national diving championship in 1960 in one-meter and three-meter diving (NAIA) in first year with ECU. Was a three-time All-America (1960-62) in both the one- and three-meter events. Set freshman record for three-meter diving with 11 dives for 420 points, which remains the school record.

## Sheilah Cotten

*Women's Basketball (1971-75)*

First female ever inducted into East Carolina Sports Hall of Fame. Finished career with 1,270 points, first 1,000 point scorer in school history. Led ECU to the AIAW national tournament in 1972-73, when team finished 18-2 and won the school's only AIAW state title. Her 442 points in 1974-75 ranks fifth in single-season scoring, and she holds the school mark for most points in a game (39) and most field goals attempted in a game (33).

## 1980

## Carlester Crumpler

*Football (1971-73), Director of Administrative Services (1988-92), Academic Counselor (1992- )*

Considered as one of the best runningbacks ever at East Carolina. Still holds school records in seven categories including 2,889 career rushing yards, 37 career touchdowns and 1,309 yards rushing in 1972. He was honorable mention All-America in 1972 and 1973 and voted Southern Conference Athlete of the Year in 1972. Also All-State two years and selected to play in the Blue-Gray All-Star Classic in 1973.

## Danny Kepley

*Football (1972-74)*

A third-team AP All-America linebacker in 1974, he was given the nickname "Captain Crunch" for his fine defensive play while at East Carolina. He received numerous honors including national defensive player of the week in 1973, All-Southern Conference three years and All-State two years. After leaving ECU, he starred with the Edmonton Eskimos of the Canadian Football League.

## Cecil Heath

*Basketball, Baseball (1951-55)*

Won seven letters in basketball and baseball at ECU. Played second base and was a four-year starter in baseball, finishing with a .320 batting average. In basketball, he was a three-year starter at guard, leading ECU to a 23-2 mark in 1953-54. Named All-State in both sports in 1954-55.

## Dr. Ray Martinez

*Head Swimming Coach (1954-67)*

Directed the Pirates to the NAIA National Championships in 1957 and 1959. His 1962 team was NCAA College Division Runners-up. A Master Coach and winner of the Kiputh Award for national leadership in aquatics, Martinez had 45 men earn All-America honors, 15 NAIA and 4 NCAA College Division national champions.

## Lex Ridenhour

*Football, Basketball, Baseball (1934-38)*

A four-letter winner in three sports. He served as a captain on all three teams. In baseball, he holds a .366 lifetime batting average and a .411 mark in 1938. He was a captain on the 1932 team that gave up just 13 points.

## Ike Riddick

*Basketball (1957-60)*

A three-year starter for East Carolina basketball in the old North State Conference. Held the school season scoring mark with 24.6 points per game for one season until it was broken in 1977-78. Was a team captain as a senior. Was named MVP in the Portsmouth Invitational Tournament.

## Carlton Barnes

*Baseball (1962-65)*

The MVP in baseball in 1965 while serving as the team captain. Was named All-State three times. Played in the Cincinnati Reds organization from 1965-68. A magna cum laude graduate from ECU.

## 1978

## Jim Johnson

*Football, Basketball, Baseball (1933-37)*

A three-sport star for the Pirates, he was captain for each team twice. He was athletic director following the war, coached three sports, and helped establish the East Carolina Educational Foundation (Pirate Club).

## Jim Mallory

*Head Baseball Coach (1954-62)*

Won numerous championships during his coaching stint at ECU including the 1961 NAIA crown. His teams won 161 games and lost just 60. He became the Dean of Men in 1959 and was the Associate Dean of Students at East Carolina.

## Tom Michel

*Football (1960-63)*

A four-year fullback under Jack Boone and Clarence Stasavich, averaged 5.7 yards per carry in college and became the first Pirate back to play in the National Football League, serving with four clubs from 1964-68. He led the 1963 team in rushing, scoring and total offense and

helped the team to a 27-6 win over Northeastern in the 1963 Eastern Bowl in Allentown, Pa., earning outstanding back honors. His son, Billy, was also a three-year letterman at offensive guard for the Pirates and participated in the Blue-Gray All-Star Classic in 1988.

**Richard Narron**  
*Baseball (1966-67)*

An All-America catcher, he played in East Carolina's first two Southern Conference championship baseball teams, helping the Pirates to a 17-10 record in 1966 and a 23-6 mark in 1967, when he was captain and made All-America. He signed with the New York Mets in 1967 and played there until moving to the Baltimore Orioles for the 1970 season.

**1977**

**Kevin Moran**  
*Football (1965-67)*

Winner of the Jacobs Blocking Trophy in 1967, one of only two Pirates to have ever claimed that prestigious award. Co-captain of the 1967 team under Clarence Stasavich that finished 8-2.

**Earl Smith**

*Football, Basketball, Baseball (1937-39), Basketball Coach (1959-63), Baseball Coach (1963-72)*

Three-sport athlete and two-sport coach at East Carolina with a career that totaled nearly 40 years. His 1963 baseball team was third nationally in the NAIA. Later took four teams to the NCAA regionals. Never had a losing basketball season and only one losing baseball season.

**Roger Thrift**  
*Football (1949-50)*

Set several football records as a quarterback in 1949 that stood for years. Has been a distinguished coach and athletic administrator in college and high school since leaving East Carolina.

**John W. (Jack) Young, Jr.**  
*Football (1940-41)*

Played on the first winning East Carolina football team in 1940. Also played on the only unbeaten and untied team in history in 1941. Came to East Carolina as a non-scholarship tackle.

**1976**

**Clarence Stasavich**  
*Head Football Coach (1962-69), Athletic Director (1963-75)*

Outstanding football coach at ECU, whose teams went 50-27-1 in eight seasons and won the Southern Conference championships in 1966. In 1964, he was the NAIA Coach of the Year while leading the Pirates to a 9-1 mark and the Tangerine Bowl. As an athletic director, he engineered ECU's entrance into the Southern Conference and developed the modern athletic complex that the Pirates currently use.

**1975**

**Dave Alexander**  
*Football (1963-65)*

An excellent fullback for the Pirate football team from 1963-65. Named All-Southern Conference and Little All-America in 1965. Is currently seventh on the ECU career rushing list with 2,112 yards. He became the first Pirate to rush for over 1,000 yards in a season with his 1,029 yard effort in 1965.

**Maurice Everett**  
*Tennis (1955-58)*

Came to East Carolina on a basketball scholarship, but became the North State Conference singles tennis champion for three straight years.

**Bill Holland**  
*Baseball, Football (1935-38)*

An outstanding tackle on the Pirate football teams of 1935-38. Also an outstanding baseball player during the same time period.

**Ken Midyette**  
*Diving (1957-59)*

Earned All-America honors in diving during the 1957, 1958, 1959 seasons. Also was the NAIA diving champion in 1958 and 1959.

**1974**

**Ken Beatty**  
*Head Football Coach (1932-33)*

First coach of the East Carolina Pirate football team.

**Dr. N.M. Jorgensen**  
*Athletic Director (1947-63)*

Served as East Carolina's first Athletic Director.

**Lacy T. West**  
*Basketball, Baseball (1961-63)*

All-America baseball and basketball player at East Carolina. Finished his basketball career with 1,111 points, a school mark at the time.

**William M. Shelton**  
*Football (1936-39)*

Three sport letter winner at East Carolina from 1936-40. Served as team captain of the 1938 football squad, as an offensive and defensive back.

**Robert R. Sawyer**  
*Swimming (1955-59)*

Earned All-America honors during his swimming career at East Carolina.

**Alden Glen Bass**  
*Football (1957-60), Baseball (1961)*

All-America football and baseball player at East Carolina. Served as a team captain of the 1960 football squad, which finished 7-3.

**Robert F. Hodges**  
*Football, Basketball (1950-53)*

All-America football and basketball player at East Carolina.

**Claude Keith King, Sr.**  
*Football, Basketball (1951-55)*

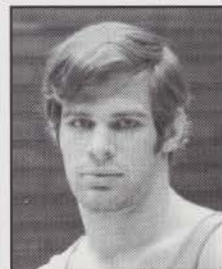
All-Conference football and golf player at East Carolina.

**Sonny Russell**  
*Basketball (1949-53)*

All-State basketball player at East Carolina. Is currently second in career scoring at ECU with 1,653 points.

**Bill Cline**

All-America football player at East Carolina. Is the Pirates' career total offensive yardage leader with 3,883 yards and is third in pass completions and passing yardage.



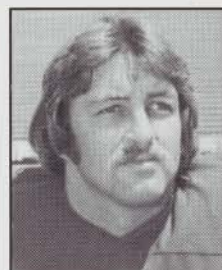

# Southern Conference Era

East Carolina began competition in the Southern Conference, one of America's oldest athletic leagues, in 1964. During its tenure in the league, the Pirates enjoyed much success. In June of 1977, ECU left the Southern Conference to become a major Division I independent.

In 12 seasons of football in the Southern Conference, the Pirates were able to win 70.6 percent of their games, claiming a 44-18-1 record. ECU won the Southern Conference football championship in 1966, 1972, 1973 and 1976.

The Pirates also had success in other sports in the Southern Conference. ECU was able to claim the Commissioner's Cup, an award symbolic of the top overall athletic program in the league, four times. The Pirates received the award in 1969-70, 1973-74, 1974-75 and 1976-77.

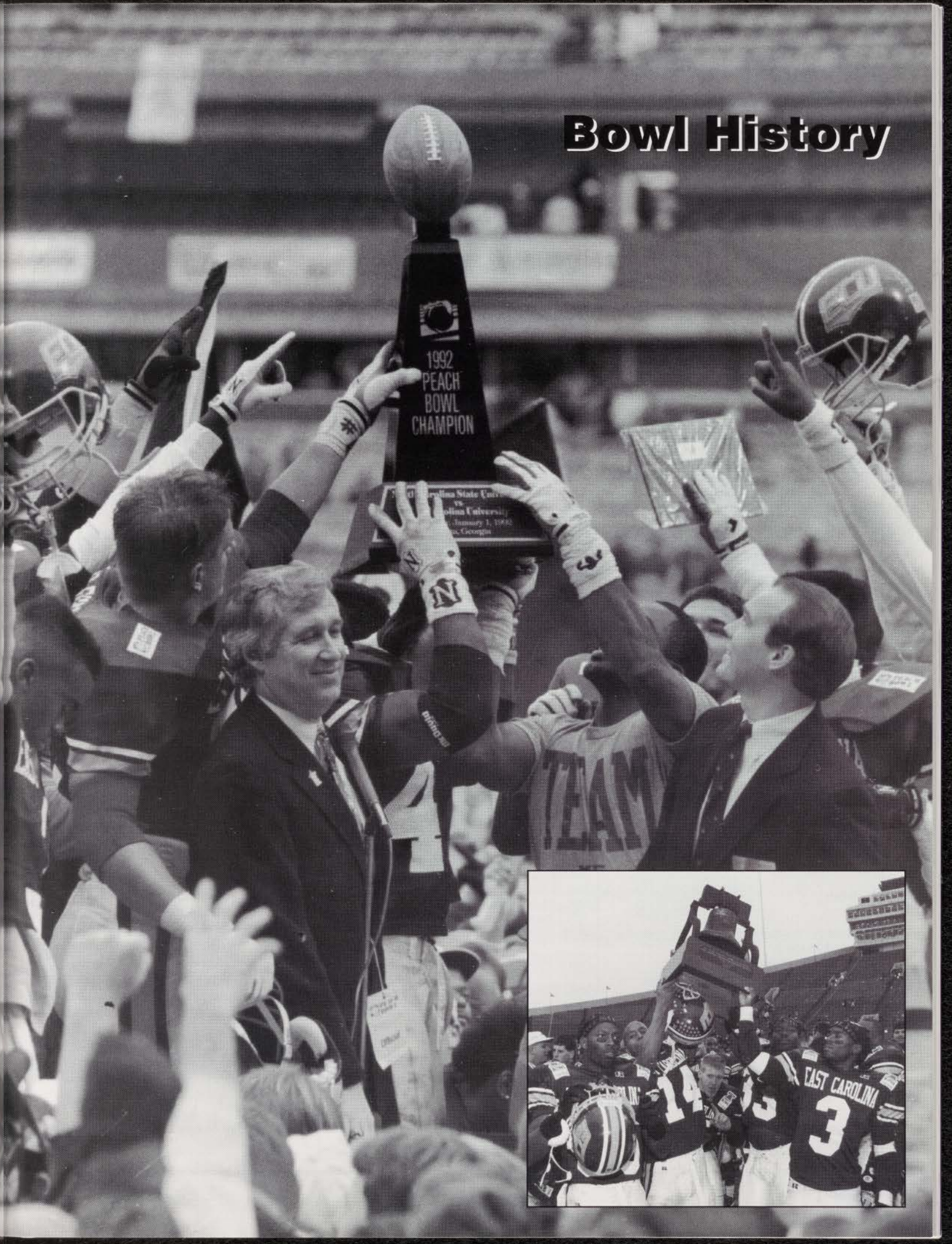
## The Clarence Stasavich Trophy

The Southern Conference honored East Carolina University's late athletic director and football coach, Clarence Stasavich, by naming the league football championship trophy the Clarence Stasavich Memorial Trophy.

Appropriately, the Pirates won the trophy in 1977, its final year in the league, and the first year in which the trophy officially carried the name of Clarence Stasavich.

Stasavich was one of the prominent leaders in the Southern Conference from the time the Pirates joined the league in 1964 until his death in 1975.

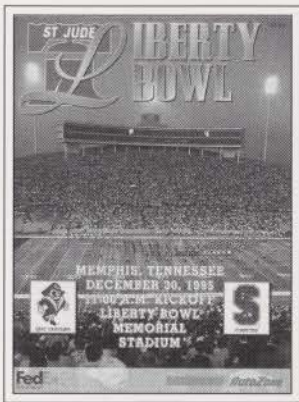

### East Carolina Finishes Business In Return Trip To Memphis By Mike Grizzard, Daily Reflector Sports Editor

Consider the business finished. East Carolina returned to the Liberty Bowl. And this time it won.

A 19-13 victory over Stanford on a Saturday that started cool and sunny and quickly turned cold and wet culminated the Pirates' quest for vindication from last year's debacle against Illinois. That game ended 30-0, but also started a mission to take care of 'Unfinished Business.'

And though it will not go down as one of the more picturesque wins in ECU history, it was quite satisfying for the many purple-clad fans in the crowd of around 30,000 (47,398 tickets were sold) who had to grit their teeth to the exasperating end.

Despite clamping down on the high-scoring Cardinal offense all day, the Pirates could never create a comfort zone and had to make one last stand to escape. Stanford, down just six despite a day full of frustration, suddenly found itself with a chance to win in the final minute.

A 40-yard kickoff return by Damon Dunn gave Stanford life. Quarterback Mark Butterfield then completed two passes and scrambled three yards to move the ball to the 26.

Stanford burned its last timeout after a six-yard pass to Mark Harris. Twenty seconds remained.

Could the Cardinal, left for dead, possibly pull this out? Not quite.

Butterfield's pass on third and one was incomplete, then his fourth-down pass to Brian Manning on a slant pattern was dropped.

ECU limited Stanford to a season-low 211 yards, including just 72 on the ground. The Pirates also forced four turnovers - two interceptions and two fumbles - and converted those into 10 points.

"We knew we had a good defense and we just wanted to prove it today," said Daren Hart, who had a 39-yard interception return for a score and 10 tackles and was named the Pirates' defensive player of the game.

These Pirates looked like imposters, too. They won not by Crandell's arm or Jerris McPhail's legs but with defense and field goals.

Yes, field goals.

Junior Chad Holcomb, named ECU's offensive MVP, set Liberty Bowl and personal single-game records with four field goals. He had three in the second period, including a career-best 46-yarder to help the Pirates to a 16-7 lead. He then added a 34-yarder with 1:50 left.

But no offensive touchdowns. None.

"It's been a long, long time since that's happened," ECU head coach Steve Logan said of winning without an offensive touchdown. "That's a first in the seven years I've been at East Carolina."

Crandell completed just 19 of 46 passes for 218 yards. He was intercepted once and sacked twice. McPhail rushed for 92 yards on 27 carries.

The Cardinal cracked ECU's defense only once, driving 69 yards in 13 plays to get within 10-7. Butterfield kept the drive alive by zipping a 31-yard pass to Manning on third and 23, moving the ball to the ECU 7.

Adam Salina scored the touchdown on a 1-yard run.

ECU resorted to a bit of trickery on its next possession, getting a 23-yard run from Morris Foreman on a fake punt. The Pirates reached the seven but had to settle for a 26-yard Holcomb field goal.

Holcomb added a 41-yarder with three seconds left in the half as ECU cashed in on a fumble recovery by Travis Darden.

Kwame Ellis had Stanford back in it in a flash. First, he scooped up a blocked punt by Nicodemous Watts and ran two yards for a score to make it 16-13. The PAT kick sailed wide.

Two plays later, Ellis picked off a Crandell pass intended for Troy Smith at the Stanford 49. The Cardinal reached the ECU 39 but had to punt.

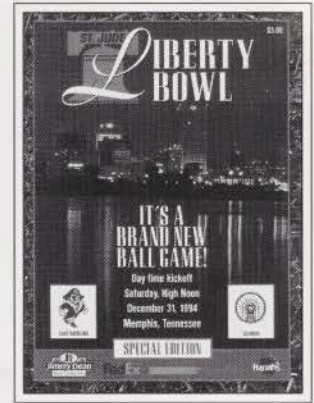

### *Illini Leave East Carolina in a Daze*

**S**omebody dubbed them "Thrillinois" because of the excitement they create on the football field.

That name fit perfectly Saturday because Illinois provided all the thrills and chills with a 30-0 domination of East Carolina in the St. Jude Liberty Bowl.

Quarterback Johnny Johnson had said his team would be ready, and he wasn't kidding. He threw for 250 yards and four touchdowns to stroll away with the MVP trophy.

And the Fighting Illini's heralded defense lived up to its No. 9 ranking, creating five turnovers that translated into 24 points. It was a flat-out skunking, a rarity for ECU's proud and explosive offense.

"I'm very stunned," said leading receiver Jason Nichols, one of many Pirates walking around in a post-game daze.

"I thought we would score," said linebacker Mark Libiano. "But it was a total team loss. They came out on fire."

Illinois coach Lou Tepper said he was also shocked his team could hold ECU scoreless. And Pirates' boss Steve Logan was apologetic to about 12,000 fans who had traveled so far only to see so little.

"We missed on some early opportunities to make it competitive," Logan said. "It's the only game we haven't been competitive in. But all the mistakes we made were due to the pressure they put on us. That team played great."

The Pirates (7-5) had come seeking more prestige, a final top 25 ranking and extra glitz to take into next season. They got none of that.

Instead, the Bucs just got a load of big, strong, bully boy Illinois, which took a 24-0 lead and virtually all the suspense out of the game by intermission.

When Johnson wasn't directing the offense, the Dana Howard-Simeon Rice-propelled defense was creating havoc.

It forced Marcus Crandall into an uncharacteristic four interceptions. And, it jumped all over Junior Smith, holding ECU's career rushing leader to 46 yards on 15 carries.

This was an Illini team some people wondered if it could get excited about playing in the Liberty Bowl.

The tone was set early.

The Big Ten team recovered an ECU fumble at the Illini 32 and struck for a quick six. Johnson hit Ken Dilger, who made a snazzy catch, on a 17-yard TD across the middle.

Then, with 10 seconds left in the first quarter, Jasper Strong turned a Johnson pass into a 73-yard score with the help of two downfield blocks by Dilger and Jim Klein. Logan saw that as a back breaker.

But perhaps the play that dashed the Pirates' hopes more than any other came early in the second quarter.

Down 14-0, Crandell lofted a pass to Allen Williams run-

ning a fade route in the end zone. Williams and Robert Crumpton went up for the ball - and Crumpton came down with it, wresting it away from the Pirates receiver.

"We just didn't get anything going after that," said Crandell, who completed 20 of 41 passes for 179 yards. "It was a tough day. They got us out of our game."

Howard, the Butkus-award winning linebacker, intended to make it just that way for ECU, saying the Illini's goal was a shut-out.

And, on offense, Johnson kept the Pirates off balance mixing the run and pass.

By the day's end, Johnson also had hit Jason Dulick and Ty Douthard on short scoring passes.

"We're not just a defensive team, we're a quality team," Tepper said. "We had a sharp day."

The Illini (7-5) did.

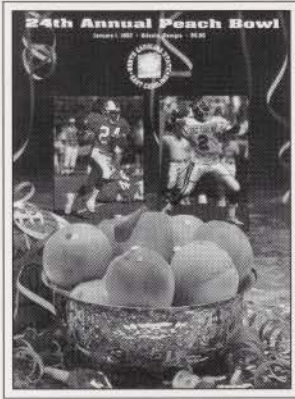

### Bowl Win Over Wolfpack Caps 11-1 Season By Mike Grizzard, Daily Reflector Sports Editor

The perfect script now has the perfect ending. And a team that always believed it could did something truly unbelievable.

It was done with thrills and chills, suspense to the very end. But what did you expect?

Down 34-17 with 8:41 to go and its never-say-die fans chanting "We believe" East Carolina mustered an incredible rally Wednesday to overcome N.C. State 37-34 in the 24th Annual Peach Bowl. The fitting end to a storybook season leaves the Pirates 11-1.

"When we were behind 17 points you couldn't help but hear the people dressed in purple chanting that they believe," ECU head coach Bill Lewis said. "I think we've added a special meaning to 'I believe' or 'We believe' or however you want to say it because I think that we truly captured the spirit of that."

The frenzied bowl-record crowd of 59,322 and the final Peach Bowl to be played in Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium nearly settled for a tie, but Damon Hartman's 49-yard field goal attempt as time expired was short and wide right.

College football's Cinderella had beat the clock again.

"We've been called a Cinderella story all year," ECU senior center Keith Arnold said. "Cinderella went to a ball tonight and got married. She's queen now."

"The feeling's unbelievable . . . now I guess we know who's best in North Carolina."

East Carolina, with its second-straight win in a series that was discontinued in 1987, can make that claim. But for three-plus quarters, the Wolfpack was better.

Muscle and speed in the running game enabled the Pack to do what it wanted coming in - keep the ball out of the hands of Pirate quarterback Jeff Blake and put a lot of points on the board.

Anthony Barbour was a danger on the corners and finished with 90 yards on 23 carries. Greg Manior and Gary Downs banged inside and combined for 117 more yards. The Pack ran the ball 56 times for 186 yards.

But when the time was an ally and first downs were critical, ECU's defense got tough and State wilted.

"I thought we were the better team there for a while," N.C. State head coach Dick Sheridan said. "But we didn't get the job done either offensively, defensively or the kicking game."

State's collapse down the stretch included a shanked punt that gave the Pirates a shot in the arm.

The Wolfpack also could find no solution to a red-hot Blake, who completed 31 of 51 passes for 378 yards, threw four touchdowns and was intercepted three times.

Blake was particularly uncanny in the fourth quarter, hitting on 17 of 26 passes, 15 of 21 for 148 yards on the final three scoring drives in which the Pirates unveiled a shotgun formation.

Tightend Luke Fisher was unstoppable, catching a bowl-record 12 passes for 144 yards. Fisher had six catches for 63 yards in the fourth period, including the game winner with 1:32 left.

The Wolfpack fumbled with just over a minute to go then lost on a last-second field goal to Maryland two years ago. The Cavs routed State 42-10 this season.

The Wolfpack appeared to have the Pirates primed for the kill after Shad Santee recovered Dion Johnson's fumble of a punt and Ledel George hit Charles Davenport with a 52-yard TD pass two plays later to make it 34-17.

Mike Reid picked off a Blake pass at the Wolfpack five on the next series, but ECU got the ball back at State's 32 after Kilpatrick's 10-yard muffed punt with 8:41 to go.

Then Blake took over.

From the 32, the Pirates needed seven plays and just 1:15 to get in the end zone. Blake got the score, slipping in from the two on a third-down option to the left.

Kilpatrick got off a 50-yard punt into the end zone after the Wolfpack failed to pick up a first down on the next series. Blake promptly marched ECU 80 yards in 11 plays, hitting 8 of 10 passes and burning just 2:06, to get within 34-30.

Blake hit Dion Johnson with a 17-yard pass for the score at the 4:18 mark. The Pirates opted to go for a two-point conversion, but Tyler Lawrence pressured Blake and forced a fumble.

State, still clinging to the lead, took over again and was in immediate trouble when Jerry Dillon disrupted an end around and dropped Davenport for a 9-yard loss.

The Pack was forced to punt and Johnson shot up the middle for 27 yards to give the Pirates the ball at the 41.

Near disaster came when Fisher fumbled after snaring a Blake pass, but Cedric Van Buren recovered. Blake hit Fisher again for 8 yards then 22 for the TD.

Terry Jordan quickly moved the Wolfpack, which still had all three of its timeouts, to the ECU 36 with 26 seconds left. That's when Zaim Cummulaj burst through to sack Jordan for an 18-yard loss.

After Jordan hit Robert Hinton for 23 yards, the Pack went for the tie.

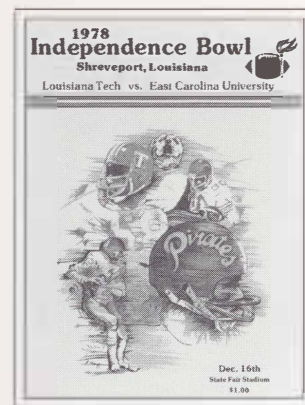

### East Carolina Wins Independence Bowl

**E**ast Carolina's football team made the most of its first post-season opportunity in 15 years by crushing Louisiana Tech, 35-13, in the third annual Independence Bowl.

It was the Pirates' first bowl appearance since they defeated Maine, 31-0, in the Tangerine Bowl in 1965. After the game, ECU coach Pat Dye expressed hope of bigger and better bowls in the Bucs' future.

The victory wasn't the only honor ECU garnered in the game. Fullback Theodore Sutton set an Independence Bowl record with 143 yards in 17 carries and was named the game's outstanding offensive player by the press. End Zack Valentine, who led the ECU defense with seven tackles, received the award as the top defensive player.

"That's the way to have fun playing the game," Dye told his team in the locker room. "We may not have been the most polished team in the world, but we really got after them."

The Pirates certainly did that. More than one Bulldog had to be helped from the field after a bone-crushing hit, and quarterback Keith Thibodeaux, who directed all three Tech scoring drives, had to be taken to the hospital after ECU linebacker Jeffrey Warren buried his helmet in the quarterback's chin.

The East Carolina defense completely shut down the Bulldog rushing attack, limiting the Southland Conference champions to just 12 yards on the ground. The host Bulldogs were more successful through the air, passing a record 52 times for 263 yards.

"We knew Tech was going to throw the football against us," Dye said, "and they got a lot of yards. They really had enough yards to score more than they did. But our defense played well, especially inside the 20, and we came up with the big play when we needed it."

Dye also had praise for his offensive unit. "I'm particularly proud of the offensive line. The offensive line has made tremendous progress and (quarterback Leander) Green is executing our offense as well as it can be executed."

Sutton, who had the best day of his career against the Bulldogs, gave credit to the Pirate defense. "Our defense kept us in good field position all game," the Kinston junior said. It was his 45-yard TD scamper in the third quarter that ended a Tech comeback bid by putting ECU up, 28-13.

Sutton said the bowl trip "means a great deal to us. We finally got a chance to prove to people that we can play football."

His record-breaking performance was a result of taking what the Bulldog defense would allow. "In our offense, one person might get a lot of yardage in a certain game. Tonight, the inside veer was really open and I just took advantage of it," Sutton explained.

It was an afternoon of frustration for Louisiana Tech as the Bulldogs left the football on the ground almost as many times as they put it in the air. Three Tech turnovers in the first half led to Pirate touchdowns and a 21-0 ECU lead early in the second quarter. The Bulldogs turned the ball over seven times in the game, six times before intermission.

Tech coach Maxie Lambright had no explanation for his team's inability to handle the ball. "It was a case of one (fumble) after a pitch, one after a pass, one after a sack ... I don't know why."

Lambright said the Pirates were a "fine defensive team. They rush the passer and we didn't move the ball on the ground. We've played an awful lot of football teams and East Carolina is one of the finest."

The lopsided outcome of the game, despite only a 332-275 Pirate

advantage in total yardage, was the result of the Bucs being able to capitalize on Bulldog mistakes, while Tech was unable to take advantage of all of its opportunities. A goal-line stand inside the ECU five late in the third quarter closed the door on the Bulldog hopes.

.....Neither team was able to generate any offense early in the game; there wasn't even a first down in the first five possessions. But the Pirates finally got away on their first scoring drive after defensive end Cliff Williams recovered a fumbled pitch at the Tech 16.

Sutton broke loose for 13 yards on first down to put the ball at the three and two plays later, Anthony Collins took a pitch over the right side for the score. Bill Lamm, who kicked PAT's after all five ECU TD's, made it 7-0.

.....The Pirates set a number of records in the young bowl, including fewest yards allowed on the ground (12), most touchdowns (five), most points scored (35), most rushing first downs (15), most fumble recoveries (four) and most interceptions (three).

The victory gave the Pirates a 9-3 record for the season and was the first time the visiting team has defeated the Southland Conference champions in the Independence Bowl. It was also the Bucs' first win over Tech, which finished 6-5, in three tries.

# East Carolina University



East Carolina University, a diverse, comprehensive university, is known for the quality and breadth of its academic programs and for its pursuit of excellence in a variety of activities.

With an enrollment of nearly 18,000 students, ECU is the third-largest institution of the 16-campus University of North Carolina system. It has a work force of more than 3,500, a faculty numbering more than 1,100 and a budget of almost \$290 million.

The campus today is alive not only with the activities of its students and faculty but also with the whir and clatter of construction crews. More than 20 percent of the campus is under construction or renovation or will be in the next few months. Among the prominent projects are the Student Recreation Center, which will be completed in the fall of 1995, and the additions and renovations to Joyner Library, which will be under way for four years.

ECU students come from all 100 of North Carolina's counties, 45 states and 38 nations. Of the students, 57 percent are women, 83 percent are undergraduates and 13 percent are minorities.

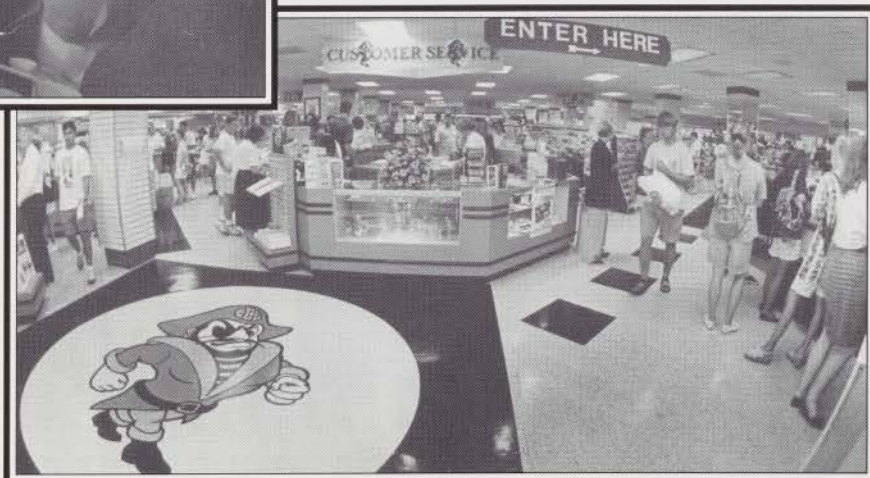
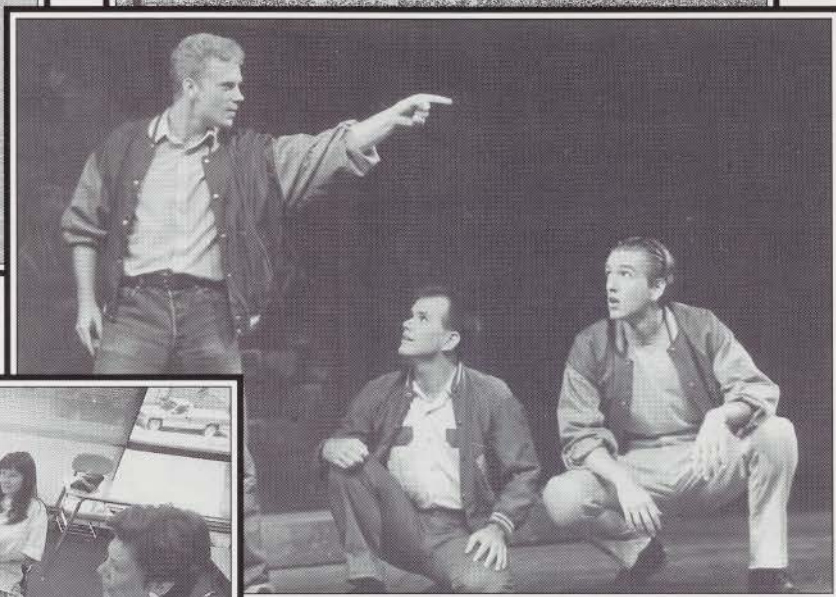
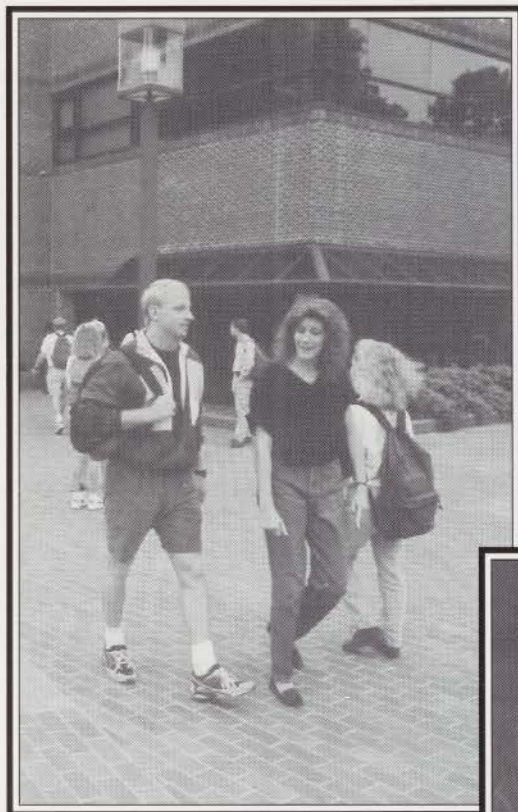
The university offers 106 undergraduate degree tracks and 92 graduate degree tracks. It conferred 3,416 degrees during the 1992-93 academic year, and it has close to 70,000 living alumni.



Here is a selection of other distinctions of ECU:

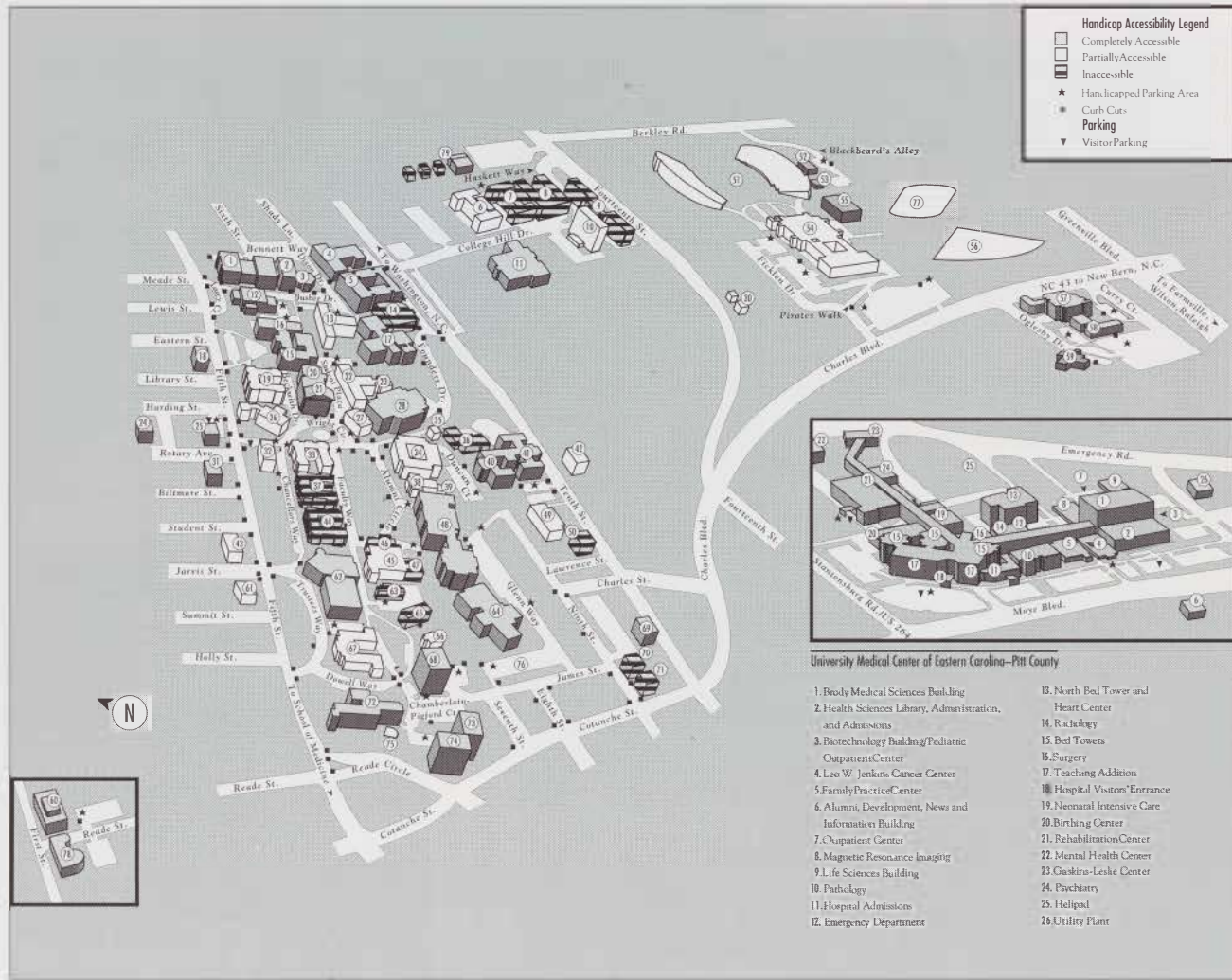
- It has the largest teacher-education program in North Carolina and the 15th largest in the nation.
- It has one of the largest art schools in the Southeast and the only art program in North Carolina accredited by the National Association of Schools of Art and Design. The Wellington B. Gray Gallery is one of the largest contemporary art galleries in North Carolina.
- The School of Medicine has ranked No. 1 nationally in the percentage of graduates entering primary care fields.
- The School of Social Work is the only one in North Carolina with both undergraduate and graduate programs accredited by the National Council on Social Work Education.
- In the School of Human Environmental Sciences, the hospital-management program is one of only two such programs in North Carolina. The child life program is the first one in North Carolina.
- The music education program in the School of Music is among the largest and strongest in the Southeastern United States. The music therapy program is the only one in a state-supported school in North Carolina.
- The school of Business has the second-oldest accredited MBA program in the state.
- The university has state-of-the-art student computing labs campus-wide and some of the finest discipline-specific student computing labs in the nation.
- The Department of English publishes seven scholarly and literary journals: *Children's Folklore Review*, *The Concord Saunterer*, *Minnesota Review*, *North Carolina Literary Review*, *Tar River Poetry*, *The Thoreau Society Bulletin* and *Victorians Institute Journal*.

# Greenville and Eastern N.C.

Greenville, North Carolina is one of the fastest growing cities in the Tar Heel state. Founded in 1771 as the Town of Martinsborough, Greenville has seen its population grow from just over 29,000 in 1970 to an estimated 52,000 in 1994. And, there's plenty of reasons why this city has grown so much.

The county seat of Pitt County, Greenville has been traditionally agricultural, holding the distinction as the world's leading producer of bright, flue-cured tobacco, and also a leader in production of peanuts, soybeans, cucumbers and other fruits and vegetables.

Major manufacturing employers in the Greenville-Pitt County area include Glaxo Wellcome Pharmaceuticals, Yale Materials, Empire Brushes and Procter & Gamble.

While the region remains strong in agriculture, Greenville has changed with the times, adding the proper mix of industry and recreational facilities to give the community a variety of options.

Local and regional support for expanded medical services in Eastern North Carolina resulted in the development of a major medical community in Greenville, and the region now depends on the city as a primary source for advanced health care.

Pitt County Memorial Hospital is Greenville's community hospital and the primary teaching facility for the East Carolina University School of Medicine, and with its excellent facilities and capabilities, it has become the regional referral center for 29 counties in Eastern North Carolina.

Greenville is a rich environment for the arts with a blend of art organization, a private Art Center, Pitt County Arts Council and the ECU Schools of Art and Music. Popular art festivals highlight the year, while the excellent reputation of the ECU School of Music attracts a high percentage of out-of-state students to the respected program. Greenville also plays host to the annual Michael Jordan Celebrity Golf Classic, which benefits the Eastern North Carolina Ronald McDonald Houses.

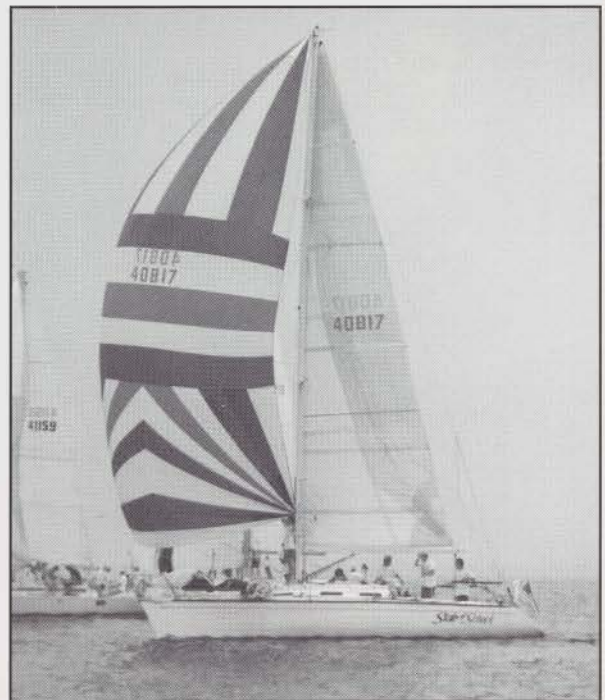
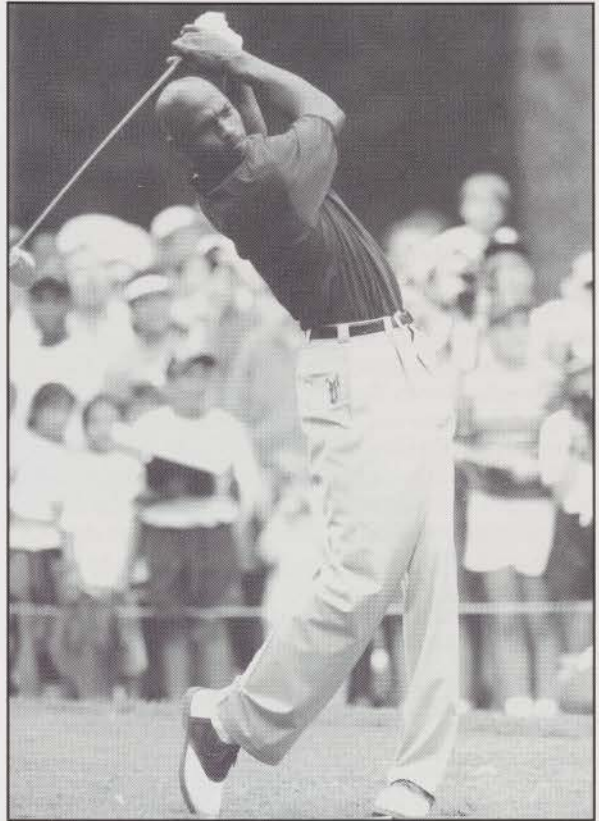
A wide array of live theater plays, musical comedies, opera and operettas and films come to Greenville through ECU. The Summer Theatre, featuring Broadway shows, and the Dinner Theatre series are particularly popular.

Greenville citizens enjoy outdoor recreation all year long thanks to a moderate climate. There are four distinct seasons, none too harsh to enjoy. Winters are short and usually mild, with the average January temperatures hovering around 45 degrees. The long summer is not too hot due to a stiff southern breeze and average July temperatures of 79 degrees.

With an average rainfall of 40 inches, well distributed throughout the year, and a growing season of 215 days, the city wears a lush, green mantle most of the year.

Greenville is less than two hours drive from the famed Outer Banks of North Carolina and the beaches, seafood and the recreation-rich Pamlico and Albemarle sounds and other Atlantic coast estuaries.

The proper blend of its people, its technology, and its recreation, makes Greenville, North Carolina a great place to be.



# Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium

The James Skinner Ficklen Memorial Stadium was dedicated on September 21, 1963, with East Carolina defeating Wake Forest 20-10.

In April, 1994, Ron and Mary Ellen Dowdy, of Orlando, Fla., announced a \$1 million gift to the ECU Educational Foundation. The gift will go toward the planned expansion of ECU's football stadium, which was renamed Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium.

Ron Dowdy, who is a member of the school's Board of Trustees, currently oversees commercial leases, residential apartments and several other enterprises, as part of Dowdy Properties in Orlando.

Dowdy, a 1966 graduate of ECU, has been involved with many civic organizations, including the Executive Committee of the Florida Citrus Sports Association, the Board of Directors for the Florida Citrus Bowl, the Board of Directors at Humana Hospital Lucerne in Orlando and the Senior Citizen Advisory Committee in Orange County.

Pirate fans everywhere are excited about the stadium expansion which will begin this fall and increase the facility capacity to approximately 48,000. Other plans include club level seating on the north side, as well as additional seats to be added at the east end.

The original plan for the stadium was announced on Oct. 7, 1961, by Dr. Leo Jenkins, Chancellor of the College, at a meeting of the Society of Buccaneers.

Within a year, \$283,387 had been raised, although the goal had been only \$200,000. With the funds in hand, Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium was built.

The original stadium consisted of the permanent stands on the south side, a small press box and the old lighting system which was removed after the 1974 season. Total cost was \$300,000.

The north side permanent seating was constructed in 1968,

increasing the stadium seating capacity to 20,000.

The stadium was named for the late James Skinner Ficklen, a Greenville resident, who distinguished himself as one of America's leading tobacconists. At the time of his death in 1955, Ficklen was President and Chairman of the Board of the E.B. Ficklen Tobacco Company of Greenville. He was a close friend of the College and established a financial aid foundation, the Ficklen Foundation, to aid students of the College.

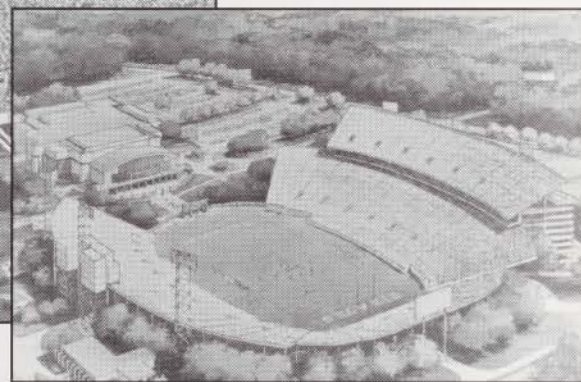
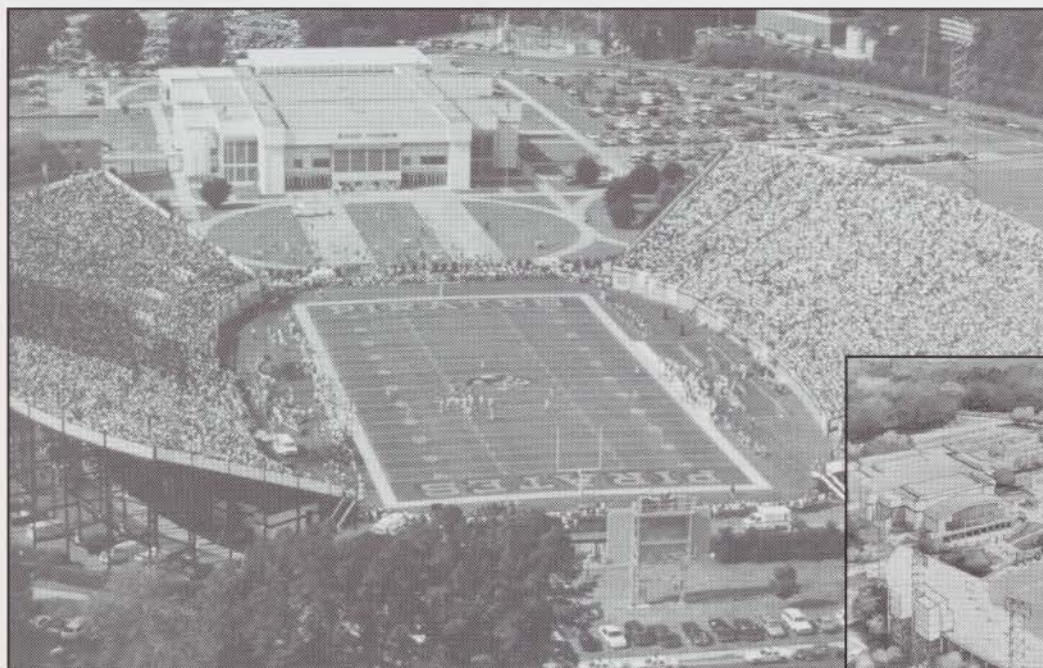
The first major change in Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium was the lighting systems, a change that occurred just before the 1975 season opened. The old inner stadium lights on six poles were removed and replaced with six towers outside the stadium. The system is a combination of metallic and incandescent lights. There are 288 fixtures of 1500 watts each on six 162-foot towers. Cost of the system was \$450,000.

A radical change greeted fans as the 1978 season opened. An expansion on all four corners boosted Dowdy-Ficklen's seating capacity from 20,000 to 35,000, the third largest stadium in North Carolina. This expansion was made possible with 2-1/2 million dollars through a drive in the spring of 1977.

In addition to more seats, the current press box with three levels and an elevator for access was built. The press box has space for 92 writers and an entire floor for electronic media. Also, a modern scoreboard with a lightbank message center was placed on the east end of Dowdy-Ficklen.

During the summer of 1983, a complete renovation took place on the playing surface. A new drainage system, a new base of gravel and sand, new treated topsoil and a new grass was installed. The new grass, Tifton 419 Hybrid Bermuda was sprigged at the rate of 600 bushels per acre.

The 1992 season saw the season attendance record fall in Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium as the Pirates drew a school-record 164,068 fans for five home games.



**Since 1963, over 3.2 million fans have packed Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium. During this same time period, ECU has won over two-thirds of its home games. When completed, stadium expansion will increase capacity to approximately 48,000.**

# Ward Sports Medicine Building



The first major step in East Carolina's continuing efforts to upgrade facilities, the Ward Sports Medicine Building, became a reality in October of 1989. The building has been dedicated in honor of Robert and Margaret Ward of Burlington, N.C.

In 1991, the Wards made, then, the largest single endowed gift ever received through the ECU Educational Foundation. The gift is just one of the numerous contributions the Wards have made to the Foundation over the years. They are Endowed Scholarship members of the Pirate Club, have made many contributions toward the enhancement of academics services for student-athletes, and for their son Robert's graduation from ECU in May of 1991, contributed a \$50,000 athletic scholarship in his name. Bob Ward is also the co-chairman of the school's Shared Visions Capital Campaign.

"The Wards have shown a deep commitment to East Carolina University and its athletics program," said new Director of Athletics Mike Hamrick. "We are appreciative of their support and generosity. College athletics needs more people like the Wards."

The Board of Trustees, on Dec. 6, 1991, approved a Motion at their meeting, to dedicate the Sports Medicine Building in the name of Bob and Margaret Ward.

The three-story, 82,095-square foot structure, the home of ECU's athletic department and Human Performance Laboratory, provides the two areas with state-of-the-art technology.

The injury treatment and rehabilitation center of the sports medicine department includes the latest in technology, making it one of the top sports medicine programs in the country. Among the many features of the new building is a 5,000-square foot strength training center, a state-of-the-art human performance laboratory, biomechanics lab, classrooms and men's and women's locker rooms.

The entire coaching staffs for the football and men's and women's basketball teams are housed on the second floor, while the athletic administrative staff has their offices on the third floor.

The building is unique in structure. The shortest of six sides of the building is the front of the facility which faces Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium.

The building has already played host to several conferences, seminars and meetings, including ECU's annual Sports Medicine Conference.

Features of the first floor include:

**\*Sports Medicine Training Center** — Sophisticated injury treatment, evaluation and rehabilitation equipment fill the room including touch-control whirlpools, a computerized isokinetic re-

habilitation and evaluation machine, exam rooms including one dental chair, and a 7-foot deep whirlpool that allows an injured athlete to exercise without bearing weight.

The training area also boasts 19 taping stations and a radio communication center which allows sports medicine officials to monitor action on the football field and basketball court simultaneously.

**\*Strength Training Center** — Includes 5,000-square feet of shiny new chrome and steel, with mirror-lined walls.

**\*Locker Rooms** — Both men and women.

**\*Equipment Storage** — A spacious area with equipment for 135 football players and more.

Attractions of the second floor include:

**\*Pat Draughon Multipurpose Lounge** — An area that overlooks Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium. Trophy cases, retired jerseys and mementos from Pirate athletics line the room.

**\*Football** — Offices for the head coach, nine assistant coaches, graduate assistants, a recruiting coordinator and secretaries. Football also has two storage rooms, a file room, and has access to two mini-auditoriums.

**\*Leo Jenkins Auditorium** — A multi-use auditorium that can seat up to 300 people. The auditorium can be broken down into two or four different rooms. It is used for meetings, classes, press conferences and other gatherings.

**\*Hall of Fame** — Hall of honor recognizing distinguished individuals who have brought honor to Pirate athletics. A plaque recognizes each member of the Hall of Fame.

**\*Basketball** — More offices for each coach, and a meeting room for both the men's and women's staff.

**\*Student Development** — Computers and tutors are available to keep the student-athlete ahead in his/her studies and career development.

**\*Classrooms**

**\*Sports Medicine Offices**

The third floor includes:

**\*Human Performance Laboratory** — A sophisticated lab with the latest in human performance technology.

**\*Biomechanics Lab**

**\*Video Lab and Film Darkroom** — A state-of-the-art video workroom with the latest in high-tech equipment.

**\*Athletic Administrative Staff** — Offices saturate the third floor from the athletic director to the business manager to the sports information director.

# Chancellor Richard Eakin

For Chancellor Richard R. Eakin, the terms "academics" and "athletics" are not mutually exclusive, but mutually reinforcing. He knows from personal experience.

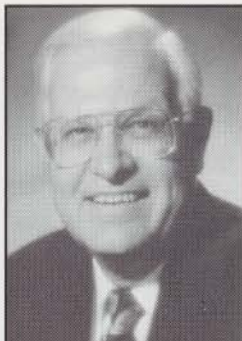
As a Geneva College undergraduate, he majored in mathematics and physics while a member of the basketball team. He also served as President of the Student Senate and Class Valedictorian and was graduated in 1960 with the honor *summa cum laude*.

Today Dick Eakin is in his 10th year as ECU's chief executive officer and his leadership mark is evident throughout ECU, including athletics.

He has a vision of greatness for ECU and leads in the belief that the university can build upon and add to its elements of distinction and strong tradition for excellence in teaching, research, regional services, and athletics.

# Athletics Director Mike Hamrick

Just over a year after he assumed the post of Director of Athletics at East Carolina University, it is easy to see the impact Mike Hamrick has had on the Pirates' program.

Hamrick, who was named Athletics Director at ECU in April of 1995, has approached his first year on the job in Greenville with a level of enthusiasm and personal touch which has proved to be refreshing to Pirate supporters everywhere. But most importantly, his contributions to the growth of East Carolina Athletics have been numerous and significant.

Among Hamrick's accomplishments in his brief tenure at ECU has been putting the Pirates in a position to become a member of Conference USA. Supporters of the program have anxiously waited for the day when East Carolina would again become a football member of a conference, as the Pirates were last members of the Southern Conference in 1977.

While Hamrick's efforts with Conference USA for ECU have served as a telling sign of the Pirates' continued growth under his leadership, another achievement which Hamrick steered has been the resumption of the football series with both North Carolina State and North Carolina. Hamrick has been instrumental in a four-year agreement reached with the Wolfpack as two games will be played in Charlotte and the other two on each school's campus. In addition, Hamrick was able to secure a home-and-home series with UNC Chapel Hill with the Tar Heels slated to make their first-ever appearance in Greenville.

N.C. State and UNC are not the only two state schools scheduled for future games in Dowdy-Ficklen. Hamrick has lined up Wake Forest for the home opener in 1997 when the Pirates will play in their newly-renovated and expanded stadium. This will be a rematch of the 1963 home opener when the Demon Deacons helped open Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium.

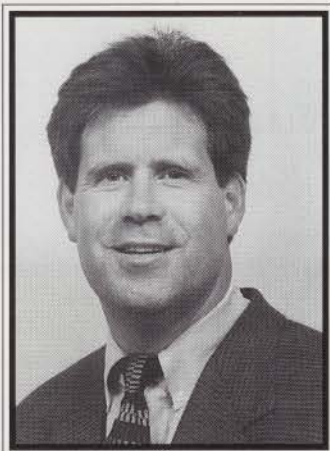
Even before Conference USA began discussions with East Carolina about possible inclusion in the league, Hamrick was at work making sure the Pirates had a bowl opportunity each year. Last fall, he was a key player in the agreement which provided ECU with a chance to qualify for the St. Jude Liberty Bowl for an additional two years.

The progress of the program under Hamrick can also be measured in the television commitments engineered by the Pirates' leader. Through Hamrick's efforts, all ECU road games not scheduled for national television, will be televised to the eastern part of the state for the first time in history. In addition, Hamrick has worked closely with ESPN to secure dramatically-expanded coverage for the program. The result of the Pirates' television packages is that the school will experience significant revenue generated through this medium.

Since Hamrick became athletics director, contributions to the ECU Educational Foundation (Pirate Club) have also risen and football season ticket sales are at an all-time high.

Hamrick has also made it clear in his early tenure that he is a committed administrator who wants to see all of East Carolina's sports programs continue to improve, particularly in the Colonial Athletic Association. In his first year, Hamrick has substantially increased the budgets of the Pirates' Olympic sports programs

During Hamrick's tenure at Arkansas-Little Rock, he engineered the Trojans' move into the Sun Belt Conference. Twice before Hamrick's arrival in Little Rock, UALR had been turned down for Sun Belt Conference membership. Also, UALR added two sports - men's and women's



golf - and funds for women's scholarships increased by over 200 percent. He also supervised a \$600,000 fund-raising effort for facility improvements at UALR. On the academic side, the cumulative GPA of UALR student-athletes rose dramatically to 2.94.

Before going to Arkansas-Little Rock, Hamrick served as Assistant Athletics Director at Illinois State University from 1984-90.

At ISU, Hamrick initiated and coordinated all departmental external activities and efforts to generate revenue from private contributions, promotional and marketing programs, ticket sales, merchandising and advertising. He also served as Director of the Redbird Educational and Scholarship Fund.

Hamrick worked as Assistant to the Director of Athletics at the University of Kansas from 1982-84. He initiated and implemented the department's entire promotional and marketing scheme and supervised nine non-revenue sports.

He began his professional career at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas, where he served as Director of Athletic Promotions from 1981-82.

A 1980 graduate of Marshall University, Hamrick played football where he was a two-year starter (1978-79) at linebacker. He received a master's degree in Sports Administration from Ohio University in 1981, where he also served as an assistant football coach.

Hamrick is currently Vice-President of the Colonial Athletic Association for the 1996-97 year and is also Chair of the CAA's Finance and Governance Committee. He is serving a three-year term as a member of the ECAC marketing committee.

The 39-year-old Hamrick and his wife, Soletta, are the parents of three children - twin sons, Brett and Justin, and daughter Mollie Ann.

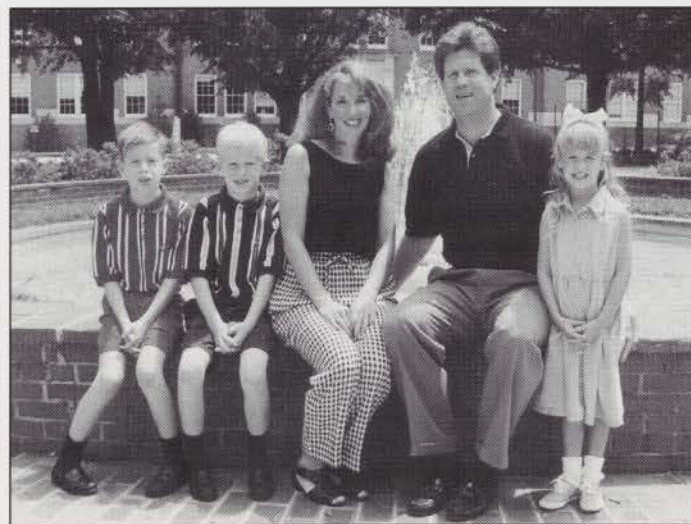

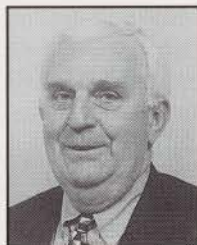

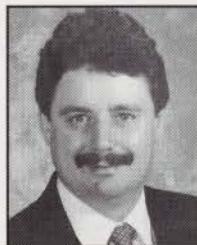

## Dr. Henry VanSant

*Associate Athletics Director for Administration and Non-Revenue Sports*

Dr. Henry VanSant, whose association with East Carolina spans five decades, is in his ninth year as associate athletics director at his alma mater.

During the spring of 1995, VanSant served as acting director of athletics and among his accomplishments were the hiring of Joe Dooley as men's basketball coach and Anne Donovan as women's basketball coach.

VanSant was an administrative assistant to the athletics director for three years prior to his elevation to associate director. In addition to working closely with athletics director Mike Hamrick, VanSant is responsible for overseeing all internal operations within the athletics department.

He oversees the business office, student-athlete support services, Olympic sports programs and operations.

# Pirate Club

The East Carolina University Educational Foundation, better known as the Pirate Club, is the backbone of financial support for ECU Athletics. Monies raised by the organization are used to help fund student-athlete scholarship costs associated with the Pirate athletics program.

The Pirate Club continues to grow, as it surpassed the coveted \$1 million contribution mark and 4,000-plus members for the eighth consecutive year. 1996's goals are \$1.6 million in unrestricted contributions.

Dennis Young, a 1969 ECU graduate, is the Pirate Club's Executive Director. Dennis is responsible for the Educational Foundation's participation in the University's \$50 million "Shared Visions Campaign" and oversees the Pirate Club operation. A native of Winston-Salem, Dennis played football at ECU during the 1965-67 seasons. He and his wife, Ellen, have two children - Allison Baise and Chip.

Mark Hessert is the Pirate Club's Associate Director. Prior to joining the Pirate Club staff, Mark was Executive Director of The University of Akron's Zip Athletic Club. Mark is responsible for the Pirate Club's annual fund campaign and oversees the Pirate Rep Program. Mark and his wife, Cheri, have one child - Logan.

Matt Maloney and Mark Wharton are Pirate Club Assistant Directors. Matt and Mark have responsibility of coordinating the Pirate Club's 34 community chapters, which span the East Coast from Washington, D.C. to Atlanta, Ga.

Pirate Club members enjoy a number of benefits including priority in purchasing football and basketball season tickets and postseason tickets; private and semi-private parking for home games; use of Pirate Club facilities; monthly newsletter; and the opportunity to attend special meetings with ECU coaches and athletic administrators. In 1993, a new point system was developed to use in determining priority seating for Pirate Club members. The system takes into consideration a member's annual contribution, consecutive years of membership, cumulative amounts given over time, and season ticket purchasing. Minimum annual membership contributions begin at \$75.

Members of the Pirate Club also receive a sense of ownership in the success of the Pirate athletics program and a great deal of satisfaction from their investment in the lives of Pirate student-athletes, who represent ECU on and off the "playing fields."

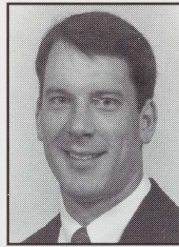

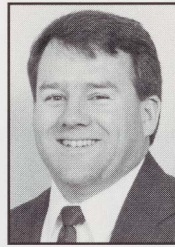

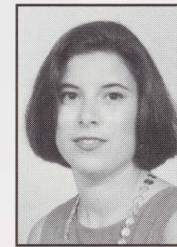

## Pirate Club Endowment Program

In 1983, four prominent East Carolina University alumni saw the need to establish an endowment program for the University's Division I-A athletics program. Through their pledging \$50,000 each toward establishment of a scholarship endowment fund, Roddy Jones of Raleigh, James Maynard of Raleigh, Alvin Hutzler of Richmond, Va. and Sam Wornom of Sanford played an important role in providing the basis for enhanced student-athlete scholarship funding by the East Carolina University Educational Foundation (Pirate Club) to ECU Athletics for years to come. Since 1983, the Educational Foundation's Endowment Fund has grown to approximately \$2.3 million in assets. Earn-

ings from endowment funds invested can be used by the Educational Foundation to help it meet its annual student-athlete scholarship funding pledge or for other restricted expenditures of ECU's 18 sports program.

During the recent Shared Visions Campaign, three \$100,000 Position Endowments were established. Further, a \$500,000 gift was received by the Educational Foundation to help fund ECU Athletics' model student development program. 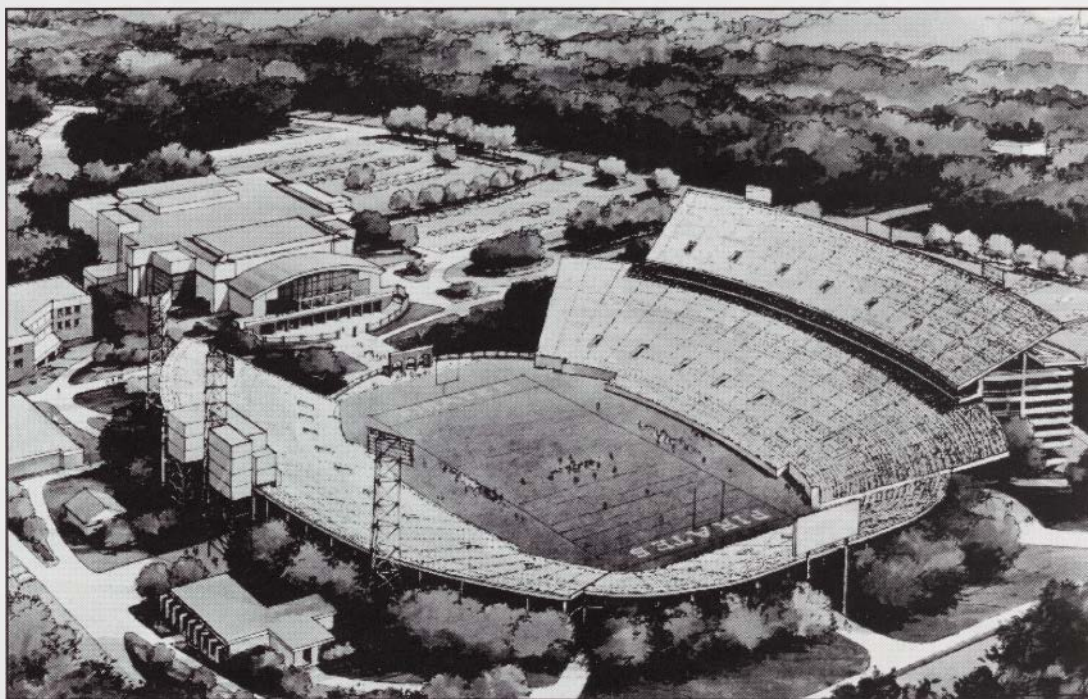

# Shared Visions Campaign

## STADIUM EXPANSION PROJECT

East Carolina University recently completed its first-ever major capital campaign - the \$50 million Shared Visions Campaign. At the close of the campaign, the University raised more than \$65 million for endowed scholarships, academic expansion, faculty development, ECU student programs and facility improvements.

Included in the \$65 million raised was \$18 million for ECU Athletics. The Educational Foundation (Pirate Club), one of the University's three non-profit foundations, reported the following Shared Visions campaign results.



- \$6 million for the expansion of Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium
- \$3 million for the further endowment of student-athlete scholarship support
- \$500,000 to endow the student-athlete development program
- \$400,000 to seed construction of a new Pirate Club Building
- \$6.5 million in annual scholarship funding

Expansion plans for Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium call for the construction of an 8,000-seat deck atop the north side of the stadium, 3,000-4,000 permanent bleacher seats in the east end zone, and 1,500 club level seats under the north side decking. Completion of the 8,000-seat decking will be prior to the 1997 football season, with endzone seats and club level seats slated for completion by the 1998 season. Following this expansion, Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium will seat approximately 48,000 fans.

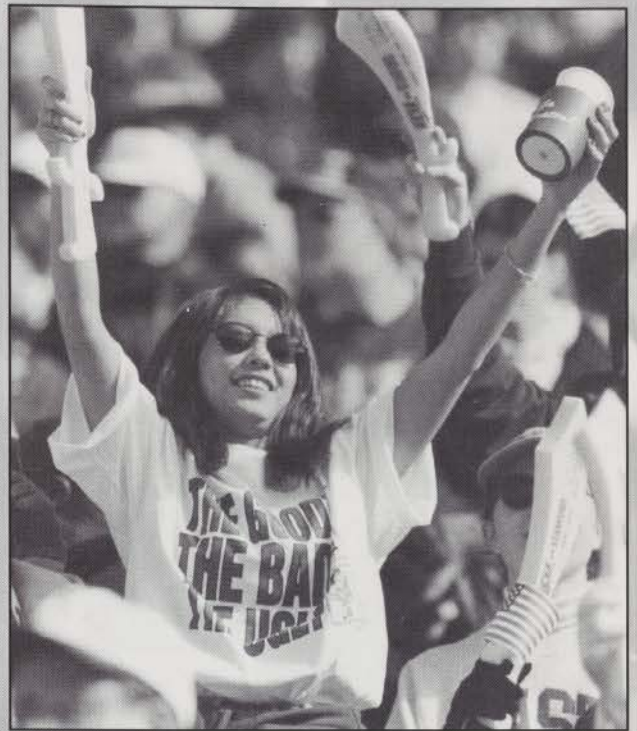
When it comes to student-athlete scholarship funding, the ECU Educational Foundation has increased its endowment fund to \$2.5 million as a result of the Shared Visions Campaign.

Successes of the Shared Visions Campaign were the direct result of efforts from many volunteers who not only gave their financial support to this campaign, but their

valuable time as well. Robert A. "Bob" Ward and Henry G. Williamson served this campaign effort well as Co-Chairmen. Ward is Executive Vice President of Finance and Administration at Unifi, Inc. in Greensboro and Williamson is President and COO of BB&T Financial Corporation in Winston-Salem.

More than 550 people made Shared Visions Campaign pledges to the East Carolina University Educational Foundation in support of the University's athletics program.

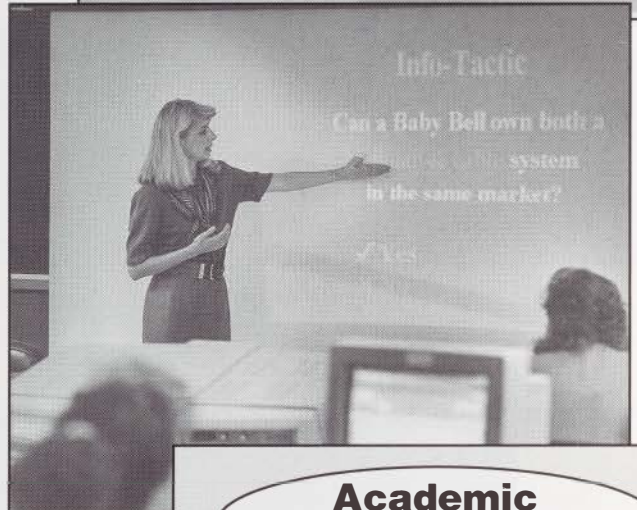
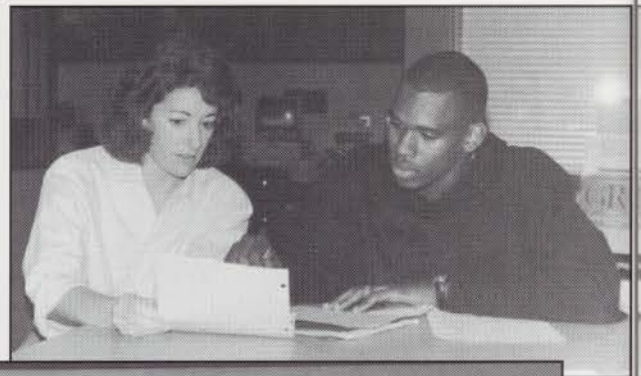
The ECU Athletics Department is committed to its Student Development Program and the understanding that student-athletes become well-rounded in all aspects of life.

# Sports Medicine

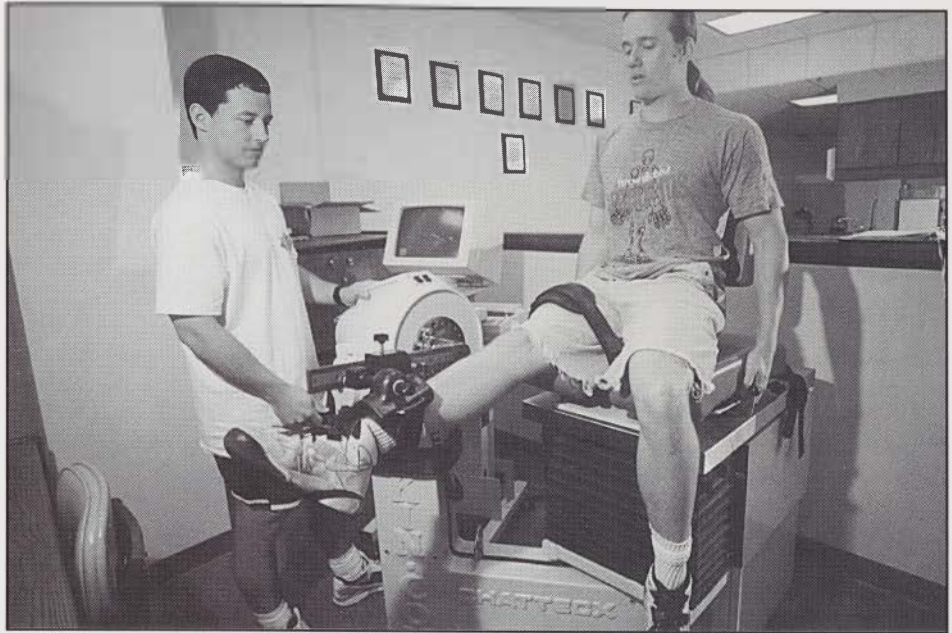

I want to take a minute to talk to you about one of the country's fastest growing college football programs — East Carolina University.

Times have never been better at East Carolina. During the decade of the 1990s, the Pirates have enjoyed a rapid level of progress and growth. We have been invited to participate in three postseason bowl games in the past five years, including last season when our team defeated Stanford of the Pacific 10 Conference in the St. Jude Liberty Bowl at Memphis.

We are also excited about the current expansion project with Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium. This expansion will increase our seating capacity to approximately 48,000 for the 1997 season. We will also be adding club level seats and additional seats in the east endzone over the next two years.

Here at ECU, we take great pride in balancing the athletic and academic lives of our student-athletes. I believe this commitment is evident when considering that our program has been recognized by the CFA for three consecutive years as having a graduation rate of 70 percent or higher.

When it comes to an exciting brand of football, we feel Pirate football rates with any around. Our offense has been consistently ranked among the nation's top 20 in the 1990s and our defense has made constant strides over the past four years. Last season, the Pirate defense was 30th in the nation in scoring defense and No. 7 in the country in pass efficiency rating.

The future is very bright at East Carolina. Our last four recruiting classes have been outstanding and we are excited about the program's continued growth. Last season after finishing 9-3 and winning the Liberty Bowl, the Pirates were ranked in virtually ever final top 25 poll; so, it's safe to say East Carolina football is no longer a secret on the national level.

As a young athlete, if you are looking for a great place to go to school academically, athletically and socially, the answer is East Carolina University.

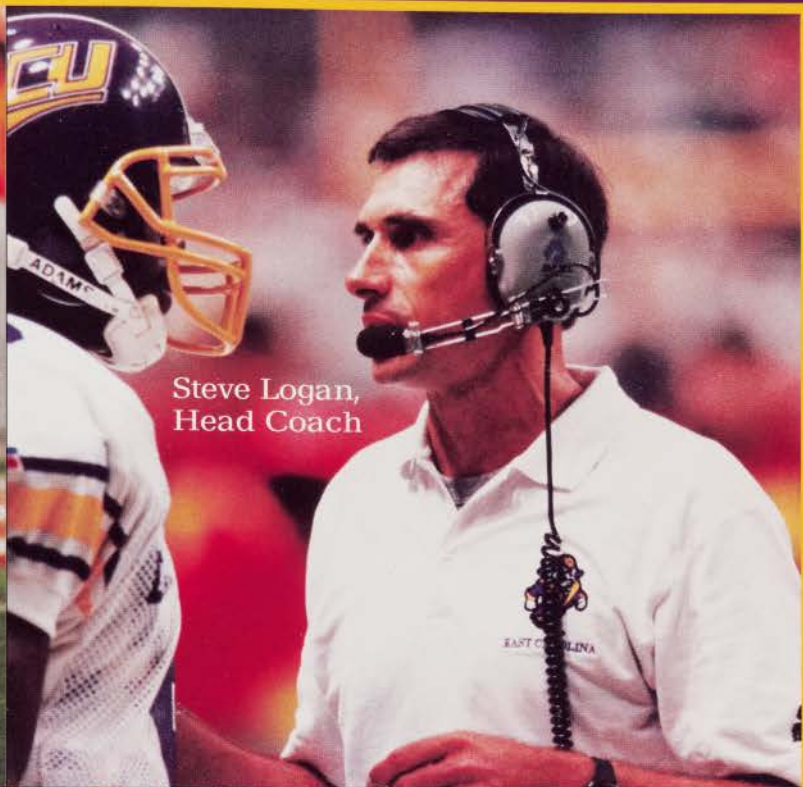
